<b>Course Description</b>	This course is designed for advanced dance students and will focus on refining technical proficiency, artistic expression and creative fluency. Students are provided the opportunity to learn established choreography, as well as, original works. Students will engage in the processes of creation, rehearsal, and performance of dance works; ensemble skills; repertoire maintenance, and performance disciplines. The end of the year culminates with a fully produced performance of completed works. Additional rehearsal time required.
