

### **Teaching Strategies with Newsela**

See below for practical ways to implement Newsela into a classroom environment.

### **Target reading skills**

# Small Groups

- 1. Assign differentiated texts to small groups
- 2. Provide content by <u>Lexile</u>, topic, or for literature circles by <u>novel study</u>

### Students become experts and teach

- 1. Use this graphic organizer
- 2. Split students into groups
- 3. Select articles and assign to groups
- 4. Allow time for collaboration and discussion

### **Engage through movement**

### Gallery Walk

- 1. Introduce a research project
- 2. Allocate research time to explore on Newsela
- 3. Take notes on a graphic organizer
- 4. Students prepare a poster or presentation
- 5. Walk around and provide feedback

### Provide evidence based arguments

- 1. Introduce a debate topic from this collection
- 2. Divide students into Affirmative and Negative
- 3. Develop a strong argument
- 4. Research and take notes on this organizer
- 5. Opening statements, rounds, rebuttals, crossexamination, closing statements

### **Build background knowledge**

## Flipped Class

- Assign Newsela articles or texts for students to review at home before class
- 2. Use class time for discussions, collaborative activities, or application exercises related to the assigned content

### Hands-on learning practice

- Incorporate Newsela articles into projectbased learning units to provide <u>diverse</u> <u>perspectives</u>, <u>background information</u>, and <u>build literacy skills</u> related to the project theme
- 2. Use articles as sources for research within the projects

### Increase critical thinking skills

## Socratic Seminars

- 1. Select Newsela articles that stimulate critical thinking and discussion
- 2. <u>Assign articles</u> before a discussion to provide necessary background information to engage in thoughtful conversations

### Whole class engagement

- 1. Integrate Newsela articles into instruction as supporting materials
- 2. Use <u>polls</u>, <u>quizzes</u>, <u>videos</u>, or <u>write prompts</u> related to the articles to maintain interactivity and student engagement

#### Create a collaborative environment

- Assign Newsela articles to small groups of students and have them <u>analyze</u> and discuss the content
- 2. Encourage group members to share their insights

## Cooperative Learning

#### **Build confidence in students**

# Peer Teaching

- 1. Assign articles to students with the task of becoming "experts" on the content
- Teach peers by summarizing the main points, leading discussions, or creating presentations based on the assigned articles

### **Higher-order thinking**

- Assign articles that align with students' research questions or topics of investigation
- Encourage students to use Newsela as a resource for <u>gathering information</u> and forming hypotheses
