16. Mr. Schmerelson – Fostering Healthy Relationships through Digital Citizenship Week (Res-007-24/25) (Noticed September 10, 2024)

Whereas, The Los Angeles Unified School District has established <u>policies and systems</u> the <u>Instructional Technology Initiative (ITI) with its mission</u> to focus on providing professional opportunities on instructional frameworks that leverage technology in purposeful and personalized ways;

Whereas, The ITI <u>District departments</u> coordinates <u>with one another on instructional technology</u> initiatives <u>and collaborates with various district departments</u> as well as <u>with</u> external partners to serve the needs of District students;

Whereas, The <u>ITI District</u> has established mandatory digital citizenship classes for students, exploring topics such as artificial intelligence, responsible digital use, and social media lessons to help build a responsible digital culture in the classroom and beyond;

Whereas, The District distributes professional development opportunities for teachers over the summer that focus on best practices to incorporate technology as a tool to better instruct and manage classroom settings;

Whereas, The LAUSD community is constantly surrounded by technological advancements, whether they are in the classroom, at home, in public spaces, or taking public transit, among other areas;

Whereas, The District is expanding opportunities for eSports programs that incorporate STEAM curriculum, allowing students an accessible pathway into the arts and sciences;

Whereas, The District has established the 2024 Digital Citizenship Challenge, incorporating leaderboards and prizes for the schools that meet or exceed digital citizenship standards;

Whereas, Digital Citizenship fits into LAUSD's strategic plan, focusing on pillars 1A (high-quality instruction), 1C (eliminating opportunity gaps), 2B (whole-child well-being), and 2C (strong social-emotional skills);

Whereas, The District recognizes the importance of inclusivity in digital spaces, ensuring that all students, regardless of socio-economic status, race, ethnicity, gender, or ability, have equitable access to technology and resources necessary for developing digital literacy and citizenship skills;

Whereas, Digital citizenship extends beyond the classroom, requiring students to understand the importance of balanced technology use, managing screen time, and the potential mental and physical health impacts of excessive digital consumption;

Whereas, The District is committed to fostering informed digital participation by teaching students to critically analyze digital content, engage with diverse perspectives online, and contribute to civic and social issues through responsible digital platforms;

Whereas, The District acknowledges the increasing importance of privacy and security in the age of AI, encouraging students to protect personal information online and be alert to online scams, data breaches, and privacy violations;

Whereas, The rise of artificial intelligence and machine learning necessitates teaching students how these technologies influence the information they consume, emphasizing the importance of understanding AI's role in shaping their digital experiences, biases, and decision-making;

Whereas, Digital citizenship education fosters collaboration and problem-solving skills in online spaces, preparing students for a future where teamwork and digital communication are essential in both academic and professional settings;

Whereas, The District is committed to supporting parents and guardians in their roles as digital mentors for their children, offering resources and training on topics such as online safety, cyberbullying prevention, and managing digital footprints;

Whereas, The District aims to promote digital resilience among students, equipping them with the skills to navigate challenges such as misinformation, cyberbullying, and online harassment with confidence, critical thinking, and proactive strategies for positive digital engagement;

Whereas, Academic settings maintain a responsibility to their students to foster a safe environment, teaching students about subjects such as civic engagement and being responsible citizens while addressing the <u>effects</u> negative impacts of cyberbullying and the difference between truths, half-truths, lies, facts, and opinions;

Whereas, The Governing Board of the Los Angeles Unified School District passed the Critical Media Literacy resolution on March 9, 2021, specifically addressing the misinformation campaigns in social media, radio, television, and in publications on Instagram, Facebook, and Twitter/X, among other social media platforms, and what the District can do to teach students about online misinformation;

Whereas, The rise growth of artificial intelligence has posed a danger to student learning, taking content from the internet and reflecting information to users as factual even when it is to the contrary; presents an opportunity to enhance student learning, it is essential to guide students in critically evaluating AI-generated content, helping them discern between accurate information and misinformation; and

Whereas, Studies also show that widespread damage addressing the spread of misinformation has a direct cause of violence, rejection of modern medicine/science, and increase in depression and suicide among student populations and their families and others; can significantly reduce violence, encourage acceptance of modern medicine and science, and promote mental well-being, leading to lower rates of depression and suicide among students, their families and communities; now, therefore, be it

Resolved, That the Governing Board of the Los Angeles Unified School District will acknowledge the week of Monday, October 16 to Sunday, October 22, 2024, as Digital Citizenship Week;

Resolved further, That all students will complete the Digital Citizenship course to demonstrate ability to discern online scams, AI manipulation and forms of digital misinformation and cyberbullying;

Resolved further, That the Board recommends that the Superintendent or a designee oversee opportunities for parents and guardians to actively participate in Digital Citizenship Week through the parent center, email updates, and other suitable platforms. These efforts will empower them with knowledge about AI-generated content in pictures and videos and best practices in navigating such situations; appropriate mediums to teach them about online scams, AI manipulation in pictures and videos, and best practices for such instances; and, be it finally

Resolved, That District staff will update the Board regarding this matter digital citizenship no later than May 2025 through a presentation during that month's Committee of the Whole or through an informative.

17. Ms. Goldberg – Support for Measure US, Proposition 2, and Proposition 4, Local and State Bonds that will Modernize Schools and Mitigate the Impacts of Climate Change in Our

Communities (Res-019-24/25) (Waiver of Board Rule 72)

Whereas, Los Angeles Unified School District schools require an estimated \$80 billion in upgrades and modernization that are currently unfunded, and that these capital projects are necessary to students' learning, college and career preparedness, safety, health, and well-being;

Whereas, California has no permanent funding stream for school repairs, and nearly 40% of California students attend schools that do not meet minimum facilities standards, leaving students statewide to deal with leaking roofs, insufficient access to shade and nature, and the impacts of asbestos, mold, lead, and other hazards;

Whereas, The climate change crisis has ushered in an era of extreme heat events, catastrophic fires, and vulnerable water supplies, and these new realities threaten the well-being of Los Angeles Unified School District students, families, staff, and their communities;

Whereas, Measure US, the Los Angeles Unified School District facilities bond, would raise \$9 billion to replace aging and deteriorating school facilities, including school technology infrastructure and equipment, enhance accessibility, expand food services, provide green schoolyards and outdoor learning environments, and promote energy efficiency;

Whereas, Proposition 2, "The K-12 Schools and Local Community College Public Education Facilities Modernization, Repair, and Safety Bond Act of 2024," would raise \$10 billion to fund construction and modernization of school facilities, career technical education facilities, lead remediation, asbestos abatement, roof replacement, air conditioning, secure school entry, and matching funds for schoolyard greening; and

Whereas, Proposition 4, "The Safe Drinking Water, Wildfire Prevention, Drought Preparedness, and Clean Air Bond Act of 2024," would raise \$10 billion to pay for climate and environmental projects addressing extreme heat mitigation, drinking water, groundwater, flooding, wildfires, and sea rise, and which would make funds available for local parks and green schoolyards; now, therefore, be it

Resolved, That the Governing Board of the Los Angeles Unified School District strongly endorses Measure US, Proposition 2, and Proposition 4; and, be it finally

<u>Resolved</u>, That by adoption of this resolution, the Board encourages all voting-age students, their families, and District staff to ensure they are registered to vote, that they have a plan to vote, and that they have learned about these critical proposals as well as the other measures, propositions, and candidates on their ballot.

Board Member Resolutions for Initial Announcement

18. Ms. Gonez – Reckoning with Our Past, Honoring Our Present: Developing a Los Angeles Unified Land Acknowledgement (Res-017-24/25) (For Action November 19, 2024)

Whereas, The Los Angeles Unified School District (District) recognizes that we occupy land that was originally and is still inhabited and cared for by the Gabrieleno Tongva and Fernandeño Tataviam tribes;

Whereas, The Gabrieleno Tongva People inhabited the region Tovangar, known today as the Greater Los Angeles Basin, which is the distinct community of the present day San Gabriel Band of Mission Indians (Gabrieleno Tongva Tribal Council) that originated in the cultures of the period preceding the establishment of the San Gabriel Mission from which the natives received the name Gabrieleno;

Whereas, The Fernandeno Tataviam People inhabited the region of Northern Los Angeles County and eastern Ventura County that includes San Fernando, Simi Valley, Santa Clarita, and Antelope Valleys that originated in the cultures of the period preceding the establishment of Mission San Fernando from which the natives received the name Fernandeño;

Whereas, The District proudly serves students self-identified as American Indian /Alaskan Native and Indigenous, including those who are Gabrieleno Tongva and Fernandeño Tataviam, and the District is pursuing a campaign to improve identification of this student group;

Whereas, From an early age students are exposed to pervasive cultural narratives that normalize eurocentrism and white supremacy, which can promote anti-indigeneity and erasure of minority students and be alienating for native and indigenous students;

Whereas, In 2020 the District took a significant step to combat this history of exclusion in the curriculum and adopted the resolution "Ethnic Studies for All Students: Reaffirming our commitment to Ethnic Studies in Los Angeles Unified" to further expand the ethnic studies curriculum throughout all grade levels and make the completion of at least one ethnic studies course a high school graduation requirement starting in the current school year 2024-25 (Res-001-20/21);

Whereas, The District has previously formally recognized the historical and current injustices committed against native and indigenous groups and disinvestment in native and indigenous students and, in 2021, the Board created a 10 million dollar fund dedicated to supporting the unique needs of Native American and Indigenous students and ensuring LAUSD schools affirm their linguistic, cultural, and historic backgrounds and promote their achievement and wellbeing;

Whereas, In 2021 the District formally urged the Office of Federal Acknowledgement within the Office of the Assistant Secretary – Indian Affairs of the Department of the Interior to grant long overdue formal Federal recognition of The Fernandeño Tataviam Band of Mission Indians (Res-017-20/21); and

Whereas, The District must join the State of California and County of Los Angeles in exploring the historical relationship between the District, Native Americans and indigenous students and families in the spirit of truth, healing, and reconciliation; now, therefore, be it

Resolved, That the Governing Board of the Los Angeles Unified School District apologizes on behalf of the Los Angeles Unified School District to tribal governments and communities for the history of maltreatment, subjugation, neglect and trauma that the California public education system has inflicted on the Gabrieleno Tongva, Fernandeño Tataviam, and other local tribes;

<u>Resolved</u> further, That the District acknowledges that colonization in what now constitutes Los Angeles Unified School boundaries resulted in land seizure, disease, slavery, relocation, genocide, multigenerational trauma, and educational disparities, and we are committed to truth, healing, cooperation and to elevating the stories, culture, and community of the original inhabitants of this

land;

Resolved further, That the District shall collaborate with local tribes to explore the historical record and relationship between the District and native and indigenous students, families, and communities, including the District's policies, procedures, and practices that may have harmed Native American and indigenous students, and to develop a public land acknowledgement statement on behalf of the District accompanied by an educational campaign to raise awareness and ensure students have access to educational resources that support their understanding of the history of the land occupied by LAUSD;

Resolved further, That the forthcoming public land acknowledgement be brought back to the Board for a formal vote no later than June 2025 and, once approved, be publicly posted on the District's website with the accompanying educational resources and tools for students and school communities to utilize;

<u>Resolved</u> further, That the District explore the feasibility and options for honoring the history of the land occupied by District and atoning for past injustices, reporting back on findings when the land acknowledgement is considered, including:

- Providing professional development to educators at all grade levels on native histories, the impact of colonization on native tribes and on the land we now occupy, and on the continued existence and culture of local tribes;
- Providing an update on and promoting the Indigenous student identification campaign effort currently underway with the goal of better capturing the number of American Indian/Alaskan Native and Indigenous students served by the District;
- Inclusion of stories, literature, and instruction that centers native voice and native tribes throughout the curricula, especially in grades TK-8, and providing an update to the Board on the implementation of AB1703 and AB1821 to provide accurate instruction on the treatment of Native Americans during Spanish colonization in California;
- District review of school names and mascots to ensure they comply with our existing policies around cultural sensitivities and affirmations in alignment with AB 3074;
- Establishing a dedicated position to work with tribes in alignment with the current efforts of the Multilingual and Multicultural Education Department;
- Prioritizing the inclusion of native plants in the District's design plans for outdoor improvements and greening projects;
- Providing resources to educators in recognition of Indigenous People's Day, National Day of Remembrance, California Native American Day, Native American Heritage Month, and, where appropriate, National Awareness Day for Missing or Murdered Indigenous Women and Girls;
- Increasing the representation of native artists in the painting of murals on school campuses, and, be it finally,

<u>Resolved</u>, That the District reaffirms its support and advocacy for the federal recognition of the Gabrileno Tongva and Fernandeño Tataviam and commits itself to advocating for the federal recognition of the First People of Los Angeles County.

19. Dr. McKenna, Mr. Schmerelson – Recognizing November as National Runaway and Homeless Youth Prevention Month (Res-020-24/25) (For Action November 19, 2024)

Whereas, November is National Runaway and Homeless Youth Prevention Month;

Whereas, Runaway and homeless youth, defined as young people between 12 and 24 years of age, have the least access to essential opportunities and supports;

Whereas, The prevalence of runaways and homelessness among youth is staggering, with studies suggesting that nationally between 1,600,000 and 2,800,000 youth up to 24 years of age experience homelessness every year, of which an overrepresentation, compared to the general youth population, are youth of color, gay, lesbian, bisexual, or transgender;

Whereas, Based on national surveys and California's youth population, an estimated 200,000 youth under 18 years of age, and thousands more who are 18 to 24 years of age, are homeless for one or more days each year;

Whereas, The percentage of unaccompanied homeless youth who are unsheltered in California stands at 68.2 percent, which is the second highest in the country. California also has 29 percent of the homeless youth in the country, the largest number of homeless youth of any state;

Whereas, An estimated 44,007 children and youth experienced homelessness in Los Angeles County in the 2023-2024 school year;

Whereas, Runaway and homeless youth flee conflict, abuse, neglect, or increasingly, poverty in their homes. They have become disconnected from educational systems and the workforce, and do not have the skills and financial resources to live on their own. The factors impacting youth homelessness are complex and differ from those impacting other homeless populations;

Whereas, Runaway and homeless youth who live on the street are victims of physical abuse, sexual exploitation, human trafficking, and crime in untold numbers. An estimated 300,000 youth are either victims or at risk of becoming victims of the commercial sexual exploitation of children each year, and sixty percent of these victimized children are homeless;

Whereas, Homeless youth tend to have started using drugs at a younger age, often before 15 years of age. Early drug use and abuse is predictive of serious adult addiction problems and long-term homelessness:

Whereas, Youth who "age out" of the foster care system are at an increased risk of homelessness, and represent an estimated 20 percent of the 20,000 youth who leave foster care and are currently homeless;

Whereas, Youth without a high school diploma are 346 percent more likely to experience homelessness than their peers who complete high school;

Whereas, Providing safe, stable, and permanent housing for runaway and homeless youth is a family, community, state, and national priority, and homeless youth are considered one of the unique populations in the homeless community by the United States Interagency Council on Homelessness;

Whereas, The future well-being of our state depends on the value we place on our youth, and, in particular, on our actions to provide the most vulnerable young people in the state with opportunities to acquire the knowledge, skills, and abilities they need to find and maintain stable housing and develop into healthy and productive adults;

Whereas, When targeted resources are invested, we see a significant increase in the number of communities with youth-specific housing and programs that will help prevent youth from becoming chronically homeless. California has increased the number of youth beds from 3,159 in 2015 to 6,240 in 2023;

Whereas, The California Coalition for Youth has operated the California Youth Crisis Line (1-800-843-5200), 24 hours a day, seven days a week, for over 30 years as the state's only emergency response system for youth in crisis, and which began offering chat-to-text counseling services in 2016;

Whereas, The California Coalition for Youth, along with other community-based organizations, providers, and advocates, are sponsoring California's thirteenth annual Runaway and Homeless Youth Prevention Month to increase awareness and action on behalf of youth at risk or currently living on the street;

Whereas, The Governing Board of the Los Angeles Unified School District recognizes the important role education can play in preventing and ending youth homelessness; the District provides assistance to children, youth, and families experiencing homelessness ensuring the their access to the same free, appropriate public education, including public preschools, provided to other children and youth; and

Whereas, Awareness of the tragedy of youth experiencing homelessness and its causes must be heightened to ensure greater support for effective programs aimed at preventing homelessness and helping youth remain off the streets; now, therefore, be it

Resolved, That the Governing Board of the Los Angeles Unified School District declares November 2024 Homeless Youth Awareness Month; and, be it finally

<u>Resolved</u>, That the Los Angeles Unified School District recognizes the unique challenges of youth experiencing homelessness and commits to increasing awareness of the issues impacting these students and will continue to support and explore programs, partnerships, and legislation that combat homelessness and remove barriers to success for homeless youth.

Ratification of a single-source named-in-grant teacher residency contract for teacher reimbursement in the Computer Science Supplementary Authorization program (CSSA) designed for practicing teachers with an interest in adding an introductory supplemental authorization in computer science, which will be offered as an online synchronous course. Completing the courses in a focused area of computer science meets the requirements set forth by the California Commission on Teacher Credentialing.

California State University, Los Angeles (CSULA or Cal State LA) will provide coursework for 60 LAUSD teachers over the course of three years (20 per year/cohort) to obtain a Computer Science (CS) Supplementary Authorization.

The contract is needed for continued support of the Computer Science Supplementary Authorization Program for LAUSD in-service teachers.

This grant will strengthen District efforts to address the growing computer science teacher shortage in K-9 schools. This grant will address the computer science teacher shortage by providing an accessible and affordable program to teachers to obtain their Computer Science Supplementary Authorization through the CSSA at Cal State LA.

There are currently 220 teachers teaching computer science courses Districtwide. Through this collaboration, the target for the CSSA at Cal State LA will be 60 additional authorized computer science teachers at elementary and middle schools. Increasing the number of authorized teachers ensures more students across the District have equitable access to appropriately trained teachers who have the skills and pedagogy to implement rigorous computer science instruction. Finally, this grant also supports the District's commitment to providing computer science education for all students before they graduate.

LAUSD will announce the opportunity to all teachers across school sites via emails, flyers, and online/offline bulletin boards and solicit applications. Any interested teacher is eligible to apply for the grant program. Annually, dedicated District program personnel will select 20 teachers based on the need of the applicant's site location.

Approval to award five (5) new formally competed contracts procured through a Request for Proposals (RFP) process, to be added to the existing bench of 11 contracts* (Board Report No. 049-22/23) via "refresh", and increase capacity by \$6,000,000, to support the implementation of the Social Emotional Learning (SEL) programs within the District. The authority to increase or decrease the amounts of these contracts will be limited to the updated aggregate value of \$16,000,000.

Vendors provide access to digital lessons and activities that are evidence-based and aligned with the CASEL framework and the District's SEL Competencies and are differentiated for application with a variety of stakeholders. Access to vendor platforms include PD and site support for implementation for schools. Access to aligned curricular materials are included, including support to access and use the materials with targeted learners. Specifically, the added vendors will provide support staff with access to SEL instructional activities and strategies to provide students in support of District Goal 4.

The current bench focuses primarily on Tier 1 SEL instruction in the classroom, whereas the added vendors support the District's transformative SEL instructional approach which is most effective in achieving student application of SEL byway of SEL integration. The added vendors provide schools specific instructional tools for support staff such as: MTSS support staff, counselors, administrators, special education staff, PSAs, PSWs, restorative justice staff, school climate advocates and paraprofessionals.

REQUEST FOR APPROVAL OF PROCUREMENT CONTRACTS $\underline{\text{NOT UNDER}}$ $\underline{\text{DELEGATED AUTHORITY}}$

The goal is to use SEL to increase positive outcomes for students, educators and support staff, including increased social emotional competence in self-management, self-efficacy, growth mindset and social awareness. With the exception of the Division of Instruction's (DOI) primary Tier 1 instructional curriculum contractors (Committee for Children and Inner Explorer), who's services are funded centrally with Title IV funds for Districtwide licenses, other District departments and schools may purchase services from the remaining contractors to support District Goal 4. DOI will support schools with SEL integration by providing access to professional development and resources designed to assist school teachers and support staff in providing SEL lessons, activities and strategies that best fit the needs of their students and stakeholders.

Direct instruction in SEL, combined with supportive programs, is essential for improving both adult and student outcomes in SEL competencies. Effective SEL instruction must extend beyond the classroom, influencing administrative practices and operations with the adoption of SEL curricula. The primary goal is to enhance social emotional competencies such as self-management, self-efficacy, growth mindset, and social awareness among students, educators, and support staff, ultimately leading to improved academic outcomes and increased staff performance. To achieve these goals, the District requires curricula consisting of two modules: professional learning in the use of evidence-based SEL curricula and/or the integration of social emotional learning into academic content; and curricula for direct instruction. This refreshed bench of SEL contractors were selected to address these needs.

Twenty proposals were received and five were deemed qualified. The source selection committee consisted of seven subject matter experts in the Division of Instruction, four from the SEL Department and three Administrative Coordinators. Firms were evaluated on qualifications and experience; qualifications and experience of personnel; technical solution/project approach; Small Business Enterprise (SBE) participation; Work Based Learning Partnership (WBLP) plan; and price.

This action supports the District's Strategic Plan, specifically Pillar 2-2C, Strong Social-Emotional Skills. One hundred percent of students in elementary, middle, and high school will engage in integrated evidence-based SEL instruction by 2026 as evidenced by classroom curriculum usage reports. By 2026, 50% of students will access and upload artifacts using the SEL portfolio in grades 2, 5/6, 8, 10, and 12 to deepen our understanding of student development in SEL and provide recommendations for multi-tiered systems of support.

Franklin Covey has been doing business with the District for 11 years, providing valuable services and resources. Character Strong has been a partner for one year, while Harmony Academy has been collaborating with the District for 11 years. School Connect and Sown to Grow are both new vendors, bringing fresh perspectives and offerings to our education community.

Authorization to increase the aggregate contract capacity of 65 formally competed contracts by \$45,000,000, in support of schools serving the Black Student Achievement Plan (BSAP) for students and families. Authorization to negotiate and execute amendments to increase capacity of a named-in-grant teacher residency contract. UCLA will provide coursework for 120 LAUSD teachers over the course of four years to obtain a Computer Science Supplementary Authorization (CSSA).

The contract is needed for continued support of the computer science teacher residency program.

The District and UCLA were co-applicants for the grant. This grant will strengthen District efforts to address the growing computer science teacher shortage in K-12 schools. This grant will address the computer science teacher shortage by providing an accessible and affordable program to teachers to obtain their Computer Science Supplementary Authorization through the CSSA at UCLA.

Currently, there are only 220 teachers teaching computer science courses Districtwide. Through this collaboration, the target for the CSSA will be 120 additional authorized computer science teachers at the elementary and secondary levels. Increasing the number of authorized teachers ensures more students across the District have equitable access to appropriately trained teachers who have the skills and pedagogy to implement rigorous computer science instruction. Finally, this grant also supports the District's commitment to providing computer science education for all students before they graduate.

LAUSD will announce the opportunity to all teachers across school sites via emails, flyers, and online/off-line bulletin boards and solicit applications. Any interested teacher is eligible to apply for the grant program. Annually, dedicated District program personnel will select 8-12 teachers based on the need of the applicant's site location.

The UCLA CSSA program is an officially approved and developed certificate program. The program offers a set of courses designed to meet the CTC's supplementary authorization requirements in terms of subjects and units.

Consideration of Street Lighting Maintenance Assessment for the Alexandria Safety Improvements No. 2 Lighting District October 22, 2024 Facilities Services Division

Action Proposed:

Authorize the Chief Facilities Executive and/or her designee to cast the Proposition 218 ballot for street lighting maintenance assessment for the Alexandria Safety Improvements No. 2 Lighting District within the City of Los Angeles (City) and execute any other reasonable instruments on behalf of Los Angeles Unified in an amount not to exceed \$8,065.83 (not including annual Consumer Price Index (CPI) increases).

Background:

The street lighting maintenance assessment for the Alexandria Safety Improvements No. 2 Lighting District is seeking support of a ballot to add 28 new pedestrian lights along Alexandria Avenue, Rosewood Avenue, Normandie Avenue, and Oakwood Avenue in Los Angeles, of these, 19 streetlights would be installed along the perimeter of Alexandria Avenue Elementary, as identified in Exhibit A. The Alexandria Safety Improvements No. 2 Lighting District will need to submit ballots to property owners to vote on the assessment and to install the additional streetlights. The Alexandria Safety Improvements No. 2 Lighting District provides servicing, installation, maintenance, and operation of street lighting. The cost for services includes but are not limited to electricity, lamps, fixtures, poles, wires, repair crews and vehicles and other items necessary to operate streetlights in the City of Los Angeles. The additional lighting will further enhance safety measures and support safety passages.

Los Angeles Unified currently pays \$1,500.70 annually for eight existing streetlights in this area. If approved and implemented the annual amount for the special assessment projected by the Alexandria Lighting District for Alexandria Avenue Elementary would increase to \$8,065.83.

The proposed assessment is subject to annual increases based on the Alexandria Safety Improvements No. 2 Lighting District budget. As opposed to Business Improvement Districts (BID), the Los Angeles City Bureau of Street Lighting has declined to grant LAUSD discounts for Lighting Improvement Districts at this time. Historically, Los Angeles Unified has negotiated and received a reduced special assessment per BID. Los Angeles Unified will continue efforts to achieve similar reductions for Lighting Improvement Districts through ongoing negotiations with the Los Angeles City Bureau of Street Lighting.

The Alexandria Safety Improvements No. 2 Lighting District is located in Region East, Board District 2 (Dr. Rocio Rivas).

Expected Outcomes:

Approval of the action will authorize the Chief Facilities Executive and/or her designee to execute the ballot in support of the proposed lighting assessment provided by the Alexandria Safety Improvements No. 2 Lighting District and pay the annual assessment for the Alexandria Safety Improvements No. 2 Lighting District. The

increased lighting will help further enhance safe passages to and from school for students attending Alexandria Avenue Elementary School.

Board Options and Consequences:

A "yes" vote by the Board of Education (Board) will authorize the Chief Facilities Executive and/or her designee to record a yes vote on the Proposition 218 ballot for the Alexandria Safety Improvements No. 2 Lighting District.

A "no" vote may result in the Alexandria Safety Improvements No. 2 Lighting District failing to obtain a majority affirmative vote of the property owners in the Alexandria Avenue Lighting District. However, if the Alexandria Safety Improvements No. 2 Lighting District does secure the required support, Los Angeles Unified would still be obligated to pay the cost associated with the special assessments.

Policy Implications:

Los Angeles Unified does not have a current policy regarding lighting districts. The proposed action advances Los Angeles Unified's 2022-2026 Strategic Plan Pillar 3 Engagement and Collaboration Leading for Impact by growing and leveraging partnerships with community-based organizations. Moreover, it supports the District's Every School Safe: A Blueprint for Safety.

Budget Impact:

The projected annual amount for the assessment of Alexandria Safety Improvements No. 2 Lighting District in 2025 would be increased from \$1,500.70 to \$8,065.83 and subject to increases based on the Alexandria Safety Improvements No. 2 Lighting District budget annually thereafter. Annual assessment for the Alexandria Safety Improvements No. 2 Lighting District will be provided by the General Fund, Program Code 15190. This is a new cost, and additional funding will be necessary to support the assessment. The assessment is an ongoing annual cost and does not have a sunset date.

Student Impact:

Improve safety measures and support safe passages around the school perimeter and surrounding neighborhood.

Equity Impact:

A lighting district is a geographically defined area within the City, in which services, maintenance, and operations are paid for through a special assessment, which is charged to all members within the district in order to equitably distribute the benefits received and the costs incurred to provide the agreed-upon services, activities, and operations.

Issues and Analysis:

Article 13 D (Proposition 218) of the State Constitution requires that a parcel's assessment may not exceed the reasonable cost for the proportional special benefit conferred on that parcel. Article 13 D provides that only special benefits are assessable, and the City must separate the general benefits from the special benefits. It also requires that publicly owned properties, which benefit from the improvements, be assessed.

Los Angeles Unified is not obligated to support the formation of the Alexandria Safety Improvements No. 2 Lighting District. Regardless of Los Angeles Unified's support, if the Alexandria Safety Improvements No. 2 Lighting District is approved, Los Angeles Unified will be required to pay its special assessment unless there has been a formal determination that it is exempt.

The City has limited funding to provide certain services, and the Alexandria Safety Improvements No. 2 Lighting District is able to supplement services that may benefit the community. Supporting the Alexandria Safety Improvements No. 2 Lighting District is voluntary by the Board, however Los Angeles Unified is obligated to pay the special assessment should the City Council vote to pass the Alexandria Safety Improvements No. 2 Lighting District ballot presented.

Area Map

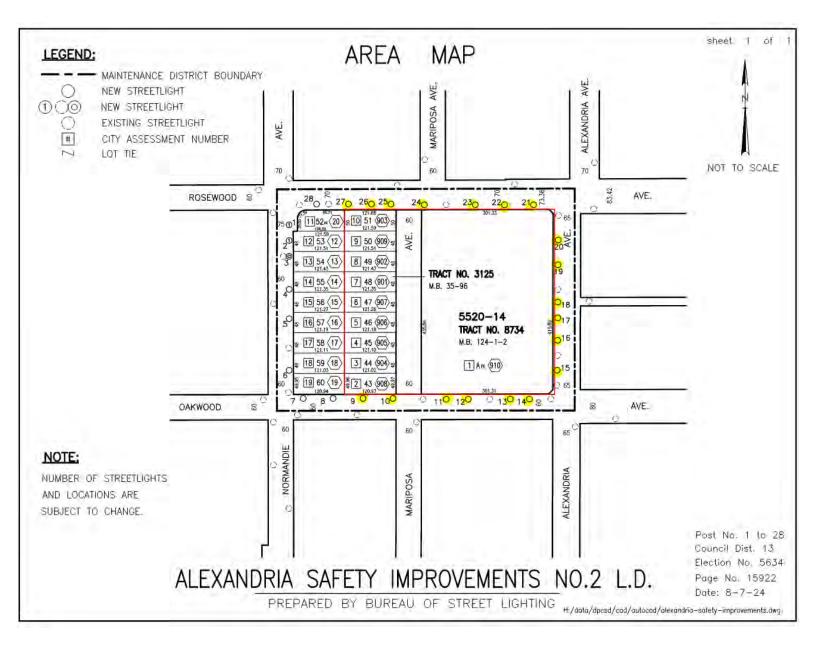
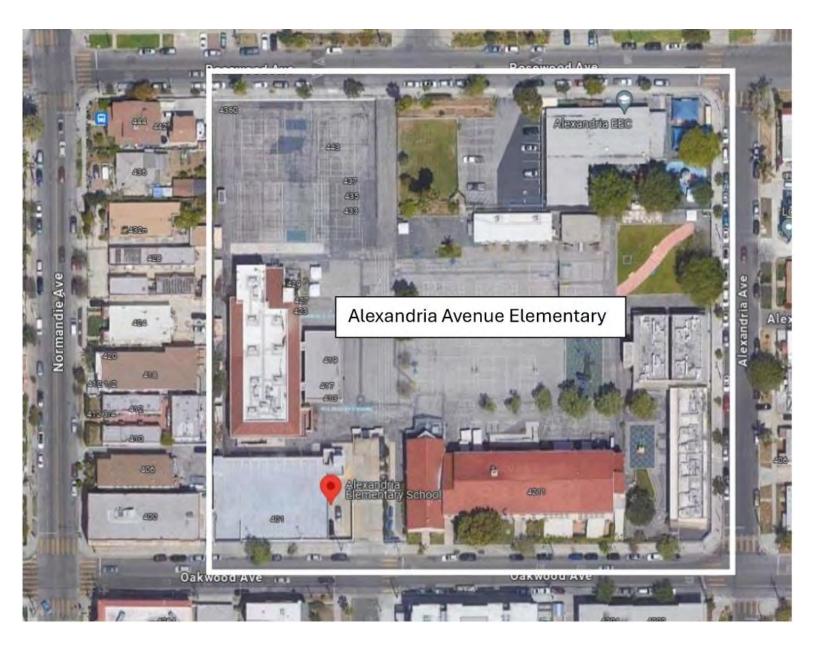


Exhibit B Aerial Map

Define and Approve Two Early Education Center Outdoor Classroom and Campus Upgrade Projects and Amend the Facilities Services Division Strategic Execution Plan to Incorporate Therein October 22, 2024

Facilities Services Division and Early Childhood Education Division

Action Proposed:

Define and approve two Early Education Center (EEC) Outdoor Classroom and Campus Upgrade Projects (Projects) at the following schools and amend the Facilities Services Division (Facilities) Strategic Execution Plan (SEP) to incorporate therein. The total combined budget for the proposed Projects, as described in Exhibit A, is \$12,872,013.

- 1. Collins EEC
- 2. Glenfeliz Boulevard EEC

Authorize the Chief Procurement Officer and/or the Chief Facilities Executive and/or their designee(s) to execute all instruments necessary, as legally permissible, to implement the proposed Projects, including budget modifications and the purchase of equipment and materials.

Background:

The Los Angeles Unified School District (Los Angeles Unified or District) School Upgrade Program includes a spending target entitled "Early Childhood Education Facilities Upgrades and Expansions." Projects developed under this category of need are included in the Facilities SEP.

The proposed Projects will create dynamic, nature-based outdoor learning spaces to enable the District's youngest learners to acquire a deep, intuitive understanding of the natural world through hands-on experiences. Each outdoor classroom may include a number of learning stations with the following components:

- Music and movement
- Climbing and balance
- Messy materials
- Nature art
- Water play
- Sand play
- Garden
- Dirt digging
- Building materials

The proposed Projects will provide outdoor classrooms by dividing the existing playground areas into distinct activity areas with paving, new playground matting and equipment, and landscaping. Campus upgrades include new heating, ventilation, and air-conditioning units, new roofing, exterior painting of buildings and structures as needed, and fire alarm system and utilities upgrades. The scope of work includes Americans with Disabilities

Act accessibility upgrades, and any other required improvements or mitigations to ensure compliance with local, state, and/or federal facilities requirements.

Bond Oversight Committee Recommendations:

This item was considered by the School Construction Bond Citizens' Oversight Committee (BOC) at its meeting on October 10, 2024, as referenced in Exhibit B. The presentation that was provided is included as Exhibit C. Staff has concluded that this proposed Facilities SEP amendment is in alignment with BOC recommendations and will facilitate Los Angeles Unified's ability to successfully implement the Facilities SEP.

Expected Outcomes:

Staff anticipates the Board of Education will define and approve the proposed Projects, as described in Exhibit A, and amend the Facilities SEP to incorporate therein. Approval will authorize staff to proceed with the implementation of the proposed Projects.

Board Options and Consequences:

Adoption of the proposed action will authorize staff to proceed with the expenditure of Bond Program funds to implement the proposed Projects. If the proposal is not approved, Bond Program funds will not be expended, access to nature-based green space will remain limited, and early education facilities needs will remain unaddressed.

Policy Implications:

This action is consistent with the District's commitment to address unmet school facilities needs and provide students with a safe and healthy learning environment. The proposed action advances Los Angeles Unified's 2022-2026 Strategic Plan Pillar 4 Operational Effectiveness Modernizing Infrastructure by providing capital improvements at schools.

Budget Impact:

The total combined budget for the proposed Projects is \$12,872,013. The proposed Projects will be funded with Bond Program funds earmarked specifically for Early Childhood Education facilities upgrades and expansions.

Each budget for the proposed Projects was prepared based on the current information known and assumptions about their proposed scope, site conditions, and market conditions. Individual budgets for the proposed Projects will be reviewed throughout the planning, design, and construction phases as new information becomes known and/or unforeseen conditions arise, and will be adjusted accordingly to enable the successful completion of each of the proposed Projects.

Student Impact:

The proposed Projects will establish nurturing, nature-based outdoor spaces that support whole-child development and learning, as well as address early education facilities needs that are necessary to improve student health, safety, and educational quality to benefit approximately 230 students.

Expected developmental outcomes include enhanced imaginative play, increased physical and mental well-being, and environmental stewardship. These outdoor classrooms will encourage and support community, student, and parent engagement through the creation of partnerships that help establish and maintain the newly developed garden spaces. These spaces can also reduce stress for staff, families, and children. Children and their parents will be able to connect with the natural world as a regular part of their healthy growth and development in the areas that lack parks and green environments.

Equity Impact:

The proposed Projects were identified by the Early Childhood Education Division (ECED) in consultation with Regions and school site administrators. Sites were selected based upon each center's proximity and access to existing community green space, and evidence of parent, administrator, and staff commitment to the success of the program. Other factors considered included income level, center enrollment, community interest, and demographics.

Issues and Analysis:

Staff's proposal supports ECED's commitment to providing a quality early education experience that will prepare students for success in school and life, while valuing and respecting the needs, languages, and cultures of all students, families, staff, and respective communities.

The Office of Environmental Health and Safety will evaluate the Projects' proposals in accordance with the California Environmental Quality Act to ensure compliance. If through the planning and design process, it is determined that the proposed Projects' scopes will not sufficiently address the facilities needs identified, the Projects' scope, schedule, and budget will be revised accordingly.

Facilities Services Division

Action Proposed:

Define and approve 13 Board District Priority (BDP) and Region Priority (RP) projects, as listed on Exhibit A, and amend the Facilities Services Division (Facilities) Strategic Execution Plan (SEP) to incorporate therein. The total budget for these proposed projects is \$708,587.

Authorize the Chief Procurement Officer and/or the Chief Facilities Executive and/or their designee(s) to execute all instruments necessary, as legally permissible, to implement the proposed projects, including budget modifications and the purchase of equipment and materials.

Background:

Projects are developed at the discretion of the Board Districts and/or Regions based upon an identified need. These projects are developed with support from Facilities Services Division staff and input from school administrators.

Project scopes, schedules, and budgets may vary depending on site conditions and needs. All projects must be capital in nature and adhere to bond language and laws.

Bond Oversight Committee Recommendations:

This item was considered by the School Construction Bond Citizens' Oversight Committee (BOC) at its meeting on October 10, 2024, as referenced in Exhibit B. The presentation that was provided is included as Exhibit C. Staff has concluded that this proposed Facilities SEP amendment is in alignment with BOC recommendations and will facilitate Los Angeles Unified's ability to successfully implement the Facilities SEP.

Expected Outcomes:

Execution of these proposed projects will help improve the learning environment for students, teachers, and staff.

Board Options and Consequences:

Adoption of the proposed action will allow staff to execute the projects listed on Exhibit A. Failure to approve this proposed action will delay the projects and ultimately the anticipated benefit to the school and its students.

Policy Implications:

The requested actions are consistent with the Board-Prioritized Facilities Programs for BDP and RP projects and the District's commitment to address unmet school facilities needs and provide students with a safe and healthy learning environment. The proposed action advances Los Angeles Unified's 2022-2026 Strategic Plan Pillar 4 Operational Effectiveness Modernizing Infrastructure by providing capital improvements at schools.

Budget Impact:

The total combined budget for the 13 proposed projects is \$708,587. Four projects are funded by Bond Program funds earmarked specifically for RP projects. Nine projects are funded by Bond Program funds earmarked specifically for BDP projects.

Each project budget was prepared based on the current information known and assumptions about the proposed project scope, site conditions, and market conditions. Individual project budgets will be reviewed throughout the planning, design, and construction phases as new information becomes known or unforeseen conditions arise and will be adjusted accordingly to enable the successful completion of each proposed project.

Student Impact:

The proposed projects will upgrade, modernize, and/or improve school facilities to enhance the safety and educational quality of the learning environment to benefit approximately 9,920 current and future students.

Approve the Definition of 12 Classroom Upgrade Projects and Amend the Facilities Services Division Strategic Execution Plan to Incorporate Therein October 22, 2024

Facilities Services Division

Action Proposed:

Approve the definition of 12 Classroom Upgrade Projects (Projects), as described in Exhibit A, and amend the Facilities Services Division (Facilities) Strategic Execution Plan (SEP) to incorporate therein. The combined budget for the proposed Projects is \$106,372,000.

Authorize the Chief Procurement Officer and/or the Chief Facilities Executive and/or their designee(s) to execute all instruments necessary, as legally permissible, to implement the proposed Projects including budget modifications and the purchase of equipment and materials.

Background:

On August 24, 2021, the Board of Education (Board) adopted an update to the School Upgrade Program (SUP) to integrate Measure RR funding and priorities into its operational framework. The updated SUP framework and the Measure RR Implementation Plan (Implementation Plan) help guide the identification of sites and development of project proposals. The Implementation Plan included, among other priorities, the development of projects to provide upgrades focused on the interior of existing classroom spaces.

The school sites identified for the proposed Projects were deemed to have the highest need for classroom upgrades based on their overall Facilities Condition Index (FCI) score for interior classroom spaces. FCI scores indicate the remaining service life of the physical components within classroom spaces and as compared to other schools. Additionally, the priority for implementation of the proposed Projects focused on middle school programs with the goal of attracting and retaining students transitioning from elementary to secondary education across the District's four geographic Regions.

The proposed Projects will provide upgrades to classrooms utilized for instruction, special education, and school set-asides within permanent and relocatable buildings. Each classroom within a school site has unique conditions and will be surveyed to understand deficiencies needing to be addressed. Based on the individual needs of each classroom, the scope may include upgrades to technology, electrical upgrades to support new classroom technology, white boards, tack boards, window blinds, paint, and security locks. The proposed Projects also include providing new classroom furniture, replacing damaged ceiling tiles, and other upgrades required to comply with local, state, and federal requirements.

Bond Oversight Committee Recommendations:

This item was considered by the School Construction Bond Citizens' Oversight Committee (BOC) at its meeting on October 10, 2024, as referenced in Exhibit B. The presentation that was provided is included as Exhibit C. Staff has concluded that this proposed Facilities SEP amendment is in alignment with BOC recommendations and will facilitate Los Angeles Unified School District's ability to successfully complete the

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Facilities SEP.

Expected Outcomes:

Approval of the 12 proposed Projects and amendment to the Facilities SEP to incorporate therein. The approval will enable staff to proceed with the design and construction of the proposed Projects.

The upgraded classrooms, once completed, will provide facilities that support education programs and student achievement. The proposed Projects will also decrease demands for repair and maintenance, alleviate the burden on custodial staff, and benefit the local economy by creating tax revenue and new jobs.

Board Options and Consequences:

Adoption of the proposed action will authorize staff to proceed with the expenditure of Bond Program funds and begin the environmental reviews and clearances, design, procurement, construction, and other activities necessary to implement the proposed Projects.

If the proposal is not approved, the proposed Projects will not commence, and the schools will not benefit from the upgrades being proposed.

Policy Implications:

The proposal does not impact Los Angeles Unified policy. It furthers implementation of the update to the SUP to integrate Measure RR funding and priorities into its operational framework. Furthermore, the proposal is consistent with the District's long-term goal to address unmet school facilities needs and significantly improve the conditions of aging and deteriorating school facilities as described in the District's local bond measures K, R, Y, Q, and RR. The proposed action advances Los Angeles Unified's 2022-2026 Strategic Plan Pillar 4 Operational Effectiveness Modernizing Infrastructure by upgrading classrooms at schools.

Budget Impact:

The combined Project budget for the 12 proposed Projects is \$106,372,000. The proposed Projects will be funded by Bond Program funds targeted in the School Upgrade Program for major modernizations, upgrades, and reconfigurations to school campuses.

The \$11,423,000 budget for the proposed Project at Robert Louis Stevenson College & Career Prep includes \$1,819,000 for classrooms presently occupied by a co-located charter school pursuant to Education Code section 47614 (Proposition 39). Bond Program funds targeted for Charter School Facilities Upgrades and Expansions will be transferred to funds earmarked in the SUP for major modernizations, upgrades, and reconfigurations to school campuses, and all aspects of the proposed upgrades will be owned entirely by District.

The Project budgets were prepared based on the current information known, and assumptions about the proposed Project scope, site conditions, and market conditions. The Project budgets will be reviewed throughout the planning, design, and construction phases as new information becomes known or unforeseen conditions arise and will be adjusted accordingly to enable the successful completion of the proposed Projects.

Student Impact:

The proposed Projects, once completed, will help ensure approximately 11,500 current and future students attending these 12 schools are provided with safe, welcoming, and state-of-the-art learning environments that support student-centered, experiential, and engaged learning. The proposed Projects will also allow schools to attract and retain future students, which builds school pride and enhances opportunities to create a positive

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school culture.

Equity Impact:

School sites represent all four Regions (North, East, South, and West) and were prioritized based on their Facilities Condition Index scores.

Issues and Analysis:

Staff will implement all opportunities to minimize construction impacts on school operations and existing education programs. As necessary, the temporary use of unused classrooms, off-hour construction and other opportunities will be utilized to reduce impacts to the existing education programs at each school.

The Office of Environmental Health and Safety (OEHS) will evaluate the proposed Projects in accordance with the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA).

Bond Program funds targeted for Charter School Facilities Upgrades and Expansions will be transferred to funds earmarked in the SUP for major modernizations, upgrades, and reconfigurations to school campuses, and all aspects of the proposed upgrades will be owned entirely by Los Angeles Unified; and

WHEREAS, The Los Angeles Unified Office of General Counsel has reviewed the proposed Projects and determined that they may proceed to the School Construction Bond Citizens' Oversight Committee (BOC) for its consideration for recommendation to the Board of Education; and

WHEREAS, Los Angeles Unified Staff has concluded that this proposed Facilities SEP amendment will facilitate Los Angeles Unified's ability to successfully implement the Facilities SEP.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED THAT:

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- 1. The BOC recommends that the Board define and approve 12 Classroom Upgrade Projects as described in Board Report No. 064-24/25, a copy of which is attached hereto in the form it was presented to the BOC and is incorporated herein by reference and amend the Facilities SEP accordingly.
- 2. This resolution shall be transmitted to the Los Angeles Unified Board and posted on the BOC's website.
- 3. Los Angeles Unified is directed to track the above recommendation and to report on the adoption, rejection, or pending status of the recommendations as provided in section 6.2 of the Charter and Memorandum of Understanding between the BOC and Los Angeles Unified.

Adoption of Resolution to Authorize Los Angeles Unified School District Representatives to Continue Performance of all Necessary Functions Related to Federal Emergency Management Agency and California Governor's Office of Emergency Services Financial Assistance Programs
October 22, 2024

Facilities Services Division

Action Proposed:

Adopt the attached Board of Education (Board) Resolution (Exhibit A) to authorize Los Angeles Unified School District (District) personnel to continue to perform all necessary functions related to Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) and California Governor's Office of Emergency Services (Cal OES) financial assistance programs including the submittal of funding applications, administration of necessary grant-related activities, and the execution of instruments necessary, as legally permissible, to implement the requirements of the grants awards.

Background:

After a natural or man-made disaster event occurs, FEMA and Cal OES receive funding for their various financial assistance programs to help the public and public agencies with disaster recovery and mitigation efforts. These programs have allowed the District to be reimbursed for costs incurred by natural disasters and to receive funding for seismic mitigation projects that help ensure school facilities are safe learning environments.

Federal funds are awarded and managed by FEMA with Cal OES serving as the intermediating agency assisting the District with navigating the federal grant process to receive funds. Cal OES is also charged with the administration of the state disaster assistance program, which provides additional state-level financial assistance for costs incurred because of a declared disaster event. It is Cal OES' responsibility to ensure federal and state grant awards are being spent in compliance with federal (Public Law 93-288 as amended by the Robert T. Stafford Disaster Relief and Emergency Assistance Act of 199) and state law (California Disaster Assistance Act).

As the managing authority, Cal OES requires the Designation of Applicant's Agent Resolution for Non-State Agencies form to be renewed every three years. This resolution allows District personnel to perform necessary administrative and project activities related to FEMA and Cal OES financial assistance programs. The District's previously submitted resolution was approved by the Board of Education on December 7, 2021 and is set to expire on December 6, 2024.

Expected Outcomes:

Adopt the Resolution to permit staff to continue the performance of all necessary administrative and project activities related to FEMA and Cal OES financial assistance programs such as disaster relief, hazard mitigation, and other FEMA and/or Cal OES programs as listed in the resolution.

Board Options and Consequences:

Approval of this action will allow staff to proceed with the necessary administrative and project activities

related to federal and state financial assistance programs.

If the proposed action is not approved, staff will not be able to proceed with applying for funds through federal and state financial programs, forgoing any available grant funds through these programs, and would also not be able to submit documentation needed to remain compliant with existing grant and reporting requirements.

Policy Implications:

Staff's proposal advances Pillar 4 Operational Effectiveness of the 2022-26 Strategic Plan and fulfills Cal OES' requirement to obtain federal and state financial assistance.

Budget Impact:

Approval of this action allows the District to continue to request and manage federal and state funding to mitigate impacts to the General Fund, Bond Program Funds, and other District resources that are associated with natural and man-made disasters.

Student Impact:

Approval of this action allows the District to apply for and be compliant with grants that are awarded to improve and repair District facilities against natural and man-made disasters, thus improving students' access to a safe and healthy learning environment.

Equity Impact:

The grants awarded through federal and state programs support the District's Bond Program which is focused on improving equity between newer and older schools so that all students have an equal opportunity for success.

Issues and Analysis:

Adoption of this Resolution will enable the District to continue requesting and administering federal and state resources for disaster relief, hazard mitigation and other FEMA/Cal OES financial assistance to adequately respond to and recover from federal or state declared disasters.

Resolution of the Board of Education of the Los Angeles Unified School District Authorizing the Issuance and Sale of 2024-25 Tax and Revenue Anticipation Notes in the Aggregate Principal Amount of Not To Exceed \$250,000,000, Requesting the Board of Supervisors of the County of Los Angeles to Provide for the Issuance and Sale of Said Notes, Authorizing the Execution and Delivery of a Note Purchase Contract and Approving Other Matters Relating thereto.

Action Proposed:

Adopt the attached resolution (Attachment A) relating to the issuance and direct placement of 2024-25 Tax and Revenue Anticipation Notes (the "Notes") for purposes of paying obligations of the District payable or accruing during Fiscal Year 2024-25, particularly for refunding a portion of near term involuntary tort liability obligations arising as a result of pending and anticipated litigation brought by application of California Assembly Bill Number 218 ("AB 218") and similar childhood sexual assault, abuse and/or molestation claims for tort liability (the "Involuntary Tort Claims").

By the attached resolution (the "Resolution"), the Board of Education ("Board") of the District requests that the County of Los Angeles (the "County") issue the Notes, in one or more series, on behalf of the District in an aggregate principal amount not to exceed \$250,000,000. Pursuant to Article 7.6 and commencing with Section 53850 of the California Government Code, California school districts are authorized to borrow money for any purpose for which the school district is authorized to expend moneys through the issuance of short-term notes.

Repayment of the Notes will be from Fiscal Year 2024-25 unrestricted general fund revenues of the District as described in the Resolution unless the Notes are refinanced. Such a refinancing would involve the issuance of additional tax and revenue anticipation notes or judgment obligation notes or bonds as provided under the Judgment Refunding Program described below.

Background:

The District is defending a significant number of lawsuits arising from the Involuntary Tort Claims. On June 18, 2024, the Board adopted a resolution approving and authorizing the issuance of judgment obligation notes and bonds and related documents, and authorizing a judicial validation proceeding, for the purpose of refunding obligations incurred as a result of the Involuntary Tort Claims (the "Judgment Refunding Program"). The validation action related to the Judgment Obligation Program is currently the subject of two separate answers contesting the action. Thus, the conclusion of the validation action is currently unpredictable. A completed validation action is required, either as currently on file or in a subsequent validation action or actions relating to the Involuntary Tort Claims refunded with Notes, to repay or refund the Notes with long-term obligations. To further the purposes of the Board's previous action, during this period where the District has been delayed in the completion of its validation action, staff has proposed the issuance of the Notes as an interim funding source for a portion of settlements and judgments related to the Involuntary Tort Claims. The Resolution requests and authorizes the County to issue the Notes, in one or more series, on behalf of the District, in an aggregate principal amount not to exceed \$250,000,000, as a temporary borrowing for the purpose of facilitating other

interim and long-term refundings of settlements and judgments related to the Involuntary Tort Claims.

Royal Bank of Canada has made a proposal to purchase the Notes, which proposal is in the form of a Note Purchase Contract (Attachment B) to be entered into by and among Royal Bank of Canada, the District, and the County (the "Purchase Contract").

Expected Outcomes:

Adoption of the Resolution authorizing necessary actions and execution of documents, including the Resolution and the Purchase Contract, to complete the issuance of the Notes. The Judgment Refunding Program was established to mitigate and manage the impacts of the Involuntary Tort Claims through the proposed refunding of the tort liability obligations resulting from the Involuntary Tort Claims and amortizing the liability over time, therefore, lessening any potential budgetary impacts to the District. The proposed issuance of the Notes as an interim funding source for a portion of settlements and judgments related to the Involuntary Tort Claims furthers the goals of the Judgment Refunding Program during this period where the District has been delayed in the completion of its validation action related to the Judgment Refunding Program.

Board Options and Consequences:

Should the Board not approve this item, staff will not be authorized to proceed with the issuance of the Notes in furtherance of the goals of the Judgment Refunding Program during this period where the District has been delayed in the completion of its validation action related to the Judgment Refunding Program. Staff is unable to predict with accuracy the timing as to when the litigation with respect to such claims will conclude or the ultimate liability the District will incur. Depending on the timing and size of the liabilities and the timing of the completion of the validation action related to the Judgment Refunding Program, District budgetary resources may need to be shifted away from programs to pay such liabilities.

Policy Implications:

This action is in compliance with the relevant criteria set forth in Article I, Article II Section 2.02, and Article IV Section 4.12 of the Debt Management Policy.

This action is also in compliance with the California law in that school districts are authorized pursuant to Sections 53850 and following of the California Government Code (being Article 7.6, Chapter 4, Part 1, Division 2, Title 5 thereof) to borrow money by issuing temporary notes for any purpose for which the school district is authorized to expend moneys, including but not limited to current expenses, capital expenditures, investment and reinvestment and the discharge of any obligation or indebtedness of the school district.

Budget Impact:

The proposed Notes will be issued in one or more series, with an aggregate not-to-exceed amount of \$250,000,000, for purposes of refunding, on an interim basis, potential obligations resulting from the Involuntary Tort Claims. No series of Notes will mature on a date which is more than 13 months subsequent to the date of its delivery or beyond Fiscal Year 2025-26, and the interest rate or rates to be borne by a series of Notes shall not exceed 12.00% per annum, as stated in the attached Resolution.

Repayment of the Notes will be from Fiscal Year 2024-25 general fund unrestricted revenues as described in the Resolution unless the Notes are refinanced. Such a refinancing would involve the issuance of additional tax and revenue anticipation notes or judgment obligation notes or bonds as provided under the Judgment Refunding Program.

Staff is unable to predict with accuracy the timing as to when the litigation with respect to the Involuntary Tort Claims will conclude or the ultimate liability the District will incur. Depending on the timing and size of the liabilities and the timing of the completion of the validation action related to the Judgment Refunding Program, District budgetary resources may need to be shifted away from education programs to pay such liabilities and or the Notes.

Student Impact:

The Notes will be issued to mitigate and manage budgetary impacts to the District in fiscal year 2024-25 by refunding the expected tort liability obligations discussed above, lessening potential impacts to the District's education programs in the near term.

Issues and Analysis:

The Judgment Refunding Program was established to mitigate and manage the impacts of the Involuntary Tort Claims by refunding the tort obligations and amortizing the liability over time, therefore lessening any potential budgetary impacts to the District. The proposed issuance of the Notes as an interim funding source for a portion of the settlements and judgments related to the Involuntary Tort Claims furthers the goals of the Judgment Refunding Program during this period where the District has been delayed in the completion of its validation action related to the Judgment Refunding Program.

A validation action, necessary to repay or refund the Notes with long-term obligations, is required, and such a validation action is currently pending and subject to completion. The validation action is currently the subject of two separate answers. Thus, the conclusion of the validation action is currently unpredictable.

Approval of the Resolution will enable the District to establish one or more Note borrowings which will help manage the financial impact of the Involuntary Tort Claims in furtherance of the Judgment Refunding Program. This interim financing mechanism is expected to allow the District to preserve the District's ability to refund these tort obligations and spread the liability over time, mitigating the immediate financial impact.

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The District has issued Tax and Revenue Anticipation Notes (TRANs) in the past to fund timing differences between receipts and disbursements. The District typically has used a competitive sale method for its TRANs issuances, however, particular facts relating to the Judgement Refunding Program provide reason for the financing to proceed with a direct placement of the Notes pursuant to the Purchase Contract.

RESOLUTION OF THE BOARD OF EDUCATION OF THE LOS ANGELES UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT AUTHORIZING THE ISSUANCE AND SALE OF 2024-2025 TAX AND REVENUE ANTICIPATION NOTES IN AN AGGREGATE PRINCIPAL AMOUNT NOT TO EXCEED \$250,000,000, REQUESTING THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS OF THE COUNTY OF LOS ANGELES TO PROVIDE FOR THE ISSUANCE AND SALE OF SAID NOTES, AUTHORIZING THE EXECUTION AND DELIVERY OF A NOTE PURCHASE CONTRACT AND APPROVING OTHER MATTERS RELATING THERETO

WHEREAS, pursuant to Sections 53850 and following of the California Government Code (being Article 7.6, Chapter 4, Part 1, Division 2, Title 5 thereof), on or after the first day of any fiscal year (being July 1) a school district may borrow money by issuing temporary notes for any purpose for which the school district is authorized to expend moneys, including but not limited to current expenses, capital expenditures, investment and reinvestment and the discharge of any obligation or indebtedness of the school district; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Education (the "Board of Education") of the Los Angeles Unified School District (the "District"), which is located in the County of Los Angeles, California, has determined that an amount not to exceed \$250,000,000 is needed to satisfy obligations payable or accruing during Fiscal Year 2024-2025 from the General Fund of the District, particularly obligations payable to certain claimants and/or plaintiffs (the "Judgment Obligees") as required by final judgments, orders for monetary damages or stipulated settlement (each of which is entered against the District by the applicable court or courts and which is not subject to appeal or further appeal, or which the District has indicated that it will not appeal, being referred to herein as, a "Judgment" and, collectively, the "Judgments") entered by the applicable court or courts as a result of pending and anticipated litigation brought by application of California Code of Civil Procedure Section 340.1 and California Assembly Bill Number 218, chaptered by the California Secretary of State on October 13, 2019 ("AB 218") and similar childhood sexual assault, abuse and/or molestation claims for tort liability, and that it is necessary that said amount be borrowed for such purpose in Fiscal Year 2024-2025 by the issuance of one or more series of temporary notes to be issued in anticipation of the receipt by or accrual to the District during Fiscal Year 2024-2025 of taxes, income, revenue (including, but not limited to, revenue from the state and federal governments), cash receipts and other moneys provided for such fiscal year for the General Fund of the District; and

WHEREAS, said notes are to be designated the "Los Angeles Unified School District 2024-2025 Tax and Revenue Anticipation Notes," with such series designations as may be approved as herein provided (collectively, the "Notes" and each series of Notes, individually a "Series of Notes"); and

WHEREAS, the Board of Education hereby finds and determines that said aggregate principal amount of the Notes, when added to the interest payable thereon, does not exceed 85% of the estimated amount of the uncollected taxes, income, revenue (including, but not limited to, revenue from the state and federal governments), cash receipts and other moneys provided for Fiscal Year 2024-2025 which will be received by or which will accrue to the District during such

fiscal year for the General Fund of the District and which will be available for the payment of the principal of and interest on the Notes; and

WHEREAS, no money has heretofore been borrowed by or on behalf of the District through the issuance of tax anticipation notes or temporary notes in anticipation of the receipt of, or payable from or secured by, taxes, income, revenue (including, but not limited to, revenue from the state and federal governments), cash receipts and other moneys provided for Fiscal Year 2024-2025 which will be received by or will accrue to the District during such fiscal year for the General Fund of the District, and the Board of Education does not contemplate such a financing through the issuance of any temporary notes, other than the Notes; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to Section 53856 of the California Government Code, certain taxes, income, revenue (including, but not limited to, revenue from the state and federal governments), cash receipts and other moneys which will be received by or accrue to the District during Fiscal Year 2024-2025 for the General Fund of the District are authorized to be pledged for the payment of the Notes and the interest thereon; and

WHEREAS, the District has not been accorded fiscal accountability status under Section 42647 or Section 42650 of the California Education Code; and

WHEREAS, Section 53853 of the California Government Code provides that notes of a school district that has not been so accorded fiscal accountability status must be issued in the name of the school district by the board of supervisors of the county, the county superintendent of which has jurisdiction over the district, as soon as possible following the receipt of a resolution of the governing board of the school district requesting the borrowing; and

WHEREAS, the Superintendent of Schools of the County of Los Angeles (the "County Superintendent of Schools") has jurisdiction over the District and, therefore, the Notes are to be issued in the name of the District by the Board of Supervisors (the "Board of Supervisors") of the County of Los Angeles (the "County"); and

WHEREAS, Section 42133 of the California Education Code provides that a school district that has a qualified or negative certification in any fiscal year may not issue, in that fiscal year or in the next succeeding fiscal year, tax anticipation notes, unless the county superintendent of schools determines, pursuant to criteria established by the Superintendent of Public Instruction of the State of California, that such school district's repayment of that indebtedness is probable; and

WHEREAS, as of the date hereof, the District has not received a qualified or negative budget certification in Fiscal Year 2023-2024 or Fiscal Year 2024-2025; and

WHEREAS, Royal Bank of Canada or an affiliate thereof (collectively, the "Lender") has made a proposal to purchase the Notes, which proposal is in the form of a Note Purchase Contract to be entered into among the Lender, the District and the County (such Note Purchase Contract, in the form presented to this meeting, with such changes, insertions and omissions as are made pursuant to this Resolution, being referred to herein as the "Purchase Contract"); and

WHEREAS, the District has previously adopted a local debt policy (the "Debt Management Policy") that complies with California Government Code Section 8855(i), and the sale and issuance of the Notes by the County on behalf of the District as contemplated by this Resolution is in compliance with the Debt Management Policy; and

WHEREAS, there have been prepared and submitted to this meeting forms of:

- (a) the Notes; and
- (b) the Purchase Contract; and

WHEREAS, the District desires to proceed with the sale and issuance of one or more Series of Notes by the County on behalf of the District and to authorize the execution of such documents and the performance of such acts as may be necessary or desirable to effect the sale and issuance of each such Series of Notes; and

WHEREAS, all acts, conditions and things required by the Constitution and laws of the State of California (the "State") to exist, to have happened and to have been performed precedent to and in connection with the consummation of the actions authorized hereby do exist, have happened and have been performed in regular and due time, form and manner as required by law, and the District is now duly authorized and empowered, pursuant to each and every requirement of law, to consummate such actions for the purpose, in the manner and upon the terms herein provided;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, by the Board of Education of the Los Angeles Unified School District, as follows:

Section 1. Recitals. The above recitals are true and correct, and the Board of Education so finds and determines.

Section 2. Request for Borrowing. For the purpose of satisfying obligations payable from the General Fund of the District as described herein, the Board of Education hereby determines to borrow an aggregate principal amount not to exceed \$250,000,000, and hereby requests the Board of Supervisors of the County to issue in the name of the District from time to time (but not later than June 30, 2025) such an aggregate principal amount of temporary notes, in one or more series, pursuant to Sections 53850 and following of the California Government Code.

Pursuant to Section 5903 of the California Government Code, the Board of Education hereby finds and determines that the interest payable on each Series of Notes will be subject to federal income taxation under the Internal Revenue Code of 1986 in existence on the date of issuance of such Series of Notes.

The District acknowledges that the Notes do not constitute a debt of the County and that the County is not responsible for, and makes no assurance regarding, the use or application of the proceeds of the Notes by the District.

Section 3. Authorization of Notes; Terms. The issuance of the Notes in one or more series from time to time (but not later than June 30, 2025), in an aggregate principal amount not to

exceed \$250,000,000, is hereby authorized and approved. The Notes shall be designated as the "Los Angeles Unified School District 2024-2025 Tax and Revenue Anticipation Notes," with appropriate series designations as approved by an Authorized District Officer (as defined herein). The Notes shall be issued in fully registered form in denominations of \$100,000 principal amount and integral multiples of \$1 in excess thereof. Each Series of Notes shall be issued in the aggregate principal amount, shall be dated, shall bear interest at the rate or rates, shall mature on the date, shall be subject to redemption, and shall be as otherwise provided in the Purchase Contract, as the same shall be completed as provided in this Resolution; provided however, that (a) no Series of Notes shall be issued in a principal amount which, when combined with the principal amount of all Series of Notes previously authorized and issued pursuant hereto, is in excess of \$250,000,000; (b) no Series of Notes shall be issued in an amount which, when added to the maximum interest payable thereon, shall exceed 85% of the estimated amount of the then uncollected taxes, income, revenue (including, but not limited to, revenue from the state and federal governments), cash receipts and other moneys provided for Fiscal Year 2024-2025 which will be received by or which will accrue to the District during such fiscal year for the General Fund of the District and which will be available for the payment of the principal of and interest on such Series of Notes, (c) no Series of Notes shall be issued if, as of the date issuance, the District has received a qualified or negative budget certification in Fiscal Year 2023-2024 or Fiscal Year 2024-2025, unless the County Superintendent of Schools determines, pursuant to criteria established by the Superintendent of Public Instruction of the State of California, that the District's repayment of such Series of Notes is probable; (d) no Series of Notes shall mature on a date which is more than 13 months subsequent to the date of its delivery or beyond Fiscal Year 2025-2026, and (e) the interest rate or rates to be borne by a Series of Notes, as shall be provided in the Purchase Contract, as the same shall be completed as provided in this Resolution, shall not exceed 12.00% per annum.

- Section 4. Pledge; Lien and Charge; Repayment Account. (a) Pledge. The term "Unrestricted Revenues" shall mean the taxes, income, revenue (including, but not limited to, revenue from the state and federal governments), cash receipts and other moneys provided for Fiscal Year 2024-2025 which will be received by or will accrue to the District during such fiscal year for the General Fund of the District and which are lawfully available for the payment of current expenses and other obligations of the District. As security for the payment of the Notes and the interest thereon, the District hereby pledges and grants a lien on and a security interest in the first Unrestricted Revenues to be received by the District in each period specified in the Purchase Contract, in an amount equal to the amount, or in the proportion of the total amount due, specified in the Purchase Contract, as the Purchase Contract shall be completed as provided in this Resolution (the "Pledged Revenues").
- (b) Lien and Charge. As provided in Section 53856 of the California Government Code, the Notes and the interest thereon, shall be a first lien and charge against, and shall be payable from the first moneys received by the District from, the Pledged Revenues.
- (c) General Obligation. As provided in Section 53857 of the California Government Code, notwithstanding the provisions of Section 53856 of the California Government Code and of subsection (b) of this Section, the Notes shall be general obligations of the District and, to the extent not paid from the Pledged Revenues, shall be paid with interest thereon from any other Unrestricted Revenues.

Repayment Account. The Auditor-Controller of the County (the "County Auditor") and the Los Angeles County Office of Education (the "County Office") are hereby requested to establish and hold in the funds or accounts of the District in the County treasury a special account designated the "Los Angeles Unified School District 2024-2025 Tax and Revenue Anticipation Note Repayment Account" (the "Repayment Account"), and to maintain the Repayment Account until the Notes and the interest thereon have been paid in full. As security for the payment of the Notes and the interest thereon, the District hereby covenants to deposit or cause to be deposited in the Repayment Account, in trust for the registered owners of the Notes, no later than the end of each period specified in the Purchase Contract, the amount of Unrestricted Revenues specified in the Purchase Contract to be so deposited, as the Purchase Contract shall be completed as provided in this Resolution. In the event that there have been insufficient Unrestricted Revenues received by the District by the end of any such period, then the amount of any deficiency in the Repayment Account shall be satisfied and made up from the first Unrestricted Revenues thereafter received by the District. As security for the payment of the Notes and the interest thereon, the District hereby pledges and grants a first lien on and a security interest in the amounts on deposit in the Repayment Account, and said amounts shall not be used for any other purpose until all Series of Notes and the interest thereon have been paid in full or such payment has been duly provided for.

All Pledged Revenues and any other Unrestricted Revenues identified as such by the District and required to be deposited in the Repayment Account pursuant to this Resolution shall, as and when received, be deposited therein. Any money deposited in the Repayment Account shall be for the benefit of the registered owners of the Notes, and until the Notes and the interest thereon are paid or until provision has been made for the payment of the Notes at maturity and interest thereon to maturity, the money in the Repayment Account shall be applied only for the purposes for which the Repayment Account is established. None of the County, the Treasurer and Tax Collector of the County (the "County Treasurer") or the County Auditor shall be liable or responsible for the sufficiency of the Repayment Account. On the date of the maturity of a Series of Notes, the money in the Repayment Account shall be used, to the extent necessary, to pay the Notes and the interest thereon. Any money remaining in or accruing to the Repayment Account after all Series of Notes and the interest thereon have been paid in full, or provision for such payment has been made, shall be transferred to the General Fund of the District.

Section 5. Paving Agent. The District hereby requests the County to appoint, and consents to the County's appointment of U.S. Bank Trust Company, National Association to act as the initial paying agent and registrar for the Notes (the "Paying Agent"). All fees and expenses of the Paying Agent shall be the sole responsibility of the District, and to the extent not paid from the proceeds of the sale of the Notes, such fees and expenses shall be paid by the District.

Section 6. Notes, less costs of issuance, shall be transferred to a third-party administrator trustee designated by the District or special account established in the County treasury, as directed by an Authorized District Officer, to be disbursed to pay Judgment Obligees amounts due under related Judgments. If requested by an Authorized District Officer, the County Auditor and the County Office are hereby requested to establish and hold in the funds or accounts of the District in the County treasury a special account designated the "Los Angeles Unified School District 2024-2025 Tax and Revenue Anticipation Note Proceeds Account" (the "Proceeds Account"), and to maintain the Proceeds Account until the Note proceeds are expended in full. The District acknowledges that

none of the County, the County Treasurer or the County Auditor shall be responsible for the proper expenditure of proceeds of the Notes.

Section 7. <u>Investment of Funds</u>. All money held by the County Treasurer in the Repayment Account shall be invested to the greatest extent possible at the County Treasurer's discretion in the County's Pooled Investment Fund and as otherwise permitted by the California Government Code and the investment policy of the County, and the proceeds of such investments shall be retained in such account and such proceeds shall be subject to the pledge, lien, and security interest described herein; provided, however, that no portion of such money shall be invested for a term that exceeds the term of the Notes.

Purchase Contract. The Purchase Contract, in substantially the form submitted to this meeting and made a part hereof as though set forth herein, is hereby approved. Each of the President of the Board of Education, or such other member of the Board of Education as the President may designate, the Superintendent of the District, the Chief Financial Officer of the District (the "Chief Financial Officer"), the Deputy Chief Financial Officer of the District (the "Deputy Chief Financial Officer") and the Controller of the District (the "Controller"), including anyone serving as an interim or provisional officer in such positions, or such other officer or employee of the District as the Chief Financial Officer, the Deputy Chief Financial Officer or the Controller may designate (the "Authorized District Officers"), is hereby authorized, and any one of the Authorized District Officers is hereby directed, for and in the name of the District, to execute and deliver the Purchase Contract in substantially said form, with such changes, insertions and omissions as the Authorized District Officer executing the Purchase Contract shall approve, such approval to be conclusively evidenced by such Authorized District Officer's execution and delivery of the Purchase Contract with such changes, insertions and omissions; provided however, that (a) the Purchase Contract shall specify the aggregate principal amount of the Notes, which amount shall not be in excess of \$250,000,000, (b) the Purchase Contract shall specify the maturity date of the Notes, which date shall not be more than 13 months subsequent to the date of its delivery or beyond Fiscal Year 2025-2026, (c) the Purchase Contract shall specify the interest rate to be borne by the Notes, which rate or rates shall not exceed 12.00% per annum, and (d) the Purchase Contract shall specify the dates of deposit and amounts or proportions of Pledged Revenues to be deposited in the Repayment Account on each such date. The Board of Supervisors of the County is hereby requested to cause the Purchase Contract to be executed and delivered by the County, with such changes, insertions and omissions therein as may be acceptable to the County and the District.

Section 9. Form of Notes; Execution and Authentication. Each Series of Notes shall be in substantially the form set forth in Exhibit A hereto, with such changes, insertions and omissions as may be necessary to incorporate therein the terms thereof specified in the Purchase Contract, as the same shall be completed as provided in this Resolution, and as may otherwise be approved by an Authorized District Officer. Each of the Chair of the Board of Supervisors of the County, the County Treasurer or any duly appointed deputy of the County Treasurer or such other officer or employee of the County as the County Treasurer may designate (the "Authorized County Officers") is hereby authorized, and any one of the Authorized County Officers is hereby directed, for and in the name of the County, to execute the Notes by manual or facsimile signature, and the Executive Officer-Clerk of the Board of Supervisors or a duly appointed deputy is hereby authorized to attest to the signature of such Authorized County Officer by manual or facsimile

signature. The Notes shall be authenticated by the manual signature of a duly authorized officer of the Paying Agent.

- Section 10. Filing with Board of Supervisors. The Executive Officer of the Board of Education is hereby authorized and directed to file a certified copy of this Resolution with the Board of Supervisors of the County, which shall constitute the request of the Board of Education that the Board of Supervisors of the County issue and sell each Series of Notes on behalf of the District as soon as practicable upon the request of an Authorized District Officer, and to simultaneously provide certified copies of this Resolution to the County Superintendent of Schools and to the County Treasurer.
- Section 11. <u>Indemnification of County</u>. The District shall indemnify and hold harmless, to the extent permitted by law, the County and its officers and employees ("Indemnified Parties"), against any and all fees, costs, charges, losses, damages, claims, actions, liabilities, joint or several, and expenses of any conceivable nature to which such Indemnified Parties may become subject because of action or inaction related to the adoption of any resolution by the Board of Supervisors of the County authorizing the issuance and sale of the Notes. The District shall also reimburse any such Indemnified Parties for any legal or other expenses incurred in connection with investigating or defending any such claims or actions.
- Section 12. Debt Management Policy; Notice to California Debt and Investment Advisory Commission. With the passage of this Resolution, the Board of Education hereby certifies that the Debt Management Policy complies with Government Code Section 8855(i), and that the Notes authorized to be issued pursuant to this Resolution are consistent with such policy, and instructs note counsel, on behalf of the District, with respect to each Series of Notes issued pursuant to this Resolution, (a) to cause notices of the proposed sale and final sale of the Notes to be filed in a timely manner with the California Debt and Investment Advisory Commission pursuant to California Government Code Section 8855, and (b) to check, on behalf of the District, the "Yes" box relating to such certifications in each notice of proposed sale filed pursuant to California Government Code Section 8855.
- **Section 13.** Electronic Signatures; DocuSign. The Board of Education hereby approves the execution and delivery of all agreements, documents, certificates and instruments referred to herein with electronic signatures as may be permitted under the California Uniform Electronic Transactions Act and digital signatures as may be permitted under Section 16.5 of the California Government Code using DocuSign.
- **Section 14.** Further Assurances. The District, and its appropriate officials, have duly taken all proceedings necessary to be taken by them, and will take any additional proceedings necessary to be taken by them, for the levy, collection and enforcement of the taxes, income, revenue, cash receipts and other moneys subject to the pledge, lien, and security interest described herein in accordance with law and for carrying out the provisions of this Resolution and the Notes.
- **Section 15.** <u>Note Issuance Services</u>. Public Resources Advisory Group is hereby approved and appointed as municipal advisor, and Orrick, Herrington & Sutcliffe LLP is hereby approved and appointed as note counsel, each of which are consultants to the District to provide such services as may be required to issue the Notes.

Section 16. Approval of Actions. The officers and employees of the District are, and each of them hereby is, authorized and directed to execute and deliver, for and on behalf of the District, any and all agreements, documents, certificates and instruments and to do and cause to be done any and all acts and things necessary or proper for carrying out the issuance and sale of the Notes and the transactions contemplated by this Resolution.

Section 17. Prior Actions. All actions heretofore taken by the officers and employees of the District with respect to the issuance and sale of the Notes, or in connection with or related to any of the agreements, documents, certificates and instruments referred to herein, are hereby approved, confirmed and ratified.

Section 18. <u>Effective Date.</u> This Resolution shall take effect immediately upon its adoption.

This Note Purchase Contract is dated as of November [__], 2024 (as amended, restated, supplemented or otherwise modified from time to time in accordance with its terms, this "Agreement"), among the County of Los Angeles (the "County"), the Los Angeles Unified School District, a school district duly organized and validly existing under the laws of the State of California (the "District"), and Royal Bank of Canada, acting through its branch located at 200 Vesey Street, New York, New York 10281-8098, and its successors and assigns (the "Purchaser").

RECITALS

WHEREAS, the District anticipates and has budgeted in its adopted budget for fiscal year [2024-25] a significant estimated exposure to not less than [____] claimants and/or plaintiffs (the "Judgment Obligees") which have obtained and may obtain final judgments or orders for monetary damages against the District following concluded litigation or stipulated settlement(s) (each such judgment or order which is entered against the District by the applicable court or courts and which is not subject to appeal or further appeal, or which the District has indicated that it will not appeal, being referred to herein as, a "Judgment" and, collectively, the "Judgments") by the applicable court or courts, including, without limitation, the California Superior Court before which several claims are currently pending, as a result of pending and anticipated litigation brought by application of California Code of Civil Procedure Section 340.1 and California Assembly Bill Number 218, chaptered by the California Secretary of State on October 13, 2019 ("AB 218"); and

WHEREAS, the Board of Education of the District (the "Board") has determined that it is in the best interests of the District to refund, from time to time, the District's obligations to the Judgment Obligees evidenced by the Judgments, and in furtherance thereof for the District to enter into one or more forms of interim refunding instruments and short-term borrowing options from time to time and pursuant to its authority under applicable law, including Sections 53850 to 53858, both inclusive, of the California Government Code (being Article 7.6, Chapter 4, Part 1, Division 2, Title 5 of the California Government Code), including in the form of "Los Angeles Unified School District 2024-2025 Tax and Revenue Anticipation Notes," in one or more series (collectively, the "Notes" and each series of Notes, individually a "Series of Notes"), each issued to refund one or more Judgments as specified in each Request for Purchase (as defined herein) and

WHEREAS, the Notes have been authorized by a Resolution of the District adopted by the Board on October ___, 2024 (the "District TRANs Resolution") and a Resolution of the County adopted by the Board of Supervisors of the County on November ____, 2024 (the "County TRANs Resolution");

WHEREAS, as authorized and in furtherance of the terms of the Resolution of the District adopted by the Board on June 18, 2024 (the "District JOB Resolution"), the Board approved, pursuant to Articles 10 and 11 (commencing with Section 53570) of Chapter 3 of Part 1 of Division 2 of Title 5 of the California Government Code and all laws amendatory thereof or supplemental thereto and under and pursuant to the provisions of the Indenture (as defined herein), the issuance of its Los Angeles Unified School District Judgment Obligation Bonds, each as

specified by series designation, to refund such bonds (collectively, the "Bonds"), in one or more series on one or more sale dates, for the purpose of refunding Judgments and obligations previously issued to refund Judgments over time as authorized in the District JOB Resolution and paying related costs of issuance (including underwriter's discount) and any original issue discount, such issuance and obligations subject to judicial validation, currently pending but not completed; and

WHEREAS, the Notes (including, without limitation, the obligation to pay all amounts due and owing with respect to the Notes, and to pay all interest thereon at the applicable interest rate set forth in this Agreement and the Notes) when due are payable from the sources described in the District TRANs Resolution and the Notes as described in Section 5.26 hereof; and

WHEREAS, each of the Notes are being issued, and will be issued, for the purpose of satisfying the District's respective payment and refunded payment obligations directly attributable to the related Judgment and Judgments; and

WHEREAS, the Purchaser has agreed to purchase Notes to pay one or more Judgments, on the terms and conditions set forth herein, to the District;

Now, Therefore in consideration of the mutual promises, covenants and conditions contained herein, the parties agree as follows:

ARTICLE I

DEFINITIONS

Section 1.01. Definitions. (a) Capitalized terms used herein but not otherwise defined in subsection (b) below or elsewhere herein shall have the meanings given to them in the District TRANs Resolution.

(b) The following terms, as used herein, have the following meanings:

"AAFR" means, for the applicable Fiscal Year referenced, the District's Annual Audited Financial Report, or successive report presenting the audited financial statements of the District.

"Act" has the meaning assigned to it in the Recitals of this Agreement.

"Affiliate" means, with respect to any Person, any Person that directly or indirectly through one or more intermediaries, controls, or is controlled by, or is under common control with, such first Person. A Person shall be deemed to control another Person for the purposes of this definition if such first Person possesses, directly or indirectly, the power to direct, or cause the direction of, the management and policies of the second Person, whether through the ownership of voting securities, common directors, trustees or officers, by contract or otherwise.

"Agreement" means this Note Purchase Contract dated as of November [__], 2024, among the County, the District and the Purchaser, as the same may be amended, supplemented, modified or restated from time to time in accordance with its terms.

"Alternate Rate" means, for any day, for each Note, a fluctuating rate of interest per annum equal to the greater of (i) the Prime Rate in effect at such time and (ii) the Federal Funds Rate in effect at such time plus one quarter of one percent (0.25%).

"Anti-Corruption Laws" means: (i) the U.S. Foreign Corrupt Practices Act of 1977, as amended; and (ii) any other anti-bribery or anti-corruption laws, regulations or ordinances in any jurisdiction in which the District or any officer, director or agent acting on behalf of the District with respect to the obligations hereunder, this Agreement or any of the other Related Documents is located or doing business.

"Anti-Money Laundering Laws" means applicable laws or regulations in any jurisdiction in which the District or any officer, director or agent acting on behalf of the District with respect to the obligations hereunder, this Agreement or any of the other Related Documents is located or doing business that relates to money laundering, any predicate crime to money laundering, or any financial record keeping and reporting requirements related thereto.

"Applicable Spread" means (i) the sum of Applicable Spread Adjustment and (ii) a rate per annum associated with the Level corresponding to the Ratings, as specified below.

The following clauses shall apply to the pricing matrix set forth above.

(a) In the event of a split rating (*i.e.*, the Rating of any of Moody's, Fitch, or S&P is at a different level than the Rating of either of the other Rating Agencies), the Applicable Spread shall be based upon the Level in which the middle of the three Ratings appears (or if two of the Ratings are the same, then the same Level as Level in which the two equivalent Ratings appear), or if there are only two Ratings, the lower of the two Ratings (for avoidance of doubt, Level VII above is the Level with the lowest Ratings and Level I is the Level with the highest Ratings for purposes of the above pricing matrix). References to ratings above are references to rating categories as presently determined by Moody's, Fitch, or S&P, as applicable, and in the event of adoption of any new or changed rating system by any of Moody's, Fitch, or S&P or a "global" rating scale by any such Rating Agency, each of the Ratings from the Rating Agency in question referred to above shall be deemed to refer to the rating category under the new rating system which most closely approximates the applicable rating category as currently in effect.

(b) Any change in the Applicable Spread resulting from a change in the Rating shall be and become effective as of and on the date of the announcement of such change. The District acknowledges that as of the Closing Date the Applicable Spread is the spread specified above for Level I.

"Applicable Spread Adjustment" means a per annum rate equal 0.20% times the actual daily amount by which the Commitment exceeds the sum of the aggregate amount of Notes outstanding hereunder, in each case, for each day from and including the Closing Date to and including the Commitment End Date (or such earlier date on which the Commitment terminates in accordance with the terms hereof) calculated based upon a year of 360 days and the applicable number of days elapsed and the amount of the Applicable Spread Adjustment shall be allocated pro rata among the Notes outstanding hereunder.

"Available Tenor" means, as of any date of determination and with respect to the then-current Benchmark, as applicable, if such Benchmark is a term rate, any tenor for such Benchmark (or component thereof) that is or may be used for determining the length of an interest period pursuant to this Agreement as of such date.

"Bank Agreement" has the meaning set forth in Section 5.25 hereof.

"Bankruptcy Code" means the Bankruptcy Code, 11 U.S.C. § 101, et seq., as amended.

"Base Rate" means, for any day, a fluctuating rate of interest per annum equal to the greatest of (i) the Prime Rate plus 2.50%, (ii) the Federal Funds Rate plus 3.50%, and (iii) 8.00%.

"Benchmark" means, initially, Daily Simple SOFR; provided, however, that if a Benchmark Transition Event has occurred with respect to Daily Simple SOFR or the then-current Benchmark, then "Benchmark" means the applicable Benchmark Replacement to the extent that such Benchmark Replacement has become effective pursuant to the provisions of this Agreement.

"Benchmark Floor" means zero percent (0%).

"Benchmark Replacement" means the sum of: (A) the alternate rate of interest that has been selected by the Purchaser and the District as the replacement for the then-current Benchmark; and (B) the spread adjustment, or method for calculating or determining such spread adjustment, (which may be a positive or negative value or zero) that has been selected by the Purchaser, in each case, giving due consideration to (x) any selection or recommendation by the Relevant Governmental Body at such time for a replacement rate, the mechanism for determining such a rate, the methodology or conventions applicable to such rate, or the spread adjustment, or method for calculating or determining such spread adjustment, for such rate, or (y) any evolving or then-prevailing market convention for determining a rate of interest as a replacement to the then-current Benchmark, the methodology or conventions applicable to such rate, or the spread adjustment, or method for calculating or determining such spread adjustment, for such alternate rate for U.S. dollar-denominated syndicated or bilateral credit facilities at such time; provided, however, that if the Benchmark Replacement as determined as provided above would be less than

the Benchmark Floor, then Benchmark Replacement shall be deemed to be the Benchmark Floor, subject to any other applicable floor rate provision.

"Benchmark Replacement Conforming Changes" means with respect to either the use or administration of the Daily Simple SOFR or the use, administration, adoption or implementation of any Benchmark Replacement, any technical, administrative or operational changes (including, without limitation, changes to the definition of "U.S. Government Securities Business Day," the timing and frequency of determining rates and making payments of interest, prepayment provisions and other technical, administrative or operational matters) that the Purchaser decides may be appropriate to reflect the adoption and implementation of any such rate or to permit the use and administration thereof by the Purchaser in a manner substantially consistent with market practice (or, if the Purchaser decides that adoption of any portion of such market practice is not administratively feasible or if the Purchaser determines that no market practice for the administration of any such rate exists, in such other manner of administration as the Purchaser decides is reasonably necessary in connection with the administration of terms of this Agreement in connection with the determination of amounts due on the Notes).

"Benchmark Replacement Date" means the earliest to occur of the following events with respect to the then-current Benchmark:

- (a) in the case of clause (a) or (b) of the definition of "Benchmark Transition Event," the later of (i) the date of the public statement or publication of information referenced therein and (ii) the date on which the administrator of such Benchmark (or the published component used in the calculation thereof) permanently or indefinitely ceases to provide such Benchmark (or such component thereof); or
- (b) in the case of clause (c) of the definition of "Benchmark Transition Event," the first date on which all Available Tenors of such Benchmark (or the published component used in the calculation thereof) has been determined and announced by the regulatory supervisor for the administrator of such Benchmark (or such component thereof) to be non-representative; *provided* that such non-representativeness will be determined by reference to the most recent statement or publication referenced in such clause (c) and even if such Benchmark (or such component thereof) continues to be provided on such date.

"Benchmark Transition Event" means the occurrence of one or more of the following events with respect to the then-current Benchmark:

- (a) a public statement or publication of information by or on behalf of the administrator of such Benchmark (or the published component used in the calculation thereof) announcing that such administrator has ceased or will cease to provide such Benchmark (or such component thereof) permanently or indefinitely; *provided* that, at the time of such statement or publication, there is no successor administrator that will continue to provide such Benchmark (or component thereof);
- (b) a public statement or publication of information by the regulatory supervisor for the administrator of such Benchmark (or the published component used in

the calculation thereof), the Board of Governors of the Federal Reserve System, the Federal Reserve Bank of New York, an insolvency official with jurisdiction over the administrator for such Benchmark (or such component), a resolution authority with jurisdiction over the administrator for such Benchmark (or such component) or a court or an entity with similar insolvency or resolution authority over the administrator for such Benchmark (or such component), which states that the administrator of such Benchmark (or such component) has ceased or will cease to provide such Benchmark (or such component thereof) permanently or indefinitely, *provided* that, at the time of such statement or publication, there is no successor administrator that will continue to provide such Benchmark (or such component thereof); or

(c) a public statement or publication of information by the regulatory supervisor for the administrator of such Benchmark (or the published component used in the calculation thereof) announcing that such Benchmark (or such component thereof) are not, or as of a specified future date will not be, representative.

"Benchmark Transition Start Date" means in the case of a Benchmark Transition Event, the earlier of (a) the applicable Benchmark Replacement Date and (b) if such Benchmark Transition Event is a public statement or publication of information of a prospective event, the 90th day prior to the expected date of such event as of such public statement or publication of information (or if the expected date of such prospective event is fewer than 90 days after such statement or publication, the date of such statement or publication).

"Benchmark Unavailability Period" means the period (if any) (a) beginning at the time that a Benchmark Replacement Date has occurred if, at such time, no Benchmark Replacement has replaced the then current Benchmark for all purposes hereunder and under Notes and (b) ending at the time that a Benchmark Replacement has replaced the then current Benchmark for all purposes hereunder and under the Notes.

"Board" means the Board of Education of the Los Angeles Unified School District.

"Bonds" has the meaning assigned to it in the Recitals of this Agreement.

"Business Day" means a day which is not (a) a Saturday, Sunday or legal holiday on which banking institutions in Los Angeles, California or New York, New York are closed, (b) a day on which the New York Stock Exchange or the Federal Reserve Bank is closed, (c) a day on which the principal offices or the offices at which the Purchaser purchases Notes hereunder are closed, or (d) any other calculation or determination involving SOFR, a U.S. Government Securities Business Day.

"Closing Date" means, as appropriate to the context, _____, 2024 as the date of closing and delivery of this Agreement and the Series A Notes, subject to the satisfaction or waiver by the Purchaser of all of the conditions precedent set forth in Article III hereof, and/or the closing date(s) for each subsequent Series of Notes, the closing date specified in the related Note Purchase Confirmation.

"Commitment" means the Purchaser's commitment to purchase Notes as and when issued up to the amount of \$250,000,000, as such amount may be reduced from time to time or terminated pursuant to Section 2.07, Section 2.08 and 6.01 hereof.

"Commitment End Date" means June 30, 2025, or if such day is a not a Business Day, the next preceding Business Day.

"Compliance Certificate" means a certificate substantially in the form of Exhibit B hereto.

"County" means the County of Los Angeles.

"County TRANs Resolution" has the meaning assigned to it in the Recitals hereof.

"Daily Simple SOFR" means, with respect to any day (a "SOFR Rate Day"), a rate per annum equal to SOFR for the day (such day, the "SOFR Determination Day") that is two (2) U.S. Government Securities Business Days prior to (i) if such SOFR Rate Day is a U.S. Government Securities Business Day, such SOFR Rate Day or (ii) if such SOFR Rate Day is not a U.S. Government Securities Business Day, the U.S. Government Securities Business Day immediately preceding such SOFR Rate Day, in each case, as such SOFR is published by the SOFR Administrator on the SOFR Administrator's Website; provided, however, that if Daily Simple SOFR determined as provided above would be less than the Benchmark Floor, then Daily Simple SOFR shall be deemed to be the Benchmark Floor. If by 5:00 p.m. (New York City time) on the second (2nd) U.S. Government Securities Business Day immediately following any SOFR Determination Day, SOFR in respect of such SOFR Determination Day has not been published on the SOFR Administrator's Website and a Benchmark Replacement Date with respect to Daily Simple SOFR has not occurred, then SOFR for such SOFR Determination Day will be SOFR as published in respect of the first preceding U.S. Government Securities Business Day for which SOFR was published on the SOFR Administrator's Website; provided that any SOFR determined pursuant to this sentence shall be utilized for purposes of calculation of Daily Simple SOFR for no more than three (3) consecutive SOFR Rate Days.

"Debt" of any Person means at any date, without duplication, (i) all obligations of such Person for borrowed money, (ii) all obligations of such Person evidenced by bonds, debentures, notes, securities or other similar instruments, (iii) all obligations of such Person to pay the deferred purchase price of property or services, except trade accounts payable arising in the ordinary course of business (including, without limitation, accounts payable to construction contractors and other professionals for services rendered), (iv) all obligations of such Person under an installment purchase contract, financing lease or capital lease or similar instrument that, in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles, would be required to be capitalized, (v) all Debt of others secured by a Lien on any asset of such Person, whether or not such Debt is assumed by such Person, (vi) all obligations of such Person under Swap Contracts, (vii) all obligations of such Person to purchase securities (or other property) which arise out of or in connection with the sale of the same or substantially similar securities or property or obligations for the deferred purchase price of property or services (other than trade accounts payable occurring in the ordinary course of business), (viii) all reimbursement obligations and other indebtedness owed to any bank or other financial institution and payable on a parity basis with the Notes, and (ix) all Debt of others of a

type described in any of clauses (i) through (vii) hereof guaranteed by such Person, whether directly or indirectly.

"Default" means any event or condition which, with notice, the passage of time or any combination of the foregoing, would constitute an Event of Default.

"Default Rate" means, for any day, and with respect to any Note or any payment obligations due and owing under Section 8.03 hereof, a rate of interest per annum equal to the Base Rate from time to time in effect plus 4.0%.

"Designated County Representative" means each "Authorized Officer" as defined in the County TRANs Resolution or a person authorized by the County Treasurer to act on behalf of the County under or with respect to this Agreement.

"Designated District Representative" means the Superintendent of the District, the Chief Business Officer or the Controller of the District, or a person authorized by the Chief Business Officer or the Controller to act on behalf of the District, and any other person authorized by the Board of Education of the District to act on behalf of the District under or with respect to this Agreement.

"District" means the Los Angeles Unified School District, a school district duly organized and validly existing under the laws of the State of California.

"District TRANs Resolution" has the meaning assigned to it in the Recitals hereof.

"Dollars," "US\$," "\$" and "U.S. Dollars" mean the lawful currency of the United States of America.

"EMMA" means Electronic Municipal Market Access as provided by the Municipal Securities Rulemaking Board.

"ERISA" means the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974, as amended, or any successor statute thereto.

"Event of Default" with respect to this Agreement means one or more of the events described in Section 6.01 of this Agreement and, with respect to any Related Documents, has the meaning assigned therein.

"Federal Funds Rate" means, for any day, the rate per annum equal to the weighted average of the rates on overnight federal funds transactions with members of the Federal Reserve System, as published by the Federal Reserve Bank of New York on the Business Day next succeeding such day; provided that (a) if such day is not a Business Day, then the Federal Funds Rate for such day shall be such rate on such transactions on the next preceding Business Day as so published on the next succeeding Business Day, and (b) if no such rate is so published on such next succeeding Business Day, then the Federal Funds Rate for such day shall be the average rate (rounded, if necessary, to a whole multiple of one one-hundredth of 1.00%) charged to the

Purchaser on such day on such transactions as determined by the Purchaser. Notwithstanding the foregoing, if the Federal Funds Rate shall be less than zero percent (0%), such rate shall be deemed to be zero percent (0%) for purposes of this Agreement.

"Fiscal Year" means the period beginning on July 1 of each year and ending on the next succeeding June 30, or any other twelve-month period selected and designated as the official Fiscal Year of the District.

"Fitch" means Fitch, Inc. and any successor rating agency.

"Governmental Authority" means the government of the United States or any other nation or any political subdivision thereof or any governmental or quasi-governmental entity, including any court, department, commission, board, bureau, agency, administration, central bank, service, district or other instrumentality of any governmental entity or other entity exercising executive, legislative, judicial, taxing, regulatory, fiscal, monetary or administrative powers or functions of or pertaining to government (including any supra-national bodies such as the European Union or European Central Bank), or any arbitrator, mediator or other Person with authority to bind a party at law.

"Indenture" means that form of indenture substantially in the form provided for in the District JOB Resolution, the execution and delivery thereof subject to judicial validation, currently pending but not completed, as the same may be executed and delivered, amended, restated, or otherwise modified in accordance with the terms hereof and thereof.

"Interest Payment Date" means the Maturity Date or such earlier date on which all Notes are required to be paid in full in accordance with the terms hereof.

"Internal Revenue Code" means the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, as amended, or any successor statute.

"Investor Letter" has the meaning set forth in Section 8.05(b) hereof.

"*Investment Policy*" means the investment policy of the District which is to be delivered to the Purchaser pursuant to Section 3.01(f) hereof.

"Judgment" has the meaning assigned to it in the Recitals of this Agreement.

"Judgment Obligees" has the meaning assigned to it in the Recitals of this Agreement.

"Law" means, collectively, all applicable international, foreign, Federal, state and local statutes, treaties, rules, guidelines, regulations, ordinances, codes and administrative or judicial precedents or authorities, including the interpretation or administration thereof by any Governmental Authority charged with the enforcement, interpretation or administration thereof, and all applicable administrative orders, directed duties, requests, licenses, authorizations and permits of, and agreements with, any applicable Governmental Authority, in each case whether or not having the force of law.

"Lien" means, with respect to any asset, any mortgage, lien, pledge, charge, security interest or encumbrance of any kind in respect of such asset. For the purposes of this Agreement, a Person shall be deemed to own subject to a Lien any asset which it has acquired or holds subject to the interest of a vendor or lessor under any conditional sale agreement, capital lease or other title retention agreement relating to such asset.

"Margin Stock" has the meaning ascribed to such term in Regulation U promulgated by the Board of Governors of the Federal Reserve System of the United States, as now and hereafter from time to time in effect.

"Material Adverse Effect" means any material adverse change in or effect on (a) the ability of the District to consummate the transactions contemplated by this Agreement, the District TRANs Resolution or the Notes, (b) the ability of the District to perform any of its obligations under this Agreement, the District TRANs Resolution or the Notes, (c) the District's ability to make payments on the Notes or any payment obligations due and owing under Section 8.03 hereof, (d) the rights, remedies and security of the Purchaser under the Agreement or any of the Related Documents, or (e) the enforceability or validity of the Agreement or any Related Document.

"Material District Debt" means any Debt of the District secured by or payable from the Unrestricted Revenues or the general fund of the District that is outstanding in a principal amount of \$65,000,000 or more (excluding in relation to the Judgments).

"Maturity Date" means August 1, 2025, which is the maturity date of the last Series of Notes issued under the Resolutions.

"Maximum Interest Rate" means an interest rate per annum equal to the lesser of (i) twelve (12%) and (ii) the maximum non-usurious rate of interest on the relevant obligation permitted by applicable law.

"Moody's" means Moody's Investors Service, Inc. and any successor rating agency.

"Non-Purchaser Transferee" has the meaning set forth in Section 8.05(b) hereof.

"Note Pricing Confirmation" means each respective completed and executed Note Pricing Confirmation modifying the terms thereof to the satisfaction of the Purchaser or an affiliate of Royal Bank of Canada as purchaser of the related Note.

"Note Counsel" means Orrick, Herrington & Sutcliffe LLP, or any other firm of attorneys nationally recognized on the subject of tax-exempt municipal finance selected by the District.

"Noteholder" means the Purchaser and each Non-Purchaser Transferee pursuant to the terms hereof so long as such Non-Purchaser Transferee owns an interest in the Notes.

"Notes" means the Los Angeles Unified School District 2024-2025 Tax and Revenue Anticipation Notes issued by the County on behalf of the District, substantially in the form set forth in Exhibit A of the District TRANs Resolution, issued and purchased in accordance with this

Agreement and the Resolutions and, as appropriate to the context, the Series A Notes and/or a subsequent Series of Notes issued and purchased in accordance with this Agreement and the Resolutions.

"Other Bank Agreements" means any other Bank Agreement and all amendments, modifications, restatements and extensions of such agreements, entered into from time to time and any other agreement delivered in substitution or exchange for such agreements and any other Bank Agreement.

"Participant" has the meaning set forth in Section 8.05(d) hereof.

"Participation" has the meaning set forth in Section 8.05(c) hereof.

"Paying Agent" means U.S. Bank Trust Company, National Association and its permitted successors and assigns.

"Paying Agent Agreement" means the Paying Agent Agreement dated November [___], 2024, between the County and the Paying Agent, as the same may be amended, supplemented, modified or restated from time to time in accordance with its terms.

"Person" means an individual, a corporation, a partnership, a limited liability company, an association, a trust or any other entity or organization, including a government or political subdivision or an agency or instrumentality thereof.

"Plan" means an employee pension benefit plan which is covered by Title IV of ERISA or subject to the minimum funding standards under Section 412 of the Code.

"Pledged Revenues" means, as provided in the District TRANs Resolution, those revenues specified in that pledge of, first lien on, first priority security interest in, the first Unrestricted Revenues to be received by the District in each period specified in this Agreement and the related Request for Purchase, Note Pricing Confirmation and the related Series of Notes, in an amount equal to the amount, or in the proportion of the total amount due, as therein specified.

"Prime Rate" means, for any day, the fluctuating rate of interest per annum equal to the "Prime Rate" listed in the "Money Rates" section of The Wall Street Journal as of such day or, if The Wall Street Journal is not published on a particular day, then the "Prime Rate" listed in the "Money Rates" section of The Wall Street Journal for the immediately preceding Business Day. If The Wall Street Journal ceases to exist or to publish a prime rate from which the Prime Rate is then determined, then the Prime Rate shall be the rate determined by Royal Bank of Canada as its prime commercial lending rate for such day for loans denominated in U.S. Dollars made in the United States. The Purchaser may make loans to its customers at, below or above such prime commercial lending rate, and the prime commercial lending rate referred to herein is not intended to be the best rate offered to customers of the Purchaser. Any change in the Prime Rate shall take effect on the date specified in the publication or announcement of such change. Each determination of the Prime Rate by the Purchaser will be conclusive and binding on the District absent manifest error.

"Purchase" means a purchaser of Notes hereunder to be made to the District by the Purchaser pursuant to Article II hereof.

"Purchase Period" means the period from and including the Closing Date to and including the Termination Date.

"Purchaser" has the meaning set forth in the introductory paragraph hereof.

"Rating" means the long-term unenhanced debt rating assigned by any of S&P, Moody's and Fitch to the general obligation bonds of the District.

"Rating Agency" means all or any of S&P, Moody's, and Fitch, as the context may require.

"Related Documents" means and includes this Agreement, the Notes, the District TRANs Resolution, the County TRANs Resolution, the Paying Agent Agreement and any and all future renewals and extensions or restatements of, or amendments or supplements to, any of the foregoing permitted hereunder and thereunder.

"Relevant Governmental Body" means the Board of Governors of the Federal Reserve System or the Federal Reserve Bank of New York, or a committee officially endorsed or convened by the Board of Governors of the Federal Reserve System or the Federal Reserve Bank of New York or any successor thereto.

"Repayment Account" has the meaning set forth in Section 5.26(a) hereof.

"Request for Purchase" has the meaning set forth in Section 2.02(a)(i) hereof.

"Resolutions" means, collectively, the County TRANs Resolution and the District TRANs Resolution.

"Sanctioned Target" means any target of Sanctions, including (i) persons on any list of targets identified or designated pursuant to any Sanctions, (ii) persons, countries, or territories that are the target of any territorial or country-based Sanctions program, (iii) persons that are a target of Sanctions due to their ownership or control by any Sanctioned Target(s), or (iv) persons otherwise a target of Sanctions, including vessels and aircraft, that are designated under any Sanctions program.

"Sanctions" means economic or financial sanctions, sectoral sanctions, secondary sanctions, trade embargoes or restrictions and anti-terrorism laws imposed, administered or enforced from time to time by the United States of America, the United Nations Security Council, the European Union, the United Kingdom, any other governmental authority with jurisdiction over the District or any officer, director or agent acting on behalf of the District with respect to the obligations hereunder, this Agreement or any of the other Related Documents.

"S&P" means S&P Global Ratings, an S&P Global Inc. business and any successor rating agency.

"Series A Notes" means the Series of Notes issued on the Closing Date in an amount not less than \$10,000,000.

"Series of Notes" has the meaning set forth in the recitals hereof.

"SOFR" means a rate per annum equal to the secured overnight financing rate as administered by the SOFR Administrator.

"SOFR Administrator" means the Federal Reserve Bank of New York (or a successor administrator of the secured overnight financing rate).

"SOFR Administrator's Website" means the website of the Federal Reserve Bank of New York, currently at http://www.newyorkfed.org, or any successor source for the secured overnight financing rate identified as such by the SOFR Administrator from time to time.

"SOFR Index Rate" means Daily Simple SOFR.

"SOFR Index Reset Date" means the second (2nd) U.S. Government Business Day preceding the applicable date of determination with respect to Daily Simple SOFR.

"State" means the State of California.

"Swap Contract" means (a) any and all rate swap transactions, basis swaps, total return swaps, credit derivative transactions, forward rate transactions, equity or equity index swaps or options, bond or bond price or bond index swaps or options or forward bond or forward bond price or forward bond index transactions, interest rate options, cap transactions, floor transactions, collar transactions, spot contracts, or any other similar transactions or any combination of any of the foregoing (including any options to enter into any of the foregoing), whether or not any such transaction is governed by or subject to any master agreement, and (b) any and all transactions of any kind, and the related confirmations, which are subject to the terms and conditions of, or governed by, any form of master agreement published by the International Swaps and Derivatives Association, Inc., any International Foreign Exchange Master Agreement, or any other master agreement (any such master agreement, together with any related schedules, a "Master Agreement"), including any such obligations or liabilities under any Master Agreement.

"Termination Date" means Maturity Date or, if earlier, such date on which the principal and interest on all Series of Notes are due and owing hereunder.

"Third-Party Administrator Trustee" means [Administrator] to serve as third-party administrator relating to payment directly to the Judgment Obligees.

"Unrestricted Revenues" means the taxes, income, revenue (including, but not limited to, revenue from the state and federal governments), cash receipts and other moneys provided for Fiscal Year 2024-2025 which will be received by or will accrue to the District during such fiscal year for the General Fund of the District and which are lawfully available for the payment of current expenses and other obligations of the District.

"U.S. Government Securities Business Day" means any day except for (i) a Saturday, (ii) a Sunday or (iii) a day on which the Securities Industry and Financial Markets Association, or any successor thereto, recommends that the fixed income departments of its members be closed for the entire day for purposes of trading in United States government securities.

"Written" or "in writing" means any form of written communication or a communication by means of facsimile.

Section 1.02. Accounting Terms and Determinations. Unless otherwise specified herein, all accounting terms used herein shall be interpreted, all accounting determinations hereunder shall be made, and all financial statements required to be delivered hereunder shall be prepared in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles as in effect from time to time, applied on a basis consistent (except for changes concurred with by the District's independent public accountants) with the most recent audited financial statements of the District delivered to the Purchaser hereunder.

ARTICLE II

PURCHASE AND TERMS OF THE NOTES

Section 2.01. Commitment to Purchase the Notes.

- (a) Purchase of Notes. During the Purchase Period, the Purchaser agrees, on the terms and conditions set forth in this Agreement, to make a loan to the District in the form of purchases of Series of Notes from the County issued on behalf of the District pursuant to this Section from time to time in amounts such that the aggregate principal amount of Notes purchased by the Purchaser at any one time outstanding shall not exceed the amount of the Commitment. Within the foregoing limit, the District may request Purchases of Series of Notes under this subsection (a), repay or, to the extent permitted by Section 2.09 hereof, prepay a Series of Notes and request that a Series of Notes be issued at any time during the Purchase Period under this subsection (a). The District shall request in the initial Request for Purchase on the Closing Date in an amount not less than \$10,000,000 and any other Request for Purchase shall be made on or before the Commitment End Date and the Commitment shall terminate on the Commitment End Date.
- (b) Deemed Loan. Notwithstanding anything herein or in the Resolutions to the contrary, upon honoring any Request for Purchase, the Purchaser shall be deemed to have made a loan to the District, the proceeds of which shall be used to purchase a Series of Notes in respect of which such Request for Purchase is made.
- Section 2.02. Method of Purchasing Notes; Account to Which Proceeds of Notes to Be Purchased. (a)(i) In the case of any Purchase of a Series of Notes, the County and the District shall give the Purchaser written notice in the form of Exhibit A hereto, executed by a Designated County Representative and a Designated District Representative (a "Request for Purchase"), by not later than 11:00 a.m. (Los Angeles time) on the seven (7) Business Day before each Purchase of a Series of Notes (or such shorter time as the Purchaser may agree to in writing), specifying:

- (A) the date of such Purchase, which shall be a Business Day;
- (B) the aggregate amount of such Purchase (which shall not exceed the difference between (i) the amount of the Commitment and (ii) the aggregate principal amount of Notes then outstanding and in the minimum amount of \$100,000);
 - (C) that the following items are attached and delivered to Note Counsel:
 - (1) the case number(s) and amount of the Judgment(s) to be funded; and
 - (2) the Request for Purchase in the form of Exhibit A attached hereto, executed by a Designated District Representative of the District, which includes wiring information from the [Third-Party Administrator Trustee].
 - (F) that the following items are delivered to Note Counsel:
 - (1) the copy of the Judgment(s) to be funded by such Series of Notes; and
 - (2) [a copy of a form of irrevocable instruction to the [Third-Party Administrator Trustee] executed by a Designated District Representative of the District to pay the Judgment Obligee(s) from Note proceeds of such Series of Notes;] and
 - (3) an Investor Letter executed by the Purchaser for delivery on the Closing Date.
 - (G) that the following items are delivered to the Purchaser:
 - (1) (a) the updated monthly cash flows of the District for such fiscal year, including the monthly Unrestricted Revenues for Fiscal Year 2024-25 of the District:
 - (2) a description of the amount of Unrestricted Revenues including estimated dates and amounts which are expected to be received by the District during the period set forth in the Request for Purchase deposited into the Repayment Account as security for the payment of the Series of Notes.
- (b) Subject to the provisions of subsection (a) of this Section 2.02 and the satisfaction of the terms and conditions set forth in Section 3.02 hereof, by not later than 3:00 p.m. (Los Angeles time) on the date of each Borrowing, the Purchaser shall wire transfer, in federal or other immediately available funds, the proceeds of such Purchase to the account or accounts set forth in the Request for Purchase.
- (c) Each Note shall be in the principal amount requested by the District pursuant to each Request for Purchase in the form of Exhibit A hereto.

- (d) The District may not request more than one (1) Purchase of Notes per Business Day.
- (e) The District may not request more than four (4) Purchases of Notes per month.
- Section 2.03. The Notes. (a) The Notes of each series shall be substantially in the form set forth in Exhibit A of the District TRANs Resolution payable to the Purchaser in an amount equal to the applicable Purchase of Notes; provided, however, that the maximum principal amount of all Notes shall not exceed the Commitment.
- (b) The Purchaser shall record the date, amount, type and maturity of each Series of Notes purchased by it and the date and amount of each payment of principal made by or on behalf of the District with respect thereto, and prior to any transfer of a Note shall endorse on the schedule forming a part thereof appropriate notations to evidence the foregoing information with respect to each Notes then outstanding evidenced by such Note; *provided* that the failure of the Purchaser to make any such recordation or endorsement, or any error therein, or failure to submit any such notations to the District shall not affect the obligations of the District hereunder or under such Note. The Purchaser is hereby irrevocably authorized by the District so to endorse each Note and to attach to and make a part of each such Note a continuation of any such schedule as and when required.
- (c) The Note Pricing Confirmation completed and executed for each Series of Notes shall modify the terms of this Agreement with respect to the applicable Series of Notes as mutually agreed to by the Purchaser and the District.
- Section 2.04. Maturity of Notes. (a) Each Series of Notes shall mature, and the principal amount thereof (together with all accrued and unpaid interest therein) shall be due and payable in full by the District on the Maturity Date or such earlier date on which all Notes become due and payable in accordance with the terms hereof.
- Section 2.05. Interest Rates. (a) Subject to subsections (d) and (e) below and the related Note Pricing Confirmation, and Section 6.02 hereof, each Note shall bear interest on the outstanding principal amount thereof, for each day from the date such Note is purchased until it becomes due, at a rate per annum equal to the sum of (i) the SOFR Index Rate plus (ii) the Applicable Spread plus (iii) the Applicable Spread Adjustment. Such interest shall be payable by the District on the Termination Date or such earlier date on which the Notes are paid in full.
- (b) (i) For internal administrative purposes only, the Purchaser may consolidate the unpaid aggregate principal balance of the Notes on its systems and in its records so that all Notes bear interest at the same interest rate.
- (ii) The Purchaser shall determine the applicable SOFR Index Rate for each Series of Notes on each SOFR Determination Day while such Note remains unpaid. Notwithstanding the foregoing, with respect to a Note that is advanced pursuant to a new Purchase, the rate for such Note shall be the same rate as for all outstanding Notes. The Purchaser will send the District a hyperlink to the SOFR Administrator's Website, as such hyperlink may be updated from time to time. Upon the request of the District, the Purchaser shall promptly, but in any event within

three (3) Business Days, notify the District of the interest rates for the Notes for such dates and periods as requested by the District. Each determination by the Purchaser of an interest rate shall be conclusive and binding for all purposes, absent manifest error. The SOFR Index Rate shall be rounded to the fifth decimal place.

(A) Subject to Section 2.05(e)(B) hereof and the Purchaser's reasonable determination upon timely notice to the District that a Benchmark Transition Event has not occurred, if the Purchaser determines (any determination of which shall be conclusive and binding on the District absent manifest error) that either (i) Daily Simple SOFR or the then-current benchmark, cannot be determined pursuant to the definition thereof other than as a result of a Benchmark Transition Event (an "Inability Determination"), (ii) Daily Simple SOFR does not adequately and fairly reflect the cost to the Purchaser to purchase or maintain any Note (a "Changed Circumstances Determination") or (iii) any law has made it unlawful, or that any Governmental Authority has asserted that it is unlawful, for the Purchaser to purchase or maintain any Note based on SOFR or Daily Simple SOFR or to determine or charge interest rates based upon SOFR or Daily Simple SOFR (an "Illegality Determination"), then the Purchaser will so notify the District and the obligation of the Purchaser to purchase or maintain any Note bearing interest at Daily Simple SOFR shall be suspended until Purchaser shall have notified the District of its determination that the circumstances giving rise to such previous determination no longer exist; provided, however, that the Purchaser will provide a Changed Circumstances Determination only in the event that a similar determination would be made with respect to similarly situated issuers under similar circumstances, as such circumstances are determined by the Purchaser in the Purchaser's commercially reasonable discretion. In each such case, the outstanding principal balance of the Notes shall bear interest (computed on the basis of a 360-day year, actual days elapsed) at the sum of (1) a fluctuating rate per annum (and any spread adjustment) mutually determined by the Purchaser and the District in writing and (2) the related Applicable Spread until the Purchaser revokes such Inability Determination or notifies the District that the circumstances giving rise to such Illegality Determination no longer exist, as applicable, provided however, the Purchaser and the District agree that from and after an Inability Determination or an Illegality Determination, until the Purchaser and the District have mutually determined such fluctuating rate per annum in writing, the outstanding principal balance of the Notes shall bear interest (computed on the basis of a 360-day year, actual days elapsed) at the sum of the Alternate Rate in effect from time to time and the Applicable Spread, from the date of such Inability Determination or an Illegality Determination until the earlier of (x) the date on which the Purchaser and the District have mutually determined such fluctuating rate per annum (and any spread adjustment) in writing and (y) the date on which the Purchaser revokes such Inability Determination or notifies the District that the circumstances giving rise to such Illegality Determination no longer exist, as applicable; provided, further, however, the Purchaser and the District agree that from and after a Changed Circumstances Determination, until the Purchaser and the District have the mutually determined such fluctuating rate per annum in writing, the outstanding principal balance of the Notes shall bear interest (computed on the basis of a 360-day year, actual days elapsed) at the sum of the Alternate Rate in effect from time to time (for the first ninety (90) days after such Changed Circumstances Determination, without regard to clause (i) of the definition of Alternate Rate) and the Applicable Spread, from the date of such Changed Circumstances Determination until the earlier of (x) the date on which the Purchaser and the District have the mutually determined such fluctuating rate per annum (and any spread adjustment) in writing and (y) the date on which the

Purchaser revokes such Changed Circumstances Determination or notifies the District that the circumstances giving rise to such Changed Circumstances Determination no longer exist, as applicable. When interest is determined in relation to the Alternate Rate, each change in the rate of interest hereunder shall become effective on the date each Alternate Rate change is determined by the Purchaser. Notwithstanding any of the foregoing to the contrary, if a Benchmark Replacement is subsequently determined in accordance with Section 2.05(e)(B) hereof, that Benchmark Replacement, plus any applicable margin, will become effective on the Benchmark Replacement Date and will then supersede the Alternate Rate and other terms determined in accordance with this provision. The Purchaser shall use commercially reasonable efforts to provide ninety (90) days' advance notice of the events and/or conditions set forth in this Section 2.05(e)(A); provided, however, that (I) since the timing of such events are not within the Purchaser's sole control, the District acknowledges and agrees that it may be impossible for the Purchaser to determine if such events are occurring ninety (90) days before they occur and, in such case, the Purchaser shall use commercially reasonable efforts to provide such notice as soon as reasonably possible and (II) the failure of the Purchaser to provide any such notice shall not affect the effectiveness of the terms and conditions of this Section 2.05(e)(A).

- (B) Notwithstanding anything to the contrary contained in this Agreement or in any Related Document (for the purposes of this Section 2.05(e)(B), a Swap Contract by and between the District and the Purchaser or any of its affiliates is not a Related Document):
 - (1) Benchmark Replacement. Notwithstanding anything to the contrary herein or in any other Relevant Document, upon the occurrence of a Benchmark Transition Event, the Purchaser and the District may amend this Agreement to replace the then-current Benchmark with a Benchmark Replacement. No replacement of a Benchmark with a Benchmark Replacement pursuant to this Section 2.05(e)(B)(1) will occur prior to the applicable Benchmark Transition Start Date.
 - (2) Benchmark Replacement Conforming Changes. The Purchaser will have the right to make Benchmark Replacement Conforming Changes from time to time and any amendments implementing such Benchmark Replacement Conforming Changes will become effective without any further action or consent of the District.
 - (3) Notices; Standards for Decisions and Determinations. In connection with the use, administration, adoption or implementation of a Benchmark Replacement, the Purchaser will promptly, but in any event within three (3) Business Days, notify the District of (A) the implementation of any Benchmark Replacement and (B) the effectiveness of any Benchmark Replacement Conforming Changes in connection with the use, administration, adoption or implementation of a Benchmark Replacement. The Purchaser will notify the District of (x) the removal or reinstatement of any tenor of a Benchmark pursuant to Section 2.05(e)(B)(4) and (y) the commencement of any Benchmark Unavailability Period. Any determination, decision or election that may be made by the Purchaser pursuant to this Section 2.05(e)(B), including any determination with respect to a tenor, rate or adjustment or of the occurrence or non-occurrence of an event, circumstance or date and any decision to take or refrain from taking any action or any selection, will be conclusive and binding

absent manifest error and will be made in its sole discretion and without the District's consent except as expressly required pursuant to this Section 2.05(e)(B).

- Unavailability of Tenor of Benchmark. Notwithstanding anything to the contrary herein or in any other Related Document, at any time (including in connection with the implementation of a Benchmark Replacement), (i) if the then-current Benchmark is a term rate and either (A) any tenor for such Benchmark is not displayed on a screen or other information service that publishes such rate from time to time as selected by the Purchaser in its reasonable discretion or (B) the regulatory supervisor for the administrator of such Benchmark has provided a public statement or publication of information announcing that any tenor for such Benchmark is not or will not be representative, then the Purchaser may modify the "interest period" (or any similar or analogous definition) for any Benchmark settings at or after such time to remove such unavailable or non-representative tenor and (ii) if a tenor that was removed pursuant to clause (i) above either (A) is subsequently displayed on a screen or information service for a Benchmark (including a Benchmark Replacement) or (B) is not, or is no longer, subject to an announcement that it is not or will not be representative for a Benchmark (including a Benchmark Replacement), then the Purchaser may modify the definition of "interest period" (or any similar or analogous definition) for all Benchmark settings at or after such time to reinstate such previously removed tenor.
- (5) Benchmark Unavailability Period. Upon the District's receipt of notice of the commencement of a Benchmark Unavailability Period, the District may revoke any pending request for a Purchase of Notes to be made during any Benchmark Unavailability Period.

Section 2.06. Fees; Default Rate.

- (a) The District shall pay within thirty (30) days after written demand via electronic invoice provided by the Purchaser to the District:
 - (i) the reasonable out-of-pocket expenses of the Purchaser, including reasonable fees and disbursements of counsel, as described in Section 8.03 herein; and
 - (ii) any reasonable amounts advanced by or on behalf of the Purchaser to the extent required to cure any Default, Event of Default or event of nonperformance hereunder or any Related Documents, together with interest at the Default Rate.
- (b) Any principal of, and to the extent permitted by applicable law, any interest on, the Notes and any other sum payable hereunder, which is not paid within the cure period due shall bear interest, from the date due and payable until paid, payable on demand therefor, at a rate per annum equal to the Default Rate.
- Section 2.07. Optional Termination or Reduction of Commitment. During the Purchase Period, the District may, upon at least three (3) Business Days' notice to the Purchaser, (i) terminate the Commitment at any time, if no Notes are outstanding at such time, or (ii) reduce

the Commitment from time to time by an aggregate amount of \$1,000,000 or any larger integral multiple of \$1,000,000, which amount shall be not greater than the amount of the Commitment; *provided*, that the Commitment may not be reduced to an amount less than the aggregate principal amount of Notes are outstanding at such time.

- Section 2.08. Mandatory Termination or Reduction of Commitment. (a) The Commitment shall terminate on the Termination Date, and any Notes then outstanding (together with accrued interest thereon and all other amounts payable hereunder) shall be due and payable by the District in full on such date.
- (b) If at any time an Event of Default shall have occurred and be continuing, the Purchaser may deliver a written notice to that effect to the District, and the Commitment shall immediately terminate.
- Section 2.09. Optional Prepayments. The District may, upon at least one Business Days' notice to the Purchaser, prepay any Series of Notes, in whole at any time, or from time to time in part in amounts aggregating \$100,000 or any larger integral multiple of \$1,000, by paying the principal amount to be prepaid together with accrued interest thereon to the date of prepayment.
- Section 2.10. General Provisions as to Payments. Subject to Section 4.09 hereof, the District shall make each payment of principal of, and interest on, the Notes any any payment obligations due and owing under Section 8.03 hereof, not later than 3:00 p.m. (Los Angeles time) on the date when due, in federal or other funds immediately available in Los Angeles, to the Purchaser by wire transfer in accordance with wire transfer instructions referred to in Section 8.01 hereof. Whenever any payment of principal of, or interest on, the Notes or of fees shall be due on a day which is not a Business Day, the date for payment thereof shall be extended to the next succeeding Business Day. If the date for any payment of principal is extended by operation of law or otherwise, interest thereon shall be payable for such extended time.
- Section 2.11. Computation of Interest and Fees. Interest and fees shall be calculated on the basis of a 360-day year based upon the actual number of days elapsed.

ARTICLE III

CONDITIONS

- Section 3.01. Effectiveness. This Agreement shall become effective on the date on which each of the following conditions shall have been satisfied:
 - (a) receipt by the Purchaser of a counterpart hereof signed by each of the parties hereto;
 - (b) receipt by the Purchaser of (i) an opinion of General Counsel to the District, addressed to the Purchaser and in a form acceptable to the Purchaser and covering such matters relating to purchase of Notes by the Purchaser contemplated hereby or by the Related Documents as the Purchaser may reasonably request, (ii) an opinion of County

Counsel, addressed to the Purchaser and in a form acceptable to the Purchaser and covering such matters relating to the purchase of Notes by the Purchaser contemplated hereby or by the Related Documents as the Purchaser may reasonably request, and (iii) an opinion of Note Counsel with a reliance letter addressed to the Purchaser and in a form acceptable to the Purchaser and covering such matters relating to the purchase of Notes by the Purchaser contemplated hereby or by the Related Documents as the Purchaser may reasonably request (including, without limitation, as to the validity, enforceability of the Agreement and the other Related Documents);

- (c) (i) receipt by the Purchaser of a certified copy of each instrument which composes the District TRANs Resolution (each as in effect on the Closing Date) and a certificate of a Designated District Representative, dated the Closing Date, certifying that each instrument which composes the District TRANs Resolution is in full force and effect on the Closing Date and that there has been no other amendment or supplement of, or modification to, any provision of any such instrument, except as set forth therein and (ii) receipt by the Purchaser of a certified copy of each instrument which composes the County TRANs Resolution (each as in effect on the Closing Date) and a certificate of a Designated County Representative, dated the Closing Date, certifying that each instrument which composes the County TRANs Resolution is in full force and effect on the Closing Date and that there has been no other amendment or supplement of, or modification to, any provision of any such instrument, except as set forth therein;
- (i) receipt by the Purchaser of a certificate of a duly authorized officer of (d) the District, certifying that (A) all conditions precedent set forth in the District TRANs Resolution with respect to the execution of this Agreement and each other Related Document have been satisfied, (B) except as disclosed to the Purchaser before the date hereof, there has been no material adverse change in the financial condition of the District since June 30, 2023, (C) that there has been no event or circumstance since June 30, 2023, that has, either individually or in the aggregate, a Material Adverse Effect, (D) that the representations and warranties contained in Article IV hereof and the other Related Documents are true and correct in all material respects on the Closing Date, except to the extent such representations and warranties specifically relate to an earlier date (in which case such representations were true and correct in all material respects as of such earlier date), (E) no event has occurred and is continuing, or would result from entry into this Agreement, which would constitute a Default or Event of Default, (F) no petition by or against the District has been filed under the United States Bankruptcy Code or under any similar law, (G) the AAFR for the Fiscal Year ended June 30, 2023, has been prepared in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles consistently applied except as stated in the notes thereto; and (G) other than litigation related to Assem. Bill No. 218 (2019-2020 Reg. Sess.), there are no actions, suits or proceedings pending or threatened against the District (excluding those in relation to the Judgments) in any court or before any arbitrator of any kind or before or by any governmental or non-governmental body which could reasonably be expected to result in a Material Adverse Effect.
 - (ii) receipt by the Purchaser of a certificate of a duly authorized officer of the District, certifying that (A) all conditions precedent set forth in the County

TRANs Resolution with respect to the execution of this Agreement and each other Related Document have been satisfied, (B) that the representations and warranties contained in Article IV hereof and the other Related Documents are true and correct in all material respects on the Closing Date, except to the extent such representations and warranties specifically relate to an earlier date (in which case such representations were true and correct in all material respects as of such earlier date), (C) no event has occurred and is continuing, or would result from entry into this Agreement, which would constitute a Default or Event of Default, and (D) no petition by or against the County has been filed under the United States Bankruptcy Code or under any similar law.

- (e) receipt by the Purchaser of a certificate of a duly authorized officer of each of the District and the County, certifying as to the incumbency and signature of each of the officers of the District and the County authorized to sign this Agreement and the Related Documents to which the District or the County, as applicable, is a party;
- (f) receipt by the Purchaser of all opinions, certificates and other documents it may reasonably request relating to the existence of the District and the County, the authority for and the validity of this Agreement and the Notes then being delivered, and any other matters relevant hereto or thereto, all in form and substance satisfactory to the Purchaser;
- (g) receipt by the Purchaser of: (A) written confirmation that the District's credit ratings on its long-term unenhanced general obligation bonds (without taking into account any third party credit enhancement) have a long-term rating of at least "___" by Moody's, "___" by Fitch, and "___" by S&P; (B) the AAFR for the Fiscal Year ended June 30, 2023; (C) a copy of the Investment Policy of the District as in effect on the Closing Date (or confirmation that the most recent Investment Policy of the District delivered to the Purchaser has not been modified and is still in full force and effect) and (D) certification from a Designated District Representative that the cash flows of the District for Fiscal Year 2024-25 that have been provided to the Purchaser are true and correct; and
- (h) any additional documentation that the Purchaser may request subject to reasonable non-disclosure of non-public information including under an asserted work-product privilege, attorney-client privilege, governmental privilege, or deliberative process privilege.
- Section 3.02. Purchases During the Purchase Period. The obligation of the Purchaser to Purchase Notes on following any Request for Purchase on or prior to the Termination Date is subject to the satisfaction of the following conditions:
 - (a) receipt by the Purchaser of a Request for Purchase as required by Section 2.02 hereof:
 - (b) receipt by the Purchaser of duly executed Note dated on or before the date of Purchase complying with the provisions of Section 2.03 hereof;

- (c) receipt by the Purchaser of an executed Note Pricing Confirmation with respect to the applicable Series of Notes;
- (d) receipt by the Purchaser of a certificate signed by a Designated District Representative with regards to the cash flows of the District for the period from and including the date of Purchase to and including the last day of Fiscal Year 2024-25 and the anticipated Unrestricted Revenues;
- (e) immediately after such Purchase, the aggregate outstanding principal amount of the outstanding Notes will not exceed the amount of the Commitment;
- (f) immediately before and as a result of giving effect to such Purchase, no Default or Event of Default shall have occurred and be continuing;
- (g) the representations and warranties of the District and the County (except to the extent the same expressly relate to an earlier date, then such representation or warranty shall be true and correct, in all material respects, as of such earlier date and except that the representations contained in Section 4.08 of Article IV(A) of this Agreement shall be deemed to refer to the most recent AAFR delivered to the Purchaser pursuant to Section 5.07 of this Agreement) contained in this Agreement shall be true in all material respects on and as of the date of such Purchase, continuation or conversion; and
- (h) the Purchaser shall have provided its prior written consent to the Request for Purchase determined in its reasonable discretion (such consent not to be unreasonably withheld or delayed).

Each Purchase hereunder shall be deemed to be a representation and warranty by the District on the date of such Purchase as to the facts specified in clauses (c), (d), (e) and (f) of this Section.

Section 3.03. No Rating; DTC; Offering Document; CUSIP. The Notes shall not be (i) assigned a specific rating by any Rating Agency, (ii) registered with DTC or any other securities depository, (iii) issued pursuant to any type of official statement, private placement memorandum or other offering document, (iv) placed or offered by a broker-dealer in the capacity of an underwriter or a placement agent or (v) assigned a CUSIP number.

ARTICLE IV(A)

REPRESENTATIONS AND WARRANTIES OF THE DISTRICT

The District makes the following representations and warranties to each Noteholder:

Section 4.01A. Legal Existence. The District is a political subdivision duly created and validly existing under the Constitution and the laws of the State, and has full legal right, power and authority, and at the Closing Date will have full legal right, power and authority (i) to enter into this Agreement and to adopt the District TRANs Resolution, (ii) to deliver the Notes as

provided herein, (iii) to carry out and consummate the transactions contemplated by this Agreement, the District TRANs Resolution, and the Notes, (iv) to pay all amounts due and owing with respect to the Notes including, but not limited to, interest on the Notes at the applicable interest rates set forth in and (v) the District has complied, and will at the Closing Date be in compliance in all respects, with the terms of the Act and the District TRANs Resolution as they pertain to such transactions.

Section 4.02A. Compliance with Law and Contracts. (a) The issuance of the Notes and the execution, delivery and performance by the District of this Agreement and the other Related Documents to which the District is a party in accordance with their respective terms and conditions have been duly authorized by all necessary action on the part of the District, and to the best knowledge of the District, did not, do not and will not, (i) violate any provision of any court order by which the District is bound, (ii) conflict with, violate or contravene any provision of existing law or regulation, of any order or decree of any court, tribunal, Governmental Authority, bureau or agency binding on the District, or (iii) conflict with, violate or cause a default, or with the passage of time or the giving of notice or both would cause a default, under any provision of any bond, note or other evidence of indebtedness or mortgage, indenture, contract or other agreement to which the District is a party or that is binding upon it or any of its properties or assets.

- (b) No consent of any Person and no license, approval or authorization of or notice to or registration, filing or declaration with, any Governmental Authority, bureau or agency is required in connection with the execution, delivery or performance by the District, or validity or enforceability against the District of this Agreement or any of the other Related Documents, or for the District to execute and deliver the Notes including in accordance with this Agreement or any of the other Related Documents or, if required, the same has been obtained and is in full force and effect.
- (c) All authorizations, approvals, licenses, permits, consents and orders of any State Governmental Authority, legislative body, board, agency or commission having jurisdiction of the matters which are required for the due authorization of, which would constitute a condition precedent to, or the absence of which would materially adversely affect the due performance by the District of its obligations under this Agreement, the District TRANs Resolution, and the Notes have been duly obtained, except for such approvals, consents and orders as are yet to be obtained or as may be required under the Blue Sky or securities laws of any state in connection with the offering and sale of the Notes.

Section 4.03A. Authorization and Validity. By all necessary official action of the District prior to or concurrently with the Closing Date, the District has duly adopted the District TRANs Resolution, has duly authorized and approved the execution and delivery of, and the performance by the District of the obligations on its part contained in, this Agreement, the Related Documents, and the Notes, and the consummation by it of all other transactions contemplated by the District TRANs Resolution, this Agreement, the Related Documents, and the Notes; the District TRANs Resolution, this Agreement, the Related Documents and the Notes, assuming due authorization, execution and delivery by the other parties thereto, constitute, or will constitute at the Closing Date, as appropriate, legal, valid and binding obligations of the District, enforceable in accordance with their respective terms, subject to bankruptcy, insolvency, reorganization, moratorium and

other similar laws relating to or affecting the enforcement of creditors' rights and the application of general principles of equity if equitable remedies are sought.

Litigation. Except as otherwise disclosed to the Purchaser in writing prior to the Closing Date, to the best knowledge of the District, after due inquiry, there is no action, suit, proceeding, inquiry or investigation, at law or in equity, before or by any court, government agency, public board or body, pending in which service of process has been completed, or threatened against the District, affecting the existence of the District or the titles of any officers executing this Agreement or any other Related Document to which the District is a party, or affecting or seeking to prohibit, restrain or enjoin execution and delivery of this Agreement, the Related Documents and the Notes, and the consummation by it of all other transactions contemplated by the District TRANs Resolution, this Agreement, the Related Documents and the Notes or the appropriation of general funds of the District as obligations of the District imposed by law pursuant to the District TRANs Resolution, or in any way contesting or affecting the validity or enforceability of this Agreement, the Related Documents, and the Notes, or contesting the powers of the District or any authority for the issuance of the Notes, the adoption of the District TRANs Resolution or the execution and delivery of this Agreement, the Related Documents, and the Notes, nor is there any known basis therefor, wherein an unfavorable decision, ruling or finding would materially adversely affect the validity or enforceability of this Agreement, the Related Documents and the Notes or the District's ability to carry out the transactions contemplated hereby or thereby applicable to the ability of the District to pay the Notes.

Section 4.05A. Related Documents. The representations and warranties of the District in all of the Related Documents are true and correct in all material respects as of the date made, except to the extent such representations and warranties relate to an earlier date (in which case such representations and warranties shall be true and correct in all material respects as of such earlier date).

Section 4.06A. Accuracy and Completeness of Information. All certificates, reports, financial statements, documents and other written information furnished to the Purchaser by the District on or prior to the Closing Date in connection with the transactions contemplated hereby were, at the time the same were so furnished, taken as a whole, complete and correct in all material respects and did not contain any untrue statement of a material fact or omit to state a material fact necessary in order to make the statements contained therein not misleading in light of the circumstances in which the same were made.

Section 4.07A. Legislation. To the best knowledge of the District, no legislation has been enacted which materially adversely affects or which prohibited or prohibits, as applicable, (i) the issuance or delivery of the Notes, (ii) the adoption of the District TRANs Resolution, (iii) the execution and delivery of this Agreement or any of the other Related Documents to which the District is a party, (iv) the creation, organization or existence of the District or the titles to office of any officers executing this Agreement or any other Related Document to which the District is a party, or (v) the power of the District to carry out its obligations under this Agreement or any of such other Related Documents.

Section 4.08A. Accuracy of Financial Reports. The most recent financial reports of the District as of June 30, 2023, copies of which have been furnished to the Purchaser, fairly present in all material respects the financial position and results of operations of the District, as of the dates and for the periods set forth therein and have been prepared in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles consistently applied except as previously disclosed to the Purchaser in writing. Since June 30, 2023, there has been no material adverse change in the financial condition or operations of the District that could reasonably be expected to result in a Material Adverse Effect.

Section 4.09A. Source of Payment of Obligations. (a) As security for the payment of the Notes and the interest thereon and all other payment obligations under Section 8.03 hereof, the District hereby represents that it has, pursuant to the District TRANs Resolution, pledged and granted a lien on and security interest in the first Unrestricted Revenues to be received by the District during fiscal year 2024-2025 of the District.

- (b) As provided in Section 53856 of the California Government Code, the District hereby represents that the Notes and the interest thereon, shall be a first lien and charge against, and shall be payable from the first moneys received by the District from, the Pledged Revenues.
- (c) As provided in Section 53857 of the California Government Code, notwithstanding the provisions of Section 53856 of the California Government Code and of subsection (b) of this Section, the District hereby represents that the Notes shall be general obligations of the District and, to the extent not paid from the Pledged Revenues, shall be paid with interest thereon from any other Unrestricted Revenues.
- (d) The obligations of the District under the Notes (including, without limitation, the obligation to pay all amounts due and owing with respect to the Notes and to pay all interest thereon at the applicable interest rate set forth in this Agreement and the Notes) when due are obligations of the District imposed by law and are absolute and unconditional, without any right of set-off or counterclaim. The Notes (including, without limitation, the obligation to pay all amounts due and owing with respect to the Notes, the and to pay all interest thereon at the applicable interest rate set forth in this Agreement and the Notes) do not constitute an obligation of the District for which the District is obligated to levy or pledge any form of taxation or for which the District has levied or pledged any form of taxation, and none of the Notes (including, without limitation, the obligation to pay all amounts due and owing with respect to the Notes and to pay all interest thereon at the applicable interest rate set forth in this Agreement and the Notes) constitutes an indebtedness of the District or the State of California, or any of its political subdivisions, in contravention of any constitutional or statutory debt limitation or restriction.

Section 4.10A. No Default or Event of Default. No Default or Event of Default has occurred and is continuing, and, to the best knowledge of the District after due inquiry, the District is not in material breach of or default under any loan agreement, indenture, bond or note, or other instrument evidencing any indebtedness or other material financial obligation of the District to which the District is a party, and no event has occurred and is continuing which constitutes or with the passage of time or the giving of notice, or both, would constitute a material default or event of default by the District under any such instrument; and the execution and delivery of this

Agreement, the Related Documents, the Notes and the adoption of the District TRANs Resolution and compliance with the provisions on the District's part contained therein, will not in any material respect conflict with or constitute a breach or default under any State constitutional provision, administrative regulation, judgment, decree, loan agreement, indenture, bond, note, ordinance, resolution, agreement or other instrument to which the District is a party, nor will any such execution, delivery, adoption or compliance result in the creation or imposition of any lien, charge or other security interest or encumbrance of any nature whatsoever upon any of the property or assets of the District or under the terms of any such law, regulation or instrument, except as provided by this Agreement, the Related Documents, the Notes and the adoption of the District TRANs Resolution and compliance with the provisions on the District's part contained therein.

- Section 4.11A. No Qualified or Negative Budget Certification. The District hereby represents that it has not received a qualified or negative budget certification in Fiscal Year 2023-2024 or Fiscal Year 2024-2025.
- Section 4.12A. Sanctions Concerns. (a) The District is not and, to the knowledge of the District, no officer, director or agent acting on behalf of the District with respect to the obligations hereunder, this Agreement or any of the other Related Documents is a Sanctioned Target.
- (b) (i) The District and, to the knowledge of the District, each officer, director and agent acting on behalf of the District with respect to the obligations hereunder, this Agreement or any of the other Related Documents are in compliance in all material respects with Anti-Money Laundering Laws, Anti-Corruption Laws and applicable Sanctions; and (ii) the District is not and, to the District's knowledge, no officer, director or agent acting on behalf of the District with respect to the obligations hereunder, this Agreement or any of the other Related Documents is, in each case, under investigation for an alleged violation of any Sanctions, Anti-Money Laundering Laws or Anti-Corruption Laws by a governmental authority that enforces such laws.
- Section 4.13A. No Sovereign Immunity. The District does not enjoy any rights of immunity on the grounds of sovereignty or other similar grounds (including, without limitation, governmental immunity) with respect to its obligations hereunder or under any other Related Document to which it is a party or by which it is bound.
- Section 4.14A. Regulations U and X. The District is not engaged in the business of extending credit for the purpose of purchasing or carrying margin stock (within the meaning of Regulation U or X issued by the Board of Governors of the Federal Reserve System); and no proceeds of the Notes will be used to extend credit to others for the purpose of purchasing or carrying any margin stock, or for any other purpose that would violate Regulation U or X issued by the Board of Governors of the Federal Reserve System.
- Section 4.15A. Usury. The terms of this Agreement and the Related Documents regarding calculation and payment of interest and fees do not violate any applicable usury laws.
- Section 4.16A. ERISA. The District does not maintain or contribute to, and has not maintained or contributed to, any Plan that is subject to Title IV of ERISA.

Section 4.17A. Estimated Amounts. The District has determined that the Commitment, when added to the interest payable thereon calculated at the Maximum Interest Rate until the Maturity Date, does not exceed 85% of the estimated amount of the Unrestricted Revenues which will be available for the payment of the principal of and interest on the Notes and any additional tax and revenue anticipation notes issued by the District in Fiscal Year 2024-25.

Section 4.18A. Debt Management Policy. The District hereby certifies that the Debt Management Policy of the District complies with Government Code Section 8855(i), and that the Notes authorized to be issued pursuant to the District TRANs Resolution are consistent with such policy, and the District has instructed Note Counsel, on behalf of the District, with respect to each series of Notes issued pursuant to the Resolution, (a) to cause notices of the proposed sale and final sale of the Notes to be filed in a timely manner with the California Debt and Investment Advisory Commission pursuant to California Government Code Section 8855, and (b) to check, on behalf of the District, the "Yes" box relating to such certifications in each notice of proposed sale filed pursuant to California Government Code Section 8855.

ARTICLE IV(B)

REPRESENTATIONS AND WARRANTIES OF THE COUNTY

The County makes the following representations and warranties to each Noteholder:

Section 4.01B. Legal Existence. The County is a political subdivision of the State validly existing under the Constitution and laws of the State, with the right and power to (i) execute, deliver and perform its obligations under this Agreement and the County TRANs Resolution and (ii) execute and deliver the Notes.

Section 4.02B. Compliance with Law and Contracts. (a) The County has duly adopted the County TRANs Resolution in accordance with the laws of the State of California; the County TRANs Resolution is in full force and effect and has not been amended, modified or rescinded, and all representations of the County set forth in the County TRANs Resolution are true and correct on the date hereof; the County has duly authorized and approved the execution and delivery of, and the observance and performance by the County of its covenants and agreements contained in the Notes and this Agreement required to have been observed or performed at or prior to the date of Closing; and the County has complied, and will at the Closing be in compliance in all respects, with the obligations in connection with the issuance of the Notes on its part contained in this Agreement, the County TRANs Resolution, and the Notes.

(b) No consent, approval, authorization, order, filing, registration, qualification, election or referendum, of or by any court or governmental agency or public body whatsoever is required in connection with the issuance, delivery or sale of the Notes or the consummation of the other transactions effected or contemplated herein or hereby, except for such actions as have been taken or as may be necessary to be taken to qualify the Notes for offer and sale under the Blue Sky or other securities laws and regulations of such states and jurisdictions of the United States of America as the Purchaser may reasonably request.

(c) All authorizations, consents or approvals of, or filings or registrations, if any, with, any governmental authority or court necessary for the valid execution and delivery by the County of the Notes will have been duly obtained or made prior to the execution and delivery of the Notes (and disclosed to the Purchaser); provided, however, that no representation is made by the County as to compliance with federal or state Blue Sky or similar securities laws of any state in connection with the offering, sale or issuance of the Notes. As used herein, the term "governmental authority" refers to any legislative body or governmental official, department, commission, board, bureau, agency, instrumentality, body or public benefit corporation

Section 4.03B. Authorization and Validity. (a) At or prior to the Closing, the County will have taken all action required to be taken by it to authorize the execution and delivery of the Notes; (b) the County has full legal right, power and authority to enter into this Agreement, to adopt the County TRANs Resolution, to execute and deliver the Notes to the Purchaser on behalf of the District and to perform its obligations under each such document or instrument (collectively, the "County Documents") and to effectuate transactions contemplated by the County Documents; (c) the execution and delivery or adoption of, and the performance by the County of its obligations contained in the Notes, the County TRANs Resolution and this Agreement have been duly authorized and such authorization shall be in full force and effect at the time of the Closing; and (d) this Agreement constitutes a valid and legally binding obligation of the County, enforceable against the County in accordance with its terms

Section 4.04B. Litigation. Except as otherwise disclosed to the Purchaser in writing prior to the Closing Date, as of the time of acceptance hereof, no action, suit, proceeding or investigation is pending or threatened against the County in any court or before any governmental authority seeking to restrain or enjoin the execution or delivery of any of the Notes or in any way contesting or affecting the validity of the County TRANs Resolution, the Notes, this Agreement, or the receipt or application of the revenues pledged to pay the Notes or the payment of principal of and interest on the Notes, or contesting the powers of the County to execute and deliver the Notes or this Agreement or to adopt the County TRANs Resolution.

Section 4.05B. Related Documents. The representations and warranties of the County in the County TRANs Resolution are true and correct in all material respects as of the date made, except to the extent such representations and warranties relate to an earlier date (in which case such representations and warranties shall be true and correct in all material respects as of such earlier date). Any certificates signed by any officer of the County and delivered to the Purchaser shall be deemed a representation and warranty by the County to the Purchaser, but not by the person signing the same in such person's individual capacity, as to the statements made therein.

Section 4.06B. Legislation. To the best knowledge of the County, no legislation has been enacted which materially adversely affects or which prohibited or prohibits, as applicable, (i) the issuance or delivery of the Notes, (ii) the adoption of the County TRANs Resolution, (iii) the execution and delivery of this Agreement or any of the other Related Documents to which the County is a party, (iv) the creation, organization or existence of the County or the titles to office of any officers executing this Agreement, the County TRANs Resolution or the Notes, or (v) the power of the County to carry out its obligations under this Agreement, the County TRANs Resolution and the Notes.

Section 4.07B. No Default or Event of Default. No Default or Event of Default has occurred and is continuing, and the execution and delivery of the Notes, the execution, delivery and performance of this Agreement, the performance of the County's obligations under the County TRANs Resolution and compliance with the provisions hereof and thereof by the County, as appropriate, do not and will not, in any material respect, conflict with or constitute on the part of the County a breach of, or a default under, the Constitution of the State, any existing law, charter, ordinance, regulation, court decree or order, resolution or any agreement, indenture, mortgage, lease or other instrument, to which the County is subject or by which it is bound.

Section 4.08B. Sanctions Concerns. (a) The County is not and, to the knowledge of the County, no officer, director or agent acting on behalf of the County with respect to the obligations under this Agreement or the County TRANs Resolution is a Sanctioned Target.

(b) (i) The County and, to the knowledge of the County, each officer, director and agent acting on behalf of the County with respect to the obligations under this Agreement or the County TRANs Resolution are in compliance in all material respects with Anti-Money Laundering Laws, Anti-Corruption Laws and applicable Sanctions; and (ii) the County is not and, to the County's knowledge, no officer, director or agent acting on behalf of the County with respect to the obligations under this Agreement or the County TRANs Resolution is, in each case, under investigation for an alleged violation of any Sanctions, Anti-Money Laundering Laws or Anti-Corruption Laws by a governmental authority that enforces such laws.

Section 4.09B. No Sovereign Immunity. The County does not enjoy any rights of immunity on the grounds of sovereignty or other similar grounds (including, without limitation, governmental immunity) with respect to its obligations hereunder or under the County TRANs Resolution.

ARTICLE V

COVENANTS

The District covenants and agrees, so long as the Purchaser has any Commitment hereunder and until the full and final payment and satisfaction of all of the Notes and all payment obligations due and owing under Section 8.03 hereof, except in any instance in which the Purchaser specially agrees in writing to any non-performance or noncompliance, that:

Section 5.01. Punctual Payment and Performance. The District shall punctually pay the interest on and principal of the Notes and all payment obligations due and owing under Section 8.03 hereof in conformity with the terms hereof and of the Notes and all payment obligations due and owing under Section 8.03 hereof, and shall faithfully observe and perform all the agreements and covenants required to be observed or performed by the District contained herein and in the Notes and all payment obligations due and owing under Section 8.03 hereof.

Section 5.02. Power to Issue the Notes. The County is duly authorized to execute and deliver the Notes on behalf of the District. The District is duly authorized to execute and deliver this Agreement. The Notes and the provisions of this Agreement are and will be the legal, valid

and binding obligations of the District and the County, as applicable, in accordance with their terms. It is intended that the proceeds of the Notes shall be applied to refund Judgments and such Judgments will constitute obligations imposed by law.

- Section 5.03. Prosecution and Defense of Suits. The District shall defend against every suit, action or proceeding at any time brought against the District or the County, as applicable, upon any claim to the extent involving the failure of the District or the County, as applicable, to fulfill its obligations hereunder and under the Notes; provided, however, that the Purchaser, or any Owner of the Notes at its election may appear in and defend any such suit, action or proceeding.
- Section 5.04. District Budgets. The District shall in each Fiscal Year to the best of its efforts include in its budget including by budget amendments amounts sufficient to pay the principal of and interest on the Notes coming due in such Fiscal Year.

Section 5.05. Reserved.

- Section 5.06. Accuracy of Information. All certificates, reports, financial statements, documents and other written information furnished by the District to the Purchaser, pursuant to this Agreement, or in connection with or pursuant to any amendment or modification of, or waiver under, this Agreement, shall, at the time the same shall be so furnished taken as a whole, (i) be complete and correct in all material respects, and (ii) not contain any untrue statements of a material fact or omit to state a material fact necessary in order to make the statements contained therein not misleading in light of the circumstances in which the same were made, and the furnishing of the same to the Purchaser shall constitute a representation and warranty by the District to that effect.
- Section 5.07. Financial and Other Reports. As soon as publicly available and in any event within 270 days after the end of each Fiscal Year, the District shall furnish the complete AAFR of the District, certified as to the fairness of presentation and conformity with general accepted accounting principles by a recognized firm of independent certified public accountants; provided that the requirement to provide any such copy to the Purchaser shall be satisfied if such copy is publicly available on EMMA.
- Section 5.08. Compliance Certificate and Additional Information. (a) With each Request for Purchase, the District shall furnish a Compliance Certificate of a Designated District Representative in the form attached hereto as Exhibit B stating whether, to such representative's knowledge, there exists on the date of such certificate any Default or Event of Default and, if any Default or Event of Default is then known to exist, setting forth the details thereof and the action which the District is taking or proposes to take with respect thereto;
- (b) As soon as available, and in any event within 90 days following approval thereof, the final, adopted budget of the District;
- (c) (A) Promptly upon obtaining knowledge of any Default or Event of Default, or notice thereof, and in any event within ten (10) Business Days thereafter, a certificate signed by a Designated District Representative specifying in reasonable detail the nature and period of

existence thereof and what action the District has taken or proposes to take with respect thereto; and (B) promptly following a written request of the Purchaser, a certificate of a Designated District Representative as to the existence or absence, as the case may be, of a Default or an Event of Default under this Agreement;

- (d) As promptly as practicable, written notice to the Purchaser of all actions, suits or proceedings pending or threatened against the District (other than litigation related to Assem. Bill No. 218 (2019-2020 Reg. Sess.)) in court or before any arbitrator of any kind or before any governmental authority which could reasonably be expected to result in a Material Adverse Effect;
- (e) Within five (5) Business Days of any request by the Purchaser, the District shall provide the Purchaser with its updated cash flows for Fiscal Year 2024-2025; and
- (f) From time to time such additional information regarding the financial condition of the District as the Purchaser may reasonably request, subject to non-disclosure of non-public information including under an asserted work-product privilege, attorney-client privilege, governmental privilege, or deliberative process privilege.
- Section 5.09. Events of Default. Promptly upon obtaining knowledge thereof, the District and the County will notify the Purchaser of the occurrence of any Event of Default, specifying the details of such Event of Default and the action that the District proposes to take with respect thereto.
- Section 5.10. Books, Records. At the Purchaser's expense (unless and until a Default or Event of Default has occurred at which time such expenses shall be borne by the District), the District will permit, during normal business hours and from time to time, upon reasonable prior notice, the Purchaser or any of its agents or representatives to examine and make copies of and abstracts from the records and books of account of the District (except records and books of accounts the examination of which by the Purchaser is prohibited by law or contractual obligation), and to discuss the affairs, finances and accounts of the District with any appropriate representative of the District or the District's independent public accountants; provided that unless an Event of Default has occurred and is continuing, no more than two such examinations may be made by the Purchaser per fiscal year of the District.
- Section 5.11. Other Obligations. The District will comply with and observe all obligations and requirements set forth in the District TRANs Resolution and all statutes and regulations binding upon it in which noncompliance or nonobservance could reasonably be expected to have a Material Adverse Effect.
- Section 5.12. Responsibilities under Related Documents. The District shall take all actions as may be reasonably requested by the Purchaser to enforce the obligations under the Related Documents of each of the other parties thereto.
- Section 5.13. Book Entry Eligibility. The District covenants that at all times from and including the Closing Date until and including the payment in full of the Notes (so long as this Agreement is effective and/or the Purchaser or any of its Affiliates own all or any portion of the

- Notes), the District shall not cause the Notes to be registered with DTC's book-entry delivery services without the Purchaser's prior written consent.
- Section 5.14. Further Assurances. The District shall, upon the request of the Purchaser, from time to time, execute and deliver and, if necessary, file, register and record such further amendments, confirmation statements and other documents and instruments and take such further action as may be reasonably necessary to effectuate the provisions of this Agreement and the other Related Documents.
- Section 5.15. Maintenance of Insurance. The District shall maintain insurance with responsible and reputable insurance companies or associations in such amounts and covering such risks as is required by law or is deemed by the District to be prudent.
- Section 5.16. Bond Ratings. (a) The District shall at all times maintain a rating on its long-term unenhanced general obligation bonds from at least one Rating Agency.
- (b) For avoidance of doubt, the District shall not maintain any ratings associated with this Agreement.
- Section 5.17. Amendments to Related Documents. Without the prior written consent of the Purchaser, neither the District nor the County will agree or consent to any amendment, supplement, waiver or modification of any provision of any Related Document that affects the rights, interests, security or remedies of the Purchaser hereunder; provided that the District may (i) provide for the issuance of one or more Series of Notes to be issued to the Purchaser and (ii) otherwise amend or supplement any Related Document in accordance with its terms so long as such amendment or supplement could not reasonably be expected to materially affect the rights, interests, security or remedies of the Purchaser or the District's obligations under the Notes or under Section 8.03 hereof.
- Section 5.18. Fiscal Year. The District shall not adopt any change in its Fiscal Year without giving prior written notice of such change to the Purchaser.
- Section 5.19. Sanctions; Anti-Money Laundering Laws and Anti-Corruption Laws. The District and the County shall comply in all material respects with, and cause each officer, director and agent acting on behalf of the District and the County, as applicable, with respect to the obligations under this Agreement or any of the other Related Documents to comply in all material respects with, all applicable Sanctions, Anti-Money Laundering Laws and Anti-Corruption Laws, and shall ensure any of the proceeds of any credit extended hereunder are not used in contravention thereof.
- Section 5.20. Use of Proceeds. (a) The District shall use the proceeds of the Notes solely as set forth herein and under the District TRANs Resolution.
- (b) The District shall not use any portion of the proceeds of the Notes for the purpose of carrying or purchasing any Margin Stock and shall not incur any Debt which is to be reduced, retired or purchased by the District out of such proceeds.

- Section 5.21. Compliance with Laws. The District will comply with all laws, statutes and regulations binding upon it, including Sanctions, Anti-Money Laundering Laws, and Anti-Corruption Laws, noncompliance with which would materially adversely affect the District's ability to perform its respective obligations under the Notes, this Agreement or any of the other Related Documents.
- Section 5.22. References to the Purchaser. Except as may be required by law (including federal and state securities laws), the District will not include any information concerning the Purchaser (other than identifying the Purchaser as a party to its contracts with the District) that is not supplied in writing, or otherwise consented to, by the Purchaser expressly for inclusion therein, in any written or published materials (other than the District's staff reports, annual statements, audited financial statements and rating agency presentations) without the prior written consent of the Purchaser; provided that, without the prior written consent of the Purchaser, the District may identify the Purchaser as a party to this Agreement, the Commitment, the Commitment End Date and the Maturity Date, in other disclosure documents of the District, so long as no other information relating to the Agreement, or the Purchaser is disclosed in such offering documents without the prior written consent of the Purchaser.
- Section 5.23. Existence, Etc. The District and the County agree that it will maintain its existence as a political subdivision under its charter and the laws of the State.
- Section 5.24. Disclosure to Participants, Purchaser Transferees and Non-Purchaser Transferees. The District shall permit the Purchaser to disclose the financial information received by it pursuant to this Agreement to each Participant and Non-Purchaser Transferee pursuant to Section 8.05 of this Agreement, subject to confidentiality restrictions and use restrictions customary for financial institutions.
- Section 5.25. Other Agreements. In the event that the District has or shall enter into or otherwise consent to any credit agreement, liquidity agreement, standby bond purchase agreement, reimbursement agreement, direct purchase agreement (such as a continuing covenant agreement or supplemental bondholder's agreement), bond purchase agreement or other agreement or instrument (or any amendment, supplement or other modification thereof) under which, directly or indirectly, any Person or Persons undertake(s) to make loans to the District in connection with the Judgments, or to make or provide funds to make payment of, or to purchase or provide credit or liquidity enhancement for or with respect to any Debt relating to the Judgments (each a "Bank Agreement"), the District shall provide notice to the Purchaser.
- Section 5.26. Security; Set Asides. (a) In furtherance of the security provisions specified in the Resolutions and the Notes, as security for the payment of the principal of and interest on the Notes, as required by the Purchaser (in its sole and absolute discretion) and as set forth in each Request for Purchase, the District covenants to deposit (and maintain) in trust for the registered owners of the Notes in a special account designated as the "[_____] School District 2024-2025 Tax and Revenue Anticipation Note Repayment Account" (the "Repayment Account"):
- (i) on April 30, 2025, immediately available monies in an amount equal to the sum of (A) fifty percent (50%) of the outstanding principal amount of all Series of Notes that may be issued

under the Commitment (i.e., \$125,000,000) plus (B) the sum of (1) the actual amount of interest accrued on the outstanding Notes through and including April 15, 2025, and (2) fifty percent (50%) of the amount of interest that could accrue from and including April 16, 2025, to and including the Maturity Date based upon the maximum amount of the Notes that may be issued under the Commitment calculated at the Maximum Interest Rate; and

(ii) on May 31, 2025, immediately available monies in an amount equal to the sum of (A) one hundred percent (100%) of the outstanding principal amount of all Series of Notes that may be issued under the Commitment (i.e., \$250,000,000) plus (B) the sum of (1) the actual amount of interest accrued on the outstanding Notes through and including May 15, 2025, and (2) one hundred percent (100%) of the interest that could accrue from and including May 16, 2025, to and including the Maturity Date based upon maximum amount of the Notes that may be issued under the Commitment calculated at the Maximum Interest Rate,

in each case, from the first Unrestricted Revenues to be received by the District during each such period set forth in each Request for Purchase and the related Note Purchase Confirmation and ending on the Maturity Date.

In the event that there have been insufficient Unrestricted Revenues received by the District by the end of any such period, then the amount of any deficiency in the Repayment Account shall be satisfied and made up from the first Unrestricted Revenues thereafter received by the District. As provided in Section 53856 of the California Government Code, the Notes and the interest thereon shall be a first lien and charge against, and shall be payable from the first moneys received by the District from, the Pledged Revenues. As provided in Section 53857 of the California Government Code, notwithstanding the provisions of Section 53856 of the California Government Code and the foregoing, the Notes shall be general obligations of the District and, to the extent not paid from the Pledged Revenues, shall be paid with interest thereon from any other Unrestricted Revenues. As security for the payment of the Notes and the interest thereon, the District has covenanted in the District TRANs Resolution to deposit or cause to be deposited in the Repayment Account, in trust for the registered owners of the Notes, no later than the end of each period as specified above, the amount of Unrestricted Revenues specified above. In the event that there have been insufficient Unrestricted Revenues received by the District by the end of any such period, then the amount of any deficiency in the Repayment Account shall be satisfied and made up from the first Unrestricted Revenues thereafter received by the District. In the District TRANs Resolution, as security for the payment of the Notes and the interest thereon, the District has pledged and granted a lien on and a security interest the amounts on deposit in the Repayment Account, and said amounts shall not be used for any other purpose until the Notes and the interest thereon have been paid in full or such payment has been duly provided for.

Section 5.27. Additional Notes. The District shall not issue any tax and revenue anticipation notes in Fiscal Year 2024-2025 that have set asides payable or required to be deposited by the District prior to May 31, 2025, to any Person other than to the Purchaser unless reasonably agreed to by the Purchaser.

Section 5.28. County TRANs Resolution Related Covenants. The County has complied and will comply in all respects with the obligations of the County in connection with the issuance of the Notes and the Repayment Account contained in the County Resolution and the Notes.

ARTICLE VI

EVENTS OF DEFAULT

- Section 6.01. Events of Default. If one or more of the following events shall have occurred and be continuing, each shall each constitute an Event of Default hereunder:
 - (a) (i) the District shall fail to pay principal of or interest on any Note when due, or (ii) the District shall fail to pay any other payment obligation under Section 8.03 hereof and such failure shall continue for three (3) Business Days; or
 - (b) any written representation, warranty, certification or statement made by the District in this Agreement or in any other Related Document or in any certificate, financial statement or other document delivered pursuant to this Agreement or any other Related Document shall (in any such case) have been incorrect or untrue in any material respect when made or deemed to have been made; or
 - (c) (i) the District shall default in the due performance or observance of any of the covenants set forth in Section 5.01, Section 5.06, Section 5.15, Section 5.16, Section 5.17, Section 5.20, Section 5.23, Section 5.26 or Section 5.27 hereof; or (ii) the County shall default in the due performance or observance of the covenant set forth in Section 5.28 hereof; or
 - (d) the District or the County shall default in the due performance or observance of any other term, covenant or agreement contained in this Agreement and such default shall remain unremedied for a period of sixty (60) days after the earlier of (i) the date on which such default shall first become known to any representative of the District or the County, as applicable, and (ii) notice of such occurrence is given by the Purchaser to the District or the County, as applicable; *provided* that so long as the District shall be proceeding with due diligence to remedy any default in the due performance or observance of such covenants which, if begun and prosecuted with due diligence, cannot be completed within a period of sixty (60) days, but can be cured, then such sixty (60) day period shall be extended to the extent as shall be necessary to enable the District or the County, as applicable, to begin and complete the remedying of such default through the exercise of due diligence but shall not exceed ninety (90) days from the earlier to occur of (i) the date on which such default shall first become known to any representative of the District or the County, as applicable, and (ii) written notice thereof is given by the Purchaser to the District or the County, as applicable; or
 - (e) (i) the District or the County shall commence a voluntary case or other proceeding, and in connection with such case or other proceeding, seek liquidation, reorganization, debt arrangement, dissolution or other relief with respect to itself or its

debts under any bankruptcy, insolvency or other similar law now or hereafter in effect or seeking the appointment of a trustee, receiver, liquidator, custodian or other similar official of its or any substantial part of its property, or shall consent to any such relief or to the appointment of or taking possession by any such official in an involuntary case or other proceeding commenced against it, or shall make a general assignment for the benefit of creditors, or shall fail generally to pay its debts as they become due, or shall declare a moratorium, debt restructuring, debt adjustment or comparable extraordinary restriction, or become insolvent within the meaning of Section 101(32) of the Bankruptcy Code (or any successor provision), or shall take any action to authorize any of the foregoing; or (ii) declaration of moratorium, debt restructuring, debt adjustment or comparable extraordinary restriction by a Governmental Authority of competent jurisdiction; or

- (i) a case or other proceeding shall be commenced against the District or the County and in connection with such case or other proceeding, a party shall seek liquidation, reorganization, debt arrangement, dissolution or other relief with respect to it or its debts under any bankruptcy, insolvency or other similar law now or hereafter in effect or seeking the appointment of a trustee, receiver, liquidator, custodian or other similar official of it or any substantial part of its property, and such involuntary case shall either (A) be consented to or acquiesced in by the District or the County, as applicable, or (B) remain undismissed and unstayed for a period of sixty (60) days; (ii) all, or substantially all of the property of the District or the County shall be condemned, seized, or otherwise appropriated; or (iii) a custodian, receiver, trustee, examiner, liquidator or similar official shall be appointed for the District or the County or an order for relief shall be entered against the District or the County under the federal bankruptcy laws as now or hereafter in effect, or any writ, judgment, warrant of attachment, execution or similar process shall be issued or levied against a substantial part of the property, assets or business of the District or the County, and such proceedings or petition shall not be dismissed, or such writ, judgment, warrant of attachment, execution or similar process shall not be stayed, released, appealed, vacated or fully bonded, within the time permitted by law after commencement, filing or levy, as the case may be; or
- (g) (i) any material provision of this Agreement or any other Related Document relating to the District or the County, shall at any time for any reason cease to be valid and binding on the District or the County as a result of any legislative or administrative action by a Governmental Authority with competent jurisdiction or shall be declared in a final non-appealable judgment by any court with competent jurisdiction to be null and void, invalid, or unenforceable, or the validity or enforceability thereof shall be publicly contested by the District or the County; or (ii) the District or the County shall have taken or permitted to be taken any official action which would adversely affect the enforceability of this Agreement or any Related Document relating to the payment of the principal of or interest on the Note or the payment obligations under Section 8.03 hereof, or the security therefor or the District otherwise repudiates its obligation to pay the Notes or the other payment obligations under Section 8.03 hereof, or (iii) or the occurrence of a repeal, reenactment, amendment, modification or enactment of legislation, if such repeal, reenactment, amendment, modification or enactment, could reasonably be expected to have

a material adverse effect on the ability of the District to pay the Notes or the payment obligations under Section 8.03 hereof;

- (h) dissolution or termination of the existence of the District or the County; or
- the District shall (i) fail to make any payment on any Material District Debt (i) (other than a Note purchased pursuant to this Agreement) or any interest or premium thereon when due (whether by scheduled maturity, required prepayment, acceleration, demand, or otherwise) and such failure shall continue after the applicable grace period, if any, specified in the agreement or instrument relating to such Material District Debt; or (ii) failure to perform or observe any term, covenant, or condition on its part to be performed or observed under any agreement or instrument relating to any Material District Debt when required to be performed or observed, and such failure shall not be waived and shall continue after the applicable grace period (without regard to any subsequent amendment, waiver or forbearance with respect thereto unless the District certifies such amendment, waiver or forbearance was obtained without conditions or the Purchaser also benefits from such condition, in its reasonable discretion), if any, specified in such agreement or instrument, and such failure permits or results in the acceleration of such Material District Debt; or (iii) any Material District Debt shall be declared to be due and payable or be required to be prepaid (other than by a regularly scheduled required prepayment or an optional prepayment), prior to the standard maturity thereof; provided, however, that in the case of clause (i), (ii) or (iii) any failure shall not be considered an Event of Default hereunder if the same is being contested in good faith and by appropriate proceedings and such contest shall operate to stay the acceleration of the maturity of such Material District Debt; provided, further, that notice shall be given promptly by the Purchaser (and in any event within three (3) Business Days after the Purchaser shall have actual knowledge thereof) to the District of the occurrence of any failure permitting the acceleration of Material District Debt as provided in clause (ii) above but the Purchaser's failure to provide such notice to the bond trustee shall not prevent such failure permitting the acceleration of Material District Debt as provided in clause (ii) above from constituting an Event of Default hereunder; or
- (j) (i) the District shall default in the due performance or observance of any material term, covenant or agreement contained in any of the Related Documents and the same shall not have been cured within any applicable cure period; *provided* that the District had received the requisite notice of such default, if applicable; or (ii) any "Event of Default" as defined in any of the Other Bank Agreements shall have occurred; or
- (k) a legislative or regulatory body with competent jurisdiction shall declare a financial emergency with respect to the District and shall appoint or designate with respect to the District, an entity such as an organization, board, commission, authority, agency or body to manage the affairs and operations of the District; or
- (l) any Rating Agency shall have downgraded the rating on any unenhanced general obligation bond of the District to below "Baa3" (or its equivalent) by Moody's, "BBB-" (or its equivalent) by S&P, or "BBB-" (or its equivalent) by Fitch or any of

Moody's, S&P, or Fitch shall have withdrawn or suspended its rating on any lease revenue bonds of the District, but not as a result of debt maturity, defeasance, non-application for a rating, non-provision of information or a downgrade of a third party credit enhancer and excluding any withdrawal or suspension of any such rating if S&P, Fitch, or Moody's, as applicable, stipulates in writing that the rating action is being taken for non-credit related reasons; or

- (m) one or more final, non-appealable judgments or orders for the payment of money in the aggregate amount of \$65,000,000 or more shall be rendered against the District (excluding those in relation to the Judgments) and such judgment or order shall continue unsatisfied and unstayed for a period of ninety (90) days; *provided* that any such judgment shall be deemed to be satisfied for purposes of this Section 6.01(m) if it is being paid by the District in installments pursuant to a settlement agreement.
- Section 6.02. Remedies upon Event of Default. If an Event of Default specified in Section 6.01 hereof shall occur and be continuing, the Purchaser may take one or more of the following actions at any time and from time to time (regardless of whether the actions are taken at the same or different times):
 - The Purchaser (i) may, by notice to the District, terminate the Commitment to the Purchase of Notes, and the Commitment to the Purchase of Notes shall thereupon terminate, and (ii) may, by notice to the District demand that the Notes, be immediately due and payable by the District and the District shall thereupon be obligated to pay immediately the outstanding principal amount of such Notes (together with accrued interest thereon), without presentment, demand, protest or other notice of any kind, all of which are hereby waived by the District; provided that in the case of any of the Events of Default specified in Section 6.01(e), Section 6.01(f) or 6.01(h) hereof, without any notice to the District or any other act by the Purchaser, the Commitment shall thereupon immediately terminate and the Notes and the other payment obligations under Section 8.03 hereof, as applicable, shall immediately be deemed to be due for payment by the District and the District shall be obligated to pay immediately the outstanding principal amount of the Notes and the other payment obligations under Section 8.03 hereof, as applicable (together with accrued interest thereon) and with all other amounts then owing hereunder, in each case, without presentment, demand, protest or notice of any kind, all of which are hereby waived by the District;
 - (b) The Purchaser shall also be entitled to exercise any and all other rights and remedies available at law or in equity. Promptly following the taking of any action or the occurrence of any event or condition referred to above, the Purchaser shall give notice thereof to the District, but the failure to give any such notice or any delay in giving any such notice shall not impair the validity or effect of any action or event or condition referred to above; or
 - (c) If at any time after such acceleration and before any judgment or decree for the payment of money with respect thereto has been entered all amounts payable to the Purchaser hereunder on the Notes subject to acceleration under this Section 6.02 (except

interest on or principal of the Notes which are due solely by reason of such acceleration) shall have been paid or provided for by deposit with the Purchaser and all existing Events of Default shall have been cured or waived, then the Purchaser may annul such acceleration and its consequences by written notice to the District, which annulment shall be binding upon the District and the Purchaser, but no such annulment shall extend to or affect any subsequent Event of Default or impair any right or remedy consequent thereon.

(d) Additionally, from and after the occurrence and during the continuance of an Event of Default, all amounts owing to the Purchaser and all amounts owing to the Noteholders hereunder and amounts owing on any Notes, as applicable, and all payment obligations of the District under Section 8.03 hereof shall bear interest at the Default Rate.

Section 8.01. Notices. All notices, requests, consents and other communications to either party hereunder shall be in writing (including bank wire, facsimile transmission or similar writing) and shall be given to such party at its address or facsimile number set forth on the signature page hereof or at such other address or facsimile number as such party may hereafter specify for the purpose by at least five (5) Business Days' prior notice to the other party, unless otherwise described herein. Each such notice, request, consent or other communication shall be effective (i) if given by facsimile, when such facsimile is transmitted to the facsimile number specified in this Section and the appropriate answerback is received, (ii) if given by mail, 72 hours after such communication is deposited in the mails with first class postage prepaid, addressed as aforesaid, or (iii) if given by any other means, when delivered at the address specified in this Section; provided that notices to the Purchaser under Article II or Article VII shall not be effective until received.

Section 8.02. No Waivers. No course of dealing and no delay or failure of the Purchaser in exercising any right, power or privilege under this Agreement or the other Related Documents shall affect any other or future exercise thereof or exercise of any right, power or privilege; nor shall any single or partial exercise of any such right, power or privilege or any abandonment or discontinuance of steps to enforce such a right, power or privilege preclude any further exercise thereof or of any other right, power or privilege. The rights and remedies of the Purchaser under this Agreement are cumulative and not exclusive of any rights or remedies which the Purchaser would otherwise have under any Related Documents, at law or in equity.

Section 8.03. Expenses; Documentary Taxes; Indemnification. (a) The District shall pay (i) reasonable out-of-pocket expenses of the Purchaser, including reasonable fees and disbursements of counsel for the Purchaser, in connection with the preparation of this Agreement, any waiver or consent hereunder or any amendment hereof or any Default or alleged Default hereunder, (ii) reasonable out-of-pocket expenses incurred by the Purchaser, including reasonable fees and disbursements of counsel, in connection with any Default or Event of Default, and collection, bankruptcy, insolvency and other enforcement proceedings resulting therefrom and any workout or restructuring or negotiations in connection with the Notes. The District shall, to the extent permitted by law, indemnify and hold the Purchaser harmless (on a net after tax basis) from any present or future claim or liability for any transfer taxes, documentary taxes, assessments or charges made by any Governmental Authority by reason of the execution and delivery of this Agreement or the Notes.

(b) To the fullest extent permitted by applicable law, the District agrees to indemnify the Purchaser and each Noteholder and hold the Purchaser and each Noteholder harmless from and against any and all liabilities, losses, damages, costs and expenses of any kind, including, reasonable attorney fees, which may be incurred by the Purchaser or such Noteholder by reason of the District's adoption of the District TRANs Resolution or the execution, delivery or performance by the District of this Agreement or any other Related Document and the use or proposed use of proceeds of the Notes; *provided* that the Purchaser or such Noteholder shall not have the right to defense or be indemnified hereunder for its own gross negligence or willful misconduct. The agreements and obligations of the District contained in this Section shall survive the termination

of this Agreement and the payment in full of the Notes and the obligations of the District thereunder and hereunder subject to any applicable statute of limitations and limited to liabilities, losses, damages, costs and expenses arising from this Agreement.

(c) To the fullest extent permitted by applicable law, the District shall not assert, and hereby waives, and acknowledges that no other Person shall have, any claim against the Purchaser or any Noteholder on any theory of liability, for special, indirect, consequential or punitive damages (as opposed to direct or actual damages) arising out of, in connection with, or as a result of, this Agreement, any other Related Document or any agreement or instrument contemplated hereby, the transactions contemplated hereby or thereby, the Notes, or the use of the proceeds thereof. Neither the Purchaser nor any Noteholder shall be liable for any damages arising from the use by unintended recipients of any information or other materials distributed to such unintended recipients by the Purchaser or such Noteholder through telecommunications, electronic or other information transmission systems in connection with this Agreement or the other Related Documents or the transactions contemplated hereby or thereby other than for direct or actual damages resulting from the gross negligence or willful misconduct of the Purchaser or any Noteholder as determined by a final and non-appealable judgment of a court of competent jurisdiction.

Section 8.04. Amendments and Waivers. Any provision of this Agreement, including as applied to the Notes, may be amended or waived if, but only if, such amendment or waiver is in writing and is signed by the County, the District and the Purchaser, and unless, the Commitment shall have terminated, any party holding all or any portion of the Commitment; provided that no such amendment or waiver shall (i) increase the Commitment or shorten the duration of the Commitment or affect any right or remedy to terminate the Commitment without the written consent of each party affected thereby, (ii) reduce the principal amount of any Note or reduce the rate of interest thereon, or reduce any fees payable hereunder, without the written consent of each Noteholder affected thereby; (iii) postpone the scheduled date of payment of the principal amount of Note, or any interest thereon, or any fees payable hereunder, or reduce the amount of, waive or excuse any such payment, without the written consent of each Noteholder affected thereby, or (iv) change any of the provisions of this Section.

Section 8.05. Successors and Assigns.

(a) Successors and Assigns Generally. This Agreement is a continuing obligation and shall be binding upon the District, its successors, transferees and assigns and shall inure to the benefit of the Noteholders and their respective permitted successors, transferees and assigns as set forth herein. The District may not assign or otherwise transfer any of its rights or obligations hereunder without the prior written consent of the Purchaser. Each Noteholder may, in its sole discretion and in accordance with applicable law, from time to time assign, sell or transfer in whole or in part, this Agreement, its interest in the Notes and the Related Documents in accordance with the provisions of paragraph (c) of this Section. Each Noteholder may at any time and from time to time enter into participation agreements in accordance with the provisions of paragraph (d) of this Section. Each Noteholder may at any time pledge or assign a security interest subject to the restrictions of paragraph (e) of this Section. The Purchaser does not intend to assign its obligations to Purchase the Notes pursuant to the terms of this Agreement, and, notwithstanding anything to

the contrary set forth herein, the Purchaser may not assign its obligations to Purchase the Notes pursuant to the terms of this Agreement without the prior written consent of the District in its sole discretion. In addition, were the Purchaser to become a Noteholder, it (i) shall intend to hold any Notes for its own account and for an indefinite period of time, and (ii) shall hold any Notes for its own account and for an indefinite period of time and shall not dispose of all or any part of such Notes except to the extent as may be provided for in Section 8.05(b), 8.05(c) or 8.05(d) below.

- (b) Sales and Transfers by Noteholder to a Non-Purchaser Transferee. Without limitation of the foregoing generality, a Noteholder may at any time sell or otherwise transfer to one or more transferees each of which constitutes (i) an Affiliate of the Noteholder or (ii) a "qualified institutional buyer" as defined in Rule 144A promulgated under the 1933 Act or "accredited investors" as defined in Rule 501 of Regulation D under the 1933 Act (each an "Assignee") all or a portion of the Notes if (A) written notice of such sale or transfer, including that such sale or transfer is to an Assignee, together with addresses and related information with respect to the Assignee, shall have been given to the District and the Purchaser (if different than the Noteholder) by such selling Noteholder and the Assignee and (B) each Assignee shall have delivered to the District and the selling Noteholder, an investment letter in substantially the form delivered by the Purchaser on the Closing Date and attached hereto as Exhibit C (the "Investor Letter").
- (c) Participations. (i) The Purchaser shall have the right to grant participations in all or a portion of the Purchaser's interest in the Notes, this Agreement and the other Related Documents (on a participating basis but not as a party to this Agreement or any other Related Document, each, a "Participation")) to one or more other banking institutions, without the consent of the District (each, a "Participant"); provided, that the Purchaser shall give the District notice of the grant of any Participation upon the effectiveness thereof.

(ii) Unless not legally entitled to do so:

- (A) each Assignee or Participant, if requested by the District in writing, shall deliver such forms or other documentation prescribed by applicable law or reasonably requested by the District as will enable the District to determine whether or not such Assignee or Participant is subject to backup withholding or information reporting requirements;
- (B) any foreign Assignee or Participant that is entitled to an exemption from or reduction of any Taxes with respect to payments hereunder or under any other Related Document shall deliver to the District, on or prior to the date on which it becomes an Assignee or a Participant under this Agreement (and from time to time thereafter, as may be necessary in the determination of the District, each in the reasonable exercise of its sole discretion), such properly completed and duly executed forms or other documentation prescribed by applicable law as will permit such payments to be made without withholding or at a reduced rate of withholding;
- (C) without limiting the generality of the foregoing, in the event that the District is a resident for tax purposes in the United States, any foreign Assignee or Participant shall

deliver to the District (in such number of copies as shall be requested by the District) on or prior to the date on which it becomes an Assignee or a Participant under this Agreement (and from time to time thereafter, as may be necessary in the determination of the District, in the reasonable exercise of its sole discretion), whichever of the following is applicable:

- (1) properly completed and duly executed copies of Internal Revenue Service Form W-8BEN claiming eligibility for benefits of an income tax treaty to which the United States is a party,
- (2) properly completed and duly executed copies of Internal Revenue Service Form W-8ECI,
- (3) in the case of a foreign Assignee or Participant claiming the benefits of the exemption "portfolio interest" under Section 881(c) of the Internal Revenue Code, (A) a duly executed certificate to the effect that such foreign Assignee or Participant is not (i) a "bank" within the meaning of Section 881(c)(3)(A) of the Internal Revenue Code, (ii) a ten-percent shareholder (within the meaning of Section 881(c)(3)(B) of the Internal Revenue Code) of the District or (iii) a controlled foreign corporation described in Section 881(c)(3)(C) of the Internal Revenue Code and (B) properly completed and duly executed copies of Internal Revenue Service Form W-8BEN; and
- (4) properly completed and duly executed copies of any other form prescribed by applicable law as a basis for claiming exemption from or a reduction in any Taxes, in each case together with such supplementary documentation as may be prescribed by applicable law to permit the District to determine the withholding or deduction required to be made, if any;
- (D) without limiting the generality of the foregoing, in the event that the District is resident for tax purposes in the United States, any foreign Assignee or Participant that does not act or ceases to act for its own account with respect to any portion of any sums paid or payable to the Purchaser under this Agreement (for example, in the case of a typical participation by the Purchaser) shall deliver to the District (in such number of copies as shall be requested by the District), on or prior to the date such foreign Assignee or Participant becomes an Assignee or a Participant, or on such later date when such foreign Assignee or Participant ceases to act for its own account with respect to any portion of any such sums paid or payable, and from time to time thereafter, as may be necessary in the determination of the District (each in the reasonable exercise of its sole discretion):
 - (1) duly executed and properly completed copies of the forms and statements required to be provided by such foreign Assignee or Participant under clause (c) of this Section 8.05 to establish the portion of any such sums paid or payable with respect to which the Assignee or Participant acts for its own account and may be entitled to an exemption from or a reduction of the applicable Taxes, and

- (2) duly executed and properly completed copies of Internal Revenue Service Form W-8IMY (or any successor forms) properly completed and duly executed by such foreign Participant, together with any information, if any, such foreign Participant chooses to transmit with such form, and any other certificate or statement of exemption required under the Internal Revenue Code or the regulations thereunder, to establish that such foreign Assignee or Participant is not acting for its own account with respect to a portion of any such sums payable to such foreign Assignee or Participant;
- (E) without limiting the generality of the foregoing, in the event that the District is resident for tax purposes in the United States, the Assignee or Participant that is not a foreign Participant and has not otherwise established to the reasonable satisfaction of the District that it is an exempt recipient (as defined in Section 6049(b)(4) of the Internal Revenue Code and the United States Treasury Regulations thereunder) shall deliver to the District (in such number of copies as shall be requested by the District) on or prior to the date on which the Assignee or Participant becomes an Assignee or a Participant under this Agreement (and from time to time thereafter as prescribed by applicable law or upon the written request of the District), duly executed and properly completed copies of Internal Revenue Service Form W-9; and
- (F) without limiting the generality of the foregoing, each Participant shall, from time to time after the initial delivery by the Assignee or Participant, as applicable, of such forms, whenever a lapse in time or change in circumstances renders such forms, certificates or other evidence so delivered obsolete or inaccurate in any material respect, promptly (1) deliver to the District two original copies of renewals, amendments or additional or successor forms, properly completed and duly executed by the Participant, as applicable, together with any other certificate or statement of exemption required in order to confirm or establish that such Assignee or Participant is entitled to an exemption from or reduction of any Taxes with respect to payments to such Assignee or Participant, as applicable, under this Agreement and, if applicable, that such Participant does not act for its own account with respect to any portion of such payment, or (2) notify the District of its inability to deliver any such forms, certificates or other evidence.
- (d) Certain Pledges. The Purchaser may at any time pledge or grant a security interest in all or any portion of its rights under the Notes, this Agreement and the Related Documents to secure obligations of the Purchaser, including any pledge or assignment to secure obligations to a Federal Reserve Bank, the United States Treasury or to any state or local governmental entity or with respect to public deposits; provided that no such pledge or assignment shall release the Purchaser from any of its obligations hereunder or substitute any such pledgee or assignee for the Purchaser as a party hereto.

Section 8.06. Governing Law; Venue. (a) This Agreement shall be governed by the laws of the State of California, without regard to conflict of law principles that would require the application of different governing law.

All litigation arising out of, or relating to this Agreement, shall be brought in a state or federal court located in the County of Los Angeles in the State of California. The parties irrevocably agree to submit to the exclusive jurisdiction of such courts and waive any defense of forum non conveniens. If for any reason no State or Federal court sitting in the County of Los Angeles can and will accept jurisdiction over any such suit, action or proceeding, then the exclusivity of jurisdiction in such courts in the County of Los Angeles shall not apply and such suit, action or proceeding may be brought in any other state or federal court in the State of California which will accept jurisdiction over such matter. Notwithstanding anything in this Agreement to the contrary, no action, suit or other proceeding may be maintained against the District or the County unless notice and presentment of such claim shall have been given in accordance with the procedural laws of the State of California and the County of Los Angeles. Service of process may be accomplished by registered mail, return receipt requested to each of the parties at the address listed for notice in Section .8.01 hereof; provided, however, that service of process with respect to the District shall be made to the Executive Officer Clerk of the Board of Education and that service of process with respect to the County shall be made to the Executive Officer Clerk of the Board of Supervisors.

Section 8.07. Counterparts; Integration. This Agreement may be signed in any number of counterparts, each of which shall be an original, with the same effect as if the signatures thereto and hereto were upon the same instrument. This Agreement constitutes the entire agreement and understanding among the parties hereto and supersedes any and all prior agreements and understandings, oral or written, relating to the subject matter hereof.

Section 8.08. Headings. Section headings in this Agreement are included herein for convenience of reference only and shall not constitute a part of this Agreement for any other purpose.

Section 8.09. Severability. The invalidity or unenforceability of anyone or more phrases, sentences, clauses, or sections contained in this Agreement shall not affect the validity or enforceability of the remaining portions of this Agreement, or any part thereof.

Section 8.10. Government Regulations. The Purchaser is subject to the Patriot Act (as hereinafter defined) and hereby notifies the District that pursuant to the requirements of the USA Patriot Act Title III of Pub. L. 107-56 (signed into law October 26, 2001) (the "Patriot Act"), it is required to obtain, verify and record information that identifies the District, which information includes the name and address of the District and the County and other information that will allow the Purchaser, to identify the District and the County in accordance with the Patriot Act. The District and the County shall promptly provide such information on request by the Purchaser. The District and the County hereby agree (a) that it is not and shall not be listed on the Specially Designated Nationals and Blocked Person List or other similar lists maintained by the Office of Foreign Assets Control ("OFAC"), the Department of the Treasury or included in any Executive Orders, that prohibits or limits the Purchaser from making any advance or extension of credit to the District or the County or from otherwise conducting business with the District or the County and (b) to ensure that the proceeds of the Notes shall not be used to violate any of the foreign asset control regulations of OFAC or any enabling statute or Executive Order relating thereto.

No Advisory or Fiduciary Relationship. In connection with all aspects of each transaction contemplated hereby (including in connection with any amendment, waiver or other modification hereof or of any other Related Document), the District and the County acknowledge and agree that: (a)(i) the services regarding this Agreement provided by the Purchaser are arm's-length commercial transactions among the District and the County, on the one hand, and the Purchaser, on the other hand, (ii) the District and the County have consulted its own legal, accounting, regulatory, tax, financial and other advisors to the extent it has deemed appropriate, and (iii) the District and the County are capable of evaluating, and understands and accepts, the terms, risks and conditions of the transactions contemplated hereby and by the other Related Documents; (b)(i) the Purchaser is and has been acting solely as a principal for its own interests and, except as expressly agreed in writing by the relevant parties, has not been, is not, and will not be acting as an advisor (municipal, financial or otherwise), agent or fiduciary, for the District and the County, and has no fiduciary duty pursuant to Section 15B of the Securities Exchange Act of 1934 to the District with respect to this transaction and the discussions, undertakings and procedures leading thereto (irrespective of whether the Purchaser has provided other services or is currently providing other services to the District on other matters), (ii) the Purchaser has no obligation to the District or the County with respect to the transactions contemplated hereby except those obligations expressly set forth herein and in the other Related Documents, (iii) the only obligations the Purchaser has to the District and the County with respect to this transaction are set forth in this Agreement; and (iv) the Purchaser is not recommending that the District or the County take an action with respect to the transaction described in this Agreement and the other Related Documents; and (c) the Purchaser may be engaged in a broad range of transactions that involve interests that differ from those of the District and the County, and the Purchaser has no obligation to disclose any of such interests to the District or the County.

Section 8.12. Electronic Signatures. The parties agree that the electronic signature of a party to this Agreement shall be as valid as an original signature of such party and shall be effective to bind such party to this Agreement. The parties acknowledge and agree that this document and any related documents, and any amendments or waivers hereto or thereto, may be executed and delivered by facsimile, electronic copies in portable document format ("PDF") or by any other electronic means intended to preserve the original graphic and pictorial appearance of a document, or by combination of such means or by any digital or electronic signature process or program, and that any signature so delivered shall be treated as and have the same force and effect as an original signature, and copies of the same may be used and introduced as evidence at any legal proceedings including, without limitation, trials and arbitrations, relating to or arising under this document. No party shall contest the admissibility of true and accurate copies of electronically signed documents on the basis of the best evidence rule or as not satisfying the business records exception to the hearsay rule. Notwithstanding the foregoing, the Purchaser may, in its sole and exclusive discretion, also require delivery of this document and any related documents, and any amendments or waivers hereto or thereto, with an original signature for its records and two or more duplicate originals of this Agreement may be signed by the parties, each of which shall be an original but all of which together shall constitute one and the same instrument.

Section 8.13. Representation by Legal Counsel; Joint Preparation. The parties hereto have participated jointly in the negotiation and drafting of this Agreement and each of the parties was represented by its respective legal counsel during the negotiation and execution of this Agreement.

In the event an ambiguity or question of intent or interpretation arises, this Agreement shall be construed as if drafted jointly by the parties and no presumption or burden of proof shall arise favoring or disfavoring any party by virtue of the authorship of any of the provisions of this Agreement.

- Section 8.14. District Business Policies; Taxpayer Identification Number (TIN). The Purchaser declares that its authorized U.S. Federal TIN is ______. No payment will be made under this Agreement without a valid TIN number.
- Section 8.15. Prior Understandings. This Agreement and the other Related Documents supersede all other prior understandings and agreements, whether written or oral, among the parties hereto relating to the transactions provided for herein and therein.
- Section 8.16. Continuing Obligation. The obligations of the District and the County under this Agreement shall continue until the later of the date this Agreement terminates and the date upon which all amounts owing to the Purchaser, each Noteholder and each Participant hereunder and under the Notes shall have been paid in full, provided that the obligations of the District to pay accrued but unpaid amounts pursuant to Article II and Article VIII hereof shall survive the termination of this Agreement. This Agreement shall be binding upon the District and the County and its successors and assigns and shall inure to the benefit of and be enforceable by the Purchaser and its successors, transferees and assigns, provided that the District and the County may not assign all or any part of this Agreement without the prior written consent of the Purchaser. Nothing contained in this Section shall be construed to be a waiver of any applicable statute of limitations.

Section 8.17. US QFC Stay Rules.

- (a) Recognition of U.S. Resolution Regimes. In the event that any party that is a Covered Entity becomes subject to a proceeding under a U.S. Special Resolution Regime, the transfer of this Agreement (and any interest and obligation in or under this Agreement and any property securing this Agreement) from such Covered Entity will be effective to the same extent as the transfer would be effective under the U.S. Special Resolution Regime if this Agreement (and any such interest, obligation and property) were governed by the laws of the United States or a state of the United States. In the event that any party that is a Covered Entity or a BHC Act Affiliate of such party becomes subject to a proceeding under a U.S. Special Resolution Regime, Default Rights against such party with respect to this Agreement are permitted to be exercised to no greater extent than such Default Rights could be exercised under the U.S. Special Resolution Regime if this Agreement were governed by the laws of the United States or a state of the United States. The requirements of this paragraph (a) apply notwithstanding the provisions of paragraph (b).
- (b) Limitation on the Exercise of Certain Rights Related to Affiliate Insolvency Proceedings. Notwithstanding anything to the contrary in this Agreement or any related agreement, but subject to the requirements of paragraph (a), no party to this Agreement shall be permitted to exercise any Default Right against a party that is a Covered Entity with respect to this Agreement that is related, directly or indirectly, to a BHC Act Affiliate of such Covered Entity becoming subject to Insolvency Proceedings, except to the extent the exercise of such Default Right would be permitted under 12 C.F.R. § 252.84, 12 C.F.R. § 47.5, or 12 C.F.R. § 382.4, as

applicable. After a BHC Act Affiliate of a party that is a Covered Entity has become subject to Insolvency Proceedings, any party that seeks to exercise a Default Right against such Covered Entity with respect to this Agreement shall have the burden of proof, by clear and convincing evidence, that the exercise of such Default Right is permitted hereunder.

(c) *Definitions*. As used in this Section 8.17:

"BHC Act Affiliate" of a party means an "affiliate" (as such term is defined under, and interpreted in accordance with, 12 U.S.C. 1841(k)) of such party.

"Covered Entity" means any of the following:

- (a) a "covered entity" as that term is defined in, and interpreted in accordance with, 12 C.F.R. § 252.82(b);
- (b) a "covered bank" as that term is defined in, and interpreted in accordance with, 12 C.F.R. § 47.3(b); or
- (c) a "covered FSI" as that term is defined in, and interpreted in accordance with, 12 C.F.R. § 382.2(b).

"Default Right" has the meaning assigned to that term in, and shall be interpreted in accordance with, 12 C.F.R. §§ 252.81, 47.2 or 382.1, as applicable.

"Insolvency Proceeding" means a receivership, insolvency, liquidation, resolution, or similar proceeding.

"U.S. Special Resolution Regime" means each of (i) the Federal Deposit Insurance Act and the regulations promulgated thereunder and (ii) Title II of the Dodd-Frank Wall Street Reform and Consumer Protection Act and the regulations promulgated thereunder.

This letter is to provide you with certain representations and agreements with respect to our purchase of all of the above-referenced notes (the "Notes"), dated their date of issuance. The Notes were issued under and secured in the manner set forth in a Resolution of the District adopted by the Board on October ___, 2024 and a Resolution of the County by the County on November 19, 2024. - 3. We have sufficient knowledge and experience in financial and business matters, including purchase and ownership of municipal and other tax-exempt obligations, to be able to evaluate the risks and merits of the investment represented by the purchase of the Notes.

- 4. The Purchaser is either a "qualified institutional buyer" as defined in Rule 144A promulgated under the 1933 Act, or an "accredited investor" as defined in Rule 501 of Regulation D under the 1933 Act and is able to bear the economic risks of such investment.
- 5. The Purchaser understands that no official statement, prospectus, offering circular, or other comprehensive offering statement is being provided with respect to the Notes. The Purchaser has made its own inquiry and analysis with respect to the District, the Notes and the security therefor, and other material factors affecting the security for and payment of the Notes.
- 6. The Purchaser acknowledges that it has either been supplied with or been given access to information, including financial statements and other financial information, regarding the **County and the District**, to which a reasonable investor would attach significance in making investment decisions, and has had the opportunity to ask questions and receive answers from knowledgeable individuals concerning the County and the District, the Notes and the security therefor, so that as a reasonable investor, it has been able to make its decision to purchase the Notes.
- 7. The Notes are being acquired by the Purchaser for investment for its own account and not with a present view toward resale or distribution; *provided, however*, that the Purchaser reserves the right to sell, transfer or redistribute the Notes, but agrees that any such sale, transfer or distribution by the Purchaser shall be to a Person:
 - (a) that is an affiliate of the Purchaser; or
 - (b) that the Purchaser reasonably believes to be a qualified institutional buyer or accredited investor and who executes an investor letter substantially in the form of this letter.

Provisional Internship Permits October 22, 2024 Human Resources Division

Action Proposed:

Approve request for 27 teachers to be employed under the Provisional Internship Permit pursuant to Title 5 California Code of Regulations, Section 80021.1.

Background:

The Provisional Internship Permit became effective on July 1, 2005 in anticipation of the phasing out of the former authorizing document. The Provisional Internship Permit is valid for one year and may not be renewed. During the first year of employment, the Provisional Intern teacher must meet all requirements for entrance into an accredited intern program.

The Los Angeles County Office of Education grants authority to the District to employ potential Provisional Interns on a Temporary County Certificate until such time that the Board of Education approves their employment under the Provisional Internship Permit. Commission on Teacher Credentialing (CTC) regulations require that the request to employ Provisional Interns be approved by the Board and submitted to the CTC within three months of the teachers beginning their assignment.

The CTC requires that the governing board be presented with a list of teachers to be employed under the Provisional Internship Permit (Attachment A).

Expected Outcomes:

The approval of Provisional Internship Permits will enable the District to continue to staff teacher vacancies in shortage subject fields with individuals committed to completing the requirements to enter into an intern program and subsequently earn a full credential.

Board Options and Consequences:

Approval of Provisional Internship Permits will afford the District the opportunity to hire new multiple subject, special education, mathematics, social science, art, music, theater, physical education, and English teachers who will be required to follow a prescribed and rigorous pathway that results in the earning of both full state and federal teacher certification.

If the Provisional Internship Permits are not approved, and a full-time teacher cannot be hired, classroom vacancies would be staffed by a series of individuals in possession of only Emergency 30-Day Substitute Teaching Permits. Day-to-day substitutes are not required to be enrolled in a teacher education program, and may only remain in a special education classroom for a maximum of twenty days, after which time they are deemed by the State as inappropriately assigned.

The goal of Human Resources Division is to insure that there is an appropriately authorized teacher in every classroom. In areas of high need such as multiple subject, special education, mathematics, social science, art, music, theater, physical education and English where there might be a teacher shortage, the District may approve the use of Provisional Internship Permits, which authorize a teacher candidate to step into the classroom as the teacher of record while they take the necessary steps to enroll in a credential program.

The nine **Teacher Residency** grants will permit our university partners to implement high-quality, yearlong teacher residency programs, with the goal of training and preparing outstanding teachers who commit to teaching in LAUSD for four years upon successful program completion and earning their credential. Grant funding includes resident stipends (ranging from \$31,000 to \$40,000 per resident depending on the grant), mentor teacher stipends, mentor teacher training, resident professional development, and administrative costs.

The Classified School Employee Teacher Credentialing grants will provide up to \$4,800 per Classified employee enrolled in the BOOST (Building Our Own Staff as Teachers) program. Classified employees admitted into BOOST go through a competitive application process, and once enrolled, must remain in good standing as District employees with yearly validation of performance evaluations, attendance, and principal/administrator endorsement for continued enrollment. BOOST members may use grant funding for tuition reimbursements and any other education or credentialing expenses.

In alignment with the District's Strategic Plan, Pillar 5: Investing in Staff, the Human Resources Division created the Los Angeles Preliminary Administrative Services Credential (LAPASC) program to establish a pipeline of highly qualified equity-driven leaders prepared to serve the needs of the diverse communities within Los Angeles. A central feature of the program is to facilitate the development of leaders who are reflective lifelong learners prepared to adapt their leadership practice in an everchanging, multicultural world. The grant will allow LAPASC, within the two-years of implementation, to prepare 44 candidates to serve the District's highest need schools and be reflective of the diverse student populations. In addition to earning the preliminary administrative services credential, this partnership with USC will offer LAPASC candidates the opportunity to participate in professional development from USC's Race & Equity Center.

Background:

LAUSD was awarded several **Teacher Residency** (**TR**) grants to support the development, implementation, and expansion of TR programs. Authorizing legislation provided state funds for competitive grants for local education agencies (LEAs) to work in partnership with institutions of higher education (IHEs) with Commission-approved teacher preparation programs to offer teacher residency pathways to earn a teaching credential in special education, STEM, or bilingual education.

The state allocated funds for the **Classified School Employee Teacher Credentialing Program** (BOOST within LAUSD). The program addresses the state's teacher shortage by supporting LEAs to recruit Classified employees into teaching careers, by supporting their undergraduate education, teacher preparation, and certification as credentialed California teachers.

The Computer Science Supplementary Authorization (CSSA) grants will strengthen the District's efforts to address the growing Computer Science (CS) teacher shortage in K-12 schools. This grant provides an accessible and affordable program to teachers to obtain their CS Supplementary Authorization through the CSSA at the University of California Los Angeles (UCLA) and California State University Los Angeles (CSULA).

LAUSD was awarded the **Diverse Education Leaders Pipeline Initiative** (**DELPI**) grant to develop and implement a support program to train, place, and retain diverse and culturally responsive administrators in transitional kindergarten to grade 12, to improve pupil outcomes and meet the needs of California's education workforce. The program includes the following goals: (1) increase the diversity among public school administrators to promote school environments that better represent and reflect the diversity of the pupils served; (2) cultivate culturally responsive public school administrators; (3) build capacity and partnerships between LEAs, nonprofit educational service providers, and IHEs to meet the needs of administrator candidates; and (4) increase the quality of school administrators by incorporating culturally diverse practices.

Expected Outcomes:

These grants will enable LAUSD to remain competitive in the training and recruitment of teachers and administrators, and to continue to build dedicated pipelines of future teachers and administrators committed to ensuring that our students are college-prepared, career-ready, and ready for the world.

Board Options and Consequences:

Approval of these grants will permit the District to partner with local university partners to offer TR programs, support Classified employees seeking to become teachers, and offer many credentialing and supplementary authorization programs.

If the grants are not approved, the District will be unable to partner with local universities to offer these aforementioned programs, and may likely lose a dedicated pipeline of well-trained, highly qualified teachers and administrators. In addition, the District would not be able to offer the same level of support and financial assistance to Classified employees interested in becoming teachers, which would ultimately reduce the District's ability to decrease the teacher shortage in needed fields such as STEM, special education and bilingual education.

Policy Implications:

This action does not change District policy.

Budget Impact:

The grant funds must be administered in accordance with all provisions of state and local laws, regulations, and policies relating to the administration, use and accounting for public school funds, including, but not limited to, the Education Code of the State of California.

The grants will provide up to \$8,976,366 annually in additional funding to the District for the duration of the grants.

Student Impact:

Ratification of these grants will enable the District to recruit and train highly qualified teachers and administrators. Highly qualified teachers are needed in shortage subject fields, including credentialed special education teachers to serve our students with disabilities, which will positively impact the achievement of all students.

GRANT AGREEMENT COMMISSION ON TEACHER CREDENTIALING

TERMS AND CONDITIONS OF GRANT

The Grantee shall be responsible for the performance of the work as set forth herein below and for the preparation of reports as specified in this Agreement. The Grantee's Project Representative shall promptly notify the State of events or proposed changes that could affect the Work Plan under this Agreement.

General Provisions

A. Definitions

- The term "Agreement" as used herein means a grant agreement between the State and Grantee specifying the payment of Grant Amount by the State for the performance of Work Plan within the Project Performance Period by the Grantee.
- 2. The term "Encumbrance" as used herein means a planned expenditure of grant funds.
- The term "Grant Amount" as used herein means funds allocated to the Grantee in accordance with Education Code 44415.5.
- 4. The term "Grantee" as used herein means the party described as the Grantee on page one (1) of this Agreement.
- The term "Institutions of higher education" means the California State University, the University of California, and private regionally accredited institutions of higher education institutions that offer a commission-approved teacher preparation program
- The term "Program" means the California Teacher Residency Expansion Grant Program.
- 7. The term "Project" as used herein means the project described on page one (1) of this Agreement.
- 8. The term "Project Performance Period" as used herein means the period of time that the Grant Amount is available, and the time in which the Project must be complete, billed and paid as described on page one (1) of this Agreement.
- The term "Project Representative" as used herein means the person authorized by the Grantee to be responsible for the Project and can make daily management decisions.
- 10. The term "State" as used herein means the Commission on Teacher Credentialing.
- 11. The term "Teacher Residency Expansion Grant Program" is a state grant program authorized under the provisions of EC §44415 and §44415.5 that provides funding for the development of teacher residency programs.
- 12. The term "Work Plan" means the residency pathway planning activities described in

the LEA's application and budget herein attached as exhibits A and B, and as approved by the State.

B. Project Execution

- Grantee agrees to complete the Project in accordance with the time of Project Performance Period, and under the terms and conditions of this Agreement. Extensions may be requested at least 90 days in advance of the date of termination and will be considered in the event of circumstances beyond the control of the Grantee, but in no event subsequent to the end of the Project Performance Period as identified in the Work Plan as the Project's date of completion.
- 2. Grantee agrees to submit in writing any deviation from the approved grant application to the State for approval, prior to implementation of changes.
- 3. Grantees will be expected to make appropriate yearly progress in implementing their expanded residency model, resulting in an increase in the number of teacher resident candidates and according to the operational plan provided in the funded application. Applicants should note that as a condition of receipt of a grant, the LEA grantee must agree to report outcome data when reports are requested by Commission staff. Failure to comply with funding terms or reporting requirements could put future funding opportunities at risk.
- 4. Grant funding may be subject to change when any unspent funds are reported in any annual reports.
- 5. The Teacher Residency Expansion grant funding period, and the approved grant activities, may extend through June 30, 2026. For grantees who also apply for or have already been awarded other Teacher Residency grant funding, the grantee may continue to operate their Teacher Residency Expansion Grant within the grant funding period and planned activities within the specified grant agreement. The funds in this grant agreement may be spent concurrently with previously awarded grant agreements until their respective cutoff dates to complete the planned activities described in the response to the selection criteria and as stated in the statute(s) in the grant agreement that authorizes funding.

C. Project Costs

Subject to the availability of Grant Amount in the Act, the State hereby grants to the Grantee an annual sum of money (Annual Grant Amount) not to exceed the amount stated on page one (1) of this Agreement in consideration of and on condition that the sum be expended in carrying out the purpose as set forth in the Work Plan and under the terms and conditions set forth in this Agreement. Grantee agrees to assume any obligation to furnish any additional funds that may be necessary to complete the Project. All costs accrued for services or supplies prior to the execution of Agreement are not eligible for reimbursement.

The Grant Amount to be provided to the Grantee, under this Agreement, may be disbursed as follows:

- Upon approval of the application, the first payment will be 90 percent (90%) of the total annual budget amount projected for the first year of resident enrollment.
- 2. The second payment will be 10 percent (10%) of the total annual budget amount

- projected for the first year of resident enrollment. The second payment will be provided to grantees after the program has completed its activities and submitted required annual reports to the Commission.
- 3. Subsequent annual payments will be determined by calculating the program need based on the actual expenditures reported by the program from the previous fiscal year and the projected enrollment numbers submitted by the program for the following fiscal year. Annual awards will be disbursed in two payments following the 90 percent (90%)/10 percent (10%) model described above. Unspent funds reported on annual reports will be deducted from the next allotment of funds.

D. Allowable Activities and Use of Funds

- Assembly Bill (AB) 130 (Chapter 44, Statutes of 2021) provided the Commission with \$350 million for the Teacher Residency Grant Program, with up to \$325 million allocated to expansion and implementation grants that shall not exceed \$25,000 per teacher candidate in the residency program of the jurisdiction of the grant recipient. Per statute, the grant funds must be matched by the grantee LEA or consortium on an eighty cents (\$.80) to one dollar (\$1) basis. Matching funds may be actual dollars or in-kind services. Funding is available through June 30, 2026.
- Sample activities that can be funded through the Teacher Residency Expansion Grants
 include but are not limited to expanding an existing LEA-IHE collaborative teacher
 residency to include any or all of the allowable designated shortage areas or
 diversification of the teacher workforce efforts described in the authorizing
 legislation.
- 3. The Grantee warrants by execution of this Agreement, that no person or selling agency has been employed or retained to solicit or secure this Agreement upon agreement or understanding for a commission, percentage, brokerage, or contingent fee, excepting bona fide employees or bona fide established commercial or selling agencies maintained by the Grantee for the purpose of securing business. For breach or violation of the warranty, the state shall, in addition to other remedies provided by law, have the right to annul this Agreement without liability, paying only for the value of the work performed, or otherwise recover the full amount of such commission, percentage, brokerage, or contingent fee.

E. Payment Documentation

- Payment shall be made yearly for the annual grant amount, less 10% withholding to be released upon satisfactory completion of all required deliverables.
- Any overpayment of Grant Amount in excess of final project costs shall be returned to the State within 60 days of completion of the Project or the end of the Project Performance Period as shown on page one (1), whichever is earlier.

F. Project Administration

 Grantee agrees to provide all technical and administrative services as needed for Agreement completion. Grantee agrees to monitor and review all work performed; and coordinate budgeting and scheduling to assure that the Agreement is completed within

budget, on schedule, and in accordance with approved procedures, applicable laws, and regulations.

- Grantee ensures that the Agreement requirements are met through completion of annual reports, submitted to the State in accordance with the Work Plan and through regular communication with the State.
- Grantee agrees to promptly submit reports as the State has requested in this Agreement or may request during the life of this Agreement.
- The Grantee shall comply with the Drug-Free Workplace Act of 1990 (Government Code section 8350 et seq.), Government Code sections 12990(a-f) and CCR, Title 2, Section 8103 (nondiscrimination for non-public entities, and Public Contract Code section 10295.3 (domestic partners).

G. Project Termination

- Failure by the Grantee to comply with the terms of this Agreement or any other Agreement under the Act may be cause for suspension of all obligations of the State hereunder.
- Failure of the Grantee to comply with the terms of this Agreement shall not be cause for the suspension of all obligations of the State hereunder if in the judgment of the State such failure was due to no fault of the Grantee.
- In such case, any amount required to settle at minimum cost any irrevocable obligations properly incurred shall be eligible for reimbursement under this Agreement.
- 4. Should the Grantee choose to terminate its participation in the program, a thirty (30)-day written notice is required. Final program and expenditure reports are due thirty (30) days after the program cessation. The Grantee agrees to return all unexpended funds within sixty (60) days of project cessation.
- 5. It is mutually agreed that if the Budget Act of the current year and/or any subsequent years covered under this Agreement does not appropriate sufficient funds for the program, this Agreement shall be of no further force and effect. In this event, the state shall have no liability to any funds to the Grantee, furnish any other consideration under this agreement, and the grantee shall not be obligated to perform any provisions of this Agreement.
- If funding for any fiscal year is reduced or deleted by the Budget Act for purposes of
 this program, the State shall have the option to either cancel this Agreement with no
 liability occurring to the State or offer an agreement amendment to the Grantee to reflect
 the changes.

H. Financial Records

- Expenditures shall comply with all applicable provisions of federal, state, and local rules, regulations and policies related to the administration, use, and accounting for public school funds, including but not limited to, the Education Code of the State of California.
- Grantee agrees to maintain satisfactory financial accounts, documents, and records for the Project and to make them available to the State for auditing at reasonable times. Grantee also agrees to retain such financial accounts, documents and records for three years following Project termination or completion.
- 3. Grantee agrees to use a generally accepted accounting system.

I. Audit

- Projects are subject to audit by the State for three years following the final payment of Grant Amount. The purpose of this audit is to verify that project expenditures were properly documented. Grantees will be contacted at least 30 days in advance of an audit.
- Audit will include all books, papers, accounts, documents, or other records of the Grantee, as they relate to the Project for which the State authorized Grant Amount. The Grantee shall have the Project records, including the sources documents and cancelled warrants, readily available to the State.
- The Grantee must also provide an employee having knowledge of the Project and the accounting procedure or system to assist the State's auditor. The Grantee shall provide a copy of any document, paper, record, or the like requested by the State.
- All Project records must be retained for at least one year following an audit or final disputed audit findings.

2021-22 Budget Act Legislation

Section 45:

Section 44415.5 is added to the Education Code, to read:

44415.5

- (a) For purposes of this section, the following definitions apply for the Teacher Residency Grant Program:
 - "Experienced mentor teacher" means an educator who meets all the following requirements:

 (A) Has at least three years of teaching experience and holds a clear credential in the subject in which the mentor teacher will be mentoring.
 - (B) Has a record of successful teaching as demonstrated, at a minimum, by satisfactory annual performance evaluations for the preceding three years.
 - (C) Receives specific training for the mentor teacher role and engages in ongoing professional learning and networking with other mentors.

- (D) Receives compensation, appropriate release time, or both, to serve as a mentor in the initial preparation or beginning teacher induction component of the teacher residency program.
- (2) "Teacher residency program" is a grant applicant-based program that partners with one or more commission-approved teacher preparation programs offered by a regionally accredited institution of higher education in which a prospective teacher teaches at least one-half time alongside a teacher of record, who is designated as the experienced mentor teacher, for at least one full school year while engaging in initial preparation coursework.
- (b) For the 2021–22 fiscal year, the sum of three hundred fifty million dollars (\$350,000,000) is hereby appropriated from the General Fund to the commission for the Teacher Residency Grant Program to support teacher residency programs that recruit and support the preparation of teachers pursuant to this section. This funding shall be available for encumbrance until June 30, 2026.
- (c) (1) The commission shall make one-time grants to grant applicants to establish new teacher residency programs, or expand, strengthen, or improve access to existing teacher residency programs that support either of the following:
 - (A) Designated shortage fields, including special education, bilingual education, science, computer science, technology, engineering, mathematics, transitional kindergarten, or kindergarten, and any other fields identified by the commission based on an annual analysis of hiring and vacancy data.
 - (B) Local efforts to recruit, develop support systems for, provide outreach and communication strategies to, and retain a diverse teacher workforce that reflects a local educational agency community's diversity.
 - (2) Grant recipients shall work with one or more commission-accredited teacher preparation programs and may work with other community partners or nonprofit organizations to develop and implement programs of preparation and mentoring for resident teachers who will be supported through program funds and subsequently employed by the sponsoring grant recipient.
 - (3) A grant applicant may consist of one or more, or any combination, of the following:
 - (A) A school district.
 - (B) A county office of education.
 - (C) A charter school.
 - (D) A regional occupational center or program operated by a joint powers authority or a county office of education.
- (d) Grants allocated pursuant to subdivision (c) shall be up to twenty-five thousand dollars (\$25,000) per teacher candidate in the residency program of the jurisdiction of the grant recipient, matched by that grant recipient at a rate of 80 percent of the grant amount received per participant, as described in subdivision (f). Residents are also eligible for other forms of federal, state, and local educational agency financial assistance to support the cost of their preparation. Grant program funding shall be used for, but is not limited to, any of the following:
 - (1) Teacher preparation costs.
 - (2) Stipends for mentor teachers, including, but not limited to, housing stipends.
 - (3) Residency program staff costs.
 - (4) Mentoring and beginning teacher induction costs following initial preparation.
- (e) A grant recipient shall not use more than 5 percent of a grant award for program administration costs.
- (f) A grant recipient shall provide a match of grant funding in the form of one or both of the following:
 - (1) Eighty cents (\$0.80) for every one dollar (\$1) of grant funding received per participant, to be used in a manner consistent with allowable grant activities pursuant to subdivision (d).
 - (2) An in-kind match of program director personnel costs, mentor teacher personnel costs, or

other personnel costs related to the Teacher Residency Grant Program, provided by the grant recipient.

- (g) Grant recipients shall do all of the following:
 - (1) Ensure that candidates are prepared to earn a preliminary teaching credential that will authorize the candidate to teach either in a designated shortage field or in furtherance of subparagraph (B) of paragraph (1) of subdivision (c) upon completion of the program.
 - (2) Ensure that candidates are provided instruction in all of the following:
 - (A) Teaching the content area or areas in which the teacher will become certified to teach.
 - (B) Planning, curriculum development, and assessment.
 - (C) Learning and child development.
 - (D) Management of the classroom environment.
 - (E) Use of culturally responsive practices, supports for language development, and supports for serving pupils with disabilities.
 - (F) Professional responsibilities, including interaction with families and colleagues.
 - (3) Provide each candidate mentoring and beginning teacher induction support following the completion of the initial credential program necessary to obtain a clear credential and ongoing professional development and networking opportunities during the candidate's first years of teaching at no cost to the candidate.
 - (4) Prepare candidates to teach in a school within the jurisdiction of the grant recipient in which they will work and learn the instructional initiatives and curriculum of the grant recipient.
 - (5) Group teacher candidates in cohorts to facilitate professional collaboration among residents, and ensure candidates are enrolled in a teaching school or professional development program that is organized to support a high-quality teacher learning experience in a supportive work environment.
- (h) To receive a grant, an applicant shall submit an application to the commission at a time, in a manner, and containing information prescribed by the commission.
- (i) When selecting grant recipients, the commission shall do both of the following:
 - (1) Require applicants to demonstrate a need for teachers in one or more designated shortage fields or for the purposes described in subparagraph (B) of paragraph (1) of subdivision (c), and to propose to establish a new, or expand, strengthen, or improve access to an existing, teacher residency program that recruits, prepares, and supports teachers to teach in either one or more such fields or in furtherance of subparagraph (B) of paragraph (1) of subdivision (c) in a school within the jurisdiction of the sponsoring grant applicant.
 - (2) Give priority consideration to grant applicants who demonstrate a commitment to increasing diversity in the teaching workforce, have a higher percentage than other applicants of unduplicated pupils, as defined in Section 42238.02, and have one or more schools that exhibit one or both of the following characteristics:
 - (A) A school where 50 percent or more of the enrolled pupils are eligible for free or reduced-price meals.
 - (B) A school that is located in either a rural location or a densely populated region.
- (j) A candidate in a teacher residency program sponsored by a grant provided pursuant to subdivision (c) shall agree in writing to serve in a school within the jurisdiction of the grant recipient that sponsored the candidate for a period of at least four school years beginning with the school year that begins after the candidate successfully completes the initial year of preparation and obtains a preliminary teaching credential. A candidate who fails to earn a preliminary credential or complete the period of the placement shall reimburse the sponsoring grant recipient the amount of grant funding invested in the candidate's residency training. The amount to be reimbursed shall be adjusted proportionately to reflect the service

provided if the candidate taught at least one year, but less than four years, at a school within the jurisdiction of the sponsoring grant recipient. A candidate shall have five school years to complete the four-school-year teaching commitment.

- (k) If a candidate is unable to complete a school year of teaching, that school year may still be counted toward the required four complete school years if any of the following occur:
 - (1) The candidate has completed at least one-half of the school year.
 - (2) The employer deems the candidate to have fulfilled their contractual requirements for the school year for the purposes of salary increases, probationary or permanent status, and retirement.
 - (3) The candidate was not able to teach due to the financial circumstances of the sponsoring grant recipient, including a decision to not reelect the employee for the succeeding school year.
 - (4) The candidate has a condition covered under the federal Family and Medical Leave Act of 1993 (29 U.S.C. Sec. 2061 et seq.) or similar state law.
 - (5) The candidate was called or ordered to active duty status for more than 30 days as a member of a reserve component of the Armed Forces of the United States.
- (1) For purposes of administering the grant program pursuant to subdivision (c), the commission shall do all of the following:
 - (1) Determine the number of grants to be awarded and the total amount awarded to each grant applicant.
 - (2) Require grant recipients to submit program and expenditure reports, as specified by the commission, as a condition of receiving grant funds.
 - (3) Annually review each grant recipient's program and expenditure reports to determine if any candidate has failed to meet their commitment pursuant to subdivision (j).
- (m) If the commission determines or is informed that a sponsored candidate failed to earn a preliminary credential or meet their commitment to teach pursuant to subdivision (j), the commission shall confirm with the grant recipient the applicable grant amount to be recovered from the candidate and the grant recipient. The amount to be recovered shall be adjusted proportionately to reflect the service provided if the candidate taught at least one year, but less than four years, at the sponsoring grant recipient.
- (n) Upon confirming the amount to be recovered from the grant recipient pursuant to subdivision (m), the commission shall notify the grant recipient of the amount to be repaid within 60 days. The grant recipient shall have 60 days from the date of the notification to make the required repayment to the commission. If the grant recipient fails to make the required payment within 60 days, the commission shall notify the Controller and the grant recipient of the failure to repay the amount owed. The Controller shall deduct an amount equal to the amount owed to the commission from the grant recipient's next principal apportionment or apportionments of state funds, other than basic aid apportionments required by Section 6 of Article IX of the California Constitution. If the grant recipient is a regional occupational center or program operated by a joint powers authority that does not receive a principal apportionment or apportionments of state funds, or a consortia of local educational agencies, the commission shall notify the Controller of the local educational agency where the candidate taught and the Controller shall deduct the amount owed from the applicable local educational agency's next principal apportionment or apportionments of state funds, other than basic aid apportionments required by Section 6 of Article IX of the California Constitution.
- (o) An amount recovered by the commission or deducted by the Controller pursuant to subdivision (n) shall be deposited into the Proposition 98 Reversion Account.
- (p) Grant recipients may recover from a sponsored candidate who fails to earn a preliminary credential or complete the period of placement the amount of grant funding invested in the candidate's residency

training. The amount to be recovered shall be adjusted proportionately to reflect the service provided if the candidate taught at least one year, but less than four years, at a school within the jurisdiction of the sponsoring grant recipient.

- (q) Grant recipients shall not charge a teacher resident a fee to participate in the Teacher Residency Grant Program.
- (r) (1) Notwithstanding subdivision (c), the commission may allocate up to twenty-five million dollars (\$25,000,000) of the amount appropriated pursuant to subdivision (b) to capacity grants that shall be awarded on a competitive basis to local educational agencies or consortia, as designated pursuant to this section, partnering with regionally accredited institutions of higher education to expand, strengthen, improve access to, or create teacher residency programs that lead to more credentialed teachers to teach either in shortage fields or in furtherance of subparagraph (B) of paragraph (1) of subdivision (c).
 - (2) (A) The commission shall determine the number of capacity grants to be awarded and the amount of the applicable grants.
 - (B) Individual capacity grants shall not exceed two hundred fifty thousand dollars (\$250,000) per grant recipient.
- (s) For purposes of making the computations required by Section 8 of Article XVI of the California Constitution, the appropriation made by subdivision (b) shall be deemed to be "General Fund revenues appropriated for school districts," as defined in subdivision (c) of Section 41202, for the 2020–21 fiscal year, and included within the "total allocations to school districts and community college districts from General Fund proceeds of taxes appropriated pursuant to Article XIII B," as defined in subdivision (e) of Section 41202, for the 2020–21 fiscal year.

SEC. 46.

Section 44417.5 is added to the Education Code, to read:

44417.5.

The commission shall conduct an evaluation of the Teacher Residency Grant Program described in Section 44415.5 to determine the effectiveness of this program in recruiting, developing support systems for, and retaining teachers prepared to teach either in commission-designated shortage areas or in furtherance of subparagraph (B) of paragraph (1) of subdivision (c) of Section 44415.5, and provide a report to the Department of Finance and the appropriate fiscal and policy committees of the Legislature on or before December 1, 2027.

Exhibit A

Task List and Timeline

(Supplied by Grantee, Question 3 of RFA Response)

Our teacher residency has a target number of 20 residents per year. Our recruitment efforts begin with advertising inside our schools and gathering referrals from our local communities. We seek especially to bring the Residency opportunity to our current Teaching Assistants and substitutes, who have often already met many of the prerequisites to join a teacher credentialing program, but for whom the cost of completing a full-year credentialing program is prohibitively high. In addition, we recruit through our community partner organizations, whose employees and volunteers are deeply immersed in our school communities. Our current Teaching Assistants, substitutes, community organization employees and volunteers often come from racial and cultural backgrounds that are similar to our students, and have affinities with our students. They have shown the commitment and investment in our students that is a foundation for their career as an educator.

The selection process for the Alder residency program is rigorous, and requires that candidates pass an application review and interview process with a panel prior to being invited to apply to Alder GSE. Alder staff and the Director of the Residency offer high-touch supports to ensure that candidates who are recruited and selected have access to the information they need to successfully enroll in the program. This includes regular contact including phone calls, emails and one-on-one conversations, as well as informational webinars and progress monitoring to ensure candidates have completed all needed requirements.

Once they do earn admission to Alder GSE, residents are supported to enroll in the program and immediately begin to process as a student teacher within LAUSD. Our teams work closely together to support new residents through this process.

GRANT AGREEMENT COMMISSION ON TEACHER CREDENTIALING

TERMS AND CONDITIONS OF GRANT

The Grantee shall be responsible for the performance of the work as set forth herein below and for the preparation of reports as specified in this Agreement. The Grantee's Project Representative shall promptly notify the State of events or proposed changes that could affect the Work Plan under this Agreement.

General Provisions

A. Definitions

- The term "Agreement" as used herein means a grant agreement between the State and Grantee specifying the payment of Grant Amount by the State for the performance of Work Plan within the Project Performance Period by the Grantee.
- 2. The term "Encumbrance" as used herein means a planned expenditure of grant funds.
- 3. The term "Grant Amount" as used herein means funds allocated to the Grantee in accordance with Education Code 44415.5.
- 4. The term "Grantee" as used herein means the party described as the Grantee on page one (1) of this Agreement.
- The term "Institutions of higher education" means the California State University, the University of California, and private regionally accredited institutions of higher education institutions that offer a commission-approved teacher preparation program.
- The term "Program" means the California Teacher Residency Implementation and Expansion Grant Program.
- 7. The term "Project" as used herein means the project described on page one (1) of this Agreement.
- 8. The term "Project Performance Period" as used herein means the period of time that the Grant Amount is available, and the time in which the Project must be complete, billed and paid as described on page one (1) of this Agreement.
- The term "Project Representative" as used herein means the person authorized by the Grantee to be responsible for the Project and can make daily management decisions.
- 10. The term "State" as used herein means the Commission on Teacher Credentialing.
- 11. The term "Teacher Residency Implementation and Expansion Grant Program" is a state grant program authorized under the provisions of EC §44415 and §44415.5 that provides funding for the development of teacher residency programs.
- 12. The term "Work Plan" means the residency pathway planning activities described in

the LEA's application and budget herein attached as exhibits A and B, and as approved by the State.

B. Project Execution

- Grantee agrees to complete the Project in accordance with the time of Project Performance Period, and under the terms and conditions of this Agreement. Extensions may be requested at least 90 days in advance of the date of termination and will be considered in the event of circumstances beyond the control of the Grantee, but in no event subsequent to the end of the Project Performance Period as identified in the Work Plan as the Project's date of completion.
- Grantee agrees to submit in writing any deviation from the approved grant application
 to the State for approval, prior to implementation of changes. The grantee may shift
 funds between approved budget categories. If the shift exceeds 10% of total grant funds,
 then approval to do so much be given by Commission staff.
- 3. Grantees will be expected to make appropriate yearly progress in implementing or expanding their residency model, resulting in an increase in the number of teacher resident candidates and according to the operational plan provided in the funded application. Awarded grantee LEAs are responsible for responding to the Commission's requirements for data collection, evaluation, and reporting. Grantees must submit reports annually to the Commission throughout the grant period. Applicants should note that as a condition of receipt of a grant, the LEA grantee must agree to report outcome data when reports are requested by Commission staff. Failure to comply with funding terms or reporting requirements could put future funding opportunities at risk.
- Grant funding may be subject to change when any unspent funds are reported in any annual reports.
- 5. The Teacher Residency Implementation and Expansion grant funding period, and the approved grant activities, may extend through June 30, 2026. For grantees who also apply for or have already been awarded other Teacher Residency grant funding, the grantee may continue to operate their Teacher Residency Implementation and Expansion Grant within the grant funding period and planned activities within the specified grant agreement. The funds in this grant agreement may be spent concurrently with previously awarded grant agreements until their respective cutoff dates to complete the planned activities described in the response to the selection criteria and as stated in the statute(s) in the grant agreement that authorizes funding.

C. Project Costs

Subject to the availability of Grant Amount in the Act, the State hereby grants to the Grantee an annual sum of money (Annual Grant Amount) not to exceed the amount stated on page one (1) of this Agreement in consideration of and on condition that the sum be expended in carrying out the purpose as set forth in the Work Plan and under the terms and conditions set forth in this Agreement. Grantee agrees to assume any obligation to furnish any additional funds that may be necessary to complete the Project. All costs accrued for services or supplies prior to the execution of Agreement are not eligible for reimbursement.

The Grant Amount to be provided to the Grantee, under this Agreement, may be disbursed as follows:

- 1. Upon approval of the application, the first payment will be 90 percent (90%) of the total annual budget amount projected for the first year of resident enrollment.
- The second payment will be 10 percent (10%) of the total annual budget amount
 projected for the first year of resident enrollment. The second payment will be provided
 to grantees after the program has completed its activities and submitted required annual
 reports to the Commission.
- 3. Subsequent Annual payments will be determined by calculating the program need based on the actual expenditures reported by the program from the previous fiscal year and the projected enrollment numbers submitted by the program for the following fiscal year. Annual awards will be disbursed in two payments following the 90 percent (90%)/10 percent (10%) model described above. Unspent funds reported on annual reports will be deducted from the next allotment of funds.
- Annual payments will not be released until the completed annual report from the previous fiscal year has been approved by Commission staff.
- Please note that the Commission fiscal department closes for the fiscal year in June of each year. Grants awarded or DocuSign forms signed in late May/June may not have funds disbursed until after July 1st of a given year.

D. Allowable Activities and Use of Funds

- 1. Assembly Bill (AB) 130 (Chapter 44, Statutes of 2021) provided the Commission with \$350 million for the Teacher Residency Grant Program, with up to \$325 million allocated to expansion and implementation grants that shall not exceed \$40,000 per teacher candidate in the residency program of the jurisdiction of the grant recipient. Per statute, the first \$25,000 per resident in grant funds must be matched by the grantee LEA or consortium on an eighty cents (\$.80) to one dollar (\$1) basis. Matching funds may be actual dollars or in-kind services. Funding is available through June 30, 2026.
- Grant funds may not be used to reimburse expenditures incurred prior to the start date of the project's "Performance Period," as indicated on the first page of this grant agreement.
- 3. Sample activities that can be funded through the Teacher Residency Implementation and Expansion Grants include but are not limited to expanding an existing LEA-IHE collaborative teacher residency to include any or all of the allowable designated shortage areas or diversification of the teacher workforce efforts described in the authorizing legislation.
- 4. The Grantee warrants by execution of this Agreement, that no person or selling agency has been employed or retained to solicit or secure this Agreement upon agreement or understanding for a commission, percentage, brokerage, or contingent fee, excepting bona fide employees or bona fide established commercial or selling agencies maintained by the Grantee for the purpose of securing business. For breach or violation of the warranty, the state shall, in addition to other remedies provided by law, have the right to annul this Agreement without liability, paying only for the value of the work

performed, or otherwise recover the full amount of such commission, percentage, brokerage, or contingent fee.

E. Payment Documentation

- Payment shall be made yearly for the annual grant amount, less 10% withholding to be released upon satisfactory completion of all required deliverables.
- Any overpayment of Grant Amount in excess of final project costs shall be returned to the State within 60 days of completion of the Project or the end of the Project Performance Period as shown on page one (1), whichever is earlier. Repayment of grant funds shall be made in accordance with subdivisions (n) and (o) of Education Code §44415.5.

F. Project Administration

- Grantee agrees to provide all technical and administrative services as needed for Agreement completion. Grantee agrees to monitor and review all work performed; and coordinate budgeting and scheduling to assure that the Agreement is completed within budget, on schedule, and in accordance with approved procedures, applicable laws, and regulations.
- Grantee ensures that the Agreement requirements are met through completion of annual reports, submitted to the State in accordance with the Work Plan and through regular communication with the State.
- Grantee agrees to promptly submit reports as the State has requested in this Agreement or may request during the life of this Agreement.
- The Grantee shall comply with the Drug-Free Workplace Act of 1990 (Government Code section 8350 et seq.), Government Code sections 12990(a-f) and CCR, Title 2, Section 8103 (nondiscrimination for non-public entities, and Public Contract Code section 10295.3 (domestic partners).

G. Project Termination

- Failure by the Grantee to comply with the terms of this Agreement or any other Agreement under the Act may be cause for suspension of all obligations of the State hereunder.
- Failure of the Grantee to comply with the terms of this Agreement shall not be cause for the suspension of all obligations of the State hereunder if in the judgment of the State such failure was due to no fault of the Grantee.
- 3. In such case, any amount required to settle at minimum cost any irrevocable obligations properly incurred shall be eligible for reimbursement under this Agreement.
- 4. Should the Grantee choose to terminate its participation in the program, a thirty (30)-day written notice is required. Final program and expenditure reports are due thirty (30) days after the program cessation. The Grantee agrees to return all unexpended funds within sixty (60) days of project cessation.

- 5. It is mutually agreed that if the Budget Act of the current year and/or any subsequent years covered under this Agreement does not appropriate sufficient funds for the program, this Agreement shall be of no further force and effect. In this event, the state shall have no liability to any funds to the Grantee, furnish any other consideration under this agreement, and the grantee shall not be obligated to perform any provisions of this Agreement.
- If funding for any fiscal year is reduced or deleted by the Budget Act for purposes of
 this program, the State shall have the option to either cancel this Agreement with no
 liability occurring to the State or offer an agreement amendment to the Grantee to reflect
 the changes.

H. Financial Records

- Expenditures shall comply with all applicable provisions of federal, state, and local rules, regulations and policies related to the administration, use, and accounting for public school funds, including but not limited to, the Education Code of the State of California.
- Grantee agrees to maintain satisfactory financial accounts, documents, and records for the Project and to make them available to the State for auditing at reasonable times. Grantee also agrees to retain such financial accounts, documents and records for three years following Project termination or completion.
- 3. Grantee agrees to use a generally accepted accounting system.

I. Audit

- Projects are subject to audit by the State for three years following the final payment of Grant Amount. The purpose of this audit is to verify that project expenditures were properly documented. Grantees will be contacted at least 30 days in advance of an audit.
- Audit will include all books, papers, accounts, documents, or other records of the Grantee, as they relate to the Project for which the State authorized Grant Amount. The Grantee shall have the Project records, including the sources documents and cancelled warrants, readily available to the State.
- The Grantee must also provide an employee having knowledge of the Project and the
 accounting procedure or system to assist the State's auditor. The Grantee shall provide
 a copy of any document, paper, record, or the like requested by the State.
- All Project records must be retained for at least one year following an audit or final disputed audit findings.

Budget Act Legislation

SEC. 46.

Section 44415.5 is amended in Education Code, to read:

Education Code §44415.5.

- (a) For purposes of this section, the following definitions apply for the Teacher Residency Grant Program:
- (1) "Experienced mentor teacher" means an educator who meets all of the following requirements:
 - (A) Has at least three years of teaching experience and holds a clear credential in the subject in which the mentor teacher will be mentoring. For programs leading to the issuance of new PK-3 early childhood education specialist credentials, the mentor teacher must have at least three years of teaching experience in prekindergarten, transitional kindergarten, kindergarten, or any of grades 1 to 3, inclusive, and hold a clear multiple subject credential.
 - (B) Has a record of successful teaching as demonstrated, at a minimum, by satisfactory annual performance evaluations for the preceding three years.
 - (C) Receives specific training for the mentor teacher role and engages in ongoing professional learning and networking with other mentors.
 - (D) Receives compensation, appropriate release time, or both, to serve as a mentor in the initial preparation or beginning teacher induction component of the teacher residency program.
 - (2) "Teacher residency program" is a grant applicant-based program that partners with one or more commission-approved teacher preparation programs offered by a regionally accredited institution of higher education in which a prospective teacher teaches at least one-half time alongside a teacher of record, who is designated as the experienced mentor teacher, for at least one full school year while engaging in initial preparation coursework.
- (b) (1) For the 2021–22 fiscal year, the sum of three hundred fifty million dollars (\$350,000,000) is hereby appropriated from the General Fund to the commission for the Teacher Residency Grant Program to support teacher residency programs that recruit and support the preparation of teachers pursuant to this section. This funding shall be available for encumbrance until June 30, 2026.
 - (2) Grant funding awarded pursuant to this section shall be expended by a grant recipient within five fiscal years of the fiscal year in which the grant was awarded.
- (c) (1) The commission shall make grants to applicants to establish new teacher residency programs, or expand, strengthen, or improve access to existing teacher residency programs that support either of the following:
 - (A) Designated shortage fields, including, but not limited to, special education, bilingual education, science, computer science, technology, engineering, mathematics, transitional kindergarten, or kindergarten, school counselors, and any other fields identified by the commission based on an annual analysis of state and regional hiring and vacancy data.

- (B) Local efforts to recruit, develop support systems for, provide outreach and communication strategies to, and retain a diverse teacher workforce that reflects a local educational agency community's diversity.
- (2) Grant recipients shall work with one or more commission-accredited teacher preparation programs and may work with other community partners or nonprofit organizations to develop and implement programs of preparation and mentoring for resident teachers who will be supported through program funds and subsequently employed by the sponsoring grant recipient.
- (3) A grant applicant may consist of one or more, or any combination, of the following:
 - (A) A school district.
 - (B) A county office of education.
 - (C) A charter school.
 - (D) A regional occupational center or program operated by a joint powers authority or a county office of education.
- (d) Grants allocated pursuant to subdivision (c) shall be up to forty thousand dollars \$40,000 per teacher candidate in the residency program of the jurisdiction of the grant recipient, matched by that grant recipient at a rate of 80 percent of the first twenty-five thousand dollars (\$25,000) of the grant amount received per participant, as described in subdivision (f). Residents are also eligible for other forms of federal, state, and local educational agency financial assistance to support the cost of their preparation. Grant program funding shall be used for, but is not limited to, any of the following:
 - (1) Teacher preparation costs.
 - (2) Stipends for mentor teachers, including, but not limited to, housing stipends.
 - (3) Residency program staff costs.
 - (4) Mentoring and beginning teacher induction costs following initial preparation.
 - (5) Compensation for residents.
- (e) A grant recipient shall not use more than 5 percent of a grant award for program administration costs.
- (f) A grant recipient shall provide a match of grant funding in the form of one or both of the following:
 - (1) Eighty cents (\$0.80) for every one dollar (\$1) of the first twenty-five thousand dollars (\$25,000) in grant funding received per participant, to be used in a manner consistent with allowable grant activities pursuant to subdivision (d).
 - (2) An in-kind match of program director personnel costs, mentor teacher personnel costs, resident compensation costs, or other personnel costs related to the Teacher Residency Grant Program, provided by the grant recipient.
- (g) Grant recipients shall do all of the following:
 - (1) Ensure that candidates are prepared to earn a preliminary teaching credential, including a PK-3 early childhood education specialist credential, in furtherance of paragraph (1) of subdivision (c) upon completion of the program.
 - (2) Ensure that candidates are provided instruction in all of the following:
 - (A) Teaching the content area or areas in which the teacher will become certified to teach.
 - (B) Planning, curriculum development, and assessment.
 - (C) Learning and child development.

- (D) Management of the classroom environment.
- (E) Use of culturally responsive practices supports for language development, and supports for serving pupils with disabilities.
- (F) Professional responsibilities, including interaction with families and colleagues.
- (3) Provide each candidate mentoring and beginning teacher induction support following the completion of the initial credential program necessary to obtain a clear credential and ongoing professional development and networking opportunities during the candidate's first years of teaching at no cost to the candidate.
- (4) Prepare candidates to teach in a school within the jurisdiction of the grant recipient in which they will work and learn the instructional initiatives and curriculum of the grant recipient.
- (5) Group teacher candidates in cohorts to facilitate professional collaboration among residents, and ensure candidates are enrolled in a teaching school or professional development program that is organized to support a high-quality teacher learning experience in a supportive work environment.
 - (6) (A) For grants awarded during and after the 2023–24 fiscal year, provide a minimum compensation package, which may include, but is not limited to, a living stipend or wages for employment of no less than twenty thousand dollars (\$20,000) per candidate. Nothing in this section precludes a grant recipient from providing a larger compensation package to candidates, and grant recipients are encouraged to provide a compensation package to residents that is similar to the grant recipient's compensation of school staff with comparable duties.
 - (B) To the extent a grant recipient received an award of up to twenty-five thousand dollars (\$25,000) per candidate before the 2023–24 fiscal year and is serving candidates during and after the 2023–24 school year with that award, and commits to providing the minimum compensation package to those candidates, the grant recipient may submit the number of those candidates and associated per-resident award to the commission for an additional per-resident allocation for a combined per-resident total of up to forty thousand dollars (\$40,000).
- (h) To receive a grant, an applicant shall submit an application to the commission at a time, in a manner, and containing information prescribed by the commission.
- (i) When selecting grant recipients, the commission shall do both of the following:
 - (1) Require applicants to demonstrate a need for teachers in one or more designated shortage fields or for the purposes described in subparagraph (B) of paragraph (1) of subdivision (c), and to propose to establish a new, or expand, strengthen, or improve access to an existing, teacher residency program that recruits, prepares, and supports teachers to teach in either one or more such fields or in furtherance of subparagraph (B) of paragraph (1) of subdivision (c) in a school within the jurisdiction of the sponsoring grant applicant.
 - (2) Give priority consideration to grant applicants who demonstrate a commitment to increasing diversity in the teaching workforce, have a higher percentage than other applicants of unduplicated pupils, as defined in Section 42238.02, and have one or more schools that exhibit one or both of the following characteristics:
 - (A) A school where 50 percent or more of the enrolled pupils are eligible for free or reduced-price meals.
 - (B) A school that is located in either a rural location or a densely populated region.

- (j) (1) A candidate in a teacher residency program sponsored by a grant provided pursuant to subdivision (c) shall agree in writing to serve in a school within the jurisdiction of the grant recipient that sponsored the candidate or another public school in California for a period of at least four school years beginning with the school year that begins after the candidate successfully completes the initial year of preparation and obtains a preliminary teaching credential, including a PK-3 early childhood education specialist credential. The candidate shall also commit in the written agreement to annually reporting to their sponsoring local educational agency where they are employed and their current contact information until they have completed their service requirement or eight years after completion of residency, whichever occurs first.
 - (2) A candidate shall have eight school years to complete the four-school-year teaching commitment.
 - (3) This subdivision shall apply to any current candidate or teacher that participates in a residency program under this section.
- (k) If a candidate is unable to complete a school year of teaching, that school year may still be counted toward the required four complete school years if any of the following occur:
 - (1) The candidate has completed at least one-half of the school year.
 - (2) The employer deems the candidate to have fulfilled their contractual requirements for the school year for the purposes of salary increases, probationary or permanent status, and retirement.
 - (3) The candidate was not able to teach due to the financial circumstances of the sponsoring grant recipient, including a decision to not reelect the employee for the succeeding school year.
 - (4) The candidate has a condition covered under the federal Family and Medical Leave Act of 1993 (29 U.S.C. Sec. 2061 et seq.) or similar state law.
 - (5) The candidate was called or ordered to active-duty status for more than 30 days as a member of a reserve component of the Armed Forces of the United States.
- (1) If a candidate is unable to complete their residency program or service requirement because of hardship, as defined by the commission, they may apply to waive any repayment obligation as described in subdivision (q).
- (m) For purposes of administering the grant program pursuant to subdivision (c), the commission shall do all of the following:
 - (1) Determine the number of grants to be awarded and the total amount awarded to each grant applicant.
 - (2) Require grant recipients to submit program and expenditure reports, as specified by the commission, as a condition of receiving grant funds.
 - (3) Annually review each grant recipient's program and expenditure reports to determine if any candidate has failed to meet their commitment pursuant to subdivision (j).
- (n) (1) If the commission is informed that more than 10 percent of sponsored candidates in a local educational agency's yearly program cohort failed to earn a preliminary credential or failed to meet their commitment to teach pursuant to subdivision (j), the commission shall confirm with the grant recipient the applicable grant amount to be recovered from the grant recipient based on the number of candidates who failed to earn a preliminary credential or meet their teaching commitment above a 10-percent attrition rate.
 - (2) The amount to be recovered shall be adjusted proportionately to reflect the service provided if the candidate taught at least one year, but less than four years, at a public school in California.

- (3) A candidate who obtains a waiver pursuant to subdivision (l) shall not count toward the 10-percent attrition rate.
- (o) Upon confirming the amount to be recovered from the grant recipient pursuant to subdivision (n), the commission shall notify the grant recipient of the amount to be repaid within 60 days. The grant recipient shall have 60 days from the date of the notification to make the required repayment to the commission. If the grant recipient fails to make the required payment within 60 days, the commission shall notify the Controller and the grant recipient of the failure to repay the amount owed. The Controller shall deduct an amount equal to the amount owed to the commission from the grant recipient's next principal apportionment or apportionments of state funds, other than basic aid apportionments required by Section 6 of Article IX of the California Constitution. If the grant recipient is a regional occupational center or program operated by a joint powers authority that does not receive a principal apportionment or apportionments of state funds, or a consortia of local educational agencies, the commission shall notify the Controller of the local educational agency where the candidate taught and the Controller shall deduct the amount owed from the applicable local educational agency's next principal apportionment or apportionments of state funds, other than basic aid apportionments required by Section 6 of Article IX of the California Constitution.
- (p) An amount recovered by the commission or deducted by the Controller pursuant to subdivision (o) shall be deposited into the Proposition 98 Reversion Account.
- (q) (1) Grant recipients may recover from a sponsored candidate who fails to earn a preliminary credential, or who fails to complete the period of placement, the amount of grant funding invested in the candidate's residency training. The amount to be recovered shall be adjusted proportionately to reflect the service provided if the candidate taught at least one year, but less than four years, at a public school in California.
 - (2) Costs considered as part of a candidate's residency training for purposes of this subdivision shall not include costs associated with a candidate's compensation package, mentor compensation, or overall program administration and shall be limited to costs incurred that are specific to that candidate, such as tuition and materials.
- (r) Grant recipients shall not charge a teacher resident a fee to participate in the Teacher Residency Grant Program.
- (s) (1) Notwithstanding subdivision (c), the commission may allocate up to twenty-five million dollars (\$25,000,000) of the amount appropriated pursuant to subdivision (b) to capacity grants that shall be awarded on a competitive basis to local educational agencies or consortia, as designated pursuant to this section, partnering with regionally accredited institutions of higher education to expand, strengthen, improve access to, or create teacher residency programs.
 - (2) (A) The commission shall determine the number of capacity grants to be awarded and the amount of the applicable grants.
 - (B) Individual capacity grants shall not exceed two hundred fifty thousand dollars (\$250,000) per grant recipient.
- (t) For purposes of making the computations required by Section 8 of Article XVI of the California Constitution, the appropriation made by subdivision (b) shall be deemed to be "General Fund revenues appropriated for school districts," as defined in subdivision (c) of Section 41202, for the 2020–21 fiscal year, and included within the "total allocations to school districts and community college districts from General Fund proceeds of taxes appropriated pursuant to Article XIII B," as defined in subdivision (e) of Section 41202, for the 2020–21 fiscal year.

SEC. 46.

Section 44417.5 is added to the Education Code, to read:

44417.5.

The commission shall conduct an evaluation of the Teacher Residency Grant Program described in Section 44415.5 to determine the effectiveness of this program in recruiting, developing support systems for, and retaining teachers prepared to teach either in commission-designated shortage areas or in furtherance of subparagraph (B) of paragraph (1) of subdivision (c) of Section 44415.5, and provide a report to the Department of Finance and the appropriate fiscal and policy committees of the Legislature on or before December 1, 2027.

Shared Vision for Residency & Financial Model

If funded, LAUSD, CSUDH and Teacher Village will engage in discussions to develop a shared vision statement for the residency. This vision will guide the residency program development and implementation and will be aligned to the institutional commitments of all organizations. In addition, LAUSD and CSUDH leadership will discuss the financial sustainability of the residency program within LAUSD's existing funding structures.

Resident Recruitment and Selection

To recruit fellows, Teacher Village hosts curated events that gather the target market and/or constituents who would refer potential Black men to the residency program. Recruiters attend HBCU back to school events, and homecoming activities with information tables sharing the opportunity to teach in Los Angeles. Teacher Village fellows will be recruited into the residency program to complete a teaching credential program at CSUDH.

In addition to Teacher Village fellows, interested candidates will be invited to information sessions that share the requirements to enter a teaching credential program and explain all aspects of the residency program.

The Teacher Village vetting process for fellows is measured by a rubric that has 9 competencies that ensures success while entering into the teaching profession. The following competencies are measured through an interview process: socially conscious, community oriented, equity minded, intelligent, flexible, invested in the Black community, invested in Los Angeles, desire to impact Black men, and advocate for social justice. These competencies will act as the foundation for developing selection criteria for residents. LAUSD hiring and CSUDH clinical practice evaluation criteria will also inform the development of section materials and protocols.

After candidates are selected to enter the residency program, they will be supported to apply to enter credential programs during the spring semester. After completing pre-service and co-requisite courses in the spring, residents will enter the fall semester as residents and will be placed with mentor teachers in classrooms for the entire school year. The goal is to recruit 2 cohorts of 10 residents to enter placements during the 2024-2025 and 2025-2026 school year.

Mentor Teacher Recruitment, Selection, and Initial Training

Capacity building activities will also include the careful selection and training of 10 mentor teachers within chosen school sites, who 1) possess the pedagogical content knowledge and skills to support residents in the credential area of their choice; 2) possess the dispositions to mentor residents to develop their own teaching practice; and 3) possess the qualifications required by the CTC,

including at least three years of K-12 teaching experience and a clear credential within candidates' content areas. If awarded, CSUDH and LAUSD will immediately engage in developing a shared vision of the knowledge, skills, and dispositions of an effective mentor teacher, which will include the commitment to support the cultural, social, and emotional aspects of Black teachers' development. This vision will be translated to selection criteria and protocols. Selection of mentor teachers will be completed by leadership within both organizations to ensure multiple perspectives are incorporated.

Prior to welcoming residents into their classrooms, selected mentor teachers will complete initial training held by TED faculty and the Teacher Village Director. Mentor teachers will be trained in culturally-affirming and community-based approaches to nurturing the development of African American teachers. This approach pays particular attention to Black men, many of whom must heal from trauma experienced in their lives and communities as they become teachers. Clinical coursework requirements and evaluation methods will also be woven into the training to ensure that mentor teachers understand how to leverage the evaluation of clinical practice requirements as support for development.

Cohort Model: Teacher Village and Monthly Convenings

New teachers often feel overwhelmed and isolated. For African Americans this is exacerbated by what former U.S. Secretary of Education John B. King Jr. calls an "invisible tax." This can take many forms such as the unconscious expectation by white school leaders that Black teachers will take the lead on disciplining Black students and be the experts on all issues related to cultural diversity.

These realities mean that many new teachers leave the profession before they have achieved a level of mastery that would sustain a long career, and this is especially true in high needs communities. The resulting impact falls most heavily on students of color who often face a treadmill of new teachers who rarely share their racial and cultural background, often are unqualified, and are likely to leave the profession within three years.

Residents will have the opportunity to choose their credential program based on their long-term career goals and passion for teaching within a specific content area. As a result, residents may not enroll in the same courses, yet they will still be cohorted based on the support they receive as Teacher Village fellows and/or monthly convenings with all residents and mentor teachers held in collaboration between the Teacher Village Director and TED faculty.

As a multifaceted multi-year program, the Teacher Village provides professional community, social connection, and housing for Black college graduates while they are earning their teaching credential. The program:

- Engages college seniors at HBCUs and local colleges in Los Angeles to encourage them to consider a career in education.
- Features a two-year Teacher Village Fellowship. After graduating from college, Fellows move
 into housing provided by the program, participate in a pre-service Summer Institute, and then
 work as teaching assistants under master teachers as they earn their teaching credential
 through our partnerships with the Los Angeles Unified School District (LAUSD) and the
 CSUDH credentialing programs. During year two, they complete their student teaching.
- Addresses the emotional, cultural, and soft skills development that are not the strength of the credentialing programs. The Village supplements those programs with additional workshops, professional mentoring, and peer support from within the cohort.

Provides housing until a new teacher is fully certified and has secured a teaching position. As
they near completion, Fellows will also be connected to workshops and resources for
first-time home owners and encouraged to work towards buying a home in the community.

If residents are not Teacher Village fellows, they will still be provided sustained support through monthly convenings. The convenings enable residents and mentor teachers the opportunity to build community, and engage in timely support.

GRANT AGREEMENT COMMISSION ON TEACHER CREDENTIALING

TERMS AND CONDITIONS OF GRANT

The Grantee shall be responsible for the performance of the work as set forth herein below and for the preparation of reports as specified in this Agreement. The Grantee's Project Representative shall promptly notify the State of events or proposed changes that could affect the Work Plan under this Agreement.

General Provisions

A. Definitions

- The term "Agreement" as used herein means a grant agreement between the State and Grantee specifying the payment of Grant Amount by the State for the performance of Work Plan within the Project Performance Period by the Grantee.
- 2. The term "Encumbrance" as used herein means a planned expenditure of grant funds.
- The term "Grant Amount" as used herein means funds allocated to the Grantee in accordance with Education Code 44415.5.
- 4. The term "Grantee" as used herein means the party described as the Grantee on page one (1) of this Agreement.
- The term "Institutions of higher education" means the California State University, the University of California, and private regionally accredited institutions of higher education institutions that offer a commission-approved teacher preparation program.
- The term "Program" means the California Teacher Residency Implementation and Expansion Grant Program.
- The term "Project" as used herein means the project described on page one (1) of this Agreement.
- 8. The term "Project Performance Period" as used herein means the period of time that the Grant Amount is available, and the time in which the Project must be complete, billed and paid as described on page one (1) of this Agreement.
- The term "Project Representative" as used herein means the person authorized by the Grantee to be responsible for the Project and can make daily management decisions.
- 10. The term "State" as used herein means the Commission on Teacher Credentialing.
- 11. The term "Teacher Residency Implementation and Expansion Grant Program" is a state grant program authorized under the provisions of EC §44415 and §44415.5 that provides funding for the development of teacher residency programs.
- 12. The term "Work Plan" means the residency pathway planning activities described in

the LEA's application and budget herein attached as exhibits A and B, and as approved by the State.

B. Project Execution

- Grantee agrees to complete the Project in accordance with the time of Project Performance Period, and under the terms and conditions of this Agreement. Extensions may be requested at least 90 days in advance of the date of termination and will be considered in the event of circumstances beyond the control of the Grantee, but in no event subsequent to the end of the Project Performance Period as identified in the Work Plan as the Project's date of completion.
- Grantee agrees to submit in writing any deviation from the approved grant application
 to the State for approval, prior to implementation of changes. The grantee may shift
 funds between approved budget categories. If the shift exceeds 10% of total grant funds,
 then approval to do so much be given by Commission staff.
- 3. Grantees will be expected to make appropriate yearly progress in implementing or expanding their residency model, resulting in an increase in the number of teacher resident candidates and according to the operational plan provided in the funded application. Awarded grantee LEAs are responsible for responding to the Commission's requirements for data collection, evaluation, and reporting. Grantees must submit reports annually to the Commission throughout the grant period. Applicants should note that as a condition of receipt of a grant, the LEA grantee must agree to report outcome data when reports are requested by Commission staff. Failure to comply with funding terms or reporting requirements could put future funding opportunities at risk.
- Grant funding may be subject to change when any unspent funds are reported in any annual reports.
- 5. The Teacher Residency Implementation and Expansion grant funding period, and the approved grant activities, may extend through June 30, 2026. For grantees who also apply for or have already been awarded other Teacher Residency grant funding, the grantee may continue to operate their Teacher Residency Implementation and Expansion Grant within the grant funding period and planned activities within the specified grant agreement. The funds in this grant agreement may be spent concurrently with previously awarded grant agreements until their respective cutoff dates to complete the planned activities described in the response to the selection criteria and as stated in the statute(s) in the grant agreement that authorizes funding.

C. Project Costs

Subject to the availability of Grant Amount in the Act, the State hereby grants to the Grantee an annual sum of money (Annual Grant Amount) not to exceed the amount stated on page one (1) of this Agreement in consideration of and on condition that the sum be expended in carrying out the purpose as set forth in the Work Plan and under the terms and conditions set forth in this Agreement. Grantee agrees to assume any obligation to furnish any additional funds that may be necessary to complete the Project. All costs accrued for services or supplies prior to the execution of Agreement are not eligible for reimbursement.

The Grant Amount to be provided to the Grantee, under this Agreement, may be disbursed as follows:

- Upon approval of the application, the first payment will be 90 percent (90%) of the total annual budget amount projected for the first year of resident enrollment.
- The second payment will be 10 percent (10%) of the total annual budget amount
 projected for the first year of resident enrollment. The second payment will be provided
 to grantees after the program has completed its activities and submitted required annual
 reports to the Commission.
- 3. Subsequent Annual payments will be determined by calculating the program need based on the actual expenditures reported by the program from the previous fiscal year and the projected enrollment numbers submitted by the program for the following fiscal year. Annual awards will be disbursed in two payments following the 90 percent (90%)/10 percent (10%) model described above. Unspent funds reported on annual reports will be deducted from the next allotment of funds.
- 4. Annual payments will not be released until the completed annual report from the previous fiscal year has been approved by Commission staff.
- Please note that the Commission fiscal department closes for the fiscal year in June of each year. Grants awarded or DocuSign forms signed in late May/June may not have funds disbursed until after July 1st of a given year.

D. Allowable Activities and Use of Funds

- 1. Assembly Bill (AB) 130 (Chapter 44, Statutes of 2021) provided the Commission with \$350 million for the Teacher Residency Grant Program, with up to \$325 million allocated to expansion and implementation grants that shall not exceed \$40,000 per teacher candidate in the residency program of the jurisdiction of the grant recipient. Per statute, the first \$25,000 per resident in grant funds must be matched by the grantee LEA or consortium on an eighty cents (\$.80) to one dollar (\$1) basis. Matching funds may be actual dollars or in-kind services. Funding is available through June 30, 2026.
- Grant funds may not be used to reimburse expenditures incurred prior to the start date of the project's "Performance Period," as indicated on the first page of this grant agreement.
- 3. Sample activities that can be funded through the Teacher Residency Implementation and Expansion Grants include but are not limited to expanding an existing LEA-IHE collaborative teacher residency to include any or all of the allowable designated shortage areas or diversification of the teacher workforce efforts described in the authorizing legislation.
- 4. The Grantee warrants by execution of this Agreement, that no person or selling agency has been employed or retained to solicit or secure this Agreement upon agreement or understanding for a commission, percentage, brokerage, or contingent fee, excepting bona fide employees or bona fide established commercial or selling agencies maintained by the Grantee for the purpose of securing business. For breach or violation of the warranty, the state shall, in addition to other remedies provided by law, have the right to annul this Agreement without liability, paying only for the value of the work

performed, or otherwise recover the full amount of such commission, percentage, brokerage, or contingent fee.

E. Payment Documentation

- Payment shall be made yearly for the annual grant amount, less 10% withholding to be released upon satisfactory completion of all required deliverables.
- Any overpayment of Grant Amount in excess of final project costs shall be returned to the State within 60 days of completion of the Project or the end of the Project Performance Period as shown on page one (1), whichever is earlier. Repayment of grant funds shall be made in accordance with subdivisions (n) and (o) of Education Code §44415.5.

F. Project Administration

- Grantee agrees to provide all technical and administrative services as needed for Agreement completion. Grantee agrees to monitor and review all work performed; and coordinate budgeting and scheduling to assure that the Agreement is completed within budget, on schedule, and in accordance with approved procedures, applicable laws, and regulations.
- Grantee ensures that the Agreement requirements are met through completion of annual reports, submitted to the State in accordance with the Work Plan and through regular communication with the State.
- 3. Grantee agrees to promptly submit reports as the State has requested in this Agreement or may request during the life of this Agreement.
- The Grantee shall comply with the Drug-Free Workplace Act of 1990 (Government Code section 8350 et seq.), Government Code sections 12990(a-f) and CCR, Title 2, Section 8103 (nondiscrimination for non-public entities, and Public Contract Code section 10295.3 (domestic partners).

G. Project Termination

- Failure by the Grantee to comply with the terms of this Agreement or any other Agreement under the Act may be cause for suspension of all obligations of the State hereunder.
- Failure of the Grantee to comply with the terms of this Agreement shall not be cause for the suspension of all obligations of the State hereunder if in the judgment of the State such failure was due to no fault of the Grantee.
- In such case, any amount required to settle at minimum cost any irrevocable obligations properly incurred shall be eligible for reimbursement under this Agreement.
- 4. Should the Grantee choose to terminate its participation in the program, a thirty (30)-day written notice is required. Final program and expenditure reports are due thirty (30) days after the program cessation. The Grantee agrees to return all unexpended funds within sixty (60) days of project cessation.

- 5. It is mutually agreed that if the Budget Act of the current year and/or any subsequent years covered under this Agreement does not appropriate sufficient funds for the program, this Agreement shall be of no further force and effect. In this event, the state shall have no liability to any funds to the Grantee, furnish any other consideration under this agreement, and the grantee shall not be obligated to perform any provisions of this Agreement.
- 6. If funding for any fiscal year is reduced or deleted by the Budget Act for purposes of this program, the State shall have the option to either cancel this Agreement with no liability occurring to the State or offer an agreement amendment to the Grantee to reflect the changes.

H. Financial Records

- Expenditures shall comply with all applicable provisions of federal, state, and local rules, regulations and policies related to the administration, use, and accounting for public school funds, including but not limited to, the Education Code of the State of California.
- Grantee agrees to maintain satisfactory financial accounts, documents, and records for the Project and to make them available to the State for auditing at reasonable times. Grantee also agrees to retain such financial accounts, documents and records for three years following Project termination or completion.
- 3. Grantee agrees to use a generally accepted accounting system.

I. Audit

- Projects are subject to audit by the State for three years following the final payment of Grant Amount. The purpose of this audit is to verify that project expenditures were properly documented. Grantees will be contacted at least 30 days in advance of an audit.
- Audit will include all books, papers, accounts, documents, or other records of the Grantee, as they relate to the Project for which the State authorized Grant Amount. The Grantee shall have the Project records, including the sources documents and cancelled warrants, readily available to the State.
- The Grantee must also provide an employee having knowledge of the Project and the accounting procedure or system to assist the State's auditor. The Grantee shall provide a copy of any document, paper, record, or the like requested by the State.
- All Project records must be retained for at least one year following an audit or final disputed audit findings.

Budget Act Legislation

SEC. 46.

Section 44415.5 is amended in Education Code, to read:

Education Code §44415.5.

- (a) For purposes of this section, the following definitions apply for the Teacher Residency Grant Program:
- (1) "Experienced mentor teacher" means an educator who meets all of the following requirements:
 - (A) Has at least three years of teaching experience and holds a clear credential in the subject in which the mentor teacher will be mentoring. For programs leading to the issuance of new PK-3 early childhood education specialist credentials, the mentor teacher must have at least three years of teaching experience in prekindergarten, transitional kindergarten, kindergarten, or any of grades 1 to 3, inclusive, and hold a clear multiple subject credential.
 - (B) Has a record of successful teaching as demonstrated, at a minimum, by satisfactory annual performance evaluations for the preceding three years.
 - (C) Receives specific training for the mentor teacher role and engages in ongoing professional learning and networking with other mentors.
 - (D) Receives compensation, appropriate release time, or both, to serve as a mentor in the initial preparation or beginning teacher induction component of the teacher residency program.
 - (2) "Teacher residency program" is a grant applicant-based program that partners with one or more commission-approved teacher preparation programs offered by a regionally accredited institution of higher education in which a prospective teacher teaches at least one-half time alongside a teacher of record, who is designated as the experienced mentor teacher, for at least one full school year while engaging in initial preparation coursework.
- (b) (1) For the 2021–22 fiscal year, the sum of three hundred fifty million dollars (\$350,000,000) is hereby appropriated from the General Fund to the commission for the Teacher Residency Grant Program to support teacher residency programs that recruit and support the preparation of teachers pursuant to this section. This funding shall be available for encumbrance until June 30, 2026.
 - (2) Grant funding awarded pursuant to this section shall be expended by a grant recipient within five fiscal years of the fiscal year in which the grant was awarded.
- (c) (1) The commission shall make grants to applicants to establish new teacher residency programs, or expand, strengthen, or improve access to existing teacher residency programs that support either of the following:
 - (A) Designated shortage fields, including, but not limited to, special education, bilingual education, science, computer science, technology, engineering, mathematics, transitional kindergarten, or kindergarten, school counselors, and any other fields identified by the commission based on an annual analysis of state and regional hiring and vacancy data.

- (B) Local efforts to recruit, develop support systems for, provide outreach and communication strategies to, and retain a diverse teacher workforce that reflects a local educational agency community's diversity.
- (2) Grant recipients shall work with one or more commission-accredited teacher preparation programs and may work with other community partners or nonprofit organizations to develop and implement programs of preparation and mentoring for resident teachers who will be supported through program funds and subsequently employed by the sponsoring grant recipient.
- (3) A grant applicant may consist of one or more, or any combination, of the following:
 - (A) A school district.
 - (B) A county office of education.
 - (C) A charter school.
 - (D) A regional occupational center or program operated by a joint powers authority or a county office of education.
- (d) Grants allocated pursuant to subdivision (c) shall be up to forty thousand dollars \$40,000 per teacher candidate in the residency program of the jurisdiction of the grant recipient, matched by that grant recipient at a rate of 80 percent of the first twenty-five thousand dollars (\$25,000) of the grant amount received per participant, as described in subdivision (f). Residents are also eligible for other forms of federal, state, and local educational agency financial assistance to support the cost of their preparation. Grant program funding shall be used for, but is not limited to, any of the following:
 - (1) Teacher preparation costs.
 - (2) Stipends for mentor teachers, including, but not limited to, housing stipends.
 - (3) Residency program staff costs.
 - (4) Mentoring and beginning teacher induction costs following initial preparation.
 - (5) Compensation for residents.
- (e) A grant recipient shall not use more than 5 percent of a grant award for program administration costs.
- (f) A grant recipient shall provide a match of grant funding in the form of one or both of the following:
 - (1) Eighty cents (\$0.80) for every one dollar (\$1) of the first twenty-five thousand dollars (\$25,000) in grant funding received per participant, to be used in a manner consistent with allowable grant activities pursuant to subdivision (d).
 - (2) An in-kind match of program director personnel costs, mentor teacher personnel costs, resident compensation costs, or other personnel costs related to the Teacher Residency Grant Program, provided by the grant recipient.
- (g) Grant recipients shall do all of the following:
 - (1) Ensure that candidates are prepared to earn a preliminary teaching credential, including a PK-3 early childhood education specialist credential, in furtherance of paragraph (1) of subdivision (c) upon completion of the program.
 - (2) Ensure that candidates are provided instruction in all of the following:
 - (A) Teaching the content area or areas in which the teacher will become certified to teach.
 - (B) Planning, curriculum development, and assessment.
 - (C) Learning and child development.

- (D) Management of the classroom environment.
- (E) Use of culturally responsive practices supports for language development, and supports for serving pupils with disabilities.
- (F) Professional responsibilities, including interaction with families and colleagues.
- (3) Provide each candidate mentoring and beginning teacher induction support following the completion of the initial credential program necessary to obtain a clear credential and ongoing professional development and networking opportunities during the candidate's first years of teaching at no cost to the candidate.
- (4) Prepare candidates to teach in a school within the jurisdiction of the grant recipient in which they will work and learn the instructional initiatives and curriculum of the grant recipient.
- (5) Group teacher candidates in cohorts to facilitate professional collaboration among residents, and ensure candidates are enrolled in a teaching school or professional development program that is organized to support a high-quality teacher learning experience in a supportive work environment.
 - (6) (A) For grants awarded during and after the 2023–24 fiscal year, provide a minimum compensation package, which may include, but is not limited to, a living stipend or wages for employment of no less than twenty thousand dollars (\$20,000) per candidate. Nothing in this section precludes a grant recipient from providing a larger compensation package to candidates, and grant recipients are encouraged to provide a compensation package to residents that is similar to the grant recipient's compensation of school staff with comparable duties.
 - (B) To the extent a grant recipient received an award of up to twenty-five thousand dollars (\$25,000) per candidate before the 2023–24 fiscal year and is serving candidates during and after the 2023–24 school year with that award, and commits to providing the minimum compensation package to those candidates, the grant recipient may submit the number of those candidates and associated per-resident award to the commission for an additional per-resident allocation for a combined per-resident total of up to forty thousand dollars (\$40,000).
- (h) To receive a grant, an applicant shall submit an application to the commission at a time, in a manner, and containing information prescribed by the commission.
- (i) When selecting grant recipients, the commission shall do both of the following:
 - (1) Require applicants to demonstrate a need for teachers in one or more designated shortage fields or for the purposes described in subparagraph (B) of paragraph (1) of subdivision (c), and to propose to establish a new, or expand, strengthen, or improve access to an existing, teacher residency program that recruits, prepares, and supports teachers to teach in either one or more such fields or in furtherance of subparagraph (B) of paragraph (1) of subdivision (c) in a school within the jurisdiction of the sponsoring grant applicant.
 - (2) Give priority consideration to grant applicants who demonstrate a commitment to increasing diversity in the teaching workforce, have a higher percentage than other applicants of unduplicated pupils, as defined in Section 42238.02, and have one or more schools that exhibit one or both of the following characteristics:
 - (A) A school where 50 percent or more of the enrolled pupils are eligible for free or reduced-price meals.
 - (B) A school that is located in either a rural location or a densely populated region.

- (j) (1) A candidate in a teacher residency program sponsored by a grant provided pursuant to subdivision (c) shall agree in writing to serve in a school within the jurisdiction of the grant recipient that sponsored the candidate or another public school in California for a period of at least four school years beginning with the school year that begins after the candidate successfully completes the initial year of preparation and obtains a preliminary teaching credential, including a PK-3 early childhood education specialist credential. The candidate shall also commit in the written agreement to annually reporting to their sponsoring local educational agency where they are employed and their current contact information until they have completed their service requirement or eight years after completion of residency, whichever occurs first.
 - (2) A candidate shall have eight school years to complete the four-school-year teaching commitment.
 - (3) This subdivision shall apply to any current candidate or teacher that participates in a residency program under this section.
- (k) If a candidate is unable to complete a school year of teaching, that school year may still be counted toward the required four complete school years if any of the following occur:
 - (1) The candidate has completed at least one-half of the school year.
 - (2) The employer deems the candidate to have fulfilled their contractual requirements for the school year for the purposes of salary increases, probationary or permanent status, and retirement.
 - (3) The candidate was not able to teach due to the financial circumstances of the sponsoring grant recipient, including a decision to not reelect the employee for the succeeding school year.
 - (4) The candidate has a condition covered under the federal Family and Medical Leave Act of 1993 (29 U.S.C. Sec. 2061 et seq.) or similar state law.
 - (5) The candidate was called or ordered to active-duty status for more than 30 days as a member of a reserve component of the Armed Forces of the United States.
- (1) If a candidate is unable to complete their residency program or service requirement because of hardship, as defined by the commission, they may apply to waive any repayment obligation as described in subdivision (q).
- (m) For purposes of administering the grant program pursuant to subdivision (c), the commission shall do all of the following:
 - (1) Determine the number of grants to be awarded and the total amount awarded to each grant applicant.
 - (2) Require grant recipients to submit program and expenditure reports, as specified by the commission, as a condition of receiving grant funds.
 - (3) Annually review each grant recipient's program and expenditure reports to determine if any candidate has failed to meet their commitment pursuant to subdivision (j).
- (n) (1) If the commission is informed that more than 10 percent of sponsored candidates in a local educational agency's yearly program cohort failed to earn a preliminary credential or failed to meet their commitment to teach pursuant to subdivision (j), the commission shall confirm with the grant recipient the applicable grant amount to be recovered from the grant recipient based on the number of candidates who failed to earn a preliminary credential or meet their teaching commitment above a 10-percent attrition rate.
 - (2) The amount to be recovered shall be adjusted proportionately to reflect the service provided if the candidate taught at least one year, but less than four years, at a public school in California.

- (3) A candidate who obtains a waiver pursuant to subdivision (1) shall not count toward the 10-percent attrition rate.
- (o) Upon confirming the amount to be recovered from the grant recipient pursuant to subdivision (n), the commission shall notify the grant recipient of the amount to be repaid within 60 days. The grant recipient shall have 60 days from the date of the notification to make the required repayment to the commission. If the grant recipient fails to make the required payment within 60 days, the commission shall notify the Controller and the grant recipient of the failure to repay the amount owed. The Controller shall deduct an amount equal to the amount owed to the commission from the grant recipient's next principal apportionment or apportionments of state funds, other than basic aid apportionments required by Section 6 of Article IX of the California Constitution. If the grant recipient is a regional occupational center or program operated by a joint powers authority that does not receive a principal apportionment or apportionments of state funds, or a consortia of local educational agencies, the commission shall notify the Controller of the local educational agency where the candidate taught and the Controller shall deduct the amount owed from the applicable local educational agency's next principal apportionment or apportionments of state funds, other than basic aid apportionments required by Section 6 of Article IX of the California Constitution.
- (p) An amount recovered by the commission or deducted by the Controller pursuant to subdivision (o) shall be deposited into the Proposition 98 Reversion Account.
- (q) (1) Grant recipients may recover from a sponsored candidate who fails to earn a preliminary credential, or who fails to complete the period of placement, the amount of grant funding invested in the candidate's residency training. The amount to be recovered shall be adjusted proportionately to reflect the service provided if the candidate taught at least one year, but less than four years, at a public school in California.
 - (2) Costs considered as part of a candidate's residency training for purposes of this subdivision shall not include costs associated with a candidate's compensation package, mentor compensation, or overall program administration and shall be limited to costs incurred that are specific to that candidate, such as tuition and materials.
- (r) Grant recipients shall not charge a teacher resident a fee to participate in the Teacher Residency Grant Program.
- (s) (1) Notwithstanding subdivision (c), the commission may allocate up to twenty-five million dollars (\$25,000,000) of the amount appropriated pursuant to subdivision (b) to capacity grants that shall be awarded on a competitive basis to local educational agencies or consortia, as designated pursuant to this section, partnering with regionally accredited institutions of higher education to expand, strengthen, improve access to, or create teacher residency programs.
 - (2) (A) The commission shall determine the number of capacity grants to be awarded and the amount of the applicable grants.
 - (B) Individual capacity grants shall not exceed two hundred fifty thousand dollars (\$250,000) per grant recipient.
- (t) For purposes of making the computations required by Section 8 of Article XVI of the California Constitution, the appropriation made by subdivision (b) shall be deemed to be "General Fund revenues appropriated for school districts," as defined in subdivision (c) of Section 41202, for the 2020–21 fiscal year, and included within the "total allocations to school districts and community college districts from General Fund proceeds of taxes appropriated pursuant to Article XIII B," as defined in subdivision (e) of Section 41202, for the 2020–21 fiscal year.

SEC. 46.

Section 44417.5 is added to the Education Code, to read:

44417.5.

The commission shall conduct an evaluation of the Teacher Residency Grant Program described in Section 44415.5 to determine the effectiveness of this program in recruiting, developing support systems for, and retaining teachers prepared to teach either in commission-designated shortage areas or in furtherance of subparagraph (B) of paragraph (1) of subdivision (c) of Section 44415.5, and provide a report to the Department of Finance and the appropriate fiscal and policy committees of the Legislature on or before December 1, 2027.

3. The Teacher Residency Program to be Implemented

Our transformation model seeks to effectively train 165 new Special Education, Multiple Subject, and Single Subject teachers to successfully obtain licensure over the life of the grant. LAUTR-CC intends to recruit, select, train, and graduate diverse cohorts of teachers specifically picked to serve in this partner district's high-needs schools and areas. Candidates will utilize VSorts™ to establish a baseline of their cultural competence for Multi-Language Speakers, SpEd, and STEM within the PreK-12 schooling context upon acceptance. These candidates come from targeted recruitment of both recent college graduates and mid-career changers who have a strong content background. LAUTR-CC has set a goal of having 67% of all Residents be candidates of color. As a Hispanic Serving Institution, and the selected District demographic data reflects the shared belief that teachers within every school & district should be representative of the cultural, racial-ethnic, and language backgrounds of the students they teach. We will target recruitment from other Hispanic Serving Institutions and Historically Black Colleges for California natives that want to help transform their communities.

LAUTR-CC will focus on recruiting soon-to-be and recent college graduates in the top third of their graduating class and continue to work with our Community College Partners (East LA College, Rio Hondo College) to feed identified students into our existing teacher pipelines (Urban Learning Program [Cal State LA's Undergraduate Education Major that is blended with a credential], Liberal Studies, Natural Science, Mathematics).

We will also partner with Career Service Centers at select colleges (including HBCU's and other MSI's) to recruit STEM and Liberal Studies[1] seniors, pathway programs at two Community Colleges to "Grow Our Own" as well as mid-career changers with strong subject matter backgrounds, with strong interpersonal skills and a commitment to serve the targeted communities.

The partnership has identified the following criteria that all applicants must fulfill: (1) able to articulate a philosophy of education grounded in equity and social justice; (2) strong content background; (3) evidence of working collaboratively; (4) service to the community; (5) grasp of data-based inquiry; (6) an assets-based orientation to family and community; (7) effective communication skills; (8) completion of a Bachelor's degree with at least a 2.75 GPA; and (8) commitment to three years of teaching in LAUSD or PUSD upon certification.

As mentioned before, the admission date for residents occurs during the term when they apply for and are successfully admitted into the program. Enrollment begins in the subsequent term (Summer, Fall, Spring) after formal acceptance to the university, college and program for which they have applied. However, the clinical practice start date for residents begins at the onset of the Cal State LA Fall semester (mid-August) and will finish at the end of the Cal State LA Spring semester (mid-May), regardless of when they are formally admitted. Our first cohort for this grant will begin in the Fall of 2024.

Our previous iteration of LAUTR included Single Subject Math or Science and Special Education with an emphasis in STEM. LAUTR-CC will contain three unique pathways into the teaching profession: The STEM pathway which includes Mathematics, Engineering and Science (single subject credential areas include Physics, Chemistry, and Biology) Single Subject Credentials, an Educational Specialist Credential (Mild-Moderate Support Needs, Extensive Support Needs, or Visual Impairments), and a Multiple Subject pathway with a Bilingual Added Authorization (BAA) in Spanish or Mandarin.

The Los Angeles Urban Teacher Residency program was launched in 2009 with a focus on

training STEM Teachers. In 2014, the LAUTR program added an emphasis on training Educational Specialists - Mild-to-Moderate Support Needs. This application will expand the educational specialist pathway and will look at Elementary teachers (especially those who will be entering into bilingual classrooms. The efforts outlined in this proposal are meant to supplement the ongoing efforts to maximize the viability of the residency pathway and do not supplant any components

The LAUTR program has 43 mentor teachers in Special Education and 29 STEM mentor teachers that make up the current pool of mentors. Our current pool of STEM teachers should be sufficient, especially since we have a number of graduates that are still teaching in the classroom who would now qualify as a mentor teacher. We will be looking for 12 Special Education teachers across multiple focus areas. We will be recruiting new teachers in the field of Extensive Support Needs and Visual Impairments. We will also be recruiting 10 new Multiple subjects teachers.

In collaboration with LAUSD and school site administrators, LAUTR will work to identify potential teachers in STEM, bilingual education, and special education who are committed to mentoring preservice teachers. LAUTR does have a current database with which to access past mentors. This database requires continuous updating as mentors are added as we vet and identify new mentors or deleted when they take on new roles within the district outside of the classroom and/or retire.

The LAUTR-CC program involves culturally sustaining pedagogical practices (Alim & Paris, 2019) rooted in the communities that the residents are serving. These pedagogical practices are vetted with the mentor to evaluate the mentor's readiness to coach and develop the resident and identify needs and strategies for development of the mentor's capacity to deliver quality coaching. LAUTR-CC purposefully positions the Mentor as a learner to help the residents see a model for practice-based growth. This is especially powerful when the mentor is trained and experienced, but also embraces the role of lifelong learning.

We will coordinate our mentor training program with the Student Learning outcomes from a course in the Educational Administration Credential program (EDAD 5065 – Instructional Leadership) at Cal State LA. This will give mentor teachers an introduction to leadership in the school and at the same time, will provide them with an entry path into the administrative credential program. In addition, we will begin exploring a micro-credential in teacher leadership and coaching.

LAUTR-CC will have a rigorous and competitive process for selecting mentors within LAUSD partner schools. Selection criteria will include: (1) an education philosophy grounded in equity; (2) strong content background; (3) evidence of effective planning and differentiated instructional practice; (4) an ability to articulate teaching "moves," (5) exemplary use of data-based inquiry and formative assessments to inform instruction; (6) evidence of ability to lead and collaborate with others; (7) demonstration of alignment with LAUTR-CC's Dispositional Assessment (RT 360); (8) evidence of work with parents and community; (9) demonstration of effective communication skills; (10) a minimum of three years of teaching experience; (11) possession of a Clear Credential[1]; and (12) a strong endorsement from his/her school principal who may be able to relieve the mentor of some duties as a result of the added responsibilities.

The selection process will include review of application materials, interviews, classroom observations and/or videotapes of classroom instruction, and review of lesson/unit plans. Mentors will be required to participate in district sponsored Mentor Training that is led by the District's Human Resources department. LAUTR-CC will then lead 3-hour monthly follow-up sessions during the

year, some of which are aligned with resident seminars to ensure that the program is capitalizing on learning opportunities. A ready pool of quality mentors already exists in the target districts who were trained during the second cycle of LAUTR which is anticipated to ease the first year of mentor professional development and mentor selection.

The Mentor and Supervisor Training and Support Program -All LAUTR-CC mentors and university supervisors will participate in California's CTC-required training for those who coach student teachers. This Intersegmental Project developed by the California Council on Teacher Education in collaboration with the CEEDAR Center consists of eight hours of professional development on three key areas: 1) coaching adult learners (i.e., adult learning principles, learning focused relationships, maximizing time and attention, applying verbal tools to invite thinking); 2) instructional strategies for all learners (i.e., elements of effective lesson design, managing instructional environments, classroom technology integration); 3) improve the application of subject matter or content knowledge; and 4) inclusive education (i.e., Multi-Tier Systems of Support, Universal Design for Learning, differentiated instruction).

LAUTR-CC will develop and deliver supplemental training in mentoring competencies and skills necessary for California residency programs that promote teacher leadership (Criswell, B. A., et al., 2018) and data inquiry (Nava, I., et al., 2019). Training will be aligned to the following two frameworks:

- The California Administrator Performance Expectations (CAPE): student centered vision, vision planning and implementation, professional learning culture, curriculum and instruction, assessment and accountability, reflective practice, and ethical decision making). The content, assignments, and assessments described in the EDAD 5065: Instructional Leadership course syllabus are aligned to the CAPEs, which will be adapted for the LAUTR mentor training scope and sequence.
- Dispositions, beliefs, attitudes, and values about teaching, learning, and leadership that
 constitute a "teacher leadership stance". Poekert et al. (2016) described teacher leadership
 as "a stance that is responsive to the needs of...students and motivates... colleagues toward
 improving their performance" (p. 325). A teacher-leadership stance is grounded in three
 assumptions: a) teaching is a profession, b) teaching is a political act, and c) teaching is a
 collaborative process. (Smulyan, 2016).

Cal State LA, in partnership with LAUSD received a stipend from the California Resident Lab in early 2020 for the development of online mentor training modules. The four-part training modules focus on co-teaching methods in general education-special education teacher partnerships and mentor-resident pairs. Mentors also strengthen their integration of UDL and differentiation strategies in co-teaching for K-12 STEM and ELA classrooms. The training modules support four data inquiry cycles focused on key Teacher Performance Expectations for resident practice. Mentor-resident conversations center on gathering data on student strengths and learning gaps (co-planning), pedagogical approaches for diverse learners (co-teaching), protocols for assessing student and teacher work (co-assessing), and peer observations, feedback, and reflection.

This comprehensive training and support for LAUTR mentors demonstrates how consistency and coherence will be assured across multiple school sites, content areas, and school administrations within the district.

The coursework for the LAUTR program was developed in collaboration with LAUSD as part of a Curriculum Committee that looked at program redundancies, while explicitly tying the field experience with the coursework.

GRANT AGREEMENT COMMISSION ON TEACHER CREDENTIALING

TERMS AND CONDITIONS OF GRANT

The Grantee shall be responsible for the performance of the work as set forth herein below and for the preparation of reports as specified in this Agreement. The Grantee's Project Representative shall promptly notify the State of events or proposed changes that could affect the Work Plan under this Agreement.

General Provisions

A. Definitions

- The term "Agreement" as used herein means a grant agreement between the State and Grantee specifying the payment of Grant Amount by the State for the performance of Work Plan within the Project Performance Period by the Grantee.
- 2. The term "Encumbrance" as used herein means a planned expenditure of grant funds.
- The term "Grant Amount" as used herein means funds allocated to the Grantee in accordance with Education Code 44415.5.
- 4. The term "Grantee" as used herein means the party described as the Grantee on page one (1) of this Agreement.
- The term "Institutions of higher education" means the California State University, the University of California, and private regionally accredited institutions of higher education institutions that offer a commission-approved teacher preparation program.
- The term "Program" means the California Teacher Residency Implementation Grant Program.
- The term "Project" as used herein means the project described on page one (1) of this Agreement.
- 8. The term "Project Performance Period" as used herein means the period of time that the Grant Amount is available, and the time in which the Project must be complete, billed and paid as described on page one (1) of this Agreement.
- 9. The term "Project Representative" as used herein means the person authorized by the Grantee to be responsible for the Project and can make daily management decisions.
- 10. The term "State" as used herein means the Commission on Teacher Credentialing.
- 11. The term "Teacher Residency Implementation Grant Program" is a state grant program authorized under the provisions of EC §44415 and §44415.5 that provides funding for the development of teacher residency programs.
- 12. The term "Work Plan" means the residency pathway planning activities described in

the LEA's application and budget herein attached as exhibits A and B, and as approved by the State.

B. Project Execution

- Grantee agrees to complete the Project in accordance with the time of Project Performance Period, and under the terms and conditions of this Agreement. Extensions may be requested at least 90 days in advance of the date of termination and will be considered in the event of circumstances beyond the control of the Grantee, but in no event subsequent to the end of the Project Performance Period as identified in the Work Plan as the Project's date of completion.
- 2. Grantee agrees to submit in writing any deviation from the approved grant application to the State for approval, prior to implementation of changes.
- 3. Grantees will be expected to make appropriate yearly progress in implementing their expanded residency model, resulting in an increase in the number of teacher resident candidates and according to the operational plan provided in the funded application. Applicants should note that as a condition of receipt of a grant, the LEA grantee must agree to report outcome data when reports are requested by Commission staff. Failure to comply with funding terms or reporting requirements could put future funding opportunities at risk.
- Grant funding may be subject to change when any unspent funds are reported in any annual reports.
- 5. The Teacher Residency Implementation grant funding period, and the approved grant activities, may extend through June 30, 2026. For grantees who also apply for or have already been awarded other Teacher Residency grant funding, the grantee may continue to operate their Teacher Residency Implementation Grant within the grant funding period and planned activities within the specified grant agreement. The funds in this grant agreement may be spent concurrently with previously awarded grant agreements until their respective cutoff dates to complete the planned activities described in the response to the selection criteria and as stated in the statute(s) in the grant agreement that authorizes funding.

C. Project Costs

Subject to the availability of Grant Amount in the Act, the State hereby grants to the Grantee an annual sum of money (Annual Grant Amount) not to exceed the amount stated on page one (1) of this Agreement in consideration of and on condition that the sum be expended in carrying out the purpose as set forth in the Work Plan and under the terms and conditions set forth in this Agreement. Grantee agrees to assume any obligation to furnish any additional funds that may be necessary to complete the Project. All costs accrued for services or supplies prior to the execution of Agreement are not eligible for reimbursement.

The Grant Amount to be provided to the Grantee, under this Agreement, may be disbursed as follows:

 Upon approval of the application, the first payment will be 90 percent (90%) of the total annual budget amount projected for the first year of resident enrollment.

- The second payment will be 10 percent (10%) of the total annual budget amount
 projected for the first year of resident enrollment. The second payment will be provided
 to grantees after the program has completed its activities and submitted required annual
 reports to the Commission.
- 3. Subsequent Annual payments will be determined by calculating the program need based on the actual expenditures reported by the program from the previous fiscal year and the projected enrollment numbers submitted by the program for the following fiscal year. Annual awards will be disbursed in two payments following the 90 percent (90%)/10 percent (10%) model described above. Unspent funds reported on annual reports will be deducted from the next allotment of funds.
- Annual payments will not be released until the completed annual report from the previous fiscal year has been approved by Commission staff.

D. Allowable Activities and Use of Funds

- 1. Assembly Bill (AB) 130 (Chapter 44, Statutes of 2021) provided the Commission with \$350 million for the Teacher Residency Grant Program, with up to \$325 million allocated to expansion and implementation grants that shall not exceed \$25,000 per teacher candidate in the residency program of the jurisdiction of the grant recipient. Per statute, the grant funds must be matched by the grantee LEA or consortium on an eighty cents (\$.80) to one dollar (\$1) basis. Matching funds may be actual dollars or in-kind services. Funding is available through June 30, 2026.
- Sample activities that can be funded through the Teacher Residency Implementation
 Grants include but are not limited to implementing or expanding an existing LEA-IHE
 collaborative teacher residency to include any or all of the allowable designated
 shortage areas or diversification of the teacher workforce efforts described in the
 authorizing legislation.
- 3. The Grantee warrants by execution of this Agreement, that no person or selling agency has been employed or retained to solicit or secure this Agreement upon agreement or understanding for a commission, percentage, brokerage, or contingent fee, excepting bona fide employees or bona fide established commercial or selling agencies maintained by the Grantee for the purpose of securing business. For breach or violation of the warranty, the state shall, in addition to other remedies provided by law, have the right to annul this Agreement without liability, paying only for the value of the work performed, or otherwise recover the full amount of such commission, percentage, brokerage, or contingent fee.

E. Payment Documentation

- 1. Payment shall be made yearly for the annual grant amount, less 10% withholding to be released upon satisfactory completion of all required deliverables.
- Any overpayment of Grant Amount in excess of final project costs shall be returned to the State within 60 days of completion of the Project or the end of the Project Performance Period as shown on page one (1), whichever is earlier.

F. Project Administration

- Grantee agrees to provide all technical and administrative services as needed for Agreement completion. Grantee agrees to monitor and review all work performed; and coordinate budgeting and scheduling to assure that the Agreement is completed within budget, on schedule, and in accordance with approved procedures, applicable laws, and regulations.
- Grantee ensures that the Agreement requirements are met through completion of annual reports, submitted to the State in accordance with the Work Plan and through regular communication with the State.
- Grantee agrees to promptly submit reports as the State has requested in this Agreement or may request during the life of this Agreement.
- The Grantee shall comply with the Drug-Free Workplace Act of 1990 (Government Code section 8350 et seq.), Government Code sections 12990(a-f) and CCR, Title 2, Section 8103 (nondiscrimination for non-public entities, and Public Contract Code section 10295.3 (domestic partners).

G. Project Termination

- Failure by the Grantee to comply with the terms of this Agreement or any other Agreement under the Act may be cause for suspension of all obligations of the State hereunder.
- Failure of the Grantee to comply with the terms of this Agreement shall not be cause for the suspension of all obligations of the State hereunder if in the judgment of the State such failure was due to no fault of the Grantee.
- In such case, any amount required to settle at minimum cost any irrevocable obligations properly incurred shall be eligible for reimbursement under this Agreement.
- 4. Should the Grantee choose to terminate its participation in the program, a thirty (30)-day written notice is required. Final program and expenditure reports are due thirty (30) days after the program cessation. The Grantee agrees to return all unexpended funds within sixty (60) days of project cessation.
- 5. It is mutually agreed that if the Budget Act of the current year and/or any subsequent years covered under this Agreement does not appropriate sufficient funds for the program, this Agreement shall be of no further force and effect. In this event, the state shall have no liability to any funds to the Grantee, furnish any other consideration under this agreement, and the grantee shall not be obligated to perform any provisions of this Agreement.
- 6. If funding for any fiscal year is reduced or deleted by the Budget Act for purposes of this program, the State shall have the option to either cancel this Agreement with no liability occurring to the State or offer an agreement amendment to the Grantee to reflect the changes.

H. Financial Records

- Expenditures shall comply with all applicable provisions of federal, state, and local rules, regulations and policies related to the administration, use, and accounting for public school funds, including but not limited to, the Education Code of the State of California.
- Grantee agrees to maintain satisfactory financial accounts, documents, and records for the Project and to make them available to the State for auditing at reasonable times. Grantee also agrees to retain such financial accounts, documents and records for three years following Project termination or completion.
- 3. Grantee agrees to use a generally accepted accounting system.

I. Audit

- Projects are subject to audit by the State for three years following the final payment of Grant Amount. The purpose of this audit is to verify that project expenditures were properly documented. Grantees will be contacted at least 30 days in advance of an audit.
- Audit will include all books, papers, accounts, documents, or other records of the Grantee, as they relate to the Project for which the State authorized Grant Amount. The Grantee shall have the Project records, including the sources documents and cancelled warrants, readily available to the State.
- The Grantee must also provide an employee having knowledge of the Project and the accounting procedure or system to assist the State's auditor. The Grantee shall provide a copy of any document, paper, record, or the like requested by the State.
- All Project records must be retained for at least one year following an audit or final disputed audit findings.

2021-22 Budget Act Legislation

Section 45:

Section 44415.5 is added to the Education Code, to read:

44415.5.

- (a) For purposes of this section, the following definitions apply for the Teacher Residency Grant Program:
 - "Experienced mentor teacher" means an educator who meets all the following requirements:

 (A) Has at least three years of teaching experience and holds a clear credential in the subject in which the mentor teacher will be mentoring.
 - (B) Has a record of successful teaching as demonstrated, at a minimum, by satisfactory annual performance evaluations for the preceding three years.
 - (C) Receives specific training for the mentor teacher role and engages in ongoing professional learning and networking with other mentors.

- (D) Receives compensation, appropriate release time, or both, to serve as a mentor in the initial preparation or beginning teacher induction component of the teacher residency program.
- (2) "Teacher residency program" is a grant applicant-based program that partners with one or more commission-approved teacher preparation programs offered by a regionally accredited institution of higher education in which a prospective teacher teaches at least one-half time alongside a teacher of record, who is designated as the experienced mentor teacher, for at least one full school year while engaging in initial preparation coursework.
- (b) For the 2021–22 fiscal year, the sum of three hundred fifty million dollars (\$350,000,000) is hereby appropriated from the General Fund to the commission for the Teacher Residency Grant Program to support teacher residency programs that recruit and support the preparation of teachers pursuant to this section. This funding shall be available for encumbrance until June 30, 2026.
- (c) (1) The commission shall make one-time grants to grant applicants to establish new teacher residency programs, or expand, strengthen, or improve access to existing teacher residency programs that support either of the following:
 - (A) Designated shortage fields, including special education, bilingual education, science, computer science, technology, engineering, mathematics, transitional kindergarten, or kindergarten, and any other fields identified by the commission based on an annual analysis of hiring and vacancy data.
 - (B) Local efforts to recruit, develop support systems for, provide outreach and communication strategies to, and retain a diverse teacher workforce that reflects a local educational agency community's diversity.
 - (2) Grant recipients shall work with one or more commission-accredited teacher preparation programs and may work with other community partners or nonprofit organizations to develop and implement programs of preparation and mentoring for resident teachers who will be supported through program funds and subsequently employed by the sponsoring grant recipient.
 - (3) A grant applicant may consist of one or more, or any combination, of the following:
 - (A) A school district.
 - (B) A county office of education.
 - (C) A charter school.
 - (D) A regional occupational center or program operated by a joint powers authority or a county office of education.
- (d) Grants allocated pursuant to subdivision (c) shall be up to twenty-five thousand dollars (\$25,000) per teacher candidate in the residency program of the jurisdiction of the grant recipient, matched by that grant recipient at a rate of 80 percent of the grant amount received per participant, as described in subdivision (f). Residents are also eligible for other forms of federal, state, and local educational agency financial assistance to support the cost of their preparation. Grant program funding shall be used for, but is not limited to, any of the following:
 - (1) Teacher preparation costs.
 - (2) Stipends for mentor teachers, including, but not limited to, housing stipends.
 - (3) Residency program staff costs.
 - (4) Mentoring and beginning teacher induction costs following initial preparation.
- (e) A grant recipient shall not use more than 5 percent of a grant award for program administration costs.
- (f) A grant recipient shall provide a match of grant funding in the form of one or both of the following:
 - (1) Eighty cents (\$0.80) for every one dollar (\$1) of grant funding received per participant, to be used in a manner consistent with allowable grant activities pursuant to subdivision (d).
 - (2) An in-kind match of program director personnel costs, mentor teacher personnel costs, or

other personnel costs related to the Teacher Residency Grant Program, provided by the grant recipient.

- (g) Grant recipients shall do all of the following:
 - (1) Ensure that candidates are prepared to earn a preliminary teaching credential that will authorize the candidate to teach either in a designated shortage field or in furtherance of subparagraph (B) of paragraph (1) of subdivision (c) upon completion of the program.
 - (2) Ensure that candidates are provided instruction in all of the following:
 - (A) Teaching the content area or areas in which the teacher will become certified to teach.
 - (B) Planning, curriculum development, and assessment.
 - (C) Learning and child development.
 - (D) Management of the classroom environment.
 - (E) Use of culturally responsive practices, supports for language development, and supports for serving pupils with disabilities.
 - (F) Professional responsibilities, including interaction with families and colleagues.
 - (3) Provide each candidate mentoring and beginning teacher induction support following the completion of the initial credential program necessary to obtain a clear credential and ongoing professional development and networking opportunities during the candidate's first years of teaching at no cost to the candidate.
 - (4) Prepare candidates to teach in a school within the jurisdiction of the grant recipient in which they will work and learn the instructional initiatives and curriculum of the grant recipient.
 - (5) Group teacher candidates in cohorts to facilitate professional collaboration among residents, and ensure candidates are enrolled in a teaching school or professional development program that is organized to support a high-quality teacher learning experience in a supportive work environment.
- (h) To receive a grant, an applicant shall submit an application to the commission at a time, in a manner, and containing information prescribed by the commission.
- (i) When selecting grant recipients, the commission shall do both of the following:
 - (1) Require applicants to demonstrate a need for teachers in one or more designated shortage fields or for the purposes described in subparagraph (B) of paragraph (1) of subdivision (c), and to propose to establish a new, or expand, strengthen, or improve access to an existing, teacher residency program that recruits, prepares, and supports teachers to teach in either one or more such fields or in furtherance of subparagraph (B) of paragraph (1) of subdivision (c) in a school within the jurisdiction of the sponsoring grant applicant.
 - (2) Give priority consideration to grant applicants who demonstrate a commitment to increasing diversity in the teaching workforce, have a higher percentage than other applicants of unduplicated pupils, as defined in Section 42238.02, and have one or more schools that exhibit one or both of the following characteristics:
 - (A) A school where 50 percent or more of the enrolled pupils are eligible for free or reduced-price meals.
 - (B) A school that is located in either a rural location or a densely populated region.
- (j) A candidate in a teacher residency program sponsored by a grant provided pursuant to subdivision (c) shall agree in writing to serve in a school within the jurisdiction of the grant recipient that sponsored the candidate for a period of at least four school years beginning with the school year that begins after the candidate successfully completes the initial year of preparation and obtains a preliminary teaching credential. A candidate who fails to earn a preliminary credential or complete the period of the placement shall reimburse the sponsoring grant recipient the amount of grant funding invested in the candidate's residency training. The amount to be reimbursed shall be adjusted proportionately to reflect the service

provided if the candidate taught at least one year, but less than four years, at a school within the jurisdiction of the sponsoring grant recipient. A candidate shall have five school years to complete the four-school-year teaching commitment.

- (k) If a candidate is unable to complete a school year of teaching, that school year may still be counted toward the required four complete school years if any of the following occur:
 - (1) The candidate has completed at least one-half of the school year.
 - (2) The employer deems the candidate to have fulfilled their contractual requirements for the school year for the purposes of salary increases, probationary or permanent status, and retirement.
 - (3) The candidate was not able to teach due to the financial circumstances of the sponsoring grant recipient, including a decision to not reelect the employee for the succeeding school year.
 - (4) The candidate has a condition covered under the federal Family and Medical Leave Act of 1993 (29 U.S.C. Sec. 2061 et seq.) or similar state law.
 - (5) The candidate was called or ordered to active duty status for more than 30 days as a member of a reserve component of the Armed Forces of the United States.
- (l) For purposes of administering the grant program pursuant to subdivision (c), the commission shall do all of the following:
 - (1) Determine the number of grants to be awarded and the total amount awarded to each grant applicant.
 - (2) Require grant recipients to submit program and expenditure reports, as specified by the commission, as a condition of receiving grant funds.
 - (3) Annually review each grant recipient's program and expenditure reports to determine if any candidate has failed to meet their commitment pursuant to subdivision (j).
- (m) If the commission determines or is informed that a sponsored candidate failed to earn a preliminary credential or meet their commitment to teach pursuant to subdivision (j), the commission shall confirm with the grant recipient the applicable grant amount to be recovered from the candidate and the grant recipient. The amount to be recovered shall be adjusted proportionately to reflect the service provided if the candidate taught at least one year, but less than four years, at the sponsoring grant recipient.
- (n) Upon confirming the amount to be recovered from the grant recipient pursuant to subdivision (m), the commission shall notify the grant recipient of the amount to be repaid within 60 days. The grant recipient shall have 60 days from the date of the notification to make the required repayment to the commission. If the grant recipient fails to make the required payment within 60 days, the commission shall notify the Controller and the grant recipient of the failure to repay the amount owed. The Controller shall deduct an amount equal to the amount owed to the commission from the grant recipient's next principal apportionment or apportionments of state funds, other than basic aid apportionments required by Section 6 of Article IX of the California Constitution. If the grant recipient is a regional occupational center or program operated by a joint powers authority that does not receive a principal apportionment or apportionments of state funds, or a consortia of local educational agencies, the commission shall notify the Controller of the local educational agency where the candidate taught and the Controller shall deduct the amount owed from the applicable local educational agency's next principal apportionment or apportionments of state funds, other than basic aid apportionments required by Section 6 of Article IX of the California Constitution.
- (o) An amount recovered by the commission or deducted by the Controller pursuant to subdivision (n) shall be deposited into the Proposition 98 Reversion Account.
- (p) Grant recipients may recover from a sponsored candidate who fails to earn a preliminary credential or complete the period of placement the amount of grant funding invested in the candidate's residency

training. The amount to be recovered shall be adjusted proportionately to reflect the service provided if the candidate taught at least one year, but less than four years, at a school within the jurisdiction of the sponsoring grant recipient.

- (q) Grant recipients shall not charge a teacher resident a fee to participate in the Teacher Residency Grant Program.
- (r) (1) Notwithstanding subdivision (c), the commission may allocate up to twenty-five million dollars (\$25,000,000) of the amount appropriated pursuant to subdivision (b) to capacity grants that shall be awarded on a competitive basis to local educational agencies or consortia, as designated pursuant to this section, partnering with regionally accredited institutions of higher education to expand, strengthen, improve access to, or create teacher residency programs that lead to more credentialed teachers to teach either in shortage fields or in furtherance of subparagraph (B) of paragraph (1) of subdivision (c).
 - (2) (A) The commission shall determine the number of capacity grants to be awarded and the amount of the applicable grants.
 - (B) Individual capacity grants shall not exceed two hundred fifty thousand dollars (\$250,000) per grant recipient.
- (s) For purposes of making the computations required by Section 8 of Article XVI of the California Constitution, the appropriation made by subdivision (b) shall be deemed to be "General Fund revenues appropriated for school districts," as defined in subdivision (c) of Section 41202, for the 2020–21 fiscal year, and included within the "total allocations to school districts and community college districts from General Fund proceeds of taxes appropriated pursuant to Article XIII B," as defined in subdivision (e) of Section 41202, for the 2020–21 fiscal year.

SEC. 46.

Section 44417.5 is added to the Education Code, to read:

44417.5.

The commission shall conduct an evaluation of the Teacher Residency Grant Program described in Section 44415.5 to determine the effectiveness of this program in recruiting, developing support systems for, and retaining teachers prepared to teach either in commission-designated shortage areas or in furtherance of subparagraph (B) of paragraph (1) of subdivision (c) of Section 44415.5, and provide a report to the Department of Finance and the appropriate fiscal and policy committees of the Legislature on or before December 1, 2027.

• Plan for Recruitment - ACT-R Program coordinators, as in the current CTC-funded residency, will oversee recruitment efforts. Residents would begin the program in August 2023. If funding is secured, the ACT-R website will be revised in 2022-23 and linked to LAUSD's HR website: https://www.csun.edu/eisner-eclucation/accelerated-collaborative-teacher-preparation-program/act-r. In addition, prospective teacher preparation candidates will attend credential office information sessions, with the ACT-R Program discussed as a program option. The CSUN College of Education recruitment officer will advertise the program through in-person information sessions with LAUSD, minority organizations on campus and in the community, and undergraduate programs. LAUSD will continue to assist recruitment effolis by sharing residency program information with the district's paraprofessionals, teachers with sholiterm permits, and substitute teachers.

Once a potential student submits an ACT-R application, an ACT-R Coordinator will contact the applicant for advisement and an interview. If the applicant meets criteria for credential program admission, she/he will undergo a second interview with CSUN faculty and LAUSD HR personnel. After collaboratively discussing and rating candidates, based on application materials and interviews, residents will be selected for the grant program.

• Enrollment - Selected residents must meet all CSUN admission requirements. Once admitted through the credential office, the ACT-R office administrative assistant provides a course schedule and permission numbers for each course, since most ACT-R courses are restricted for the residents. LAUSD HR personnel meet with candidates to ensure they understand all requirements for the ACT-R grant and review the service agreement and early contract which must be signed to remain an ACT-R resident. Funds for the stipend are typically sent after tuition is due. However, CSUN through Cash Services, has provided "enrollment protection" so that residents will not be dropped from their courses.

PROJECT DESCRIPTION

GRANT AGREEMENT COMMISSION ON TEACHER CREDENTIALING

TERMS AND CONDITIONS OF GRANT

The Grantee shall be responsible for the performance of the work as set forth herein below and for the preparation of reports as specified in this Agreement. The Grantee's Project Representative shall promptly notify the State of events or proposed changes that could affect the Work Plan under this Agreement.

General Provisions

A. Definitions

- The term "Agreement" as used herein means a grant agreement between the State and Grantee specifying the payment of Grant Amount by the State for the performance of Work Plan within the Project Performance Period by the Grantee.
- 2. The term "Encumbrance" as used herein means a planned expenditure of grant funds.
- The term "Grant Amount" as used herein means funds allocated to the Grantee in accordance with Education Code 44415.5.
- 4. The term "Grantee" as used herein means the party described as the Grantee on page one (1) of this Agreement.
- The term "Institutions of higher education" means the California State University, the University of California, and private regionally accredited institutions of higher education institutions that offer a commission-approved teacher preparation program
- The term "Program" means the California Teacher Residency Expansion Grant Program.
- The term "Project" as used herein means the project described on page one (1) of this Agreement.
- 8. The term "Project Performance Period" as used herein means the period of time that the Grant Amount is available, and the time in which the Project must be complete, billed and paid as described on page one (1) of this Agreement.
- The term "Project Representative" as used herein means the person authorized by the Grantee to be responsible for the Project and can make daily management decisions.
- 10. The term "State" as used herein means the Commission on Teacher Credentialing.
- 11. The term "Teacher Residency Expansion Grant Program" is a state grant program authorized under the provisions of EC §44415 and §44415.5 that provides funding for the development of teacher residency programs.
- 12. The term "Work Plan" means the residency pathway planning activities described in

the LEA's application and budget herein attached as exhibits A and B, and as approved by the State.

B. Project Execution

- Grantee agrees to complete the Project in accordance with the time of Project Performance Period, and under the terms and conditions of this Agreement. Extensions may be requested at least 90 days in advance of the date of termination and will be considered in the event of circumstances beyond the control of the Grantee, but in no event subsequent to the end of the Project Performance Period as identified in the Work Plan as the Project's date of completion.
- 2. Grantee agrees to submit in writing any deviation from the approved grant application to the State for approval, prior to implementation of changes.
- 3. Grantees will be expected to make appropriate yearly progress in implementing their expanded residency model, resulting in an increase in the number of teacher resident candidates and according to the operational plan provided in the funded application. Applicants should note that as a condition of receipt of a grant, the LEA grantee must agree to report outcome data when reports are requested by Commission staff. Failure to comply with funding terms or reporting requirements could put future funding opportunities at risk.
- Grant funding may be subject to change when any unspent funds are reported in any annual reports.
- 5. The Teacher Residency Expansion grant funding period, and the approved grant activities, may extend through June 30, 2026. For grantees who also apply for or have already been awarded other Teacher Residency grant funding, the grantee may continue to operate their Teacher Residency Expansion Grant within the grant funding period and planned activities within the specified grant agreement. The funds in this grant agreement may be spent concurrently with previously awarded grant agreements until their respective cutoff dates to complete the planned activities described in the response to the selection criteria and as stated in the statute(s) in the grant agreement that authorizes funding.

C. Project Costs

Subject to the availability of Grant Amount in the Act, the State hereby grants to the Grantee an annual sum of money (Annual Grant Amount) not to exceed the amount stated on page one (1) of this Agreement in consideration of and on condition that the sum be expended in carrying out the purpose as set forth in the Work Plan and under the terms and conditions set forth in this Agreement. Grantee agrees to assume any obligation to furnish any additional funds that may be necessary to complete the Project. All costs accrued for services or supplies prior to the execution of Agreement are not eligible for reimbursement.

The Grant Amount to be provided to the Grantee, under this Agreement, may be disbursed as follows:

- Upon approval of the application, the first payment will be 90 percent (90%) of the total annual budget amount projected for the first year of resident enrollment.
- 2. The second payment will be 10 percent (10%) of the total annual budget amount

projected for the first year of resident enrollment. The second payment will be provided to grantees after the program has completed its activities and submitted required annual reports to the Commission.

3. Subsequent annual payments will be determined by calculating the program need based on the actual expenditures reported by the program from the previous fiscal year and the projected enrollment numbers submitted by the program for the following fiscal year. Annual awards will be disbursed in two payments following the 90 percent (90%)/10 percent (10%) model described above. Unspent funds reported on annual reports will be deducted from the next allotment of funds.

D. Allowable Activities and Use of Funds

- Assembly Bill (AB) 130 (Chapter 44, Statutes of 2021) provided the Commission with \$350 million for the Teacher Residency Grant Program, with up to \$325 million allocated to expansion and implementation grants that shall not exceed \$25,000 per teacher candidate in the residency program of the jurisdiction of the grant recipient. Per statute, the grant funds must be matched by the grantee LEA or consortium on an eighty cents (\$.80) to one dollar (\$1) basis. Matching funds may be actual dollars or in-kind services. Funding is available through June 30, 2026.
- Sample activities that can be funded through the Teacher Residency Expansion Grants
 include but are not limited to expanding an existing LEA-IHE collaborative teacher
 residency to include any or all of the allowable designated shortage areas or
 diversification of the teacher workforce efforts described in the authorizing
 legislation.
- 3. The Grantee warrants by execution of this Agreement, that no person or selling agency has been employed or retained to solicit or secure this Agreement upon agreement or understanding for a commission, percentage, brokerage, or contingent fee, excepting bona fide employees or bona fide established commercial or selling agencies maintained by the Grantee for the purpose of securing business. For breach or violation of the warranty, the state shall, in addition to other remedies provided by law, have the right to annul this Agreement without liability, paying only for the value of the work performed, or otherwise recover the full amount of such commission, percentage, brokerage, or contingent fee.

E. Payment Documentation

- Payment shall be made yearly for the annual grant amount, less 10% withholding to be released upon satisfactory completion of all required deliverables.
- Any overpayment of Grant Amount in excess of final project costs shall be returned to the State within 60 days of completion of the Project or the end of the Project Performance Period as shown on page one (1), whichever is earlier.

F. Project Administration

 Grantee agrees to provide all technical and administrative services as needed for Agreement completion. Grantee agrees to monitor and review all work performed; and coordinate budgeting and scheduling to assure that the Agreement is completed within

budget, on schedule, and in accordance with approved procedures, applicable laws, and regulations.

- Grantee ensures that the Agreement requirements are met through completion of annual reports, submitted to the State in accordance with the Work Plan and through regular communication with the State.
- 3. Grantee agrees to promptly submit reports as the State has requested in this Agreement or may request during the life of this Agreement.
- The Grantee shall comply with the Drug-Free Workplace Act of 1990 (Government Code section 8350 et seq.), Government Code sections 12990(a-f) and CCR, Title 2, Section 8103 (nondiscrimination for non-public entities, and Public Contract Code section 10295.3 (domestic partners).

G. Project Termination

- Failure by the Grantee to comply with the terms of this Agreement or any other Agreement under the Act may be cause for suspension of all obligations of the State hereunder.
- 2. Failure of the Grantee to comply with the terms of this Agreement shall not be cause for the suspension of all obligations of the State hereunder if in the judgment of the State such failure was due to no fault of the Grantee.
- In such case, any amount required to settle at minimum cost any irrevocable obligations properly incurred shall be eligible for reimbursement under this Agreement.
- 4. Should the Grantee choose to terminate its participation in the program, a thirty (30)-day written notice is required. Final program and expenditure reports are due thirty (30) days after the program cessation. The Grantee agrees to return all unexpended funds within sixty (60) days of project cessation.
- 5. It is mutually agreed that if the Budget Act of the current year and/or any subsequent years covered under this Agreement does not appropriate sufficient funds for the program, this Agreement shall be of no further force and effect. In this event, the state shall have no liability to any funds to the Grantee, furnish any other consideration under this agreement, and the grantee shall not be obligated to perform any provisions of this Agreement.
- If funding for any fiscal year is reduced or deleted by the Budget Act for purposes of
 this program, the State shall have the option to either cancel this Agreement with no
 liability occurring to the State or offer an agreement amendment to the Grantee to reflect
 the changes.

H. Financial Records

- Expenditures shall comply with all applicable provisions of federal, state, and local rules, regulations and policies related to the administration, use, and accounting for public school funds, including but not limited to, the Education Code of the State of California.
- Grantee agrees to maintain satisfactory financial accounts, documents, and records for the Project and to make them available to the State for auditing at reasonable times. Grantee also agrees to retain such financial accounts, documents and records for three years following Project termination or completion.
- 3. Grantee agrees to use a generally accepted accounting system.

I. Audit

- Projects are subject to audit by the State for three years following the final payment of Grant Amount. The purpose of this audit is to verify that project expenditures were properly documented. Grantees will be contacted at least 30 days in advance of an audit.
- Audit will include all books, papers, accounts, documents, or other records of the Grantee, as they relate to the Project for which the State authorized Grant Amount. The Grantee shall have the Project records, including the sources documents and cancelled warrants, readily available to the State.
- The Grantee must also provide an employee having knowledge of the Project and the accounting procedure or system to assist the State's auditor. The Grantee shall provide a copy of any document, paper, record, or the like requested by the State.
- All Project records must be retained for at least one year following an audit or final disputed audit findings.

2021-22 Budget Act Legislation

Section 45:

Section 44415.5 is added to the Education Code, to read:

44415.5

- (a) For purposes of this section, the following definitions apply for the Teacher Residency Grant Program:
 - "Experienced mentor teacher" means an educator who meets all the following requirements:

 (A) Has at least three years of teaching experience and holds a clear credential in the subject in which the mentor teacher will be mentoring.
 - (B) Has a record of successful teaching as demonstrated, at a minimum, by satisfactory annual performance evaluations for the preceding three years.
 - (C) Receives specific training for the mentor teacher role and engages in ongoing professional learning and networking with other mentors.

- (D) Receives compensation, appropriate release time, or both, to serve as a mentor in the initial preparation or beginning teacher induction component of the teacher residency program.
- (2) "Teacher residency program" is a grant applicant-based program that partners with one or more commission-approved teacher preparation programs offered by a regionally accredited institution of higher education in which a prospective teacher teaches at least one-half time alongside a teacher of record, who is designated as the experienced mentor teacher, for at least one full school year while engaging in initial preparation coursework.
- (b) For the 2021–22 fiscal year, the sum of three hundred fifty million dollars (\$350,000,000) is hereby appropriated from the General Fund to the commission for the Teacher Residency Grant Program to support teacher residency programs that recruit and support the preparation of teachers pursuant to this section. This funding shall be available for encumbrance until June 30, 2026.
- (c) (1) The commission shall make one-time grants to grant applicants to establish new teacher residency programs, or expand, strengthen, or improve access to existing teacher residency programs that support either of the following:
 - (A) Designated shortage fields, including special education, bilingual education, science, computer science, technology, engineering, mathematics, transitional kindergarten, or kindergarten, and any other fields identified by the commission based on an annual analysis of hiring and vacancy data.
 - (B) Local efforts to recruit, develop support systems for, provide outreach and communication strategies to, and retain a diverse teacher workforce that reflects a local educational agency community's diversity.
 - (2) Grant recipients shall work with one or more commission-accredited teacher preparation programs and may work with other community partners or nonprofit organizations to develop and implement programs of preparation and mentoring for resident teachers who will be supported through program funds and subsequently employed by the sponsoring grant recipient.
 - (3) A grant applicant may consist of one or more, or any combination, of the following:
 - (A) A school district.
 - (B) A county office of education.
 - (C) A charter school.
 - (D) A regional occupational center or program operated by a joint powers authority or a county office of education.
- (d) Grants allocated pursuant to subdivision (c) shall be up to twenty-five thousand dollars (\$25,000) per teacher candidate in the residency program of the jurisdiction of the grant recipient, matched by that grant recipient at a rate of 80 percent of the grant amount received per participant, as described in subdivision (f). Residents are also eligible for other forms of federal, state, and local educational agency financial assistance to support the cost of their preparation. Grant program funding shall be used for, but is not limited to, any of the following:
 - (1) Teacher preparation costs.
 - (2) Stipends for mentor teachers, including, but not limited to, housing stipends.
 - (3) Residency program staff costs.
 - (4) Mentoring and beginning teacher induction costs following initial preparation.
- (e) A grant recipient shall not use more than 5 percent of a grant award for program administration costs.
- (f) A grant recipient shall provide a match of grant funding in the form of one or both of the following:
 - (1) Eighty cents (\$0.80) for every one dollar (\$1) of grant funding received per participant, to be used in a manner consistent with allowable grant activities pursuant to subdivision (d).
 - (2) An in-kind match of program director personnel costs, mentor teacher personnel costs, or

other personnel costs related to the Teacher Residency Grant Program, provided by the grant recipient.

- (g) Grant recipients shall do all of the following:
 - (1) Ensure that candidates are prepared to earn a preliminary teaching credential that will authorize the candidate to teach either in a designated shortage field or in furtherance of subparagraph (B) of paragraph (1) of subdivision (c) upon completion of the program.
 - (2) Ensure that candidates are provided instruction in all of the following:
 - (A) Teaching the content area or areas in which the teacher will become certified to teach.
 - (B) Planning, curriculum development, and assessment.
 - (C) Learning and child development.
 - (D) Management of the classroom environment.
 - (E) Use of culturally responsive practices, supports for language development, and supports for serving pupils with disabilities.
 - (F) Professional responsibilities, including interaction with families and colleagues.
 - (3) Provide each candidate mentoring and beginning teacher induction support following the completion of the initial credential program necessary to obtain a clear credential and ongoing professional development and networking opportunities during the candidate's first years of teaching at no cost to the candidate.
 - (4) Prepare candidates to teach in a school within the jurisdiction of the grant recipient in which they will work and learn the instructional initiatives and curriculum of the grant recipient.
 - (5) Group teacher candidates in cohorts to facilitate professional collaboration among residents, and ensure candidates are enrolled in a teaching school or professional development program that is organized to support a high-quality teacher learning experience in a supportive work environment.
- (h) To receive a grant, an applicant shall submit an application to the commission at a time, in a manner, and containing information prescribed by the commission.
- (i) When selecting grant recipients, the commission shall do both of the following:
 - (1) Require applicants to demonstrate a need for teachers in one or more designated shortage fields or for the purposes described in subparagraph (B) of paragraph (1) of subdivision (c), and to propose to establish a new, or expand, strengthen, or improve access to an existing, teacher residency program that recruits, prepares, and supports teachers to teach in either one or more such fields or in furtherance of subparagraph (B) of paragraph (1) of subdivision (c) in a school within the jurisdiction of the sponsoring grant applicant.
 - (2) Give priority consideration to grant applicants who demonstrate a commitment to increasing diversity in the teaching workforce, have a higher percentage than other applicants of unduplicated pupils, as defined in Section 42238.02, and have one or more schools that exhibit one or both of the following characteristics:
 - (A) A school where 50 percent or more of the enrolled pupils are eligible for free or reduced-price meals.
 - (B) A school that is located in either a rural location or a densely populated region.
- (j) A candidate in a teacher residency program sponsored by a grant provided pursuant to subdivision (c) shall agree in writing to serve in a school within the jurisdiction of the grant recipient that sponsored the candidate for a period of at least four school years beginning with the school year that begins after the candidate successfully completes the initial year of preparation and obtains a preliminary teaching credential. A candidate who fails to earn a preliminary credential or complete the period of the placement shall reimburse the sponsoring grant recipient the amount of grant funding invested in the candidate's residency training. The amount to be reimbursed shall be adjusted proportionately to reflect the service

provided if the candidate taught at least one year, but less than four years, at a school within the jurisdiction of the sponsoring grant recipient. A candidate shall have five school years to complete the four-school-year teaching commitment.

- (k) If a candidate is unable to complete a school year of teaching, that school year may still be counted toward the required four complete school years if any of the following occur:
 - (1) The candidate has completed at least one-half of the school year.
 - (2) The employer deems the candidate to have fulfilled their contractual requirements for the school year for the purposes of salary increases, probationary or permanent status, and retirement.
 - (3) The candidate was not able to teach due to the financial circumstances of the sponsoring grant recipient, including a decision to not reelect the employee for the succeeding school year.
 - (4) The candidate has a condition covered under the federal Family and Medical Leave Act of 1993 (29 U.S.C. Sec. 2061 et seq.) or similar state law.
 - (5) The candidate was called or ordered to active duty status for more than 30 days as a member of a reserve component of the Armed Forces of the United States.
- (l) For purposes of administering the grant program pursuant to subdivision (c), the commission shall do all of the following:
 - (1) Determine the number of grants to be awarded and the total amount awarded to each grant applicant.
 - (2) Require grant recipients to submit program and expenditure reports, as specified by the commission, as a condition of receiving grant funds.
 - (3) Annually review each grant recipient's program and expenditure reports to determine if any candidate has failed to meet their commitment pursuant to subdivision (j).
- (m) If the commission determines or is informed that a sponsored candidate failed to earn a preliminary credential or meet their commitment to teach pursuant to subdivision (j), the commission shall confirm with the grant recipient the applicable grant amount to be recovered from the candidate and the grant recipient. The amount to be recovered shall be adjusted proportionately to reflect the service provided if the candidate taught at least one year, but less than four years, at the sponsoring grant recipient.
- (n) Upon confirming the amount to be recovered from the grant recipient pursuant to subdivision (m), the commission shall notify the grant recipient of the amount to be repaid within 60 days. The grant recipient shall have 60 days from the date of the notification to make the required repayment to the commission. If the grant recipient fails to make the required payment within 60 days, the commission shall notify the Controller and the grant recipient of the failure to repay the amount owed. The Controller shall deduct an amount equal to the amount owed to the commission from the grant recipient's next principal apportionment or apportionments of state funds, other than basic aid apportionments required by Section 6 of Article IX of the California Constitution. If the grant recipient is a regional occupational center or program operated by a joint powers authority that does not receive a principal apportionment or apportionments of state funds, or a consortia of local educational agencies, the commission shall notify the Controller of the local educational agency where the candidate taught and the Controller shall deduct the amount owed from the applicable local educational agency's next principal apportionment or apportionments of state funds, other than basic aid apportionments required by Section 6 of Article IX of the California Constitution.
- (o) An amount recovered by the commission or deducted by the Controller pursuant to subdivision (n) shall be deposited into the Proposition 98 Reversion Account.
- (p) Grant recipients may recover from a sponsored candidate who fails to earn a preliminary credential or complete the period of placement the amount of grant funding invested in the candidate's residency

training. The amount to be recovered shall be adjusted proportionately to reflect the service provided if the candidate taught at least one year, but less than four years, at a school within the jurisdiction of the sponsoring grant recipient.

- (q) Grant recipients shall not charge a teacher resident a fee to participate in the Teacher Residency Grant Program.
- (r) (1) Notwithstanding subdivision (c), the commission may allocate up to twenty-five million dollars (\$25,000,000) of the amount appropriated pursuant to subdivision (b) to capacity grants that shall be awarded on a competitive basis to local educational agencies or consortia, as designated pursuant to this section, partnering with regionally accredited institutions of higher education to expand, strengthen, improve access to, or create teacher residency programs that lead to more credentialed teachers to teach either in shortage fields or in furtherance of subparagraph (B) of paragraph (1) of subdivision (c).
 - (2) (A) The commission shall determine the number of capacity grants to be awarded and the amount of the applicable grants.
 - (B) Individual capacity grants shall not exceed two hundred fifty thousand dollars (\$250,000) per grant recipient.
- (s) For purposes of making the computations required by Section 8 of Article XVI of the California Constitution, the appropriation made by subdivision (b) shall be deemed to be "General Fund revenues appropriated for school districts," as defined in subdivision (c) of Section 41202, for the 2020–21 fiscal year, and included within the "total allocations to school districts and community college districts from General Fund proceeds of taxes appropriated pursuant to Article XIII B," as defined in subdivision (e) of Section 41202, for the 2020–21 fiscal year.

SEC. 46.

Section 44417.5 is added to the Education Code, to read:

44417.5

The commission shall conduct an evaluation of the Teacher Residency Grant Program described in Section 44415.5 to determine the effectiveness of this program in recruiting, developing support systems for, and retaining teachers prepared to teach either in commission-designated shortage areas or in furtherance of subparagraph (B) of paragraph (1) of subdivision (c) of Section 44415.5, and provide a report to the Department of Finance and the appropriate fiscal and policy committees of the Legislature on or before December 1, 2027.

UCLA TEP will oversee recruitment efforts as it has in the original CTC-funded residency. In the 22-23 school year, it has already admitted a group of talented and diverse pre-service teachers. These students will be recruited for the expanded residency should funds be awarded. Additionally, in the ensuing years of the grant, TEP will recruit residency candidates via online and in-person information sessions, presentations in undergraduate classes, and participation in university-sponsored graduate student fairs, including thoughts hosted by Historically Black Colleges and Universities (HBCUs). LAUSD will continue to assist recruitment efforts by sharing the residency information with the district's paraprofessionals and substitute teachers.

TERMS AND CONDITIONS OF GRANT

The Grantee shall be responsible for the performance of the work as set forth herein below and for the preparation of reports as specified in this Agreement. The Grantee's Project Representative shall promptly notify the State of events or proposed changes that could affect the Work Plan under this Agreement.

General Provisions

A. Definitions

- The term "Agreement" as used herein means a grant agreement between the State and Grantee specifying the payment of Grant Amount by the State for the performance of Work Plan within the Project Performance Period by the Grantee.
- 2. The term "Encumbrance" as used herein means a planned expenditure of grant funds.
- The term "Grant Amount" as used herein means funds allocated to the Grantee in accordance with Education Code 44415.5.
- The term "Grantee" as used herein means the party described as the Grantee on page one (1)
 of this Agreement.
- The term "Institutions of higher education" means the California State University, the University of California, and private regionally accredited institutions of higher education institutions that offer a commission-approved teacher preparation program.
- The term "Program" means the California Teacher Residency Implementation and Expansion Grant Program.
- The term "Project" as used herein means the project described on page one (1) of this Agreement.
- 8. The term "Project Performance Period" as used herein means the period of time that the Grant Amount is available, and the time in which the Project must be complete, billed and paid as described on page one (1) of this Agreement.
- The term "Project Representative" as used herein means the person authorized by the Grantee to be responsible for the Project and can make daily management decisions.
- 10. The term "State" as used herein means the Commission on Teacher Credentialing.
- 11. The term "Teacher Residency Implementation and Expansion Grant Program" is a state grant program authorized under the provisions of EC §44415 and §44415.5 that provides funding for the development of teacher residency programs.
- 12. The term "Work Plan" means the residency pathway planning activities described in the LEA's application and budget herein attached as exhibits A and B, and as approved by the State.

B. Project Execution

- Grantee agrees to complete the Project in accordance with the time of Project Performance Period, and under the terms and conditions of this Agreement. Extensions may be requested at least 90 days in advance of the date of termination and will be considered in the event of circumstances beyond the control of the Grantee, but in no event subsequent to the end of the Project Performance Period as identified in the Work Plan as the Project's date of completion.
- 2. Grantee agrees to submit in writing any deviation from the approved grant application to the

- 3. Grantees will be expected to make appropriate yearly progress in implementing or expanding their residency model, resulting in an increase in the number of teacher resident candidates and according to the operational plan provided in the funded application. Awarded grantee LEAs are responsible for responding to the Commission's requirements for data collection, evaluation, and reporting. Grantees must submit reports annually to the Commission throughout the grant period. Applicants should note that as a condition of receipt of a grant, the LEA grantee must agree to report outcome data when reports are requested by Commission staff. Failure to comply with funding terms or reporting requirements could put future funding opportunities at risk.
- Grant funding may be subject to change when any unspent funds are reported in any annual reports.
- 5. The Teacher Residency Implementation and Expansion grant funding period, and the approved grant activities, may extend through June 30, 2026. For grantees who also apply for or have already been awarded other Teacher Residency grant funding, the grantee may continue to operate their Teacher Residency Implementation and Expansion Grant within the grant funding period and planned activities within the specified grant agreement. The funds in this grant agreement may be spent concurrently with previously awarded grant agreements until their respective cutoff dates to complete the planned activities described in the response to the selection criteria and as stated in the statute(s) in the grant agreement that authorizes funding.

C. Project Costs

Subject to the availability of Grant Amount in the Act, the State hereby grants to the Grantee an annual sum of money (Annual Grant Amount) not to exceed the amount stated on page one (1) of this Agreement in consideration of and on condition that the sum be expended in carrying out the purpose as set forth in the Work Plan and under the terms and conditions set forth in this Agreement. Grantee agrees to assume any obligation to furnish any additional funds that may be necessary to complete the Project. All costs accrued for services or supplies prior to the execution of Agreement are not eligible for reimbursement.

The Grant Amount to be provided to the Grantee, under this Agreement, may be disbursed as follows:

- Upon approval of the application, the first payment will be 90 percent (90%) of the total annual budget amount projected for the first year of resident enrollment.
- The second payment will be 10 percent (10%) of the total annual budget amount projected for the first year of resident enrollment. The second payment will be provided to grantees after the program has completed its activities and submitted required annual reports to the Commission.
- Annual awards will be disbursed in two payments following the 90 percent (90%)/10 percent (10%) model described above.
- Annual payments will not be released until the completed annual report from the previous fiscal year has been approved by Commission staff.
- Please note that the Commission fiscal department closes for the fiscal year in June of each year. Grants awarded or DocuSign forms signed in late May/June may not have funds disbursed until after July 1st of a given year.

D. Allowable Activities and Use of Funds

Assembly Bill (AB) 130 (Chapter 44, Statutes of 2021) provided the Commission with \$350 million for the Teacher Residency Grant Program, with up to \$325 million allocated to expansion and implementation grants that shall not exceed \$40,000 per teacher candidate in

cents (\$.80) to one dollar (\$1) basis. Matching funds may be actual dollars or in-kind services. Funding is available through June 30, 2026.

- 2. Grant funds may not be used to reimburse expenditures incurred prior to the start date of the project's "Performance Period," as indicated on the first page of this grant agreement.
- 3. Sample activities that can be funded through the Teacher Residency Implementation and Expansion Grants include but are not limited to expanding an existing LEA-IHE collaborative teacher residency to include any or all of the allowable designated shortage areas or diversification of the teacher workforce efforts described in the authorizing legislation.
- 4. The Grantee warrants by execution of this Agreement, that no person or selling agency has been employed or retained to solicit or secure this Agreement upon agreement or understanding for a commission, percentage, brokerage, or contingent fee, excepting bona fide employees or bona fide established commercial or selling agencies maintained by the Grantee for the purpose of securing business. For breach or violation of the warranty, the state shall, in addition to other remedies provided by law, have the right to annul this Agreement without liability, paying only for the value of the work performed, or otherwise recover the full amount of such commission, percentage, brokerage, or contingent fee.

E. Payment Documentation

- 1. Payment shall be made yearly for the annual grant amount, less 10% withholding to be released upon satisfactory completion of all required deliverables.
- 2. Any overpayment of Grant Amount in excess of final project costs shall be returned to the State within 60 days of completion of the Project or the end of the Project Performance Period as shown on page one (1), whichever is earlier. Repayment of grant funds shall be made in accordance with subdivisions (n) and (o) of Education Code §44415.5.

F. Project Administration

- 1. Grantee agrees to provide all technical and administrative services as needed for Agreement completion. Grantee agrees to monitor and review all work performed; and coordinate budgeting and scheduling to assure that the Agreement is completed within budget, on schedule, and in accordance with approved procedures, applicable laws, and regulations.
- 2. Grantee ensures that the Agreement requirements are met through completion of annual reports, submitted to the State in accordance with the Work Plan and through regular communication with the State.
- 3. Grantee agrees to promptly submit reports as the State has requested in this Agreement or may request during the life of this Agreement.
- The Grantee shall comply with the Drug-Free Workplace Act of 1990 (Government Code section 8350 et seq.), Government Code sections 12990(a-f) and CCR, Title 2, Section 8103 (nondiscrimination for non-public entities, and Public Contract Code section 10295.3 (domestic partners).

G. Project Termination

- 1. Failure by the Grantee to comply with the terms of this Agreement or any other Agreement under the Act may be cause for suspension of all obligations of the State hereunder.
- 2. Failure of the Grantee to comply with the terms of this Agreement shall not be cause for the suspension of all obligations of the State hereunder if in the judgment of the State such failure was due to no fault of the Grantee.
- In such case, any amount required to settle at minimum cost any irrevocable obligations

- 4. Should the Grantee choose to terminate its participation in the program, a thirty (30)-day written notice is required. Final program and expenditure reports are due thirty (30) days after the program cessation. The Grantee agrees to return all unexpended funds within sixty (60) days of project cessation.
- 5. It is mutually agreed that if the Budget Act of the current year and/or any subsequent years covered under this Agreement does not appropriate sufficient funds for the program, this Agreement shall be of no further force and effect. In this event, the state shall have no liability to disburse any funds to the Grantee, furnish any other consideration under this agreement, and the grantee shall not be obligated to perform any provisions of this Agreement.
- 6. If funding for any fiscal year is reduced or deleted by the Budget Act for purposes of this program, the State shall have the option to either cancel this Agreement with no liability occurring to the State or offer an agreement amendment to the Grantee to reflect the changes.

H. Financial Records

- Expenditures shall comply with all applicable provisions of federal, state, and local rules, regulations and policies related to the administration, use, and accounting for public school funds, including but not limited to, the Education Code of the State of California.
- Grantee agrees to maintain satisfactory financial accounts, documents, and records for the Project and to make them available to the State for auditing at reasonable times. Grantee also agrees to retain such financial accounts, documents and records for three years following Project termination or completion.
- 3. Grantee agrees to use a generally accepted accounting system.

I. Audit

- Projects are subject to audit by the State for three years following the final payment of Grant Amount. The purpose of this audit is to verify that project expenditures were properly documented. Grantees will be contacted at least 30 days in advance of an audit.
- Audit will include all books, papers, accounts, documents, or other records of the Grantee, as
 they relate to the Project for which the State authorized Grant Amount. The Grantee shall
 have the Project records, including the sources documents and cancelled warrants, readily
 available to the State.
- The Grantee must also provide an employee having knowledge of the Project and the accounting procedure or system to assist the State's auditor. The Grantee shall provide a copy of any document, paper, record, or the like requested by the State.
- All Project records must be retained for at least one year following an audit or final disputed audit findings.

SEC. 46.

Section 44415.5 is amended in Education Code, to read:

Education Code §44415.5.

- (a) For purposes of this section, the following definitions apply for the Teacher Residency Grant Program:
 - (1) "Experienced mentor teacher" means an educator who meets all of the following requirements:
 - (A) Has at least three years of teaching experience and holds a clear credential in the subject in which the mentor teacher will be mentoring. For programs leading to the issuance of new PK-3 early childhood education specialist credentials, the mentor teacher must have at least three years of teaching experience in prekindergarten, transitional kindergarten, kindergarten, or any of grades 1 to 3, inclusive, and hold a clear multiple subject credential.
 - (B) Has a record of successful teaching as demonstrated, at a minimum, by satisfactory annual performance evaluations for the preceding three years.
 - (C) Receives specific training for the mentor teacher role and engages in ongoing professional learning and networking with other mentors.
 - (D) Receives compensation, appropriate release time, or both, to serve as a mentor in the initial preparation or beginning teacher induction component of the teacher residency program.
 - (2) "Teacher residency program" is a grant applicant-based program that partners with one or more commission-approved teacher preparation programs offered by a regionally accredited institution of higher education in which a prospective teacher teaches at least one-half time alongside a teacher of record, who is designated as the experienced mentor teacher, for at least one full school year while engaging in initial preparation coursework.
- (b) (1) For the 2021–22 fiscal year, the sum of three hundred fifty million dollars (\$350,000,000) is hereby appropriated from the General Fund to the commission for the Teacher Residency Grant Program to support teacher residency programs that recruit and support the preparation of teachers pursuant to this section. This funding shall be available for encumbrance until June 30, 2026.
 - (2) Grant funding awarded pursuant to this section shall be expended by a grant recipient within five fiscal years of the fiscal year in which the grant was awarded.
- (c) (1) The commission shall make grants to applicants to establish new teacher residency programs, or expand, strengthen, or improve access to existing teacher residency programs that support either of the following:
 - (A) Designated shortage fields, including, but not limited to, special education, bilingual education, science, computer science, technology, engineering, mathematics, transitional kindergarten, or kindergarten, school counselors, and any other fields identified by the commission based on an annual analysis of state and regional hiring and vacancy data.
 - (B) Local efforts to recruit, develop support systems for, provide outreach and communication strategies to, and retain a diverse teacher workforce that reflects a local educational agency community's diversity.
 - (2) Grant recipients shall work with one or more commission-accredited teacher preparation programs and may work with other community partners or nonprofit organizations to develop and implement programs of preparation and mentoring for resident teachers who will be supported through program funds and subsequently employed by the sponsoring grant recipient.
 - (3) A grant applicant may consist of one or more, or any combination, of the following:
 - (A) A school district.
 - (B) A county office of education.
 - (C) A charter school.
 - (D) A regional occupational center or program operated by a joint powers authority or a county office of education.

(d) Grants allocated pursuant to subdivision (c) shall be up to forty thousand dollars \$40,000 per teacher Docusign Envelope ID: 2D91205F-FDE2-47FE-AD79-8E81D7E49952 candidate in the residency program of the grant recipient, matched by that grant recipient at 349 a rate of 80 percent of the first twenty-five thousand dollars (\$25,000) of the grant amount received per participant, as described in subdivision (f). Residents are also eligible for other forms of federal, state, and local educational agency financial assistance to support the cost of their preparation. Grant program funding shall be used for, but is not limited to, any of the following:

- (1) Teacher preparation costs.
- (2) Stipends for mentor teachers, including, but not limited to, housing stipends.
- (3) Residency program staff costs.
- (4) Mentoring and beginning teacher induction costs following initial preparation.
- (5) Compensation for residents.
- (e) A grant recipient shall not use more than 5 percent of a grant award for program administration costs.
- (f) A grant recipient shall provide a match of grant funding in the form of one or both of the following:
 - (1) Eighty cents (\$0.80) for every one dollar (\$1) of the first twenty-five thousand dollars (\$25,000) in grant funding received per participant, to be used in a manner consistent with allowable grant activities pursuant to subdivision (d).
 - (2) An in-kind match of program director personnel costs, mentor teacher personnel costs, resident compensation costs, or other personnel costs related to the Teacher Residency Grant Program, provided by the grant recipient.
- (g) Grant recipients shall do all of the following:
 - (1) Ensure that candidates are prepared to earn a preliminary teaching credential, including a PK-3 early childhood education specialist credential, in furtherance of paragraph (1) of subdivision (c) upon completion of the program.
 - (2) Ensure that candidates are provided instruction in all of the following:
 - (A) Teaching the content area or areas in which the teacher will become certified to teach.
 - (B) Planning, curriculum development, and assessment.
 - (C) Learning and child development.
 - (D) Management of the classroom environment.
 - (E) Use of culturally responsive practices supports for language development, and supports for serving pupils with disabilities.
 - (F) Professional responsibilities, including interaction with families and colleagues.
 - (3) Provide each candidate mentoring and beginning teacher induction support following the completion of the initial credential program necessary to obtain a clear credential and ongoing professional development and networking opportunities during the candidate's first years of teaching at no cost to the candidate.
 - (4) Prepare candidates to teach in a school within the jurisdiction of the grant recipient in which they will work and learn the instructional initiatives and curriculum of the grant recipient.
 - (5) Group teacher candidates in cohorts to facilitate professional collaboration among residents, and ensure candidates are enrolled in a teaching school or professional development program that is organized to support a high-quality teacher learning experience in a supportive work environment.
 - (6) (A) For grants awarded during and after the 2023-24 fiscal year, provide a minimum compensation package, which may include, but is not limited to, a living stipend or wages for employment of no less than twenty thousand dollars (\$20,000) per candidate. Nothing in this section precludes a grant recipient from providing a larger compensation package to candidates, and grant recipients are encouraged to provide a compensation package to residents that is similar to the grant recipient's compensation of school staff with comparable duties.
 - (B) To the extent a grant recipient received an award of up to twenty-five thousand dollars (\$25,000) per candidate before the 2023-24 fiscal year and is serving candidates during and after the 2023-24 school year with that award, and commits to providing the minimum compensation package to those candidates, the grant recipient may submit the number of those

- (h) To receive a grant, an applicant shall submit an application to the commission at a time, in a manner, and containing information prescribed by the commission.
- (i) When selecting grant recipients, the commission shall do both of the following:
 - (1) Require applicants to demonstrate a need for teachers in one or more designated shortage fields or for the purposes described in subparagraph (B) of paragraph (1) of subdivision (c), and to propose to establish a new, or expand, strengthen, or improve access to an existing, teacher residency program that recruits, prepares, and supports teachers to teach in either one or more such fields or in furtherance of subparagraph (B) of paragraph (1) of subdivision (c) in a school within the jurisdiction of the sponsoring grant applicant.
 - (2) Give priority consideration to grant applicants who demonstrate a commitment to increasing diversity in the teaching workforce, have a higher percentage than other applicants of unduplicated pupils, as defined in Section 42238.02, and have one or more schools that exhibit one or both of the following characteristics:
 - (A) A school where 50 percent or more of the enrolled pupils are eligible for free or reducedprice meals.
 - (B) A school that is located in either a rural location or a densely populated region.
- (j) (1) A candidate in a teacher residency program sponsored by a grant provided pursuant to subdivision (c) shall agree in writing to serve in a school within the jurisdiction of the grant recipient that sponsored the candidate or another public school in California for a period of at least four school years beginning with the school year that begins after the candidate successfully completes the initial year of preparation and obtains a preliminary teaching credential, including a PK-3 early childhood education specialist credential. The candidate shall also commit in the written agreement to annually reporting to their sponsoring local educational agency where they are employed and their current contact information until they have completed their service requirement or eight years after completion of residency, whichever occurs first.
 - (2) A candidate shall have eight school years to complete the four-school-year teaching commitment.
 - (3) This subdivision shall apply to any current candidate or teacher that participates in a residency program under this section.
- (k) If a candidate is unable to complete a school year of teaching, that school year may still be counted toward the required four complete school years if any of the following occur:
 - (1) The candidate has completed at least one-half of the school year.
 - (2) The employer deems the candidate to have fulfilled their contractual requirements for the school year for the purposes of salary increases, probationary or permanent status, and retirement.
 - (3) The candidate was not able to teach due to the financial circumstances of the sponsoring grant recipient, including a decision to not reelect the employee for the succeeding school year.
 - (4) The candidate has a condition covered under the federal Family and Medical Leave Act of 1993 (29 U.S.C. Sec. 2061 et seq.) or similar state law.
 - (5) The candidate was called or ordered to active-duty status for more than 30 days as a member of a reserve component of the Armed Forces of the United States.
- (1) If a candidate is unable to complete their residency program or service requirement because of hardship, as defined by the commission, they may apply to waive any repayment obligation as described in subdivision
- (m) For purposes of administering the grant program pursuant to subdivision (c), the commission shall do all of the following:
 - (1) Determine the number of grants to be awarded and the total amount awarded to each grant applicant.
 - (2) Require grant recipients to submit program and expenditure reports, as specified by the commission, as a condition of receiving grant funds.
 - (3) Annually review each grant recipient's program and expenditure reports to determine if any candidate has failed to meet their commitment pursuant to subdivision (j).

teach pursuant to subdivision (j), the commission shall confirm with the grant recipient the applicable grant amount to be recovered from the grant recipient based on the number of candidates who failed to earn a preliminary credential or meet their teaching commitment above a 10-percent attrition rate.

- (2) The amount to be recovered shall be adjusted proportionately to reflect the service provided if the candidate taught at least one year, but less than four years, at a public school in California.
- (3) A candidate who obtains a waiver pursuant to subdivision (1) shall not count toward the 10-percent attrition rate.
- (o) Upon confirming the amount to be recovered from the grant recipient pursuant to subdivision (n), the commission shall notify the grant recipient of the amount to be repaid within 60 days. The grant recipient shall have 60 days from the date of the notification to make the required repayment to the commission. If the grant recipient fails to make the required payment within 60 days, the commission shall notify the Controller and the grant recipient of the failure to repay the amount owed. The Controller shall deduct an amount equal to the amount owed to the commission from the grant recipient's next principal apportionment or apportionments of state funds, other than basic aid apportionments required by Section 6 of Article IX of the California Constitution. If the grant recipient is a regional occupational center or program operated by a joint powers authority that does not receive a principal apportionment or apportionments of state funds, or a consortia of local educational agencies, the commission shall notify the Controller of the local educational agency where the candidate taught and the Controller shall deduct the amount owed from the applicable local educational agency's next principal apportionment or apportionments of state funds, other than basic aid apportionments required by Section 6 of Article IX of the California Constitution.
- (p) An amount recovered by the commission or deducted by the Controller pursuant to subdivision (o) shall be deposited into the Proposition 98 Reversion Account.
- (q) (1) Grant recipients may recover from a sponsored candidate who fails to earn a preliminary credential, or who fails to complete the period of placement, the amount of grant funding invested in the candidate's residency training. The amount to be recovered shall be adjusted proportionately to reflect the service provided if the candidate taught at least one year, but less than four years, at a public school in California.
 - (2) Costs considered as part of a candidate's residency training for purposes of this subdivision shall not include costs associated with a candidate's compensation package, mentor compensation, or overall program administration and shall be limited to costs incurred that are specific to that candidate, such as tuition and materials.
- (r) Grant recipients shall not charge a teacher resident a fee to participate in the Teacher Residency Grant Program.
- (s) (1) Notwithstanding subdivision (c), the commission may allocate up to twenty-five million dollars (\$25,000,000) of the amount appropriated pursuant to subdivision (b) to capacity grants that shall be awarded on a competitive basis to local educational agencies or consortia, as designated pursuant to this section, partnering with regionally accredited institutions of higher education to expand, strengthen, improve access to, or create teacher residency programs.
 - (2) (A) The commission shall determine the number of capacity grants to be awarded and the amount of the applicable grants.
 - (B) Individual capacity grants shall not exceed two hundred fifty thousand dollars (\$250,000) per grant recipient.
- (t) For purposes of making the computations required by Section 8 of Article XVI of the California Constitution, the appropriation made by subdivision (b) shall be deemed to be "General Fund revenues appropriated for school districts," as defined in subdivision (c) of Section 41202, for the 2020–21 fiscal year, and included within the "total allocations to school districts and community college districts from General Fund proceeds of taxes appropriated pursuant to Article XIII B," as defined in subdivision (e) of Section 41202, for the 2020–21 fiscal year.

As this is a new pathway for UCLA, we will begin with a small number of candidates and plan to expand as the program grows.

Plan for recruiting

UCLA TEP will oversee recruitment efforts as it has in other residency efforts. It is in the process of determining admission to its program and has received applications from talented and diverse applicants for the 2024-2025 school year. Should funds be awarded, Education Specialist residency candidates will be recruited from the group of admitted students. Additionally, in the ensuing years of the grant, TEP will recruit residency candidates via online and in-person information sessions, presentations in undergraduate classes, including students in the UCLA Disability Studies major, and participation in university-sponsored graduate student fairs. LAUSD will continue to assist recruitment efforts by sharing the residency information with the district's paraprofessionals and substitute teachers.

b) Month and Year program will begin

The Education Specialist Residency program will begin in August 2024.

c) Current focus of the residency program

The current focus of this implementation grant will be the development of an Education Specialist residency program.

 d) Build on/supplement but not supplant the current teacher residency program or local/IHE efforts.

e) Number of mentor teachers needed

We would like to recruit 12 mentors to ensure that UCLA Education Specialists have the opportunity to interact with a wide range of practitioners.

f) Recruit, select, and train new mentors.

With the establishment of this new residency pathway, UCLA TEP has been consulting with LAUSD's Division of Special Education to select clinical placement sites. UCLA TEP also seeks to work with existing partner schools and will continue to consult with school site administrators for mentor recommendations. Potential mentor recruits will have a minimum of three years of teaching experience, hold a clear credential in Special Education, and have satisfactory district evaluations.

g) Describe how consistency and coherence will be assured across multiple school sites, content areas, and school administrations.

UCLA TEP secured internal funds to create its new Education Specialist pathway. This pathway has been in a planning phase for nearly two years in consultation with district officials, practitioners, and researchers. A mentor training program has been designed as part of the planning phase. Potential mentors will be invited to participate in this training program during the summer months. Meetings with school administrators will be an aspect of mentor recruitment.

h) Eliminate duplicative coursework and fieldwork experiences

As part of the establishment of UCLA's Education Specialist pathway, coursework and field experiences were reviewed and redesigned to ensure that TPEs were being met, duplicative courses and field experiences were eliminated, and all credentialing requirements were satisfied. A program advisory group consisting of district officials, practitioners, and researchers was established to provide feedback on curriculum and other programmatic decisions.

k) Modifications and/or improvements

We will introduce more opportunities for residency students to give feedback on their clinical experiences. Presently, feedback is provided on coursework quarterly, and a survey is completed at the end of the program and during their first year of teaching.

Further, as part of our sustainability plan, we are working on ways to make substitute teaching opportunities available to residency students.

GRANT AGREEMENT COMMISSION ON TEACHER CREDENTIALING

TERMS AND CONDITIONS OF GRANT

The Grantee shall be responsible for the performance of the work as set forth herein below and for the preparation of reports as specified in this Agreement. The Grantee's Project Representative shall promptly notify the State of events or proposed changes that could affect the Work Plan under this Agreement.

General Provisions

A. Definitions

- The term "Agreement" as used herein means a grant agreement between the State and Grantee specifying the payment of Grant Amount by the State for the performance of Work Plan within the Project Performance Period by the Grantee.
- 2. The term "Encumbrance" as used herein means a planned expenditure of grant funds.
- The term "Grant Amount" as used herein means funds allocated to the Grantee in accordance with Education Code 44415.5.
- 4. The term "Grantee" as used herein means the party described as the Grantee on page one (1) of this Agreement.
- The term "Institutions of higher education" means the California State University, the University of California, and private regionally accredited institutions of higher education institutions that offer a commission-approved teacher preparation program.
- The term "Program" means the California Teacher Residency Implementation Grant Program.
- The term "Project" as used herein means the project described on page one (1) of this Agreement.
- 8. The term "Project Performance Period" as used herein means the period of time that the Grant Amount is available, and the time in which the Project must be complete, billed and paid as described on page one (1) of this Agreement.
- The term "Project Representative" as used herein means the person authorized by the Grantee to be responsible for the Project and can make daily management decisions.
- 10. The term "State" as used herein means the Commission on Teacher Credentialing.
- 11. The term "Teacher Residency Implementation Grant Program" is a state grant program authorized under the provisions of EC §44415 and §44415.5 that provides funding for the development of teacher residency programs.
- 12. The term "Work Plan" means the residency pathway planning activities described in

the LEA's application and budget herein attached as exhibits A and B, and as approved by the State.

B. Project Execution

- Grantee agrees to complete the Project in accordance with the time of Project Performance Period, and under the terms and conditions of this Agreement. Extensions may be requested at least 90 days in advance of the date of termination and will be considered in the event of circumstances beyond the control of the Grantee, but in no event subsequent to the end of the Project Performance Period as identified in the Work Plan as the Project's date of completion.
- 2. Grantee agrees to submit in writing any deviation from the approved grant application to the State for approval, prior to implementation of changes.
- 3. Grantees will be expected to make appropriate yearly progress in implementing their expanded residency model, resulting in an increase in the number of teacher resident candidates and according to the operational plan provided in the funded application. Applicants should note that as a condition of receipt of a grant, the LEA grantee must agree to report outcome data when reports are requested by Commission staff. Failure to comply with funding terms or reporting requirements could put future funding opportunities at risk.
- Grant funding may be subject to change when any unspent funds are reported in any annual reports.
- 5. The Teacher Residency Implementation grant funding period, and the approved grant activities, may extend through June 30, 2026. For grantees who also apply for or have already been awarded other Teacher Residency grant funding, the grantee may continue to operate their Teacher Residency Implementation Grant within the grant funding period and planned activities within the specified grant agreement. The funds in this grant agreement may be spent concurrently with previously awarded grant agreements until their respective cutoff dates to complete the planned activities described in the response to the selection criteria and as stated in the statute(s) in the grant agreement that authorizes funding.

C. Project Costs

Subject to the availability of Grant Amount in the Act, the State hereby grants to the Grantee an annual sum of money (Annual Grant Amount) not to exceed the amount stated on page one (1) of this Agreement in consideration of and on condition that the sum be expended in carrying out the purpose as set forth in the Work Plan and under the terms and conditions set forth in this Agreement. Grantee agrees to assume any obligation to furnish any additional funds that may be necessary to complete the Project. All costs accrued for services or supplies prior to the execution of Agreement are not eligible for reimbursement.

The Grant Amount to be provided to the Grantee, under this Agreement, may be disbursed as follows:

 Upon approval of the application, the first payment will be 90 percent (90%) of the total annual budget amount projected for the first year of resident enrollment.

- The second payment will be 10 percent (10%) of the total annual budget amount projected for the first year of resident enrollment. The second payment will be provided to grantees after the program has completed its activities and submitted required annual reports to the Commission.
- 3. Subsequent Annual payments will be determined by calculating the program need based on the actual expenditures reported by the program from the previous fiscal year and the projected enrollment numbers submitted by the program for the following fiscal year. Annual awards will be disbursed in two payments following the 90 percent (90%)/10 percent (10%) model described above. Unspent funds reported on annual reports will be deducted from the next allotment of funds.
- 4. Annual payments will not be released until the completed annual report from the previous fiscal year has been approved by Commission staff.

D. Allowable Activities and Use of Funds

- Assembly Bill (AB) 130 (Chapter 44, Statutes of 2021) provided the Commission with \$350 million for the Teacher Residency Grant Program, with up to \$325 million allocated to expansion and implementation grants that shall not exceed \$25,000 per teacher candidate in the residency program of the jurisdiction of the grant recipient. Per statute, the grant funds must be matched by the grantee LEA or consortium on an eighty cents (\$.80) to one dollar (\$1) basis. Matching funds may be actual dollars or in-kind services. Funding is available through June 30, 2026.
- Sample activities that can be funded through the Teacher Residency Implementation
 Grants include but are not limited to implementing or expanding an existing LEA-IHE
 collaborative teacher residency to include any or all of the allowable designated
 shortage areas or diversification of the teacher workforce efforts described in the
 authorizing legislation.
- 3. The Grantee warrants by execution of this Agreement, that no person or selling agency has been employed or retained to solicit or secure this Agreement upon agreement or understanding for a commission, percentage, brokerage, or contingent fee, excepting bona fide employees or bona fide established commercial or selling agencies maintained by the Grantee for the purpose of securing business. For breach or violation of the warranty, the state shall, in addition to other remedies provided by law, have the right to annul this Agreement without liability, paying only for the value of the work performed, or otherwise recover the full amount of such commission, percentage, brokerage, or contingent fee.

E. Payment Documentation

- 1. Payment shall be made yearly for the annual grant amount, less 10% withholding to be released upon satisfactory completion of all required deliverables.
- Any overpayment of Grant Amount in excess of final project costs shall be returned to the State within 60 days of completion of the Project or the end of the Project Performance Period as shown on page one (1), whichever is earlier.

F. Project Administration

- Grantee agrees to provide all technical and administrative services as needed for Agreement completion. Grantee agrees to monitor and review all work performed; and coordinate budgeting and scheduling to assure that the Agreement is completed within budget, on schedule, and in accordance with approved procedures, applicable laws, and regulations.
- Grantee ensures that the Agreement requirements are met through completion of annual reports, submitted to the State in accordance with the Work Plan and through regular communication with the State.
- Grantee agrees to promptly submit reports as the State has requested in this Agreement or may request during the life of this Agreement.
- The Grantee shall comply with the Drug-Free Workplace Act of 1990 (Government Code section 8350 et seq.), Government Code sections 12990(a-f) and CCR, Title 2, Section 8103 (nondiscrimination for non-public entities, and Public Contract Code section 10295.3 (domestic partners).

G. Project Termination

- Failure by the Grantee to comply with the terms of this Agreement or any other Agreement under the Act may be cause for suspension of all obligations of the State hereunder.
- Failure of the Grantee to comply with the terms of this Agreement shall not be cause for the suspension of all obligations of the State hereunder if in the judgment of the State such failure was due to no fault of the Grantee.
- In such case, any amount required to settle at minimum cost any irrevocable obligations properly incurred shall be eligible for reimbursement under this Agreement.
- 4. Should the Grantee choose to terminate its participation in the program, a thirty (30)-day written notice is required. Final program and expenditure reports are due thirty (30) days after the program cessation. The Grantee agrees to return all unexpended funds within sixty (60) days of project cessation.
- 5. It is mutually agreed that if the Budget Act of the current year and/or any subsequent years covered under this Agreement does not appropriate sufficient funds for the program, this Agreement shall be of no further force and effect. In this event, the state shall have no liability to any funds to the Grantee, furnish any other consideration under this agreement, and the grantee shall not be obligated to perform any provisions of this Agreement.
- 6. If funding for any fiscal year is reduced or deleted by the Budget Act for purposes of this program, the State shall have the option to either cancel this Agreement with no liability occurring to the State or offer an agreement amendment to the Grantee to reflect the changes.

H. Financial Records

- Expenditures shall comply with all applicable provisions of federal, state, and local
 rules, regulations and policies related to the administration, use, and accounting for
 public school funds, including but not limited to, the Education Code of the State of
 California.
- Grantee agrees to maintain satisfactory financial accounts, documents, and records for the Project and to make them available to the State for auditing at reasonable times. Grantee also agrees to retain such financial accounts, documents and records for three years following Project termination or completion.
- 3. Grantee agrees to use a generally accepted accounting system.

I. Audit

- Projects are subject to audit by the State for three years following the final payment of Grant Amount. The purpose of this audit is to verify that project expenditures were properly documented. Grantees will be contacted at least 30 days in advance of an audit.
- Audit will include all books, papers, accounts, documents, or other records of the Grantee, as they relate to the Project for which the State authorized Grant Amount. The Grantee shall have the Project records, including the sources documents and cancelled warrants, readily available to the State.
- The Grantee must also provide an employee having knowledge of the Project and the accounting procedure or system to assist the State's auditor. The Grantee shall provide a copy of any document, paper, record, or the like requested by the State.
- All Project records must be retained for at least one year following an audit or final disputed audit findings.

2021-22 Budget Act Legislation

Section 45:

Section 44415.5 is added to the Education Code, to read:

44415.5.

- (a) For purposes of this section, the following definitions apply for the Teacher Residency Grant Program:
 - "Experienced mentor teacher" means an educator who meets all the following requirements:

 (A) Has at least three years of teaching experience and holds a clear credential in the subject in which the mentor teacher will be mentoring.
 - (B) Has a record of successful teaching as demonstrated, at a minimum, by satisfactory annual performance evaluations for the preceding three years.
 - (C) Receives specific training for the mentor teacher role and engages in ongoing professional learning and networking with other mentors.

- (D) Receives compensation, appropriate release time, or both, to serve as a mentor in the initial preparation or beginning teacher induction component of the teacher residency program.
- (2) "Teacher residency program" is a grant applicant-based program that partners with one or more commission-approved teacher preparation programs offered by a regionally accredited institution of higher education in which a prospective teacher teaches at least one-half time alongside a teacher of record, who is designated as the experienced mentor teacher, for at least one full school year while engaging in initial preparation coursework.
- (b) For the 2021–22 fiscal year, the sum of three hundred fifty million dollars (\$350,000,000) is hereby appropriated from the General Fund to the commission for the Teacher Residency Grant Program to support teacher residency programs that recruit and support the preparation of teachers pursuant to this section. This funding shall be available for encumbrance until June 30, 2026.
- (c) (1) The commission shall make one-time grants to grant applicants to establish new teacher residency programs, or expand, strengthen, or improve access to existing teacher residency programs that support either of the following:
 - (A) Designated shortage fields, including special education, bilingual education, science, computer science, technology, engineering, mathematics, transitional kindergarten, or kindergarten, and any other fields identified by the commission based on an annual analysis of hiring and vacancy data.
 - (B) Local efforts to recruit, develop support systems for, provide outreach and communication strategies to, and retain a diverse teacher workforce that reflects a local educational agency community's diversity.
 - (2) Grant recipients shall work with one or more commission-accredited teacher preparation programs and may work with other community partners or nonprofit organizations to develop and implement programs of preparation and mentoring for resident teachers who will be supported through program funds and subsequently employed by the sponsoring grant recipient.
 - (3) A grant applicant may consist of one or more, or any combination, of the following:
 - (A) A school district.
 - (B) A county office of education.
 - (C) A charter school.
 - (D) A regional occupational center or program operated by a joint powers authority or a county office of education.
- (d) Grants allocated pursuant to subdivision (c) shall be up to twenty-five thousand dollars (\$25,000) per teacher candidate in the residency program of the jurisdiction of the grant recipient, matched by that grant recipient at a rate of 80 percent of the grant amount received per participant, as described in subdivision (f). Residents are also eligible for other forms of federal, state, and local educational agency financial assistance to support the cost of their preparation. Grant program funding shall be used for, but is not limited to, any of the following:
 - (1) Teacher preparation costs.
 - (2) Stipends for mentor teachers, including, but not limited to, housing stipends.
 - (3) Residency program staff costs.
 - (4) Mentoring and beginning teacher induction costs following initial preparation.
- (e) A grant recipient shall not use more than 5 percent of a grant award for program administration costs.
- (f) A grant recipient shall provide a match of grant funding in the form of one or both of the following:
 - (1) Eighty cents (\$0.80) for every one dollar (\$1) of grant funding received per participant, to be used in a manner consistent with allowable grant activities pursuant to subdivision (d).
 - (2) An in-kind match of program director personnel costs, mentor teacher personnel costs, or

other personnel costs related to the Teacher Residency Grant Program, provided by the grant recipient.

- (g) Grant recipients shall do all of the following:
 - (1) Ensure that candidates are prepared to earn a preliminary teaching credential that will authorize the candidate to teach either in a designated shortage field or in furtherance of subparagraph (B) of paragraph (1) of subdivision (c) upon completion of the program.
 - (2) Ensure that candidates are provided instruction in all of the following:
 - (A) Teaching the content area or areas in which the teacher will become certified to teach.
 - (B) Planning, curriculum development, and assessment.
 - (C) Learning and child development.
 - (D) Management of the classroom environment.
 - (E) Use of culturally responsive practices, supports for language development, and supports for serving pupils with disabilities.
 - (F) Professional responsibilities, including interaction with families and colleagues.
 - (3) Provide each candidate mentoring and beginning teacher induction support following the completion of the initial credential program necessary to obtain a clear credential and ongoing professional development and networking opportunities during the candidate's first years of teaching at no cost to the candidate.
 - (4) Prepare candidates to teach in a school within the jurisdiction of the grant recipient in which they will work and learn the instructional initiatives and curriculum of the grant recipient.
 - (5) Group teacher candidates in cohorts to facilitate professional collaboration among residents, and ensure candidates are enrolled in a teaching school or professional development program that is organized to support a high-quality teacher learning experience in a supportive work environment.
- (h) To receive a grant, an applicant shall submit an application to the commission at a time, in a manner, and containing information prescribed by the commission.
- (i) When selecting grant recipients, the commission shall do both of the following:
 - (1) Require applicants to demonstrate a need for teachers in one or more designated shortage fields or for the purposes described in subparagraph (B) of paragraph (1) of subdivision (c), and to propose to establish a new, or expand, strengthen, or improve access to an existing, teacher residency program that recruits, prepares, and supports teachers to teach in either one or more such fields or in furtherance of subparagraph (B) of paragraph (1) of subdivision (c) in a school within the jurisdiction of the sponsoring grant applicant.
 - (2) Give priority consideration to grant applicants who demonstrate a commitment to increasing diversity in the teaching workforce, have a higher percentage than other applicants of unduplicated pupils, as defined in Section 42238.02, and have one or more schools that exhibit one or both of the following characteristics:
 - (A) A school where 50 percent or more of the enrolled pupils are eligible for free or reduced-price meals.
 - (B) A school that is located in either a rural location or a densely populated region.
- (j) A candidate in a teacher residency program sponsored by a grant provided pursuant to subdivision (c) shall agree in writing to serve in a school within the jurisdiction of the grant recipient that sponsored the candidate for a period of at least four school years beginning with the school year that begins after the candidate successfully completes the initial year of preparation and obtains a preliminary teaching credential. A candidate who fails to earn a preliminary credential or complete the period of the placement shall reimburse the sponsoring grant recipient the amount of grant funding invested in the candidate's residency training. The amount to be reimbursed shall be adjusted proportionately to reflect the service

provided if the candidate taught at least one year, but less than four years, at a school within the jurisdiction of the sponsoring grant recipient. A candidate shall have five school years to complete the four-school-year teaching commitment.

- (k) If a candidate is unable to complete a school year of teaching, that school year may still be counted toward the required four complete school years if any of the following occur:
 - (1) The candidate has completed at least one-half of the school year.
 - (2) The employer deems the candidate to have fulfilled their contractual requirements for the school year for the purposes of salary increases, probationary or permanent status, and retirement.
 - (3) The candidate was not able to teach due to the financial circumstances of the sponsoring grant recipient, including a decision to not reelect the employee for the succeeding school year.
 - (4) The candidate has a condition covered under the federal Family and Medical Leave Act of 1993 (29 U.S.C. Sec. 2061 et seq.) or similar state law.
 - (5) The candidate was called or ordered to active duty status for more than 30 days as a member of a reserve component of the Armed Forces of the United States.
- (l) For purposes of administering the grant program pursuant to subdivision (c), the commission shall do all of the following:
 - (1) Determine the number of grants to be awarded and the total amount awarded to each grant applicant.
 - (2) Require grant recipients to submit program and expenditure reports, as specified by the commission, as a condition of receiving grant funds.
 - (3) Annually review each grant recipient's program and expenditure reports to determine if any candidate has failed to meet their commitment pursuant to subdivision (j).
- (m) If the commission determines or is informed that a sponsored candidate failed to earn a preliminary credential or meet their commitment to teach pursuant to subdivision (j), the commission shall confirm with the grant recipient the applicable grant amount to be recovered from the candidate and the grant recipient. The amount to be recovered shall be adjusted proportionately to reflect the service provided if the candidate taught at least one year, but less than four years, at the sponsoring grant recipient.
- (n) Upon confirming the amount to be recovered from the grant recipient pursuant to subdivision (m), the commission shall notify the grant recipient of the amount to be repaid within 60 days. The grant recipient shall have 60 days from the date of the notification to make the required repayment to the commission. If the grant recipient fails to make the required payment within 60 days, the commission shall notify the Controller and the grant recipient of the failure to repay the amount owed. The Controller shall deduct an amount equal to the amount owed to the commission from the grant recipient's next principal apportionment or apportionments of state funds, other than basic aid apportionments required by Section 6 of Article IX of the California Constitution. If the grant recipient is a regional occupational center or program operated by a joint powers authority that does not receive a principal apportionment or apportionments of state funds, or a consortia of local educational agencies, the commission shall notify the Controller of the local educational agency where the candidate taught and the Controller shall deduct the amount owed from the applicable local educational agency's next principal apportionment or apportionments of state funds, other than basic aid apportionments required by Section 6 of Article IX of the California Constitution.
- (o) An amount recovered by the commission or deducted by the Controller pursuant to subdivision (n) shall be deposited into the Proposition 98 Reversion Account.
- (p) Grant recipients may recover from a sponsored candidate who fails to earn a preliminary credential or complete the period of placement the amount of grant funding invested in the candidate's residency

training. The amount to be recovered shall be adjusted proportionately to reflect the service provided if the candidate taught at least one year, but less than four years, at a school within the jurisdiction of the sponsoring grant recipient.

- (q) Grant recipients shall not charge a teacher resident a fee to participate in the Teacher Residency Grant Program.
- (r) (1) Notwithstanding subdivision (c), the commission may allocate up to twenty-five million dollars (\$25,000,000) of the amount appropriated pursuant to subdivision (b) to capacity grants that shall be awarded on a competitive basis to local educational agencies or consortia, as designated pursuant to this section, partnering with regionally accredited institutions of higher education to expand, strengthen, improve access to, or create teacher residency programs that lead to more credentialed teachers to teach either in shortage fields or in furtherance of subparagraph (B) of paragraph (1) of subdivision (c).
 - (2) (A) The commission shall determine the number of capacity grants to be awarded and the amount of the applicable grants.
 - (B) Individual capacity grants shall not exceed two hundred fifty thousand dollars (\$250,000) per grant recipient.
- (s) For purposes of making the computations required by Section 8 of Article XVI of the California Constitution, the appropriation made by subdivision (b) shall be deemed to be "General Fund revenues appropriated for school districts," as defined in subdivision (c) of Section 41202, for the 2020-21 fiscal year, and included within the "total allocations to school districts and community college districts from General Fund proceeds of taxes appropriated pursuant to Article XIII B," as defined in subdivision (e) of Section 41202, for the 2020-21 fiscal year.

SEC. 46.

Section 44417.5 is added to the Education Code, to read:

44417.5.

The commission shall conduct an evaluation of the Teacher Residency Grant Program described in Section 44415.5 to determine the effectiveness of this program in recruiting, developing support systems for, and retaining teachers prepared to teach either in commission-designated shortage areas or in furtherance of subparagraph (B) of paragraph (1) of subdivision (c) of Section 44415.5, and provide a report to the Department of Finance and the appropriate fiscal and policy committees of the Legislature on or before December 1, 2027.

UCLA-TEP will oversee recruitment efforts via online and in-person information sessions, presentations in undergraduate classes and programs such as Cal Teach (focused on STEM undergraduates), and participation in university-sponsored graduate student fairs, including those hosted by Historically Black Colleges and Universities (HBCUs). Further, UCLA-TEP will employ social media and connect with program alums to inform and recruit math and science residents. LAUSD and CVUHSD will continue to assist recruitment efforts by sharing the residency information with the district's paraprofessionals and substitute teachers. GRANT AGREEMENT COMMISSION ON TEACHER CREDENTIALING

TERMS AND CONDITIONS OF GRANT

The Grantee shall be responsible for the performance of the work as set forth herein below and for the preparation of reports as specified in this Agreement. The Grantee's Project Representative shall promptly notify the State of events or proposed changes that could affect the Work Plan under this Agreement.

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the LEA's application and budget herein attached as exhibits A and B, and as approved by the State.

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- 2. Grantee agrees to submit in writing any deviation from the approved grant application to the State for approval, prior to implementation of changes.
- 3. Grantees will be expected to make appropriate yearly progress in implementing their expanded residency model, resulting in an increase in the number of teacher resident candidates and according to the operational plan provided in the funded application. Applicants should note that as a condition of receipt of a grant, the LEA grantee must agree to report outcome data when reports are requested by Commission staff. Failure to comply with funding terms or reporting requirements could put future funding opportunities at risk.
- 4. Grant funding may be subject to change when any unspent funds are reported in any annual reports.
- 5. The Teacher Residency Implementation grant funding period, and the approved grant activities, may extend through June 30, 2026. For grantees who also apply for or have already been awarded other Teacher Residency grant funding, the grantee may continue to operate their Teacher Residency Implementation Grant within the grant funding period and planned activities within the specified grant agreement. The funds in this grant agreement may be spent concurrently with previously awarded grant agreements until their respective cutoff dates to complete the planned activities described in the response to the selection criteria and as stated in the statute(s) in the grant agreement that authorizes funding.

C. Project Costs

Subject to the availability of Grant Amount in the Act, the State hereby grants to the Grantee an annual sum of money (Annual Grant Amount) not to exceed the amount stated on page one (1) of this Agreement in consideration of and on condition that the sum be expended in carrying out the purpose as set forth in the Work Plan and under the terms and conditions set forth in this Agreement. Grantee agrees to assume any obligation to furnish any additional funds that may be necessary to complete the Project. All costs accrued for services or supplies prior to the execution of Agreement are not eligible for reimbursement.

The Grant Amount to be provided to the Grantee, under this Agreement, may be disbursed as follows:

 Upon approval of the application, the first payment will be 90 percent (90%) of the total annual budget amount projected for the first year of resident enrollment.

- The second payment will be 10 percent (10%) of the total annual budget amount projected for the first year of resident enrollment. The second payment will be provided to grantees after the program has completed its activities and submitted required annual reports to the Commission.
- 3. Subsequent Annual payments will be determined by calculating the program need based on the actual expenditures reported by the program from the previous fiscal year and the projected enrollment numbers submitted by the program for the following fiscal year. Annual awards will be disbursed in two payments following the 90 percent (90%)/10 percent (10%) model described above. Unspent funds reported on annual reports will be deducted from the next allotment of funds.
- Annual payments will not be released until the completed annual report from the previous fiscal year has been approved by Commission staff.

D. Allowable Activities and Use of Funds

- 1. Assembly Bill (AB) 130 (Chapter 44, Statutes of 2021) provided the Commission with \$350 million for the Teacher Residency Grant Program, with up to \$325 million allocated to expansion and implementation grants that shall not exceed \$25,000 per teacher candidate in the residency program of the jurisdiction of the grant recipient. Per statute, the grant funds must be matched by the grantee LEA or consortium on an eighty cents (\$.80) to one dollar (\$1) basis. Matching funds may be actual dollars or in-kind services. Funding is available through June 30, 2026.
- Sample activities that can be funded through the Teacher Residency Implementation
 Grants include but are not limited to implementing or expanding an existing LEA-IHE
 collaborative teacher residency to include any or all of the allowable designated
 shortage areas or diversification of the teacher workforce efforts described in the
 authorizing legislation.
- 3. The Grantee warrants by execution of this Agreement, that no person or selling agency has been employed or retained to solicit or secure this Agreement upon agreement or understanding for a commission, percentage, brokerage, or contingent fee, excepting bona fide employees or bona fide established commercial or selling agencies maintained by the Grantee for the purpose of securing business. For breach or violation of the warranty, the state shall, in addition to other remedies provided by law, have the right to annul this Agreement without liability, paying only for the value of the work performed, or otherwise recover the full amount of such commission, percentage, brokerage, or contingent fee.

E. Payment Documentation

- 1. Payment shall be made yearly for the annual grant amount, less 10% withholding to be released upon satisfactory completion of all required deliverables.
- Any overpayment of Grant Amount in excess of final project costs shall be returned to the State within 60 days of completion of the Project or the end of the Project Performance Period as shown on page one (1), whichever is earlier.

F. Project Administration

- Grantee agrees to provide all technical and administrative services as needed for Agreement completion. Grantee agrees to monitor and review all work performed; and coordinate budgeting and scheduling to assure that the Agreement is completed within budget, on schedule, and in accordance with approved procedures, applicable laws, and regulations.
- Grantee ensures that the Agreement requirements are met through completion of annual reports, submitted to the State in accordance with the Work Plan and through regular communication with the State.
- Grantee agrees to promptly submit reports as the State has requested in this Agreement or may request during the life of this Agreement.
- The Grantee shall comply with the Drug-Free Workplace Act of 1990 (Government Code section 8350 et seq.), Government Code sections 12990(a-f) and CCR, Title 2, Section 8103 (nondiscrimination for non-public entities, and Public Contract Code section 10295.3 (domestic partners).

G. Project Termination

- Failure by the Grantee to comply with the terms of this Agreement or any other Agreement under the Act may be cause for suspension of all obligations of the State hereunder.
- Failure of the Grantee to comply with the terms of this Agreement shall not be cause for the suspension of all obligations of the State hereunder if in the judgment of the State such failure was due to no fault of the Grantee.
- In such case, any amount required to settle at minimum cost any irrevocable obligations properly incurred shall be eligible for reimbursement under this Agreement.
- 4. Should the Grantee choose to terminate its participation in the program, a thirty (30)-day written notice is required. Final program and expenditure reports are due thirty (30) days after the program cessation. The Grantee agrees to return all unexpended funds within sixty (60) days of project cessation.
- 5. It is mutually agreed that if the Budget Act of the current year and/or any subsequent years covered under this Agreement does not appropriate sufficient funds for the program, this Agreement shall be of no further force and effect. In this event, the state shall have no liability to any funds to the Grantee, furnish any other consideration under this agreement, and the grantee shall not be obligated to perform any provisions of this Agreement.
- 6. If funding for any fiscal year is reduced or deleted by the Budget Act for purposes of this program, the State shall have the option to either cancel this Agreement with no liability occurring to the State or offer an agreement amendment to the Grantee to reflect the changes.

H. Financial Records

- Expenditures shall comply with all applicable provisions of federal, state, and local rules, regulations and policies related to the administration, use, and accounting for public school funds, including but not limited to, the Education Code of the State of California.
- Grantee agrees to maintain satisfactory financial accounts, documents, and records for the Project and to make them available to the State for auditing at reasonable times. Grantee also agrees to retain such financial accounts, documents and records for three years following Project termination or completion.
- 3. Grantee agrees to use a generally accepted accounting system.

I. Audit

- Projects are subject to audit by the State for three years following the final payment of Grant Amount. The purpose of this audit is to verify that project expenditures were properly documented. Grantees will be contacted at least 30 days in advance of an audit.
- Audit will include all books, papers, accounts, documents, or other records of the Grantee, as they relate to the Project for which the State authorized Grant Amount. The Grantee shall have the Project records, including the sources documents and cancelled warrants, readily available to the State.
- The Grantee must also provide an employee having knowledge of the Project and the accounting procedure or system to assist the State's auditor. The Grantee shall provide a copy of any document, paper, record, or the like requested by the State.
- All Project records must be retained for at least one year following an audit or final disputed audit findings.

2021-22 Budget Act Legislation

Section 45:

Section 44415.5 is added to the Education Code, to read:

44415.5

- (a) For purposes of this section, the following definitions apply for the Teacher Residency Grant Program:
 - (1) "Experienced mentor teacher" means an educator who meets all the following requirements:

 (A) Has at least three years of teaching experience and holds a clear credential in the
 - (A) Has at least three years of teaching experience and holds a clear credential in the subject in which the mentor teacher will be mentoring.
 - (B) Has a record of successful teaching as demonstrated, at a minimum, by satisfactory annual performance evaluations for the preceding three years.
 - (C) Receives specific training for the mentor teacher role and engages in ongoing professional learning and networking with other mentors.

- (D) Receives compensation, appropriate release time, or both, to serve as a mentor in the initial preparation or beginning teacher induction component of the teacher residency program.
- (2) "Teacher residency program" is a grant applicant-based program that partners with one or more commission-approved teacher preparation programs offered by a regionally accredited institution of higher education in which a prospective teacher teaches at least one-half time alongside a teacher of record, who is designated as the experienced mentor teacher, for at least one full school year while engaging in initial preparation coursework.
- (b) For the 2021–22 fiscal year, the sum of three hundred fifty million dollars (\$350,000,000) is hereby appropriated from the General Fund to the commission for the Teacher Residency Grant Program to support teacher residency programs that recruit and support the preparation of teachers pursuant to this section. This funding shall be available for encumbrance until June 30, 2026.
- (c) (1) The commission shall make one-time grants to grant applicants to establish new teacher residency programs, or expand, strengthen, or improve access to existing teacher residency programs that support either of the following:
 - (A) Designated shortage fields, including special education, bilingual education, science, computer science, technology, engineering, mathematics, transitional kindergarten, or kindergarten, and any other fields identified by the commission based on an annual analysis of hiring and vacancy data.
 - (B) Local efforts to recruit, develop support systems for, provide outreach and communication strategies to, and retain a diverse teacher workforce that reflects a local educational agency community's diversity.
 - (2) Grant recipients shall work with one or more commission-accredited teacher preparation programs and may work with other community partners or nonprofit organizations to develop and implement programs of preparation and mentoring for resident teachers who will be supported through program funds and subsequently employed by the sponsoring grant recipient.
 - (3) A grant applicant may consist of one or more, or any combination, of the following:
 - (A) A school district.
 - (B) A county office of education.
 - (C) A charter school.
 - (D) A regional occupational center or program operated by a joint powers authority or a county office of education.
- (d) Grants allocated pursuant to subdivision (c) shall be up to twenty-five thousand dollars (\$25,000) per teacher candidate in the residency program of the jurisdiction of the grant recipient, matched by that grant recipient at a rate of 80 percent of the grant amount received per participant, as described in subdivision (f). Residents are also eligible for other forms of federal, state, and local educational agency financial assistance to support the cost of their preparation. Grant program funding shall be used for, but is not limited to, any of the following:
 - (1) Teacher preparation costs.
 - (2) Stipends for mentor teachers, including, but not limited to, housing stipends.
 - (3) Residency program staff costs.
 - (4) Mentoring and beginning teacher induction costs following initial preparation.
- (e) A grant recipient shall not use more than 5 percent of a grant award for program administration costs.
- (f) A grant recipient shall provide a match of grant funding in the form of one or both of the following:
 - (1) Eighty cents (\$0.80) for every one dollar (\$1) of grant funding received per participant, to be used in a manner consistent with allowable grant activities pursuant to subdivision (d).
 - (2) An in-kind match of program director personnel costs, mentor teacher personnel costs, or

other personnel costs related to the Teacher Residency Grant Program, provided by the grant recipient.

(g) Grant recipients shall do all of the following:

(1) Ensure that candidates are prepared to earn a preliminary teaching credential that will authorize the candidate to teach either in a designated shortage field or in furtherance of subparagraph (B) of paragraph (1) of subdivision (c) upon completion of the program.

(2) Ensure that candidates are provided instruction in all of the following:

- (A) Teaching the content area or areas in which the teacher will become certified to teach.
- (B) Planning, curriculum development, and assessment.
- (C) Learning and child development.
- (D) Management of the classroom environment.
- (E) Use of culturally responsive practices, supports for language development, and supports for serving pupils with disabilities.
- (F) Professional responsibilities, including interaction with families and colleagues.
- (3) Provide each candidate mentoring and beginning teacher induction support following the completion of the initial credential program necessary to obtain a clear credential and ongoing professional development and networking opportunities during the candidate's first years of teaching at no cost to the candidate.
- (4) Prepare candidates to teach in a school within the jurisdiction of the grant recipient in which they will work and learn the instructional initiatives and curriculum of the grant recipient.
- (5) Group teacher candidates in cohorts to facilitate professional collaboration among residents, and ensure candidates are enrolled in a teaching school or professional development program that is organized to support a high-quality teacher learning experience in a supportive work environment.
- (h) To receive a grant, an applicant shall submit an application to the commission at a time, in a manner, and containing information prescribed by the commission.
- (i) When selecting grant recipients, the commission shall do both of the following:
 - (1) Require applicants to demonstrate a need for teachers in one or more designated shortage fields or for the purposes described in subparagraph (B) of paragraph (1) of subdivision (c), and to propose to establish a new, or expand, strengthen, or improve access to an existing, teacher residency program that recruits, prepares, and supports teachers to teach in either one or more such fields or in furtherance of subparagraph (B) of paragraph (1) of subdivision (c) in a school within the jurisdiction of the sponsoring grant applicant.
 - (2) Give priority consideration to grant applicants who demonstrate a commitment to increasing diversity in the teaching workforce, have a higher percentage than other applicants of unduplicated pupils, as defined in Section 42238.02, and have one or more schools that exhibit one or both of the following characteristics:
 - (A) A school where 50 percent or more of the enrolled pupils are eligible for free or reduced-price meals.
 - (B) A school that is located in either a rural location or a densely populated region.
- (j) A candidate in a teacher residency program sponsored by a grant provided pursuant to subdivision (c) shall agree in writing to serve in a school within the jurisdiction of the grant recipient that sponsored the candidate for a period of at least four school years beginning with the school year that begins after the candidate successfully completes the initial year of preparation and obtains a preliminary teaching credential. A candidate who fails to earn a preliminary credential or complete the period of the placement shall reimburse the sponsoring grant recipient the amount of grant funding invested in the candidate's residency training. The amount to be reimbursed shall be adjusted proportionately to reflect the service

provided if the candidate taught at least one year, but less than four years, at a school within the jurisdiction of the sponsoring grant recipient. A candidate shall have five school years to complete the four-school-year teaching commitment.

- (k) If a candidate is unable to complete a school year of teaching, that school year may still be counted toward the required four complete school years if any of the following occur:
 - (1) The candidate has completed at least one-half of the school year.
 - (2) The employer deems the candidate to have fulfilled their contractual requirements for the school year for the purposes of salary increases, probationary or permanent status, and retirement.
 - (3) The candidate was not able to teach due to the financial circumstances of the sponsoring grant recipient, including a decision to not reelect the employee for the succeeding school year.
 - (4) The candidate has a condition covered under the federal Family and Medical Leave Act of 1993 (29 U.S.C. Sec. 2061 et seq.) or similar state law.
 - (5) The candidate was called or ordered to active duty status for more than 30 days as a member of a reserve component of the Armed Forces of the United States.
- (l) For purposes of administering the grant program pursuant to subdivision (c), the commission shall do all of the following:
 - (1) Determine the number of grants to be awarded and the total amount awarded to each grant applicant.
 - (2) Require grant recipients to submit program and expenditure reports, as specified by the commission, as a condition of receiving grant funds.
 - (3) Annually review each grant recipient's program and expenditure reports to determine if any candidate has failed to meet their commitment pursuant to subdivision (j).
- (m) If the commission determines or is informed that a sponsored candidate failed to earn a preliminary credential or meet their commitment to teach pursuant to subdivision (j), the commission shall confirm with the grant recipient the applicable grant amount to be recovered from the candidate and the grant recipient. The amount to be recovered shall be adjusted proportionately to reflect the service provided if the candidate taught at least one year, but less than four years, at the sponsoring grant recipient.
- (n) Upon confirming the amount to be recovered from the grant recipient pursuant to subdivision (m), the commission shall notify the grant recipient of the amount to be repaid within 60 days. The grant recipient shall have 60 days from the date of the notification to make the required repayment to the commission. If the grant recipient fails to make the required payment within 60 days, the commission shall notify the Controller and the grant recipient of the failure to repay the amount owed. The Controller shall deduct an amount equal to the amount owed to the commission from the grant recipient's next principal apportionment or apportionments of state funds, other than basic aid apportionments required by Section 6 of Article IX of the California Constitution. If the grant recipient is a regional occupational center or program operated by a joint powers authority that does not receive a principal apportionment or apportionments of state funds, or a consortia of local educational agencies, the commission shall notify the Controller of the local educational agency where the candidate taught and the Controller shall deduct the amount owed from the applicable local educational agency's next principal apportionment or apportionments of state funds, other than basic aid apportionments required by Section 6 of Article IX of the California Constitution.
- (o) An amount recovered by the commission or deducted by the Controller pursuant to subdivision (n) shall be deposited into the Proposition 98 Reversion Account.
- (p) Grant recipients may recover from a sponsored candidate who fails to earn a preliminary credential or complete the period of placement the amount of grant funding invested in the candidate's residency

training. The amount to be recovered shall be adjusted proportionately to reflect the service provided if the candidate taught at least one year, but less than four years, at a school within the jurisdiction of the sponsoring grant recipient.

- (q) Grant recipients shall not charge a teacher resident a fee to participate in the Teacher Residency Grant Program.
- (r) (1) Notwithstanding subdivision (c), the commission may allocate up to twenty-five million dollars (\$25,000,000) of the amount appropriated pursuant to subdivision (b) to capacity grants that shall be awarded on a competitive basis to local educational agencies or consortia, as designated pursuant to this section, partnering with regionally accredited institutions of higher education to expand, strengthen, improve access to, or create teacher residency programs that lead to more credentialed teachers to teach either in shortage fields or in furtherance of subparagraph (B) of paragraph (1) of subdivision (c).
 - (2) (A) The commission shall determine the number of capacity grants to be awarded and the amount of the applicable grants.
 - (B) Individual capacity grants shall not exceed two hundred fifty thousand dollars (\$250,000) per grant recipient.
- (s) For purposes of making the computations required by Section 8 of Article XVI of the California Constitution, the appropriation made by subdivision (b) shall be deemed to be "General Fund revenues appropriated for school districts," as defined in subdivision (c) of Section 41202, for the 2020–21 fiscal year, and included within the "total allocations to school districts and community college districts from General Fund proceeds of taxes appropriated pursuant to Article XIII B," as defined in subdivision (e) of Section 41202, for the 2020–21 fiscal year.

SEC. 46.

Section 44417.5 is added to the Education Code, to read:

44417.5.

The commission shall conduct an evaluation of the Teacher Residency Grant Program described in Section 44415.5 to determine the effectiveness of this program in recruiting, developing support systems for, and retaining teachers prepared to teach either in commission-designated shortage areas or in furtherance of subparagraph (B) of paragraph (1) of subdivision (c) of Section 44415.5, and provide a report to the Department of Finance and the appropriate fiscal and policy committees of the Legislature on or before December 1, 2027.

Exhibit A

Task List and Timeline

(Supplied by Grantee, Question 3 of RFA Response)

There is a clear process for recruiting and selecting diverse and committed residency candidates who demonstrate high likelihood for success. Residents first apply for the USC Rossier MAT program and once admitted, they can apply for the residency program by completing the required essay and going through a Residency Committee review of documents, culminating in an interview with the committee.

- Applicants that complete the essay for the residency process will have their applications,
 personal statements, short-answer and mission directed written responses on their
 applications reviewed by the interview panel committee (e.g., faculty of the IHE and LEA).
 Please see Residency Admissions Rubric (Includes Residency Essay Information).
- Applicants will then be asked to participate in an interview, via Zoom with the same committee. <u>The Residency Interview Protocol</u> and <u>Residency Interview Rubric</u> will be used to prompt and note their responses. Based upon written response and professional characteristics demonstrated in the interview, the committee will choose 15-20 residents to participate in the program.

Assessment of Resident performance is transparent and formative. During Term 1, Mentors and Residents participate in 3 "conversations" (beginning, middle and exit) to evaluate the Residents progress forward. These are video-taped and shared with the program director and co-director. They are not graded, instead they are used as a strategy to build rapport, communication and trust. Residents also attend monthly meetings with the residency team (e.g., faculty from the LEA and IHE) to conduct check-ins, review progress and identify next steps.

Coursework for residents is assessed as it is in the traditional program, with the same expectations. This is consistent in Terms 2 & 3, where practicum and coursework are blended in Core Pedagogy classes, EDUC 673 and 677b. Each term culminates with a Key Assessment.

Terms 1 & 2 build skills toward understanding the cultural context, planning, instruction and assessment (see Program Structure above). Term 3 Key Assessment is the edTPA, and Term 4 Key Assessment is a Capstone Project in EDUC 677B. Lastly, residents will commit to work 4 years in LEA schools.

GRANT AGREEMENT COMMISSION ON TEACHER CREDENTIALING

TERMS AND CONDITIONS OF GRANT

The Grantee shall be responsible for the performance of the work as set forth herein below and for the preparation of reports as specified in this Agreement. The Grantee's Project Representative shall promptly notify the State of events or proposed changes that could affect the Work Plan under this Agreement.

General Provisions

A. Definitions

- The term "Agreement" as used herein means a grant agreement between the State and Grantee specifying the payment of Grant Amount by the State for the performance of Work Plan within the Project Performance Period by the Grantee.
- 2. The term "Encumbrance" as used herein means a planned expenditure of grant funds.
- 3. The term "Grant Amount" as used herein means funds allocated to the Grantee in accordance with Education Code 44415.5.
- The term "Grantee" as used herein means the party described as the Grantee on page one (1) of this Agreement.
- The term "Institutions of higher education" means the California State University, the University of California, and private regionally accredited institutions of higher education institutions that offer a commission-approved pupil personnel services credential preparation program specializing in school counseling.
- 6. The term "Program" means the California Teacher Residency Capacity Grant Program.
- The term "Project" as used herein means the project described on page one (1) of this Agreement.
- 8. The term "Project Performance Period" as used herein means the period of time that the Grant Amount is available, and the time in which the Project must be complete, billed and paid as described on page one (1) of this Agreement.
- The term "Project Representative" as used herein means the person authorized by the Grantee to be responsible for the Project and can make daily management decisions.
- 10. The term "State" as used herein means the Commission on Teacher Credentialing.
- 11. The term "Teacher Residency Capacity Grant Program" is a state grant program authorized under the provisions of EC §44415 and §44415.5 that provides funding for the development of teacher residency programs.
- 12. The term "Work Plan" means the residency pathway planning activities described in

the LEA's application and budget herein attached as exhibits A and B, and as approved by the State.

B. Project Execution

- Grantee agrees to complete the Project in accordance with the time of Project
 Performance Period, and under the terms and conditions of this Agreement. Extensions
 may be requested at least 90 days in advance of the date of termination and will be
 considered in the event of circumstances beyond the control of the Grantee, but in no
 event subsequent to the end of the Project Performance Period as identified in the Work
 Plan as the Project's date of completion.
- Grantee agrees to submit in writing any deviation from the approved grant application to the State for approval, prior to implementation of changes.
- 3. Grantees will be expected to make appropriate progress in implementing the program planning process according to the operational plan provided in the funded application. Additionally, grantees will be expected to provide data and expenditure reports when annual reports are requested by the Commission. Failure to comply with funding terms or reporting requirements could put future funding opportunities at risk.
- Grant funding may be subject to change when any unspent funds are reported in any annual reports.
- 5. The Teacher Residency Capacity grants are intended to prepare the LEA applicant and their IHE partner to apply for the full residency grant program. The Teacher Residency Capacity grant funding period, and the approved grant activities, may extend through June 30, 2026. Grantees who also apply for other Teacher Residency grant funding may continue to operate their Teacher Residency Capacity Grant and spend funds from both grants concurrently to complete the planned activities described in the response to the selection criteria.

C. Project Costs

Subject to the availability of Grant Amount in the Act, the State hereby grants to the Grantee a sum of money not to exceed the amount stated on page one (1) of this Agreement in consideration of and on condition that the sum be expended in carrying out the purpose as set forth in the Work Plan and under the terms and conditions set forth in this Agreement. Grantee agrees to assume any obligation to furnish any additional funds that may be necessary to complete the Project. All costs accrued for services or supplies prior to the execution of Agreement are not eligible for reimbursement.

The Grant Amount to be provided to the Grantee, under this Agreement, may be disbursed as follows:

- Upon approval of the application, the first payment will be 90 percent (90%) of the total budget amount.
- The second payment will be 10 percent (10%) of the total budget amount. The second payment will be provided to grantees after the program has completed its activities and submitted a report of outcomes.

D. Allowable Activities and Use of Funds

- The 2021-22 Budget Act legislation authorizes the Commission to allocate up to \$25 million for capacity grants that shall not exceed \$250,000 per grant recipient. Per statute, the grant funds must be matched by the grantee LEA or consortium on an eighty cents (\$.80) to one dollar (\$1) basis. Matching funds may be actual dollars or in-kind services. Funding is available through June 30, 2026.
- 2. Sample activities that can be funded through the Teacher Residency Capacity Grants include but are not limited to: (a) planning and development of a new, collaborative LEA-IHE teacher residency program; (b) planning to expand an existing LEA-IHE collaborative teacher residency; (c) developing the LEA's/consortium's and IHE's capacity to effectively offer a teacher residency program within its local school(s); (d) developing the IHE's capacity to support a cohort model for residents in the program; and (e) developing the collaborative LEA-IHE partnership's capacity to apply for future grant funding to operate the intended teacher residency program.
- 3. The Grantee warrants by execution of this Agreement, that no person or selling agency has been employed or retained to solicit or secure this Agreement upon agreement or understanding for a commission, percentage, brokerage, or contingent fee, excepting bona fide employees or bona fide established commercial or selling agencies maintained by the Grantee for the purpose of securing business. For breach or violation of the warranty, the state shall, in addition to other remedies provided by law, have the right to annul this Agreement without liability, paying only for the value of the work performed, or otherwise recover the full amount of such commission, percentage, brokerage, or contingent fee.

E. Payment Documentation

- Payment shall be made for the total grant amount, less 10% withholding to be released upon satisfactory completion of all required deliverables.
- Grantee shall submit all documentation for Project completion and final reimbursement within 90 days of Project completion, but no later than the end of the Project Performance Period as shown on page one (1).
- 3. Any overpayment of the Grant Amount shall be returned to the State.

F. Project Administration

- Grantee agrees to provide all technical and administrative services as needed for Agreement completion. Grantee agrees to monitor and review all work performed; and coordinate budgeting and scheduling to assure that the Agreement is completed within budget, on schedule, and in accordance with approved procedures, applicable laws, and regulations.
- Grantee ensures that the Agreement requirements are met through completion of annual reports, submitted to the State in accordance with the Work Plan and through regular communication with the State.
- Grantee agrees to promptly submit reports as the State has requested in this Agreement or may request during the life of this Agreement.

 The Grantee shall comply with the Drug-Free Workplace Act of 1990 (Government Code section 8350 et seq.), Government Code sections 12990(a-f) and CCR, Title 2, Section 8103 (nondiscrimination for non-public entities, and Public Contract Code section 10295.3 (domestic partners).

G. Project Termination

- Failure by the Grantee to comply with the terms of this Agreement or any other Agreement under the Act may be cause for suspension of all obligations of the State hereunder.
- Failure of the Grantee to comply with the terms of this Agreement shall not be cause for the suspension of all obligations of the State hereunder if in the judgment of the State such failure was due to no fault of the Grantee.
- In such case, any amount required to settle at minimum cost any irrevocable obligations properly incurred shall be eligible for reimbursement under this Agreement.
- 4. Should the Grantee choose to terminate its participation in the program, a thirty (30)-day written notice is required. Final program and expenditure reports are due thirty (30) days after the program cessation. The Grantee agrees to return all unexpended funds within sixty (60) days of project cessation.
- 5. It is mutually agreed that if the Budget Act of the current year and/or any subsequent years covered under this Agreement does not appropriate sufficient funds for the program, this Agreement shall be of no further force and effect. In this event, the state shall have no liability to any funds to the Grantee, furnish any other consideration under this agreement, and the grantee shall not be obligated to perform any provisions of this Agreement.
- 6. If funding for any fiscal year is reduced or deleted by the Budget Act for purposes of this program, the State shall have the option to either cancel this Agreement with no liability occurring to the State or offer an agreement amendment to the Grantee to reflect the changes.

H. Financial Records

- Expenditures shall comply with all applicable provisions of federal, state, and local rules, regulations and policies related to the administration, use, and accounting for public school funds, including but not limited to, the Education Code of the State of California.
- Grantee agrees to maintain satisfactory financial accounts, documents, and records for the Project and to make them available to the State for auditing at reasonable times. Grantee also agrees to retain such financial accounts, documents and records for three years following Project termination or completion.
- 3. Grantee agrees to use a generally accepted accounting system.

I. Audit

1. Projects are subject to audit by the State for three years following the final payment of

Grant Amount. The purpose of this audit is to verify that project expenditures were properly documented. Grantees will be contacted at least 30 days in advance of an audit.

- Audit will include all books, papers, accounts, documents, or other records of the Grantee, as they relate to the Project for which the State authorized Grant Amount. The Grantee shall have the Project records, including the sources documents and cancelled warrants, readily available to the State.
- The Grantee must also provide an employee having knowledge of the Project and the accounting procedure or system to assist the State's auditor. The Grantee shall provide a copy of any document, paper, record, or the like requested by the State.
- All Project records must be retained for at least one year following an audit or final disputed audit findings.

2021-22 Budget Act Legislation

Section 45:

Section 44415.5 is added to the Education Code, to read:

44415.5

- (a) For purposes of this section, the following definitions apply for the Teacher Residency Grant Program:
 - (1) "Experienced mentor teacher" means an educator who meets all the following requirements:
 (A) Has at least three years of teaching experience and holds a clear credential in the subject in which the mentor teacher will be mentoring.
 - (B) Has a record of successful teaching as demonstrated, at a minimum, by satisfactory annual performance evaluations for the preceding three years.
 - (C) Receives specific training for the mentor teacher role and engages in ongoing professional learning and networking with other mentors.
 - (D) Receives compensation, appropriate release time, or both, to serve as a mentor in the initial preparation or beginning teacher induction component of the teacher residency program.
 - (2) "Teacher residency program" is a grant applicant-based program that partners with one or more commission-approved teacher preparation programs offered by a regionally accredited institution of higher education in which a prospective teacher teaches at least one-half time alongside a teacher of record, who is designated as the experienced mentor teacher, for at least one full school year while engaging in initial preparation coursework.
- (b) For the 2021–22 fiscal year, the sum of three hundred fifty million dollars (\$350,000,000) is hereby appropriated from the General Fund to the commission for the Teacher Residency Grant Program to support teacher residency programs that recruit and support the preparation of teachers pursuant to this section. This funding shall be available for encumbrance until June 30, 2026.
- (c) (1) The commission shall make one-time grants to grant applicants to establish new teacher residency programs, or expand, strengthen, or improve access to existing teacher residency programs that support either of the following:

- (A) Designated shortage fields, including special education, bilingual education, science, computer science, technology, engineering, mathematics, transitional kindergarten, or kindergarten, and any other fields identified by the commission based on an annual analysis of hiring and vacancy data.
- (B) Local efforts to recruit, develop support systems for, provide outreach and communication strategies to, and retain a diverse teacher workforce that reflects a local educational agency community's diversity.
- (2) Grant recipients shall work with one or more commission-accredited teacher preparation programs and may work with other community partners or nonprofit organizations to develop and implement programs of preparation and mentoring for resident teachers who will be supported through program funds and subsequently employed by the sponsoring grant recipient.
- (3) A grant applicant may consist of one or more, or any combination, of the following:
 - (A) A school district.
 - (B) A county office of education.
 - (C) A charter school.
 - (D) A regional occupational center or program operated by a joint powers authority or a county office of education.
- (d) Grants allocated pursuant to subdivision (c) shall be up to twenty-five thousand dollars (\$25,000) per teacher candidate in the residency program of the jurisdiction of the grant recipient, matched by that grant recipient at a rate of 80 percent of the grant amount received per participant, as described in subdivision (f). Residents are also eligible for other forms of federal, state, and local educational agency financial assistance to support the cost of their preparation. Grant program funding shall be used for, but is not limited to, any of the following:
 - (1) Teacher preparation costs.
 - (2) Stipends for mentor teachers, including, but not limited to, housing stipends.
 - (3) Residency program staff costs.
 - (4) Mentoring and beginning teacher induction costs following initial preparation.
- (e) A grant recipient shall not use more than 5 percent of a grant award for program administration costs.
- (f) A grant recipient shall provide a match of grant funding in the form of one or both of the following:
 - (1) Eighty cents (\$0.80) for every one dollar (\$1) of grant funding received per participant, to be used in a manner consistent with allowable grant activities pursuant to subdivision (d).
 - (2) An in-kind match of program director personnel costs, mentor teacher personnel costs, or other personnel costs related to the Teacher Residency Grant Program, provided by the grant recipient.
- (g) Grant recipients shall do all of the following:
 - (1) Ensure that candidates are prepared to earn a preliminary teaching credential that will authorize the candidate to teach either in a designated shortage field or in furtherance of subparagraph (B) of paragraph (1) of subdivision (c) upon completion of the program.
 - (2) Ensure that candidates are provided instruction in all of the following:
 - (A) Teaching the content area or areas in which the teacher will become certified to teach.
 - (B) Planning, curriculum development, and assessment.
 - (C) Learning and child development.
 - (D) Management of the classroom environment.
 - (E) Use of culturally responsive practices, supports for language development, and supports for serving pupils with disabilities.
 - (F) Professional responsibilities, including interaction with families and colleagues.
 - (3) Provide each candidate mentoring and beginning teacher induction support following the

completion of the initial credential program necessary to obtain a clear credential and ongoing professional development and networking opportunities during the candidate's first years of teaching at no cost to the candidate.

- (4) Prepare candidates to teach in a school within the jurisdiction of the grant recipient in which they will work and learn the instructional initiatives and curriculum of the grant recipient.
- (5) Group teacher candidates in cohorts to facilitate professional collaboration among residents, and ensure candidates are enrolled in a teaching school or professional development program that is organized to support a high-quality teacher learning experience in a supportive work environment.
- (h) To receive a grant, an applicant shall submit an application to the commission at a time, in a manner, and containing information prescribed by the commission.
- (i) When selecting grant recipients, the commission shall do both of the following:
 - (1) Require applicants to demonstrate a need for teachers in one or more designated shortage fields or for the purposes described in subparagraph (B) of paragraph (1) of subdivision (c), and to propose to establish a new, or expand, strengthen, or improve access to an existing, teacher residency program that recruits, prepares, and supports teachers to teach in either one or more such fields or in furtherance of subparagraph (B) of paragraph (1) of subdivision (c) in a school within the jurisdiction of the sponsoring grant applicant.
 - (2) Give priority consideration to grant applicants who demonstrate a commitment to increasing diversity in the teaching workforce, have a higher percentage than other applicants of unduplicated pupils, as defined in Section 42238.02, and have one or more schools that exhibit one or both of the following characteristics:
 - (A) A school where 50 percent or more of the enrolled pupils are eligible for free or reduced-price meals.
 - (B) A school that is located in either a rural location or a densely populated region.
- (j) A candidate in a teacher residency program sponsored by a grant provided pursuant to subdivision (c) shall agree in writing to serve in a school within the jurisdiction of the grant recipient that sponsored the candidate for a period of at least four school years beginning with the school year that begins after the candidate successfully completes the initial year of preparation and obtains a preliminary teaching credential. A candidate who fails to earn a preliminary credential or complete the period of the placement shall reimburse the sponsoring grant recipient the amount of grant funding invested in the candidate's residency training. The amount to be reimbursed shall be adjusted proportionately to reflect the service provided if the candidate taught at least one year, but less than four years, at a school within the jurisdiction of the sponsoring grant recipient. A candidate shall have five school years to complete the four-school-year teaching commitment.
- (k) If a candidate is unable to complete a school year of teaching, that school year may still be counted toward the required four complete school years if any of the following occur:
 - (1) The candidate has completed at least one-half of the school year.
 - (2) The employer deems the candidate to have fulfilled their contractual requirements for the school year for the purposes of salary increases, probationary or permanent status, and retirement.
 - (3) The candidate was not able to teach due to the financial circumstances of the sponsoring grant recipient, including a decision to not reelect the employee for the succeeding school year.
 - (4) The candidate has a condition covered under the federal Family and Medical Leave Act of 1993 (29 U.S.C. Sec. 2061 et seq.) or similar state law.
 - (5) The candidate was called or ordered to active duty status for more than 30 days as a member of a reserve component of the Armed Forces of the United States.

- (l) For purposes of administering the grant program pursuant to subdivision (c), the commission shall do all of the following:
 - (1) Determine the number of grants to be awarded and the total amount awarded to each grant applicant.
 - (2) Require grant recipients to submit program and expenditure reports, as specified by the commission, as a condition of receiving grant funds.
 - (3) Annually review each grant recipient's program and expenditure reports to determine if any candidate has failed to meet their commitment pursuant to subdivision (j).
- (m) If the commission determines or is informed that a sponsored candidate failed to earn a preliminary credential or meet their commitment to teach pursuant to subdivision (j), the commission shall confirm with the grant recipient the applicable grant amount to be recovered from the candidate and the grant recipient. The amount to be recovered shall be adjusted proportionately to reflect the service provided if the candidate taught at least one year, but less than four years, at the sponsoring grant recipient.
- (n) Upon confirming the amount to be recovered from the grant recipient pursuant to subdivision (m), the commission shall notify the grant recipient of the amount to be repaid within 60 days. The grant recipient shall have 60 days from the date of the notification to make the required repayment to the commission. If the grant recipient fails to make the required payment within 60 days, the commission shall notify the Controller and the grant recipient of the failure to repay the amount owed. The Controller shall deduct an amount equal to the amount owed to the commission from the grant recipient's next principal apportionment or apportionments of state funds, other than basic aid apportionments required by Section 6 of Article IX of the California Constitution. If the grant recipient is a regional occupational center or program operated by a joint powers authority that does not receive a principal apportionment or apportionments of state funds, or a consortia of local educational agencies, the commission shall notify the Controller of the local educational agency where the candidate taught and the Controller shall deduct the amount owed from the applicable local educational agency's next principal apportionment or apportionments of state funds, other than basic aid apportionments required by Section 6 of Article IX of the California Constitution.
- (o) An amount recovered by the commission or deducted by the Controller pursuant to subdivision (n) shall be deposited into the Proposition 98 Reversion Account.
- (p) Grant recipients may recover from a sponsored candidate who fails to earn a preliminary credential or complete the period of placement the amount of grant funding invested in the candidate's residency training. The amount to be recovered shall be adjusted proportionately to reflect the service provided if the candidate taught at least one year, but less than four years, at a school within the jurisdiction of the sponsoring grant recipient.
- (q) Grant recipients shall not charge a teacher resident a fee to participate in the Teacher Residency Grant Program.
- (r) (1) Notwithstanding subdivision (c), the commission may allocate up to twenty-five million dollars (\$25,000,000) of the amount appropriated pursuant to subdivision (b) to capacity grants that shall be awarded on a competitive basis to local educational agencies or consortia, as designated pursuant to this section, partnering with regionally accredited institutions of higher education to expand, strengthen, improve access to, or create teacher residency programs that lead to more credentialed teachers to teach either in shortage fields or in furtherance of subparagraph (B) of paragraph (1) of subdivision (c).
 - (2) (A) The commission shall determine the number of capacity grants to be awarded and the amount of the applicable grants.
 - (B) Individual capacity grants shall not exceed two hundred fifty thousand dollars (\$250,000) per grant recipient.

(s) For purposes of making the computations required by Section 8 of Article XVI of the California Constitution, the appropriation made by subdivision (b) shall be deemed to be "General Fund revenues appropriated for school districts," as defined in subdivision (c) of Section 41202, for the 2020–21 fiscal year, and included within the "total allocations to school districts and community college districts from General Fund proceeds of taxes appropriated pursuant to Article XIII B," as defined in subdivision (e) of Section 41202, for the 2020–21 fiscal year.

SEC. 46.

Section 44417.5 is added to the Education Code, to read:

44417.5.

The commission shall conduct an evaluation of the Teacher Residency Grant Program described in Section 44415.5 to determine the effectiveness of this program in recruiting, developing support systems for, and retaining teachers prepared to teach either in commission-designated shortage areas or in furtherance of subparagraph (B) of paragraph (1) of subdivision (c) of Section 44415.5, and provide a report to the Department of Finance and the appropriate fiscal and policy committees of the Legislature on or before December 1, 2027.

GRANT AGREEMENT COMMISSION ON TEACHER CREDENTIALING

TERMS AND CONDITIONS OF GRANT

The Grantee shall be responsible for the performance of the work as set forth herein below and for the preparation of reports as specified in this Agreement. The Grantee's Project Representative shall promptly notify the State of events or proposed changes that could affect the Work Plan under this Agreement.

General Provisions

A. Definitions

- The term "Agreement" as used herein means a grant agreement between the State and Grantee specifying the payment of Grant Amount by the State for the performance of Work Plan within the Project Performance Period by the Grantee.
- 2. The term "Encumbrance" as used herein means a planned expenditure of grant funds.
- The term "Grant Amount" as used herein means funds allocated to the Grantee in accordance with <u>AB 130 Section 129 (Chap. 44, Stats. 2021)</u> and <u>Education</u> <u>Code 44391 – 44393.</u>
- 4. The term "Grantee" as used herein means the party described as the Grantee on page one (1) of this Agreement.
- The term "Institutions of higher education" means the California Community Colleges, the California State University, the University of California, and private not-for-profit institutions of higher education that offer a commissionapproved teacher preparation program.
- The term "Program" means the California Classified School Employee Teacher Credentialing Program.
- 7. The term "Project" as used herein means the project described on page one (1) of this Agreement.
- 8. The term "Project Performance Period" as used herein means the period of time that the Grant Amount is available, and the time in which the Project must be complete, billed and paid as described on page one (1) of this Agreement.
- The term "Project Representative" as used herein means the person authorized by the Grantee to be responsible for the Project and can make daily management decisions.
- 10. The term "State" as used herein means the Commission on Teacher Credentialing.
- 11. The term "Work Plan" means the Classified Grant planning activities described in the LEA's application and budget herein attached as exhibits A and B, and as

approved by the State.

B. Project Execution

- Grantee agrees to complete the Project in accordance with the time of Project Performance Period, and under the terms and conditions of this Agreement. Extensions may be requested at least 90 days in advance of the date of termination and will be considered in the event of circumstances beyond the control of the Grantee, but in no event subsequent to the end of the Project Performance Period as identified in the Work Plan as the Project's date of completion.
- 2. Grantee agrees to submit in writing any deviation from the approved grant application to the State for approval, prior to implementation of changes.
- 3. The grantee will be expected to make appropriate yearly progress in implementing the Classified Grant according to the program design provided in the funded application. Funding for the program is contingent on satisfactory annual progress in implementing the Classified Grant program detailed in the initial application, annual certification of participants, updated annual budget plan expenditures, and to provide annual data as specified in the RFA. Applicants should note that if awarded grant funding, they must do the following:
 - Provide information about the Classified Grant to all eligible classified school employees in the school district, charter school, our county office of education and assistance to each classified employee recruited under the program regarding admission to a teacher training program.
 - ii. Provide an assurance to the Commission that they will require participants to satisfy both of the following requirements before participating in the program:
 - 1. Pass a criminal background check.
 - Provide verification of one of the following:
 - a. Has earned an associate or higher-level degree.
 - Hass successfully completed at least two years of study at a postsecondary educational institution.
 - iii. Provide certification to the Commission that the applicant has received a commitment from each participant that the following will be accomplished:
 - Under the program, graduate from an institution of higher education with a bachelor's degree.
 - Complete all the requirements for, and obtain, a multiple subject, single subject, or education specialist teaching credential.
 - Complete one school year of classroom instruction in the school district, charter school, or county office of education for each year the participant receives assistance from the Classified Grant program.

- 4. Grantee should note that as a condition of receipt of a grant, the LEA grantee must agree to report outcome data when reports are requested by Commission staff. Failure to comply with funding terms or reporting requirements could put future funding opportunities at risk.
- 5. Grant funding may be subject to change when any unspent funds are reported in any annual reports.
- 6. The Classified Program grant funding period, and the approved grant activities, may extend through June 30, 2026. The funds in this grant Agreement may be spent concurrently with previously awarded grant agreements until their respective cutoff dates to complete the planned activities described in the response to the selection criteria and as stated in the statute(s) in the grant Agreement that authorizes funding.
- 7. Grantee and program participants shall participate in an evaluation to determine the success of the program.

C. Project Costs

Subject to the availability of Grant Amount in the Act, the State hereby grants to the Grantee an annual sum of money (Annual Grant Amount) not to exceed the amount stated on page one (1) of this Agreement in consideration of and on condition that the sum be expended in carrying out the purpose as set forth in the Work Plan and under the terms and conditions set forth in this Agreement. Grantee agrees to assume any obligation to furnish any additional funds that may be necessary to complete the Project. All costs accrued for services or supplies prior to the execution of Agreement are not eligible for reimbursement.

For breach or violation of the warranty, the state shall, in addition to other remedies provided by law, have the right to annul this Agreement without liability, paying only for the value of the work performed, or otherwise recover the full amount of such commission, percentage, brokerage, or contingent fee.

E. Payment Documentation

- Payment shall be made yearly for the annual grant amount, less 10% withholding to be released upon satisfactory completion of all required deliverables.
- 2. Any overpayment of Grant Amount in excess of final project costs shall be returned to the State within 60 days after completion of the Project or the end of the Project Performance Period as shown on page one (1).

F. Project Administration

- Grantee agrees to provide all technical and administrative services as needed for Agreement completion. H. Financial Records

- Expenditures shall comply with all applicable provisions of federal, state, and local rules, regulations and policies related to the administration, use, and accounting for public school funds, including but not limited to, the Education Code of the State of California.
- Grantee agrees to maintain satisfactory financial accounts, documents, and records for the Project and to make them available to the State for auditing at reasonable times. Grantee also agrees to retain such financial accounts, documents and records for three years following Project termination or completion.

3. Grantee agrees to use a generally accepted accounting system.

I. Audit

- Projects are subject to audit by the State for three years following the final payment of Grant Amount. The purpose of this audit is to verify that project expenditures were properly documented. Grantees will be contacted at least 30 days in advance of an audit.
- Audit will include all books, papers, accounts, documents, or other records of the Grantee, as they relate to the Project for which the State authorized Grant Amount. The Grantee shall have the Project records, including the sources documents and cancelled warrants, readily available to the State.
- 3. The Grantee must also provide an employee having knowledge of the Project and the accounting procedure or system to assist the State's auditor. The Grantee shall provide a copy of any document, paper, record, or the like requested by the State.
- 4. All Project records must be retained for at least one year following an audit or final disputed audit findings.

2021-22 Authorizing Legislation

AB 130 Section 129 (Chap. 44, Stats. 2021)

- (a) For the 2021–22 fiscal year, the sum of one hundred twenty-five million dollars (\$125,000,000) is hereby appropriated from the General Fund to the Commission on Teacher Credentialing for the California Classified School Employee Teacher Credentialing Program, pursuant to Section 44393 of the Education Code. This funding shall be available for encumbrance until June 30, 2026.
- (b) (1) A grant to a local educational agency shall not exceed twenty-four thousand dollars (\$24,000) over five years per participant teacher candidate.
- (2) A local educational agency receiving a grant shall not use more than 10 percent of a grant award for program administration costs.
- (c) The Commission on Teacher Credentialing shall do both of the following:
- (1) Allocate grants for at least 5,208 new participants.
- (2) Give priority to a local educational agency that meets any of the following:
- (A) Has not previously received funding pursuant to Section 44393 of the Education Code.
- (B) Has a higher share than other applicants of unduplicated pupils as defined in Section 42238.02 of the Education Code.
- (C) Notwithstanding eligibility requirements pursuant to Section 44393 of the Education Code, has a plan to create a new, or expand an existing, program that recruits and supports expanding learning and preschool program staff and address kindergarten and early childhood education teacher shortages.
- (d) For purposes of making the computations required by Section 8 of Article XVI of the California Constitution, the appropriation made by subdivision (a) shall be deemed to be

"General Fund revenues appropriated for school districts," as defined in subdivision (c) of Section 41202 of the Education Code, for the 2020–21 fiscal year, and included within the "total allocations to school districts and community college districts from General Fund proceeds of taxes appropriated pursuant to Article XIII B," as defined in subdivision (e) of Section 41202 of the Education Code, for the 2020–21 fiscal year.

Section 44392 of the Education Code

44392. For the purposes of this article, unless the context clearly requires otherwise, the following terms shall have the following meanings:

- (a) "Applicant" means a school district, charter school, or county office of education applying for program funds under the California Classified School Employee Teacher Credentialing Program.
- (b) "Institutions of higher education" means the California Community Colleges, the California State University, the University of California, and private not-for-profit institutions of higher education that offer a commission-approved teacher preparation program.
- (c) "Participant" means a classified school employee who elects to participate in the California Classified School Employee Teacher Credentialing Program.
- (d) "Program" means the California Classified School Employee Teacher Credentialing Program.
- (e) "Classified school employee" means a noncertificated school employee currently working in a public school.
- (f) "Teacher training program" means an undergraduate or graduate program of instruction conducted by a teacher preparation program approved by the commission that includes a developmentally sequenced career ladder to provide instruction, coursework, and clearly defined tasks for each level of the ladder, and that is designed to qualify students enrolled in the program for a teaching credential authorizing instruction in kindergarten and grades 1 to 12, inclusive.

Section 44393 of the Education Code:

- 44393. (a) The California Classified School Employee Teacher Credentialing Program is hereby established for the purpose of recruiting classified school employees to participate in a program designed to encourage them to enroll in teacher training programs and to provide instructional service as teachers in the public schools.
- (b) Subject to an appropriation for these purposes in the annual Budget Act or another statute, the commission shall issue a request for proposals to all school districts, charter schools, and county offices of education in the state in order to solicit applications for funding. The criteria adopted by the commission for the selection of school districts, charter schools, or county offices of education to participate in the program shall include all of the following:
- (1) The extent to which the applicant demonstrates the capacity and willingness to accommodate the participation of classified school employees in teacher training programs conducted at institutions of higher education or a local educational agency.
- (2) The extent to which the applicant's plan for the implementation of its recruitment program involves the active participation of one or more local campuses of the participating institutions of higher education in the development of coursework and teaching programs for participating classified school employees. Each selected applicant shall be required to enter into a written articulation agreement with the participating campuses of the institutions of

higher education.

- (3) The extent to which the applicant's plan for recruitment attempts to meet the demand for teachers in shortage areas in transitional kindergarten, kindergarten, and grades 1 to 12, inclusive.
- (4) The extent to which a developmentally sequenced series of job descriptions leads from an entry-level classified school employee position to an entry-level teaching position in that school district, charter school, or county office of education.
- (5) The extent to which the applicant's plan for recruitment attempts to meet its own specific teacher needs.
- (c) An applicant that is selected to participate pursuant to subdivision (b) shall provide information about the program to all eligible classified school employees in the school district, charter school, or county office of education and assistance to each classified school employee it recruits under the program regarding admission to a teacher training program.
- (d) (1) An applicant shall require participants to satisfy both of the following requirements before participating in the program:
- (A) Pass a criminal background check.
- (B) Provide verification of one of the following:
- (i) Has earned an associate or higher level degree.
- (ii) Has successfully completed at least two years of study at a postsecondary educational institution.
- (2) An applicant shall certify that it has received a commitment from each participant that he or she will accomplish all of the following:
- (A) Graduate from an institution of higher education under the program with a bachelor's degree.
- (B) Complete all of the requirements for, and obtain, a multiple subject, single subject, or education specialist teaching credential.
- (C) Complete one school year of classroom instruction in the school district, charter school, or county office of education for each year that he or she receives assistance for books, fees, and tuition while attending an institution of higher education under the program.
- (e) The commission shall contract with an independent evaluator with a proven record of experience in assessing teacher training programs to conduct an evaluation to determine the success of the program. The evaluation shall be completed on or before July 1, 2021. The commission shall submit the completed evaluation to the Governor and the education policy and fiscal committees of the Assembly and Senate.
- (f) On or before January 1 of each year, the commission shall report to the Legislature regarding the status of the program, including, but not limited to, the number of classified school employees recruited, the academic progress of the classified school employees recruited, the

number of classified school employees recruited who are subsequently employed as teachers in the public schools, the degree to which the applicant meets the teacher shortage needs of the school district, charter school, or county office of education, and the ethnic and racial composition of the participants in the program. The report shall be made in conformance with Section 9795 of the Government Code.

The Grantee warrants by execution of this Agreement, that no person or selling agency has been employed or retained to solicit or secure this Agreement upon agreement or understanding for a commission, percentage, brokerage, or contingent fee, excepting bona fide employees or bona fide established commercial or selling agencies maintained by the Grantee for the purpose of securing business. For breach or violation of the warranty, the state shall, in addition to other remedies provided by law, have the right to annul this Agreement without liability, paying only for the value of the work performed, or otherwise recover the full amount of such commission, percentage, brokerage, or contingent fee.

E. Payment Documentation

- Payment shall be made yearly for the annual grant amount, less 10% withholding to be released upon satisfactory completion of all required deliverables.
- 2. Any overpayment of Grant Amount in excess of final project costs shall be returned to the State within 60 days after completion of the Project or the end of the Project Performance Period as shown on page one (1).

F. Project Administration

- Grantee agrees to provide all technical and administrative services as needed for Agreement completion. Grantee agrees to monitor and review all work performed; and coordinate budgeting and scheduling to assure that the Agreement is completed within budget, on schedule, and in accordance with approved procedures, applicable laws, and regulations.
- 2. Grantee ensures that the Agreement requirements are met through completion of annual reports, submitted to the State in accordance with the Work Plan and through regular communication with the State.
- Grantee agrees to promptly submit reports as the State has requested in this Agreement or may request during the life of this Agreement.

4. The Grantee shall comply with the Drug-Free Workplace Act of 1990 (Government Code section 8350 et seq.), Government Code sections 12990(a-f) and CCR, Title 2, Section 8103 (nondiscrimination for non-public entities, and Public Contract Code section 10295.3 (domestic partners).

G. Project Termination

- Failure by the Grantee to comply with the terms of this Agreement or any other Agreement under the Act may be cause for suspension of all obligations of the State hereunder.
- 2. Failure of the Grantee to comply with the terms of this Agreement shall not be cause for the suspension of all obligations of the State hereunder if in the judgment of the State such failure was due to no fault of the Grantee.
- In such case, any amount required to settle at minimum cost any irrevocable obligations properly incurred shall be eligible for reimbursement under this Agreement.
- 4. Should the Grantee choose to terminate its participation in the program, a thirty (30)-day written notice is required. Final program and expenditure reports are due thirty (30) days after the program cessation. The Grantee agrees to return all unexpended funds within sixty (60) days of project cessation.
- 5. It is mutually agreed that if the Budget Act of the current year and/or any subsequent years covered under this Agreement does not appropriate sufficient funds for the program, this Agreement shall be of no further force and effect. In this event, the state shall have no liability to any funds to the Grantee, furnish any other consideration under this Agreement, and the grantee shall not be obligated to perform any provisions of this Agreement.
- If funding for any fiscal year is reduced or deleted by the Budget Act for purposes of this program, the State shall have the option to either cancel this Agreement with no liability occurring to the State or offer an agreement amendment to the Grantee to reflect the changes.

H. Financial Records

- Expenditures shall comply with all applicable provisions of federal, state, and local rules, regulations and policies related to the administration, use, and accounting for public school funds, including but not limited to, the Education Code of the State of California.
- Grantee agrees to maintain satisfactory financial accounts, documents, and records for the Project and to make them available to the State for auditing at reasonable times. Grantee also agrees to retain such financial accounts, documents and records for three years following Project termination or completion.

3. Grantee agrees to use a generally accepted accounting system.

I. Audit

- Projects are subject to audit by the State for three years following the final payment of Grant Amount. The purpose of this audit is to verify that project expenditures were properly documented. Grantees will be contacted at least 30 days in advance of an audit.
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- (B) Has a higher share than other applicants of unduplicated pupils as defined in Section 42238.02 of the Education Code.
- (C) Notwithstanding eligibility requirements pursuant to Section 44393 of the Education Code, has a plan to create a new, or expand an existing, program that recruits and supports expanding learning and preschool program staff and address kindergarten and early childhood education teacher shortages.
- (d) For purposes of making the computations required by Section 8 of Article XVI of the California Constitution, the appropriation made by subdivision (a) shall be deemed to be

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- (c) "Participant" means a classified school employee who elects to participate in the California Classified School Employee Teacher Credentialing Program.
- (d) "Program" means the California Classified School Employee Teacher Credentialing Program.
- (e) "Classified school employee" means a noncertificated school employee currently working in a public school.
- (f) "Teacher training program" means an undergraduate or graduate program of instruction conducted by a teacher preparation program approved by the commission that includes a developmentally sequenced career ladder to provide instruction, coursework, and clearly defined tasks for each level of the ladder, and that is designed to qualify students enrolled in the program for a teaching credential authorizing instruction in kindergarten and grades 1 to 12, inclusive.

Section 44393 of the Education Code:

- 44393. (a) The California Classified School Employee Teacher Credentialing Program is hereby established for the purpose of recruiting classified school employees to participate in a program designed to encourage them to enroll in teacher training programs and to provide instructional service as teachers in the public schools.
- (b) Subject to an appropriation for these purposes in the annual Budget Act or another statute, the commission shall issue a request for proposals to all school districts, charter schools, and county offices of education in the state in order to solicit applications for funding. The criteria adopted by the commission for the selection of school districts, charter schools, or county offices of education to participate in the program shall include all of the following:
- (1) The extent to which the applicant demonstrates the capacity and willingness to accommodate the participation of classified school employees in teacher training programs conducted at institutions of higher education or a local educational agency.
- (2) The extent to which the applicant's plan for the implementation of its recruitment program involves the active participation of one or more local campuses of the participating institutions of higher education in the development of coursework and teaching programs for participating classified school employees. Each selected applicant shall be required to enter into a written articulation agreement with the participating campuses of the institutions of

higher education.

- (3) The extent to which the applicant's plan for recruitment attempts to meet the demand for teachers in shortage areas in transitional kindergarten, kindergarten, and grades 1 to 12, inclusive.
- (4) The extent to which a developmentally sequenced series of job descriptions leads from an entry-level classified school employee position to an entry-level teaching position in that school district, charter school, or county office of education.
- (5) The extent to which the applicant's plan for recruitment attempts to meet its own specific teacher needs.
- (c) An applicant that is selected to participate pursuant to subdivision (b) shall provide information about the program to all eligible classified school employees in the school district, charter school, or county office of education and assistance to each classified school employee it recruits under the program regarding admission to a teacher training program.
- (d) (1) An applicant shall require participants to satisfy both of the following requirements before participating in the program:
- (A) Pass a criminal background check.
- (B) Provide verification of one of the following:
- Has earned an associate or higher level degree.
- (ii) Has successfully completed at least two years of study at a postsecondary educational institution.
- (2) An applicant shall certify that it has received a commitment from each participant that he or she will accomplish all of the following:
- (A) Graduate from an institution of higher education under the program with a bachelor's degree.
- (B) Complete all of the requirements for, and obtain, a multiple subject, single subject, or education specialist teaching credential.
- (C) Complete one school year of classroom instruction in the school district, charter school, or county office of education for each year that he or she receives assistance for books, fees, and tuition while attending an institution of higher education under the program.
- (e) The commission shall contract with an independent evaluator with a proven record of experience in assessing teacher training programs to conduct an evaluation to determine the success of the program. The evaluation shall be completed on or before July 1, 2021. The commission shall submit the completed evaluation to the Governor and the education policy and fiscal committees of the Assembly and Senate.
- (f) On or before January 1 of each year, the commission shall report to the Legislature regarding the status of the program, including, but not limited to, the number of classified school employees recruited, the academic progress of the classified school employees recruited, the

number of classified school employees recruited who are subsequently employed as teachers in the public schools, the degree to which the applicant meets the teacher shortage needs of the school district, charter school, or county office of education, and the ethnic and racial composition of the participants in the program. The report shall be made in conformance with Section 9795 of the Government Code.

5b) Program Planning, Implementation, Key Staff and Governance:

This proposal is for the expansion and continuance of the BOOST program already in place. All activities and timelines are set within the functions of the Career Ladder office which will be responsible for the implementation and monitoring of the program. Upon award notification, BOOST staff will prepare recruitment materials to distribute to current eligible classified employees.

In order to maximize the amount of funds directly supporting the BOOST participants, program staff will be funded from general funds allocated to the Career Ladder. Key staff are one (1) full-time equivalent with a percentage of their time designated to focus on grant activities and members as noted in Table 4. The Fiscal Manager of the program will be the Administrative Services Manager of Human Resources, who administers the budgets for the entire Division. Additional staff needed for professional development will vary and be covered through Program Administration funds set aside for this purpose.

The Career Ladder office is a subunit of the Certificated Recruitment, Selection and Credential Services Unit within the Human Resources Division. The Director of Certificated Recruitment and Workforce Management will oversee the management of the Classified Employee Grant Program. The Career Ladder staff are supervised by both the Director and Assistant Director of Certificated Workforce Management, who in turn report to the Chief and Deputy Chief of Human Resources.

5c) Participant Advisement:

Mentoring and guidance from a Career Ladder Mentor has been identified as the key factor in the successful transition of members to teaching. Career Ladder members regularly meet with their mentor to complete the Individualized Mentorship Plan (IMP) and create an individualized timeline to obtain a teaching credential. These

individualized meetings ensure that the member is on-track to complete the program on time or to determine if additional resources are needed. The steps of the program, as outlined in Table 3 below, are designed to align the credential requirements along with academic progress, so that participants are able to transition to teaching as soon as possible. This establishes an individualized timeline to obtain a teaching credential and apply for a teaching position.

5d) Participant Support:

In addition to the individualized mentoring, the following program supports are also provided:

- Professional development to expose participant to the District's Teaching and Learning Framework and develop and understanding of the District's definition of effective teaching practice
- Additional professional development opportunities that will assist in the credentialing process and teacher training; such as, forums, workshops, regional meetings, etc.
- Release time for classroom observations and teacher shadowing

- Direct Financial Assistance in the form of reimbursements for educational and credential related expenses which may include:
 - o Tuition Reimbursement
 - Textbook reimbursement
 - o Required materials and/or equipment expenses
 - o Technology stipend
 - o University fees
 - Parking permit for university/college
 - Public transportation fees to travel to and from university/college
 - Test Fee vouchers or reimbursements for CBEST, CSET, RICA and/or US Constitution
 - Test Preparation Courses for CBEST, CSET, RICA and/or US Constitution
 - o Credential license fees
 - o Other qualifying expenses required for education or credentialing
- Teaching Mentor in same credential area (when feasible) when in a provisional assignment or District Intern teacher
- Academic advisement and other guidance from partner institutions of higher education

Funds not requested as reimbursements for the BOOST participant will be used to cover costs for professional development or other educational resources that will assist the participant in becoming an effective teacher. Professional development will be provided as a range of options. A bi-annual forum will provide a variety of workshops ranging on topics from working in the classroom as a paraprofessional to effective teaching strategies. In addition, the forums will provide attendees an opportunity to meet with Human Resources Talent Acquisition Specialists and learn about the LAUSD teacher eligibility process and interview preparation strategies. Finally, the Career Ladder office is working closely with the Division of Special Education and the Multilingual and Multicultural Education Division offices in order to ensure that classified staff are provided appropriate professional development opportunities and access to necessary instruction resources that will support student success.

5e) Progress Monitoring:

Upon acceptance to BOOST, participants will be required to sign the policy agreement which outlines the requirements of the program at the initial IMP meeting. Members will be required to meet at least once annually to update their progress to qualify for reimbursements and supports. This will provide up-to-date information as to the progress BOOST participants are making throughout the year.

GRANT AGREEMENT COMMISSION ON TEACHER CREDENTIALING

TERMS AND CONDITIONS OF GRANT

The Grantee shall be responsible for the performance of the work as set forth herein below and for the preparation of reports as specified in this Agreement. The Grantee's Project Representative shall promptly notify the State of events or proposed changes that could affect the Work Plan under this Agreement.

General Provisions

A. Definitions

- The term "Agreement" as used herein means a grant agreement between the State and Grantee specifying the payment of Grant Amount by the State for the performance of the Work Plan within the Project Performance Period by the Grantee.
- 2. The term "Encumbrance" as used herein means a planned expenditure of grant funds.
- The term "Grant Amount" as used herein means funds allocated to the Grantee in accordance with Assembly Bill (AB) 130 (Chapter 44, Statutes of 2021), Section 143.
- 4. The term "Grantee" as used herein means the party described as the Grantee on page one (1) of this Agreement.
- 5. The term "Local Educational Agency" means a school district, county office of education, county superintendent of schools, state-operated education program, including a state special school, an education program providing instruction in kindergarten or any of grades 1 to 12, inclusive, that is offered by a state agency, including the Department of Youth and Community Restoration and the State Department of Developmental Services, or a regional occupational center or program operated by a joint powers authority or county office of education.
- The term "Program" means the Computer Science Supplementary Authorization Incentive Grant Program.
- The term "Project" as used herein means the project described on page one (1) of this Agreement.
- 8. The term "Project Performance Period" as used herein means the period of time that the Grant Amount is available, and the time in which the Project must be complete, billed and paid as described on page one (1) of this Agreement.
- The term "Project Representative" as used herein means the person authorized by the Grantee to be responsible for the Project and can make daily management decisions.
- 10. The term "State" as used herein means the Commission on Teacher Credentialing.
- 11. The term "Computer Science Supplementary Authorization Incentive Grant Program" is a state grant program authorized under the provisions of (AB) 130, Section 143 that

provides funding for Local Education Agencies (LEAs) interested in supporting credentialed teachers in adding a Computer Science Supplementary Authorization to their Single Subject or Multiple Subject Credential.

12. The term "Work Plan" means the computer supplementary authorization program planning activities described in the LEA's application and budget herein attached as exhibits A and B, and as approved by the State.

B. Project Execution

- Grantee agrees to complete the Project in accordance with the time of Project Performance Period, and under the terms and conditions of this Agreement. Extensions may be requested at least 90 days in advance of the date of termination and will be considered in the event of circumstances beyond the control of the Grantee, but in no event subsequent to the end of the Project Performance Period as identified in the Work Plan as the Project's date of completion.
- 2. Grantee agrees to submit in writing any deviation from the approved grant application to the State for approval, prior to implementation of changes.
- 3. Grantees will be expected to make appropriate yearly progress in implementing their computer science supplementary authorization program, resulting in an increase in the number of teachers providing instruction in computer science coursework in settings authorized by the underlying credential and according to the operational plan provided in the funded application. Applicants should note that as a condition of receipt of a grant, the LEA grantee must agree to report outcome data when reports are requested by Commission staff. Failure to comply with funding terms or reporting requirements could put future funding opportunities at risk.
- 4. Awarded grantee LEAs must report annually to the Commission on Teacher Credentialing beginning on or before June 30th of the end of the first year after receiving a grant award and continue throughout the project period on the number of new computer science courses being taught by teachers who participated in the grant program. In addition, awarded grantee LEAs will be expected to report annually to the Commission information related to program participation, completion, and expenditures throughout the grant period.
- Grant funding may be subject to change when any unspent funds are reported in any annual reports.
- 6. The Computer Science Supplementary Authorization Incentive Grant funding period, and the approved grant activities, may extend through June 30, 2026. For grantees who also apply for or have already been awarded other Computer Science Supplementary Authorization Incentive Grant funding, the grantee may continue to operate their Computer Science Supplementary Authorization Incentive Grant within the grant funding period and planned activities within the specified grant agreement. The funds in this grant agreement may be spent concurrently with previously awarded grant agreements until their respective cutoff dates to complete the planned activities described in the response to the selection criteria and as stated in the statute(s) in the grant agreement that authorizes funding.

C. Project Costs

Subject to the availability of Grant Amount in the Act, the State hereby grants to the Grantee an annual sum of money (Annual Grant Amount) not to exceed the amount stated on page one (1) of this Agreement in consideration of and on condition that the sum be expended in carrying out the purpose as set forth in the Work Plan and under the terms and conditions set forth in this Agreement. Grantee agrees to assume any obligation to furnish any additional funds that may be necessary to complete the Project. All costs accrued for services or supplies prior to the execution of Agreement are not eligible for reimbursement.

The Grant Amount to be provided to the Grantee, under this Agreement, may be disbursed as follows:

- Upon approval of the application, the first payment will be 90 percent (90%) of the total annual budget amount projected for the first year of candidate participation.
- The second payment will be 10 percent (10%) of the total annual budget amount projected for the first year of the program. The second payment will be provided to grantees after the program has completed its activities and submitted the required annual reports to the Commission.
- 3. Subsequent annual payments will be determined by calculating the program need based on the actual expenditures reported by the program from the previous fiscal year and the projected participant numbers submitted by the program for the following fiscal year. Annual awards will be disbursed in two payments following the 90 percent (90%)/10 percent (10%) model described above. Unspent funds reported on annual reports will be deducted from the next allotment of funds.

D. Allowable Activities and Use of Funds

- 1. Assembly Bill (AB) 130 Section 143 provided the Commission with \$15,000,000 (\$15 million) appropriated from the General Fund for the Computer Science Supplementary Authorization Incentive Grant Program. One time grant awards of up to \$2,500 per teacher participating in the Computer Science Supplementary Authorization Incentive Grant Program are available to support credentialed teachers to obtain a supplementary authorization in computer science and provide instruction in computer science coursework in settings authorized by the underlying credential. Funding is available for up to five years, through June 30, 2026
- 2. Grant funding may be used for costs for any of the following: coursework, books, fees, tuition, and release time and/or substitute cost. The awards allocated pursuant to this grant shall not be subject to local educational agency indirect costs. The 100-percent match of grant funding may be in the form of (A) one dollar (\$1) for every one dollar (\$1) of grant funding received that is to be used in a manner consistent with allowable grant costs described above and/or (B) an in-kind match of release time or substitute teacher costs for the participating teacher.
- 3. The Grantee warrants by execution of this Agreement, that no person or selling agency has been employed or retained to solicit or secure this Agreement upon agreement or understanding for a commission, percentage, brokerage, or contingent fee, excepting bona fide employees or bona fide established commercial or selling agencies maintained by the Grantee for the purpose of securing business. For breach or violation

of the warranty, the state shall, in addition to other remedies provided by law, have the right to annul this Agreement without liability, paying only for the value of the work performed, or otherwise recover the full amount of such commission, percentage, brokerage, or contingent fee.

E. Payment Documentation

- Payment shall be made yearly for the annual grant amount, less 10% withholding to be released upon satisfactory completion of all required deliverables.
- 2. Any overpayment of Grant Amount in excess of final project costs shall be returned to the State within 60 days of completion of the Project or the end of the Project Performance Period as shown on page one (1), whichever is earlier.

F. Project Administration

- Grantee agrees to provide all technical and administrative services as needed for Agreement completion. Grantee agrees to monitor and review all work performed; and coordinate budgeting and scheduling to assure that the Agreement is completed within budget, on schedule, and in accordance with approved procedures, applicable laws, and regulations.
- Grantee ensures that the Agreement requirements are met through completion of annual reports, submitted to the State in accordance with the Work Plan and through regular communication with the State.
- 3. Grantee agrees to promptly submit reports as the State has requested in this Agreement or may request during the life of this Agreement.
- The Grantee shall comply with the Drug-Free Workplace Act of 1990 (Government Code section 8350 et seq.), Government Code sections 12990(a-f) and CCR, Title 2, Section 8103 (nondiscrimination for non-public entities, and Public Contract Code section 10295.3 (domestic partners).

G. Project Termination

- Failure by the Grantee to comply with the terms of this Agreement or any other Agreement under the Act may be cause for suspension of all obligations of the State hereunder.
- Failure of the Grantee to comply with the terms of this Agreement shall not be cause for the suspension of all obligations of the State hereunder if in the judgment of the State such failure was due to no fault of the Grantee.
- In such case, any amount required to settle at minimum cost any irrevocable obligations
 properly incurred shall be eligible for reimbursement under this Agreement.
- 4. Should the Grantee choose to terminate its participation in the program, a thirty (30)-day written notice is required. Final program and expenditure reports are due thirty (30) days after the program cessation. The Grantee agrees to return all unexpended funds within sixty (60) days of project cessation.

- 5. It is mutually agreed that if the Budget Act of the current year and/or any subsequent years covered under this Agreement does not appropriate sufficient funds for the program, this Agreement shall be of no further force and effect. In this event, the state shall have no liability to any funds to the Grantee, furnish any other consideration under this agreement, and the grantee shall not be obligated to perform any provisions of this Agreement.
- If funding for any fiscal year is reduced or deleted by the Budget Act for purposes of
 this program, the State shall have the option to either cancel this Agreement with no
 liability occurring to the State or offer an agreement amendment to the Grantee to reflect
 the changes.

H. Financial Records

- Expenditures shall comply with all applicable provisions of federal, state, and local rules, regulations and policies related to the administration, use, and accounting for public school funds, including but not limited to, the Education Code of the State of California.
- Grantee agrees to maintain satisfactory financial accounts, documents, and records for the Project and to make them available to the State for auditing at reasonable times. Grantee also agrees to retain such financial accounts, documents and records for three years following Project termination or completion.
- 3. Grantee agrees to use a generally accepted accounting system.

I. Audit

- Projects are subject to audit by the State for three years following the final payment of Grant Amount. The purpose of this audit is to verify that project expenditures were properly documented. Grantees will be contacted at least 30 days in advance of an audit.
- Audit will include all books, papers, accounts, documents, or other records of the Grantee, as they relate to the Project for which the State authorized Grant Amount. The Grantee shall have the Project records, including the sources documents and cancelled warrants, readily available to the State.
- The Grantee must also provide an employee having knowledge of the Project and the
 accounting procedure or system to assist the State's auditor. The Grantee shall provide
 a copy of any document, paper, record, or the like requested by the State.
- All Project records must be retained for at least one year following an audit or final disputed audit findings.

2021-22 Budget Act Legislation

AB 130, SEC. 143.

- (a) For the 2021–22 fiscal year, the sum of fifteen million (\$15,000,000) is hereby appropriated from the General Fund to the Commission on Teacher Credentialing for the Computer Science Supplementary Authorization Incentive Grant Program. This funding shall be available for encumbrance until June 30, 2026.
- (b) The Computer Science Supplementary Authorization Incentive Grant Program is hereby established for the purpose of providing one-time grants to local educational agencies to support the preparation of credentialed teachers to earn a supplementary authorization in computer science and provide instruction in computer science coursework in settings authorized by the underlying credential.
- (c) The commission shall approve applications submitted by local educational agencies that meet the criteria established by the commission pursuant to paragraph (1) of subdivision (e). To the extent that funds are available, the commission shall allocate funds to participating local educational agencies for each approved application.
- (d) A participating teacher is eligible to receive an award of up to two thousand five hundred dollars (\$2,500) from the Computer Science Supplementary Authorization Incentive Grant Program.
- (e) The commission shall do all of the following:
 - (1) Establish grant criteria for local educational agencies.
 - (2) Issue a request for proposal to all local educational agencies to solicit applications for funding.
 - (3) Accept grant applications from participating local educational agencies until funds are fully expended.
 - (4) Review applications and verify that each proposed participant teacher holds a valid credential.
 - (5) Allocate grants to participating local educational agencies for the purpose of paying the teacher costs of coursework, books, fees, and tuition, as applicable.
 - (6) Give priority to grant applications for teachers that provide instruction at either of the following:
 - (A) A school operating within a rural district.
 - (B) A school with a higher share than other applicants of unduplicated pupils, as defined in Section 42238.02 of the Education Code.
- (f) In selecting grant recipients, the commission shall require each applicant to, at a minimum, do all of the following:
 - (1) Identify the teachers employed by the local educational agency who have been selected to participate in the incentive grant program.
 - (2) Identify the number of coursework credits required for each selected teacher to earn a supplementary authorization in computer science.
 - (3) Provide an estimated cost for the required coursework, books, fees, tuition, and release time, as applicable.

- (4) Provide a 100-percent match of grant funding in the form of one or both of the following:
 - (A) One dollar (\$1) for every one dollar (\$1) of grant funding received that is to be used in a manner consistent with allowable grant costs described in paragraph (3).
 - (B) An in-kind match of release time or substitute teacher costs for the participating teacher.
- (5) Report to the Commission on Teacher Credentialing on or before August 30 of the second year after receiving a grant award the number of new computer science courses offered at the school being taught by a teacher who participated in the incentive grant program.
- (g) The awards allocated pursuant to this section shall not be subject to local educational agency indirect costs.
- (h) On or before April 1 of each year until the fiscal year following final disbursement of the grant funds, the Commission on Teacher Credentialing shall report to the fiscal committees of the Legislature, the Legislative Analyst's Office, and the Department of Finance on the program, including, but not limited to, the number of participating local educational agencies, the number of grants issued, the number of computer science supplementary authorizations issued, and the number of new computer science courses reported by grant recipients. The report shall be submitted in compliance with Section 9795 of the Government Code.
- (i) For purposes of this section, "local educational agency" means a school district, county office of education, county superintendent of schools, state-operated education program, including a state special school, an education program providing instruction in kindergarten or any of grades 1 to 12, inclusive, that is offered by a state agency, including the Department of Youth and Community Restoration and the State Department of Developmental Services, or a regional occupational center or program operated by a joint powers authority or county office of education.
- (j) For purposes of making the computations required by Section 8 of Article XVI of the California Constitution, the appropriation made by subdivision (a) shall be deemed to be "General Fund revenues appropriated for school districts," as defined in subdivision (c) of Section 41202 of the Education Code, for the 2020-21 fiscal year, and included within the "total allocations to school districts and community college districts from General Fund proceeds of taxes appropriated pursuant to Article XIII B," as defined in subdivision (e) of Section 41202 of the Education Code, for the 2020-21 fiscal year.

The Grantee's Project Representative shall promptly notify the State of events or proposed changes that could affect the Work Plan under this Agreement.

General Provisions

A. Definitions

- The term "Agreement" as used herein means a grant agreement between the State and Grantee specifying the payment of Grant Amount by the State for the performance of the Work Plan within the Project Performance Period by the Grantee.
- 2. The term "Encumbrance" as used herein means a planned expenditure of grant funds.
- The term "Grant Amount" as used herein means funds allocated to the Grantee in accordance with Assembly Bill (AB) 130 (Chapter 44, Statutes of 2021), Section 143.
- 4. The term "Grantee" as used herein means the party described as the Grantee on page one (1) of this Agreement.
- 5. The term "Local Educational Agency" means a school district, county office of education, county superintendent of schools, state-operated education program, including a state special school, an education program providing instruction in kindergarten or any of grades 1 to 12, inclusive, that is offered by a state agency, including the Department of Youth and Community Restoration and the State Department of Developmental Services, or a regional occupational center or program operated by a joint powers authority or county office of education.
- The term "Program" means the Computer Science Supplementary Authorization Incentive Grant Program.
- The term "Project" as used herein means the project described on page one (1) of this Agreement.
- 8. The term "Project Performance Period" as used herein means the period of time that the Grant Amount is available, and the time in which the Project must be complete, billed and paid as described on page one (1) of this Agreement.
- The term "Project Representative" as used herein means the person authorized by the Grantee to be responsible for the Project and can make daily management decisions.
- 10. The term "State" as used herein means the Commission on Teacher Credentialing.
- 11. The term "Computer Science Supplementary Authorization Incentive Grant Program" is a state grant program authorized under the provisions of (AB) 130, Section 143 that

provides funding for Local Education Agencies (LEAs) interested in supporting credentialed teachers in adding a Computer Science Supplementary Authorization to their Single Subject or Multiple Subject Credential.

12. The term "Work Plan" means the computer supplementary authorization program planning activities described in the LEA's application and budget herein attached as exhibits A and B, and as approved by the State.

B. Project Execution

- Grantee agrees to complete the Project in accordance with the time of Project
 Performance Period, and under the terms and conditions of this Agreement. Extensions
 may be requested at least 90 days in advance of the date of termination and will be
 considered in the event of circumstances beyond the control of the Grantee, but in no
 event subsequent to the end of the Project Performance Period as identified in the Work
 Plan as the Project's date of completion.
- Grantee agrees to submit in writing any deviation from the approved grant application
 to the Commission for approval, prior to implementation of changes. Any variation of
 grant funds in approved budget categories that exceeds ten percent (10%) of what was
 submitted in the proposed budget requires prior approval from the Commission.
- 3. Grantees will be expected to make appropriate yearly progress in implementing their computer science supplementary authorization program, resulting in an increase in the number of teachers providing instruction in computer science coursework in settings authorized by the underlying credential and according to the operational plan provided in the funded application. Applicants should note that as a condition of receipt of a grant, the LEA grantee must agree to report outcome data when reports are requested by Commission staff. Failure to comply with funding terms or reporting requirements could put future funding opportunities at risk.
- 4. Awarded grantee LEAs must report annually to the Commission on Teacher Credentialing beginning on or before June 30th of the end of the first year after receiving a grant award and continue throughout the project period on the number of new computer science courses being taught by teachers who participated in the grant program. In addition, awarded grantee LEAs will be expected to report annually to the Commission information related to program participation, completion, and expenditures throughout the grant period.
- Grant funding may be subject to change when any unspent funds are reported in any annual reports.
- 6. The Computer Science Supplementary Authorization Incentive Grant funding period, and the approved grant activities, may extend through June 30, 2026. For grantees who also apply for or have already been awarded other Computer Science Supplementary Authorization Incentive Grant funding, the grantee may continue to operate their Computer Science Supplementary Authorization Incentive Grant within the grant funding period and planned activities within the specified grant agreement. The funds in this grant agreement may be spent concurrently with previously awarded grant agreements until their respective cutoff dates to complete the planned activities described in the response to the selection criteria and as stated in the statute(s) in the grant agreement that authorizes funding.

C. Project Costs

Subject to the availability of Grant Amount in the Act, the State hereby grants to the Grantee an annual sum of money (Annual Grant Amount) not to exceed the amount stated on page one (1) of this Agreement in consideration of and on condition that the sum be expended in carrying out the purpose as set forth in the Work Plan and under the terms and conditions set forth in this Agreement. Grantee agrees to assume any obligation to furnish any additional funds that may be necessary to complete the Project. All costs accrued for services or supplies prior to the execution of Agreement are not eligible for reimbursement.

The Grant Amount to be provided to the Grantee, under this Agreement, may be disbursed as follows:

- 1. Upon approval of the application, the first payment will be 90 percent (90%) of the total annual budget amount projected for the first year of candidate participation.
- The second payment will be 10 percent (10%) of the total annual budget amount
 projected for the first year of the program. The second payment will be provided to
 grantees after the program has completed its activities and submitted the required annual
 reports to the Commission.
- 3. Subsequent annual payments will be determined by calculating the program need based on the actual expenditures reported by the program from the previous fiscal year and the projected participant numbers submitted by the program for the following fiscal year. Annual awards will be disbursed in two payments following the 90 percent (90%)/10 percent (10%) model described above. Unspent funds reported on annual reports will be deducted from the next allotment of funds.

D. Allowable Activities and Use of Funds

- 1. Assembly Bill (AB) 130 Section 143 provided the Commission with \$15,000,000 (\$15 million) appropriated from the General Fund for the Computer Science Supplementary Authorization Incentive Grant Program. One time grant awards of up to \$2,500 per teacher participating in the Computer Science Supplementary Authorization Incentive Grant Program are available to support credentialed teachers to obtain a supplementary authorization in computer science and provide instruction in computer science coursework in settings authorized by the underlying credential. Funding is available for up to five years, through June 30, 2026
- 2. Grant funding may be used for costs for any of the following: coursework, books, fees, tuition, and release time and/or substitute cost. The awards allocated pursuant to this grant shall not be subject to local educational agency indirect costs. The 100-percent match of grant funding may be in the form of (A) one dollar (\$1) for every one dollar (\$1) of grant funding received that is to be used in a manner consistent with allowable grant costs described above and/or (B) an in-kind match of release time or substitute teacher costs for the participating teacher.
- The Grantee warrants by execution of this Agreement, that no person or selling agency
 has been employed or retained to solicit or secure this Agreement upon agreement or
 understanding for a commission, percentage, brokerage, or contingent fee, excepting

bona fide employees or bona fide established commercial or selling agencies maintained by the Grantee for the purpose of securing business. For breach or violation of the warranty, the state shall, in addition to other remedies provided by law, have the right to annul this Agreement without liability, paying only for the value of the work performed, or otherwise recover the full amount of such commission, percentage, brokerage, or contingent fee.

E. Payment Documentation

- Payment shall be made yearly for the annual grant amount, less 10% withholding to be released upon satisfactory completion of all required deliverables.
- 2. Any overpayment of Grant Amount in excess of final project costs shall be returned to the State within 60 days of completion of the Project or the end of the Project Performance Period as shown on page one (1), whichever is earlier.

F. Project Administration

- Grantee agrees to provide all technical and administrative services as needed for Agreement completion. Grantee agrees to monitor and review all work performed; and coordinate budgeting and scheduling to assure that the Agreement is completed within budget, on schedule, and in accordance with approved procedures, applicable laws, and regulations.
- Grantee ensures that the Agreement requirements are met through completion of annual reports, submitted to the State in accordance with the Work Plan and through regular communication with the State.
- Grantee agrees to promptly submit reports as the State has requested in this Agreement or may request during the life of this Agreement.
- The Grantee shall comply with the Drug-Free Workplace Act of 1990 (Government Code section 8350 et seq.), Government Code sections 12990(a-f) and CCR, Title 2, Section 8103 (nondiscrimination for non-public entities, and Public Contract Code section 10295.3 (domestic partners).

G. Project Termination

- Failure by the Grantee to comply with the terms of this Agreement or any other Agreement under the Act may be cause for suspension of all obligations of the State hereunder.
- Failure of the Grantee to comply with the terms of this Agreement shall not be cause for the suspension of all obligations of the State hereunder if in the judgment of the State such failure was due to no fault of the Grantee.
- 3. In such case, any amount required to settle at minimum cost any irrevocable obligations properly incurred shall be eligible for reimbursement under this Agreement.
- 4. Should the Grantee choose to terminate its participation in the program, a thirty (30)-day written notice is required. Final program and expenditure reports are due thirty (30) days after the program cessation. The Grantee agrees to return all unexpended funds

within sixty (60) days of project cessation.

- 5. It is mutually agreed that if the Budget Act of the current year and/or any subsequent years covered under this Agreement does not appropriate sufficient funds for the program, this Agreement shall be of no further force and effect. In this event, the state shall have no liability to any funds to the Grantee, furnish any other consideration under this agreement, and the grantee shall not be obligated to perform any provisions of this Agreement.
- 6. If funding for any fiscal year is reduced or deleted by the Budget Act for purposes of this program, the State shall have the option to either cancel this Agreement with no liability occurring to the State or offer an agreement amendment to the Grantee to reflect the changes.

H. Financial Records

- Expenditures shall comply with all applicable provisions of federal, state, and local
 rules, regulations and policies related to the administration, use, and accounting for
 public school funds, including but not limited to, the Education Code of the State of
 California.
- Grantee agrees to maintain satisfactory financial accounts, documents, and records for the Project and to make them available to the State for auditing at reasonable times. Grantee also agrees to retain such financial accounts, documents and records for three years following Project termination or completion.
- 3. Grantee agrees to use a generally accepted accounting system.

I. Audit

- Projects are subject to audit by the State for three years following the final payment of Grant Amount. The purpose of this audit is to verify that project expenditures were properly documented. Grantees will be contacted at least 30 days in advance of an audit.
- Audit will include all books, papers, accounts, documents, or other records of the Grantee, as they relate to the Project for which the State authorized Grant Amount. The Grantee shall have the Project records, including the sources documents and cancelled warrants, readily available to the State.
- The Grantee must also provide an employee having knowledge of the Project and the accounting procedure or system to assist the State's auditor. The Grantee shall provide a copy of any document, paper, record, or the like requested by the State.
- All Project records must be retained for at least one year following an audit or final disputed audit findings.

2021-22 Budget Act Legislation

AB 130, SEC. 143.

- (a) For the 2021–22 fiscal year, the sum of fifteen million (\$15,000,000) is hereby appropriated from the General Fund to the Commission on Teacher Credentialing for the Computer Science Supplementary Authorization Incentive Grant Program. This funding shall be available for encumbrance until June 30, 2026.
- (b) The Computer Science Supplementary Authorization Incentive Grant Program is hereby established for the purpose of providing one-time grants to local educational agencies to support the preparation of credentialed teachers to earn a supplementary authorization in computer science and provide instruction in computer science coursework in settings authorized by the underlying credential.

- (d) A participating teacher is eligible to receive an award of up to two thousand five hundred dollars (\$2,500) from the Computer Science Supplementary Authorization Incentive Grant Program.
- (e) The commission shall do all of the following:
 - (1) Establish grant criteria for local educational agencies.
 - (2) Issue a request for proposal to all local educational agencies to solicit applications for funding.
 - (3) Accept grant applications from participating local educational agencies until funds are fully expended.
 - (4) Review applications and verify that each proposed participant teacher holds a valid credential.
 - (5) Allocate grants to participating local educational agencies for the purpose of paying the teacher costs of coursework, books, fees, and tuition, as applicable.
 - (6) Give priority to grant applications for teachers that provide instruction at either of the following:
 - (A) A school operating within a rural district.
 - (B) A school with a higher share than other applicants of unduplicated pupils, as defined in Section 42238.02 of the Education Code.
- (f) In selecting grant recipients, the commission shall require each applicant to, at a minimum, do all of the following:
 - (1) Identify the teachers employed by the local educational agency who have been selected to participate in the incentive grant program.
 - (2) Identify the number of coursework credits required for each selected teacher to earn a supplementary authorization in computer science.
 - (3) Provide an estimated cost for the required coursework, books, fees, tuition, and release time, as applicable.

- (4) Provide a 100-percent match of grant funding in the form of one or both of the following:
 - (A) One dollar (\$1) for every one dollar (\$1) of grant funding received that is to be used in a manner consistent with allowable grant costs described in paragraph (3).
 - (B) An in-kind match of release time or substitute teacher costs for the participating teacher.
- (5) Report to the Commission on Teacher Credentialing on or before August 30 of the second year after receiving a grant award the number of new computer science courses offered at the school being taught by a teacher who participated in the incentive grant program.
- (g) The awards allocated pursuant to this section shall not be subject to local educational agency indirect costs.
- (h) On or before April 1 of each year until the fiscal year following final disbursement of the grant funds, the Commission on Teacher Credentialing shall report to the fiscal committees of the Legislature, the Legislative Analyst's Office, and the Department of Finance on the program, including, but not limited to, the number of participating local educational agencies, the number of grants issued, the number of computer science supplementary authorizations issued, and the number of new computer science courses reported by grant recipients. The report shall be submitted in compliance with Section 9795 of the Government Code.
- (i) For purposes of this section, "local educational agency" means a school district, county office of education, county superintendent of schools, state-operated education program, including a state special school, an education program providing instruction in kindergarten or any of grades 1 to 12, inclusive, that is offered by a state agency, including the Department of Youth and Community Restoration and the State Department of Developmental Services, or a regional occupational center or program operated by a joint powers authority or county office of education.
- (j) For purposes of making the computations required by Section 8 of Article XVI of the California Constitution, the appropriation made by subdivision (a) shall be deemed to be "General Fund revenues appropriated for school districts," as defined in subdivision (c) of Section 41202 of the Education Code, for the 2020–21 fiscal year, and included within the "total allocations to school districts and community college districts from General Fund proceeds of taxes appropriated pursuant to Article XIII B," as defined in subdivision (e) of Section 41202 of the Education Code, for the 2020–21 fiscal year.

The amount to be recovered shall be adjusted proportionately to reflect the service provided if the candidate served at least one year at a public school in California. Upon confirming the amount to be recovered from the grant recipient, the Commission shall notify the grantee of the amount to be repaid within 60 days. - Upon approval of the application, the first payment will be 90 percent (90%) of the total annual grant amount projected for the first year of candidate enrollment.
- The second payment will be 10 percent (10%) of the total annual grant amount projected for the first year of candidate enrollment. The second payment will be provided to grantees after the program has completed its activities and submitted the required annual reports to the Commission.
- 3. Subsequent annual payments will be disbursed in two payments following the 90 percent (90%)/10 percent (10%) model described above.
- Annual payments will not be released until the completed annual report from the previous fiscal year has been approved by Commission staff.

D. Allowable Activities and Use of Funds

 Senate Bill (SB) 141 Section 112 (Chap. 48, Stats. 2023) provided the Commission with \$10 million for the Diverse Education Leaders Pipeline Initiative Grant Program. Per

statute, one-time, non-renewable grant awards of up to \$30,000 per administrative candidate. An LEA receiving a grant shall not use more than 5 percent of grant awards for program administration costs. Grant funds are available to eligible LEA grantees through June 30, 2027.

- Grant funds may not be used to reimburse expenditures incurred prior to the start date of the project's "Performance Period," as indicated on the first page of the grant award agreement.
- 3. Grant recipients shall not charge a sponsored candidate a fee to participate in the Diverse Education Leaders Pipeline Initiative program.
- Only activities that were approved on the grant application may be funded. Note that
 this is not a planning grant, and only Program Administration costs may be claimed
 as outlined in the approved budget.
- 5. The Grantee warrants by execution of this Agreement, that no person or selling agency has been employed or retained to solicit or secure this Agreement upon agreement or understanding for a commission, percentage, brokerage, or contingent fee, excepting bona fide employees or bona fide established commercial or selling agencies maintained by the Grantee for the purpose of securing business. For breach or violation of the warranty, the state shall, in addition to other remedies provided by law, have the right to annul this Agreement without liability, paying only for the value of the work performed, or otherwise recover the full amount of such commission, percentage, brokerage, or contingent fee.

E. Payment Documentation

- Payment shall be made yearly for the annual grant amount, less 10 percent withholding to be released upon satisfactory completion of all required deliverables.
- 2. Any overpayment of Grant Amount in excess of final project costs shall be returned to the State within 60 days of completion of the Project or at the end of the Project Performance Period as shown on page one (1), whichever is earlier.
- 3. Repayment of grant funds shall be made in accordance with SB 141, Section 112 (Chap. 48, Stats. 2023) subdivisions (i), (j), and (l).

F. Project Administration

- Grantee agrees to provide all technical and administrative services as needed for Agreement completion. Grantee agrees to monitor and review all work performed; and coordinate budgeting and scheduling to assure that the Agreement is completed within budget, on schedule, and in accordance with approved procedures, applicable laws, and regulations.
- Grantee ensures that the Agreement requirements are met through completion of annual reports, submitted to the State in accordance with the Work Plan and through regular communication with the State.

- 3. Grantee agrees to promptly submit reports as the State has requested in this Agreement or may request during the life of this Agreement.
- The Grantee shall comply with the Drug-Free Workplace Act of 1990 (Government Code section 8350 et seq.), Government Code sections 12990(a-f) and CCR, Title 2, Section 8103 (nondiscrimination for non-public entities, and Public Contract Code section 10295.3 (domestic partners).

G. Project Termination

- Failure by the Grantee to comply with the terms of this Agreement or any other Agreement under the Act may be cause for suspension of all obligations of the State hereunder.
- Failure of the Grantee to comply with the terms of this Agreement shall not be cause for the suspension of all obligations of the State hereunder if in the judgment of the State such failure was due to no fault of the Grantee.
- In such case, any amount required to settle at minimum cost any irrevocable obligations properly incurred shall be eligible for reimbursement under this Agreement.
- 4. Should the Grantee choose to terminate its participation in the program, a thirty (30)-day written notice is required. Final program and expenditure reports are due thirty (30) days after the program cessation. The Grantee agrees to return all unexpended funds within sixty (60) days of project cessation.
- 5. It is mutually agreed that if the Budget Act of the current year and/or any subsequent years covered under this Agreement does not appropriate sufficient funds for the program, this Agreement shall be of no further force and effect. In this event, the state shall have no liability to any funds to the Grantee, furnish any other consideration under this agreement, and the grantee shall not be obligated to perform any provisions of this Agreement.
- If funding for any fiscal year is reduced or deleted by the Budget Act for purposes of this program, the State shall have the option to either cancel this Agreement with no liability occurring to the State or offer an agreement amendment to the Grantee to reflect the changes.

H. Financial Records

- Expenditures shall comply with all applicable provisions of federal, state, and local rules, regulations and policies related to the administration, use, and accounting for public school funds, including but not limited to, the Education Code of the State of California.
- Grantee agrees to maintain satisfactory financial accounts, documents, and records
 for the Project and to make them available to the State for auditing at reasonable
 times. Grantee also agrees to retain such financial accounts, documents, and records
 for three years following Project termination or completion.
- 3. Grantee agrees to use a generally accepted accounting system.

I. Audit

- Projects are subject to audit by the State for three years following the final payment
 of the Grant Amount. The purpose of this audit is to verify that project expenditures
 were properly documented. Grantees will be contacted at least 30 days in advance of
 an audit.
- Audit will include all books, papers, accounts, documents, or other records of the Grantee, as they relate to the Project for which the State authorized Grant Amount. The Grantee shall have the Project records, including the sources documents and cancelled warrants, readily available to the State.
- The Grantee must also provide an employee having knowledge of the Project and the
 accounting procedure or system to assist the State's auditor. The Grantee shall provide
 a copy of any document, paper, record, or the like requested by the State.
- All Project records must be retained for at least one year following an audit or final disputed audit findings.

2023 Authorizing Legislation

SB 141 Section 112 (Chap. 48, Stats. 2023)

- (a) For the 2023–24 fiscal year, the Superintendent of Public Instruction shall allocate the sum of ten million dollars (\$10,000,000) from the funding appropriated in Provision 3 of Item 6100-488 of the Budget Act of 2023 to the Commission on Teacher Credentialing to establish the Diverse Education Leaders Pipeline Initiative program, as set forth in this section.
- (b) The purpose of the program is to train, place, and retain diverse and culturally responsive administrators in transitional kindergarten, kindergarten, and grades 1 to 12, inclusive, to improve pupil outcomes and meet the needs of California's education workforce. The program shall have the following goals:
 - (1) Increasing diversity among public school administrators for transitional kindergarten, kindergarten, and grades 1 to 12, inclusive, to promote school environments that better represent and reflect the diversity of the pupils served.

- (2) Cultivating culturally responsive public school administrators for transitional kindergarten, kindergarten, and grades 1 to 12, inclusive, through professional development that centers diversity, equity, and inclusion.
- (3) Mitigating or removing administrator credentialing costs for aspiring public school administrators for transitional kindergarten, kindergarten, and grades 1 to 12, inclusive, and administrator preparation and induction programs.
- (4) Promoting improved academic and school climate outcomes for all pupils, especially historically underserved pupil subgroups.
- (5) Tracking and publicly reporting recruitment, retention, and demographic data for educators that benefit from this program to inform policy, legislation, and practice.
- (6) Build capacity and partnerships between local educational agencies, nonprofit educational service providers, and institutions of higher education to meet the needs of administrator candidates with a focus on improving outcomes for pupils and strengthening California's educator workforce.
- (7) Increasing quality school administrators statewide and incorporating culturally diverse practices that prove effective towards increasing local educational agency and schoolsite leadership.
- (c) For purposes of this section, the following definitions apply:
 - (1) "Administrator candidate" means an individual with a teaching or services credential eligible to pursue an administrative services credential, including individuals who will apply or who have applied to administrator programs.
 - (2) "Grant recipient" means a local educational agency or a consortium of local educational agencies that is awarded a grant pursuant to this section.
 - (3) "Institution of higher education" means a California postsecondary college or university accredited by the Commission on Teacher Credentialing to offer a preparation program for an administrative services credential.
 - (4) "Local educational agency" means a school district, county office of education, charter school, or a regional occupational center or program operated by a joint powers authority or a county office of education.
 - (5) "Nonprofit educational service provider" means either of the following:
 - (A) A California nonprofit entity accredited by the Commission on Teacher Credentialing to offer a preparation program for an administrative services credential.
 - (B) A California nonprofit entity in partnership with a local educational agency or institution of higher education accredited by the California Commission on Teacher Credentialing to offer a preparation program for an administrative services credential.
- (d) When selecting grant recipients, the Commission on Teacher Credentialing shall do both of the following:
 - (1) Develop criteria for the awarding of competitive grants and an application process, request necessary data from participating local educational agencies, and award grants consistent with this section. Successful applicants shall demonstrate an understanding of how diverse and

culturally competent school leadership affects pupil academic success and social-emotional well-being, family engagement, and the retention of a diverse educator workforce.

- (2) Give priority consideration to grant applicants who demonstrate a commitment to increasing diversity in the teaching workforce, have a higher percentage than other applicants of enrolled unduplicated pupils, as defined in Section 42238.02 of the Education Code, and have one or more schools that exhibit one or both of the following characteristics:
 - (A) A school where 50 percent or more of the enrolled pupils are eligible for free or reduced-price meals.
 - (B) A school that is located in either a rural location or a densely populated region.
- (e) Grant recipients awarded funding pursuant to this section shall demonstrate a commitment to administrator diversity and culturally responsive school leadership, as evidenced by programmatic pedagogy, curriculum, coursework, mission statements, or any other relevant data, and shall receive an amount of up to thirty thousand dollars (\$30,000) per administrator candidate.
- (f) (1) Permissible uses of funding allocated pursuant to this section include, but are not limited to, all of the following:
 - (A) Coaching, training, and mentoring activities for current administrators and administrator candidates to serve and educate diverse pupil populations, engage diverse families, and support and retain a diverse educator workforce.
 - (B) Developing support systems for a diverse administrator workforce that reflects a local educational agency community's diversity.
 - (C) Paying for or reimbursing administrator program costs.
 - (D) Paying for or reimbursing administrator credentialing costs, including administrative services credential clear induction programs.
 - (2) A grant recipient shall not use more than 5 percent of a grant award for program administration costs.
 - (3) In performing these activities, a grant recipient is highly encouraged to partner with an institution of higher education or a nonprofit educational service provider, or both, as applicable. These partnerships may require that grant recipients provide fiscal support to partner organizations to support their capacity for meaningful collaboration and implementation of the Diverse Education Leaders Pipeline Initiative program.
- (g) An administrator candidate shall agree in writing to serve in a school within the jurisdiction of the grant recipient that sponsored the candidate or another public school in California for a period of at least two school years. The administrator candidate shall also commit in the written agreement to annually report to their sponsoring local educational agency where they are employed and their current contact information until they have completed their service requirement. Upon receiving the preliminary administrator credential, the administrator candidate has four years to complete the two-year service requirement.
- (h) If a candidate is unable to complete a school year of service, that school year may still be counted toward the required two complete school years if any of the following occur:
 - (1) The candidate has completed at least one-half of the school year.

- (2) The employer deems the candidate to have fulfilled their contractual requirements for the school year.
- (3) The candidate was not able to serve as an administrator due to the financial circumstances of the sponsoring grant recipient, including a decision to not reelect the employee for the succeeding school year.
- (4) The candidate has a condition covered under the federal Family and Medical Leave Act of 1993 (29 U.S.C. Sec. 2601 et seq.) or similar state law.
- (5) The candidate was called or ordered to active duty status for more than 30 days as a member of a reserve component of the Armed Forces of the United States.
- (i) (1) If the Commission on Teacher Credentialing is informed that more than 10 percent of sponsored candidates in a local educational agency's yearly program cohort failed to earn an administrator credential or failed to meet their commitment pursuant to this section, the Commission on Teacher Credentialing shall confirm with the grant recipient the applicable grant amount to be recovered from the grant recipient based on the number of candidates who failed to earn a credential or meet their administrator commitment above a 10-percent attrition rate.
 - (2) The amount to be recovered shall be adjusted proportionately to reflect the service provided if the candidate served at least one year at a public school in California.
- (j) Upon confirming the amount to be recovered from the grant recipient pursuant to subdivision (i), the Commission on Teacher Credentialing shall notify the grant recipient of the amount to be repaid within 60 days. The grant recipient shall have 60 days from the date of the notification to make the required repayment to the Commission on Teacher Credentialing. If the grant recipient fails to make the required payment within 60 days, the Commission on Teacher Credentialing shall notify the Controller and the grant recipient of the failure to repay the amount owed. The Controller shall deduct an amount equal to the amount owed to the Commission on Teacher Credentialing from the grant recipient's next principal apportionment or apportionments of state funds, other than basic aid apportionments required by Section 6 of Article IX of the California Constitution.
- (k) An amount recovered by the Commission on Teacher Credentialing or deducted by the Controller pursuant to subdivision (j) shall be deposited into the Proposition 98 Reversion Account.
- (I) Grant recipients may recover from a sponsored candidate who fails to earn an administrator credential, or who fails to complete the period of placement, the amount of grant funding invested in the administrator candidate's training. The amount to be recovered shall be adjusted proportionately to reflect the service provided if the administrator candidate served at least one year, but less than two years, at a public school in California.
- (m) Grant recipients shall not charge a sponsored candidate a fee to participate in the Diverse Education Leaders Pipeline Initiative program.
- (n) On or before June 30, 2027, the Commission on Teacher Credentialing shall submit a report on the Diverse Education Leaders Pipeline Initiative program to the Department of Finance and the appropriate policy and fiscal committees of both houses of the Legislature. The report shall include an evaluation of the program, including, but not limited to, all of the following information:
 - (1) The number of local educational agencies awarded a grant and the number of institutions of higher education and nonprofit educational service providers that were included in grantee partnerships.

- (2) The number of administrator candidates supported by the grant award and the number of individuals who obtained an administrative services credential and employment as an administrator as a result of the program.
- (3) Any relevant demographic data for each participating local educational agency, including the racial, ethnic, and gender demographics and first language of each administrator candidate supported by the grant award.
- (4) The types of culturally relevant support provided to administrator candidates and administrators to improve retention and the education, engagement, and retention of diverse pupils, families, and educators.
- (5) Where applicable, the impact of the program on pupil academic and school climate outcomes in participating local educational agencies.

Exhibit A

Implementation Plan

(Supplied by Grantee, Question 3 of RFA Response)

The LAPASC program is built on the following **theory of action:** If candidates are provided with the tools of cultural proficiency, they have capacity to engage in equity driven transformative work. By doing so, they will have the agency to enact transformational change at their school site. To this end, **The LAPASC** program has 4 blocks of instruction: Instructional Leadership, Change Leadership, Facilitating Communities of Practice, and Vision and Community Leadership. All blocks also include fieldwork experiences, Equity Seminars, and workshops. Fieldwork experiences are designed to ensure candidates integrate their learnings from the course work to real school settings and administrative practices. lock 4 brings together The program tracks the development of the equity-driven leader through an expanding variety of interactions: individual (coaching, evaluation, monitoring); group (professional development, leading communities of practice); systems (plans, policy, law and ethics); the incorporation trauma informed social emotional learning practices. Finally, personal, professional and community relationships. (Vision, mission, community). Fieldwork experiences, the Principal Shadowing assignment and the culminating task further reassert the behaviors and disposition which are the bedrock of the program. The LAPASC program evolves in the following manner:

Block 1, Instructional Leadership covers evaluation, supervision, the role of coaching, application of adult learning, and effective professional development. In this block, CalAPA Cycle 3 preparation is fully included within the block's course work. The fieldwork provides the opportunity to support teacher growth through professional development instructor and/or student identified needs. Block 1 Syllabus: Instructional Leadership

Block 2, Change Leadership builds upon the work in Block 1 to study an entire school site's ability to adapt to and identify needs. Candidates will master how to utilize quantitative and qualitative data collection to identify school improvement planning. Block 2 focuses on creating an urgency to change, building the capacity of staff to manage and adapt to student needs, creating school-wide priorities and goals, and creating a theory of action. In this block, preparation for CalAPA Cycle 1 is fully embedded. Block 2 Syllabus: Change Leadership

In Block 3, Facilitating Communities of Practice, candidates will learn about organizational issues around evaluation, supervision, the role of coaching teams, application of adult learning, and effective professional development. Candidates will learn how to plan and implement a collaborative approach to school improvement. Candidates will learn the essential aspects of collaboration, networking, target investigation/experimentation and providing measurable goals and outcomes. It also supports completion of CalAPA Cycle 2. Block 3 Syllabus: Facilitating Communities of Practice,

In Block 4, Vision and Community Leadership, candidates will focus on understanding and defining culture; managing cultural dynamics through collaboration; transformational culture; understanding community; and the role of communications in building a vision. In this course there is a particular focus on Trauma Informed Social Emotional Learning (TISEL), systems and operational aspects of leadership. Candidates will engage in one Consequential Task focused on Trauma Informed Leadership and Social-Emotional Learning (SEL) in this course.

Block 4 Syllabus: Vision and Community

Equity Seminars/USC Racial Equity Leadership Academy (8 Full Saturdays and 1 Sunday)
Each Block within the LAPASC program begins with a one-day Equity Seminar which
introduces the Cultural Proficiency Framework Emphasis is placed on learning from equity gains
and racial missteps that have recently occurred elsewhere; learning how to get ahead of situations
and reducing the risk of crisis; and learning actionable racial equity leadership strategies.

Participants will also receive numerous tools and resources. The Workshops are designed to
provide support for candidates to successfully integrate their learning about equity driven
practices into their considerations as they meet program and CTC requirements (CalAPA).

Integral to these days is the partnership with University of Southern California's (USC) Race and
Equity Center. In support of the ongoing focus of LAPASC, and with the support of the DELPI
grant, USC will provide professional development in the following areas to enhance candidate's
ability to lead LAUSD schools on equity driven transformational leadership, culturally
relevant/proficient curriculum across content area, sustaining culturally responsive teacher, and
fostering racial equity, data literacy and decision making.

The partnership will allow the LAPASC program to prepare candidates to become fearless leaders in addressing issues of inequity, racism, and disparity. It will enhance the capacity of candidates, and LAPASC faculty, to enact the behaviors of equity driven transformative leaders.

Field experiences: Fieldwork is an integral piece in the preparation of candidates for the Preliminary Administrative Services Credential. The following two fieldwork experiences are required and mandatory for all candidates: All Candidates must engage in designing.

implementing, and monitoring professional development. The second experience is selected by the candidate and the Administrative Mentor based on the results of the candidate's self-assessment and identified area of improvement. The Administrative Mentor and LAPASC roles and responsibilities are clearly defined in the Fieldwork Agreement document. LAPASC Fieldwork Guide

Principal Shadowing: Experience Candidates will participate in two 1-day shadowing experiences wherein he/she/they will shadow a vetted and proven exemplary principal and another administrator of their choice. Upon completion they will write a reflective narrative based on the Essential Elements of Cultural proficiency and other specific prompts. Candidates maintain a running record of what they observe during the 2 days and submit a reflective analysis of their experience. LAPASC Principal Shadowing Guide

Culminating Task: Candidates will engage in one consequential task focused on Trauma Informed Leadership and Equity Driven leadership. As cited previously, a robust body of research demonstrates that when evidence-based trauma-informed SEL programming is well implemented, academic achievement increases as does student well-being. Candidates will complete an intake for the school site they are employed at. In this way, candidates will demonstrate their mastery of the standards and their readiness to take on the role of a transformational equity-driven school site leader. LAPASC TISEL Culminating Task

LAPASC runs its program from April to March annually. This was deliberately chosen so candidates can complete the program, be processed through CTC and be available for a potential administrative placement on July 1st of the new school year. It also facilitates the timing and ease of completing the CalAPA assessments as required by the state of California. It ensures they have access to staff and resources to complete these successfully. As described in the Program Overview, LAPASC begins with Cycle 3 in April when most teachers have completed formal evaluation processes and are available for the coaching exercise. Our predicted schedule under the DELPI grant is:

DELPI Cohort 1: April 2025-March 2026 (30 Candidates)

DELPI Cohort 2: April 2026-March 2027 (30 Candidates) total of 60 Candidates

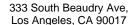

Diploma with Alternate Assessment Exemption (PUBLIC HEARING)
October 22, 2024

Action Proposed:

To provide eligible individuals with exceptional needs, who were enrolled in grade 10 or higher in the 2022-23 school year, with the opportunity to be awarded a high school diploma, pursuant to Education Code Section 51225.32, authorize District schools to extend a graduation exemption from all courses and requirements adopted by the Los Angeles Unified Board of Education (Board) that are additional to the statewide course requirements specified in Education Code Section 51225.3. Eligible individuals are defined as students with an Individualized Education Program (IEP) who are eligible to take the state alternative assessment and required to complete state standards-aligned coursework to meet the statewide course requirements, as noted in their IEP.

Background:

Pursuant to Education Code Section 51225.31, beginning with students in the Class of 2026, Local Education Agencies (LEAs) are required to provide a graduation exemption to all eligible individuals who entered ninth grade in the 2022-23 school year or later. Education Code section 51225.32 allows LEAs, if authorized by their Governing Board, to provide this exemption to eligible individuals who were enrolled in grade 10 or higher in the 2022-23 school year. If authorized, more students would have access to a high school diploma, thus expanding their career and college opportunities. If approved, schools will receive support with IEP amendments and credit recovery opportunities to support eligible students.

Expected Outcomes:

Approval of this action will give eligible students greater access to postsecondary college and career opportunities, especially if a high school diploma is required for their chosen career path. Additionally, this action will increase graduation rates at schools, as previously eligible students who would have only received a certificate of completion, and not been counted as graduates on the California dashboard, will now be recognized as a graduate.

Board Options and Consequences:

If the Board approves this action, all currently enrolled eligible students in the Class of 2025 who meet the minimum California Department of Education (CDE) graduation requirements will be able to receive a high school diploma. Additionally, students who earned a certificate of completion and are still eligible for special education may also be eligible to receive a high school diploma.

If the Board does not authorize the eligibility exemption for high school diplomas, the diploma exemption for alternative assessment will only be available to students who entered 9th grade in the 2022-2023 (Class of 2026) and later.

Policy Implications:

Authorization would alter existing graduation requirements for students with disabilities currently enrolled and eligible for state alternative assessments, who were in grade 10 or higher during the 2022-2023 school year.

Under the new requirements, these students would need to fulfill California's minimum graduation standards, and not local graduation requirements. California requirements include:

- Three year-long courses in English
- Two year-long courses in mathematics
- Two year-long courses in science
- Three year-long courses in social studies
- Two courses in physical education
- One year-long course in either visual or performing arts, world language, or Career and Technical Education

Issues and Analysis:

Though the proposed action is not mandatory, approval may present greater equity and access for all students to earn a high school diploma. Additionally, eligible students in the Class of 2024 who successfully complete graduation requirements may increase the adjusted five-year cohort graduation rate in December 2025. If approved, schools will receive immediate guidance for implementation through Inter-Office Correspondence, frequently asked questions and answers, training on transcript analysis and identification of credit recovery opportunities for eligible students, and IEP guidance.

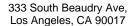

Approval of the Renewal Petition for New West Charter [PUBLIC HEARING] October 22, 2024 Charter Schools Division

Action Proposed:

Approve the renewal petition for New West Charter ("Charter School") located in Board District 4 and Region West, for six (6) years, beginning July 1, 2025 until June 30, 2031, to serve 1,150 students in grades 6-12 in year one, and up to 1,150 students in grades 6-12 by the end of the charter term. The recommendation for approval is based on the information set forth in the attached Staff Assessment and Recommendation Report.

Although New West Charter's renewal petition contains the provisions identified in the LAUSD Board adopted LAUSD Federal, State, and District Required Language for Independent Charter School Petitions (New and Renewal) and Material Revisions ("FSDRL"), New West Charter's renewal petition may contain provisions that are inconsistent with the FSDRL.

New West Charter is only required to update its charter to include a reasonably comprehensive description (including FSDRL) of any new requirements enacted into law after the charter was originally granted or last renewed as necessary to reflect the current program offered by the charter school. (Ed. Code, § 47607(c)(2)(F).)

New West Charter's renewal petition expressly acknowledges that, to the extent any inconsistency may exist between any provision contained within the body of the Charter and the FSDRL contained in the addendum, the provisions of the FSDRL addendum shall control. Additionally, the renewal petition provides its governing board, "may initiate and carry on any program or activity or may other act in a manner which is not in conflict with or inconsistent with or preempted by any law and which are not in conflict with this charter or the purposes for which schools are established." Accordingly, other than the applicable updates made to New West Charter's renewal petition pursuant to Education Code section 47607(c)(2)(F), New West Charter's renewal petition may not be inconsistent with the law and the provisions of the FSDRL. Moreover, New West Charter's renewal petition qualifies in various sections that, "This section will be followed in the event that LAUSD does not approve the charter." Conversely, the provisions of the FSDRL shall control in the event the LAUSD Board approves the renewal petition. The District will execute its oversight functions in accordance with applicable legal, District and charter requirements, including the FSDRL.

Background:

New West Charter is a 6-12 school currently serving 998 students on private facilities in West Los Angeles at 1905 Armacost Ave., Los Angeles, CA 90026 and 11625 Pico Blvd., Los Angeles, CA 90064 in Board District 4 and Region West. New West Charter was originally approved by the California State Board of Education on December 5, 2001, after denial by the LAUSD Board of Education, to serve students in grades 6-8 for a three-year term with subsequent term extensions through 2007-2008. After subsequent denials by the LAUSD Board of Education, the California State Board of Education renewed New West Charter's charter in 2007 and 2012,

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and in 2017 with technical amendments to revise the petition (e.g., the *Home - School Agreement*, admission preferences, and description of the independent study program). The grade span of New West Charter's charter was extended by the State Board of Education in 2011 to serve students in grades 9-12. On May 11, 2017, New West Charter's charter was renewed on appeal by the California State Board of Education for a five-year term to serve 1,225 students in grades 6-12.

Pursuant to Education Code section 47607.4, all charter schools whose term expires on or between January 1, 2022, and June 30, 2025, inclusive, shall have their term extended by two years, and all charter schools whose terms expires on or between January 1, 2024, and June 30, 2027, inclusive, shall have their term extended by one additional year. Thus, by operation of law, the charter term for New West Charter expires June 30, 2025.

Pursuant to Education Code section 47605.9, New West Charter may continue to operate under the California State Board of Education's authority only until the date on which the charter is up for renewal, at which point New West Charter must submit a petition for renewal to the governing board of the school district within the boundaries of which the charter school is located (i.e., LAUSD Board).

Pursuant to applicable law, charter schools classified as high performing may be renewed for a term of five (5), six (6), or seven (7) years. (Ed. Code, § 47607.) To help determine the recommended term length in these cases, staff considers various factors related to the charter school's operation and performance during the term of the charter, consistent with Education Code section 47607 and as noted in the LAUSD Policy and Procedures for Charter Schools. As staff considered New West Charter's renewal petition and record, also informed by a review of materials from the California Department of Education (CDE), staff recommends a term length of six (6) years. Moreover, should the LAUSD Board of Education approve the renewal of Charter School, LAUSD Board of Education would become the chartering authorizer and conduct oversight pursuant to applicable law and District policy and procedures.

On July 25, 2024, New West Charter submitted its charter renewal petition application to the Charter Schools Division seeking to continue operations of its independent charter school. The 90-day statutory timeline for Board action on this petition runs through October 23, 2024.

An initial Public Hearing was held on September 10, 2024.

Based on a comprehensive review and assessment of Charter School's renewal petition application and its record of performance, staff has determined that Charter School has met the requirements for renewal and therefore recommends approval of the renewal petition.

Due Diligence:

Current New West Charter governing board members completed questionnaires so the District may assess whether any conflicts of interest arise based on the information provided by the governing board members. A due diligence review of the charter school and its governing organization, school leader, and on-site financial manager, was performed by the Office of the Inspector General.

The renewal petition is available for perusal in the Charter Schools Division and online at the District's Board of Education website at http://laschoolboard.org/charterpetitions.

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Statutory Framework and Criteria for Renewal:

A charter school must demonstrate that it is eligible for a renewal of its charter by meeting specific renewal criteria outlined in the Charter Schools Act. The renewal criteria prescribed in Education Code sections 47607 and 47607.2 requires a three-pronged analysis:

Criterion 1: The Charter Schools Act provides that renewals are governed by the standards and criteria described in Education Code section 47605 applicable to initial petitions. The first criterion considered in reviewing a renewal petition requires an analysis of the following:

- Whether the petition includes a sound educational program;
- Whether the petition contains a reasonably comprehensive description of the 15 elements required for petitions;
- Whether the petition contains an affirmation of each of the conditions described in Education Code section 47605(e); and
- Whether the charter school is likely to successfully implement the program set forth in the petition. Education Code section 47607(b) provides that renewals are governed by the standards and criteria described in section 47605 applicable to initial petitions. (The Board may not consider the community impact analysis or District fiscal analysis in determining whether to grant or deny a renewal petition).

Criterion 2: The Board is required to consider the charter school's performance on the California School Dashboard accountability indicators. Education Code sections 47607 and 47607.2 prescribe three-tiers of performance classification in which a charter school falls within one of the following categories - "high," "middle," or "low." The three-tier classification considers a charter school's performance on the California School Dashboard accountability indicators, with an emphasis on the measurements of academic performance.

Criterion 3: Notwithstanding Criterion 1 and 2, the Board must also consider whether the charter school's enrollment or dismissal practices are discriminatory as grounds for nonrenewal. (Ed. Code, § 47607 (e).) Additionally, the Board considers whether the charter school has substantial fiscal or governance factors as grounds for nonrenewal. (Ed. Code, § 47607(e).)

Expected Outcomes:

Charter School is expected to operate its school in a manner consistent with Board action, policies and requirements, local, state, and federal law including ordinances, statutes, and regulations as well as with the terms and conditions set forth in Charter School's petition. The measurable pupil outcomes and method by which pupil progress toward outcomes will be measured are set forth in the charter petition.

Board Options and Consequences:

"Yes" - If the Board adopts the recommendation of approval of the renewal charter petition, Charter School would be authorized to continue operations as a charter school for the charter term beginning July 1, 2025.

"No" - Pursuant to Education Code section 47605.9, if the Board denies the renewal petition, the charter school may submit the petition for renewal directly to the California State Board of Education, which shall review the petition in accordance with Education Code section 47605(k)(1)(B). If the California State Board of Education grants renewal pursuant to Education Code section 47607, the California State Board of Education shall designate, in consultation with the petitioner, either the LAUSD Board or Los Angeles County Board of

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Education as the chartering authority.

Policy Implications:

There are no policy implications at this time.

Budget Impact:

State income and various other income sources to the District are reduced when current District students enroll at a charter school, and comparable or offsetting expenditure reduction may not occur in such cases. Under Education Code section 47604(d), a chartering authority that grants a charter to a charter school to be operated as or by a nonprofit public benefit corporation is not liable for the debts or obligations of the charter school or for claims arising from the performance of acts, errors, or omissions by the charter school, if the chartering authority has complied with all oversight responsibilities required by law including, but not limited to, those required by Education Code section 47604.32 and Education Code section 47605(m). As the chartering authority, the District will continue to monitor and evaluate the charter school's fiscal condition and operations, and management of public funds, including review of all legally required fiscal reports, and the annual update of the charter school's LCAP. (Ed. Code, §§ 47604.32, 47604.33, 47606.5). Any significant modifications to the charter school's charter or operations that raise financial implications would require a material revision prior to implementation. Charter schools are expected to secure and maintain all insurance coverage consistent with applicable legal, District and charter requirements.

Charter School has chosen to remain with a non-LAUSD Special Education Local Planning Area (SELPA) of which it is currently a participating member. Should Charter School subsequently elect to be part of the LAUSD SELPA, any Option election that occurs during Charter School's charter term shall be mutually agreed upon and addressed in a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) between the Charter School and the District. The Option election shall be effective on July 1 of the next school year with the corresponding fair share contribution.

Student Impact:

As stated in the LAUSD Policy and Procedures for Charter Schools, "[W]hen the LAUSD Board authorizes and oversees a charter school, it establishes a relationship to advance its vision and mission and to accelerate gains in academic achievement and accountability for *all* of its students and public schools," (*Policy*, p.3). Based on a comprehensive review and assessment of Charter School's renewal petition application, staff has determined that Charter School has met the requirements for charter school approval.

STAFF ASSESSMENT

Staff recommends approval of the renewal petition for New West Charter ("Charter School"), located in Board District 4 and Region West, for a term of six (6) years, beginning July 1, 2025, until June 30, 2031 to serve up to 1,150 students in grades 6-12 in each year of the charter term. The enrollment capacity of 1,150 is the number represented in the renewal petition and reflects a decrease of 75 students.

Although New West Charter's renewal petition contains the provisions identified in the LAUSD Board adopted LAUSD Federal, State, and District Required Language for Independent Charter School Petitions (New and Renewal) and Material Revisions ("FSDRL"), New West Charter's renewal petition may contain provisions that are inconsistent with the FSDRL.

New West Charter is only required to update its charter to include a reasonably comprehensive description (including FSDRL) of any new requirements enacted into law after the charter was originally granted or last renewed as necessary to reflect the current program offered by the charter school. (Ed. Code, § 47607(c)(2)(F).)

• Criterion 1: Does the renewal petition include a sound educational program, a reasonably comprehensive description of the 15 elements required for petitions, an affirmation of each of the conditions described in Education Code section 47605(e), and are petitioners likely to successfully implement the program set forth in the petition? (Ed. Code, § 47607(b).)

These criteria have been determined not to be bases for denial.

• Criterion 2: Is the charter school "high," "middle," or "low" performing? (see Ed. Code, §§ 47607(c), 47607.2(a), and 47607.2(b).) Has the charter school attained measurable increases in academic achievement schoolwide and for numerically significant numerically significant student groups served by the charter school, and does the charter school have strong postsecondary outcomes, if applicable?

These criteria have been determined not to be bases for denial.

• Criterion 3: Is the charter school serving all pupils who wish to attend, or does the charter school have substantial fiscal or governance issues? (Ed. Code, § 47607(e).)

V. ANNUAL PERFORMANCE-BASED OVERSIGHT RESULTS

In accordance with Education Code section 47604.32, the District's Charter Schools Division (CSD) conducts at least one school site visit each year where the CSD evaluates charter school performance in the following four categories: Governance; Student Achievement and Educational Performance; Organizational Management, Programs, and Operations; and Fiscal Operations. Charter schools are rated in each category based on information and evidence gathered at the time of the annual performance-based oversight visit following a four-point rubric: (4) *Accomplished*, (3) *Proficient*, (2) *Developing*, and (1) *Unsatisfactory*.

New West Charter has been overseen by the SBE, as its chartering authorizer, since the inception of New West Charter in 2001. CSD team has reviewed documents from and has met with CDE staff. CDE staff shared they do not have concerns with the operations and governance of New West based on their oversight review and monitoring. Based on the "Charter School Monitoring Instrument" (rev. December 2021), the CDE annual oversight includes review of the following five criteria: Criterion 1: Fidelity to Charter Petition and Memorandum of Understanding; Criterion 2: Educational Performance; Criterion 3: Governance and Organizational Leadership; Criterion 4: Fiscal Operations and Internal Controls; and Criterion 5: School Operations. In the most recent annual oversight documentation, the CDE Charter Schools Division's "Summary of Annual Site Visit for New West Charter Conducted on October 24–25, 2023," indicated that New West Charter was "in compliance with its charter and the Memorandum of Understanding between the California State Board of Education and NWC."

c. Other Significant Fiscal Information

New West Charter is currently authorized and overseen by the SBE. District staff has communicated with and reviewed documents from staff at the CDE.

New West Charter achieved ratings of *Good* in the assessment of its fiscal condition for Fiscal Years 2022-2023 and 2023-2024 by its current authorizer. The SBE has delegated the responsibility of oversight monitoring of the SBE-authorized charter schools to the CDE. The CDE reviews all financial reports, budgetary updates, and pertinent budget assumptions provided by each SBE-authorized charter school in its overall assessment of a charter school's current and projected financial condition, fiscal sustainability, and appropriateness of fiscal management practices. Each charter school's financial condition is categorized as Good, Fair, or Poor.¹

- i. Charter schools categorized by the CDE as being in *Good* fiscal condition have demonstrated an ability to operate with a balanced budget; maintain stable student enrollment and attendance ratios; properly manage cash liquidity; maintain low debt levels; maintain positive fund balances; and meet the recommended cash reserve levels specified in the memoranda of understanding (MOU) between the SBE and each of the SBE-authorized charter schools that it oversees.
- ii. Charter schools in *Fair* financial condition show some signs of fiscal distress and need to take appropriate action to address declines in their fiscal condition. Specifically, a charter school in *Fair* fiscal condition may have out of balance budgets whereby the school's expenditures exceed its income (deficit spending); declining student enrollment or

- attendance ratios; insufficient cash liquidity; high debt levels; declining or low fund balances; or cash reserve levels that are below the levels required in the school's MOU.
- iii. Charter schools in *Poor* financial condition are in danger of jeopardizing its fiscal operations going forward. Timely and appropriate action by the charter school's board is critical in addressing and mitigating the charter school's serious decline in financial condition. Specifically, a charter school in poor financial condition has a negative fund balance and no reserves. The school does not have an adequate cash level and has a high debt level.

I. Category of Proposed Action:

The proposed action would renew the charter for six (6) years, beginning July 1, 2025 until June 30, 2031 to serve up to 1,150 students in grades 6-12 in year 1 and up to 1,150 students in grades 6-12 by the end of its charter term.

II. Summary Description of Current District Practice:

Charter schools are schools of choice by legislation and are open to any student in the State of California. Charter schools are granted renewal for single charter status for a minimum period of two years to a maximum of seven (7) years, depending on the state's classification of High, Middle or Low for a charter school's performance pursuant to applicable law. Low performing charter schools may be renewed for a period of two years, Middle performing charter schools for five years, and High performing charter schools may receive a term of five, six or seven years. It should be noted, however, that although State legislation allows students to attend a charter school from any area in the state, the Los Angeles Unified School District (LAUSD) is under Court Order, Crawford v. LAUSD, which applies to all schools within or chartered through the LAUSD. Any modifications to the Court-Ordered Integration Program must first be approved by Student Integration Services.

III. Proposed Change:

The approval of this charter petition would renew the charter of New West Charter for six (6) years beginning July 1, 2025 until June 30, 2031.

IV. Effects of This Proposal:

The Los Angeles Unified School District (LAUSD) does not guarantee availability of Court-ordered Integration funding. The charter school will be responsible for maintaining the Court Order and providing information requested by the LAUSD as set forth in the Charter petition. Modifications or school decisions cannot negatively impact or cause additional costs to the Court-ordered Integration budget.

V. Analyze the Impact of This Proposal on Integration, Desegregation, Re-segregation and/or Segregation:

If the Charter goals are met, there should be positive results on the five (5) Harms of Racial Isolation which are low academic achievement, low self-esteem, lack of access to post-secondary opportunities, interracial hostility and intolerance, and overcrowded conditions. The Court-ordered Integration Program for participating students will operate under various Court Orders for schools within the Los Angeles Unified School District. Any modification of the Court-ordered Integration Program must first be approved by Student Integration Services.

VI. If proposed action affects negatively any desegregation program, list other option(s) identified:

If the District Court-ordered Integration Guidelines are followed, there will not be a negative effect on the District's Court-ordered Integration Program.

Whereas, Academic settings maintain a responsibility to their students to foster a safe environment, teaching students about subjects such as civic engagement and being responsible citizens while addressing the <u>effects</u> negative impacts of cyberbullying and the difference between truths, half-truths, lies, facts, and opinions;

Ms. Gonez - Reckoning with Our Past, Honoring Our Present: Developing a Los Angeles Unified Land Acknowledgement (Res-017-24/25) (For Action November 19, 2024)

Whereas, The Los Angeles Unified School District (District) recognizes that we occupy land that was originally and is still inhabited and cared for by the Gabrieleno Tongva and FernandenÞo Tataviam tribes;

Whereas, The Gabrieleno Tongva People inhabited the region Tovangar, known today as the Greater Los Angeles Basin, which is the distinct community of the present day San Gabriel Band of Mission Indians (Gabrieleno Tongva Tribal Council) that originated in the cultures of the period preceding the establishment of the San Gabriel Mission from which the natives received the name Gabrieleno;

Whereas, The Fernandeno Tataviam People inhabited the region of Northern Los Angeles County and eastern Ventura County that includes San Fernando, Simi Valley, Santa Clarita, and Antelope Valleys that originated in the cultures of the period preceding the establishment of Mission San Fernando from which the natives received the name Fernandeño;

Whereas, The District proudly serves students self-identified as American Indian /Alaskan Native and Indigenous, including those who are Gabrieleno Tongva and FernandenPo Tataviam, and the District is pursuing a campaign to improve identification of this student group;

Whereas, From an early age students are exposed to pervasive cultural narratives that normalize eurocentrism and white supremacy, which can promote anti-indigeneity and erasure of minority students and be alienating for native and indigenous students;

Whereas, In 2020 the District took a significant step to combat this history of exclusion in the curriculum and adopted the resolution "Ethnic Studies for All Students: Reaffirming our commitment to Ethnic Studies in Los Angeles Unified" to further expand the ethnic studies curriculum throughout all grade levels and make the completion of at least one ethnic studies course a high school graduation requirement starting in the current school year 2024-25 (Res-001-20/21);

Whereas, The District must join the State of California and County of Los Angeles in exploring the historical relationship between the District, Native Americans and indigenous students and families in the spirit of truth, healing, and reconciliation; now, therefore, be it

Resolved, That the Governing Board of the Los Angeles Unified School District apologizes on behalf of the Los Angeles Unified School District to tribal governments and communities for the history of maltreatment, subjugation, neglect and trauma that the California public education system has inflicted on the Gabrieleno Tongva, FernandenÞo Tataviam, and other local tribes;

<u>Resolved</u> further, That the District acknowledges that colonization in what now constitutes Los Angeles Unified School boundaries resulted in land seizure, disease, slavery, relocation, genocide, multigenerational trauma, and educational disparities, and we are committed to truth, healing, cooperation and to elevating the stories, culture, and community of the original inhabitants of this land;

Resolved further, That the District shall collaborate with local tribes to explore the historical record and relationship between the District and native and indigenous students, families, and communities, including the District's policies, procedures, and practices that may have harmed Native American and indigenous students, and to develop a public land acknowledgement statement on behalf of the District accompanied by an educational campaign to raise awareness and ensure students have access to educational resources that support their understanding of the history of the land occupied by LAUSD;

<u>Resolved</u> further, That the forthcoming public land acknowledgement be brought back to the Board for a formal vote no later than June 2025 and, once approved, be publicly posted on the District's website with the accompanying educational resources and tools for students and school communities to utilize;

- Establishing a dedicated position to work with tribes in alignment with the current efforts of the Multilingual and Multicultural Education Department;
- Prioritizing the inclusion of native plants in the District's design plans for outdoor improvements and greening projects;
- Providing resources to educators in recognition of Indigenous People's Day, National Day of Remembrance, California Native American Day, Native American Heritage Month, and, where

- appropriate, National Awareness Day for Missing or Murdered Indigenous Women and Girls;

Dr. McKenna - Recognizing November as National Runaway and Homeless Youth Prevention Month (Res-020 -24/25) (For Action November 19, 2024)

Whereas, November is National Runaway and Homeless Youth Prevention Month;

Whereas, Runaway and homeless youth, defined as young people between 12 and 24 years of age, have the least access to essential opportunities and supports;

Whereas, The prevalence of runaways and homelessness among youth is staggering, with studies suggesting that nationally between 1,600,000 and 2,800,000 youth up to 24 years of age experience homelessness every year, of which an overrepresentation, compared to the general youth population, are youth of color, gay, lesbian, bisexual, or transgender;

Whereas, Based on national surveys and California's youth population, an estimated 200,000 youth under 18 years of age, and thousands more who are 18 to 24 years of age, are homeless for one or more days each year;

Whereas, The percentage of unaccompanied homeless youth who are unsheltered in California stands at 68.2 percent, which is the second highest in the country. California also has 29 percent of the homeless youth in the country, the largest number of homeless youth of any state;

Whereas, An estimated 44,007 children and youth experienced homelessness in Los Angeles County in the 2023-2024 school year;

Whereas, Runaway and homeless youth flee conflict, abuse, neglect, or increasingly, poverty in their homes. They have become disconnected from educational systems and the workforce, and do not have the skills and financial resources to live on their own. The factors impacting youth homelessness are complex and differ from those impacting other homeless populations;

Whereas, Runaway and homeless youth who live on the street are victims of physical abuse, sexual exploitation, human trafficking, and crime in untold numbers. An estimated 300,000 youth are either victims or at risk of becoming victims of the commercial sexual exploitation of children each year, and sixty percent of these victimized children are homeless;

Whereas, Homeless youth tend to have started using drugs at a younger age, often before 15 years of age. Early drug use and abuse is predictive of serious adult addiction problems and long-term homelessness;

Whereas, Youth who "age out" of the foster care system are at an increased risk of homelessness, and represent an estimated 20 percent of the 20,000 youth who leave foster care and are currently homeless;

Whereas, Youth without a high school diploma are 346 percent more likely to experience homelessness than their peers who complete high school;

Whereas, Providing safe, stable, and permanent housing for runaway and homeless youth is a family, community, state, and national priority, and homeless youth are considered one of the unique populations in the homeless community by the United States Interagency Council on Homelessness;

Whereas, The future well-being of our state depends on the value we place on our youth, and, in particular, on our actions to provide the most vulnerable young people in the state with opportunities to acquire the knowledge, skills, and abilities they need to find and maintain stable housing and develop into healthy and productive adults;

Whereas, When targeted resources are invested, we see a significant increase in the number of communities with youth-specific housing and programs that will help prevent youth from becoming chronically homeless. California has increased the number of youth beds from 3,159 in 2015 to 6,240 in 2023;

Whereas, The California Coalition for Youth has operated the California Youth Crisis Line (1-800-843-5200), 24 hours a day, seven days a week, for over 30 years as the state's only emergency response system for youth in crisis, and which began offering chat-to-text counseling services in 2016;

Whereas, The California Coalition for Youth, along with other community-based organizations, providers, and advocates, are sponsoring California's thirteenth annual Runaway and Homeless Youth Prevention Month to increase awareness and action on behalf of youth at risk or currently living on the street;

Whereas, The Governing Board of the Los Angeles Unified School District recognizes the important role education can play in preventing and ending youth homelessness; the District provides assistance to children, youth, and families experiencing homelessness ensuring the their access to the same free, appropriate public education, including public preschools, provided to other children and youth; and

Whereas, Awareness of the tragedy of youth experiencing homelessness and its causes must be heightened to ensure greater support for effective programs aimed at preventing homelessness and helping youth remain off the streets; now, therefore, be it

Resolved, That the Governing Board of the Los Angeles Unified School District declares November 2024 Homeless Youth Awareness Month; and, be it finally

<u>Resolved</u>, That the Los Angeles Unified School District recognizes the unique challenges of youth experiencing homelessness and commits to increasing awareness of the issues impacting these students and will continue to support and explore programs, partnerships, and legislation that combat homelessness and remove barriers to success for homeless youth.

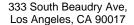

 learning materials, dual language immersion programs from the earliest years, and
 wraparound services (e.g. legal and social-emotional support and resource hubs, such as
 Dream Resource Centers and enrollment supports, such as additional School Enrollment,
 Placement and Assessment (SEPA) Centers), and considering opportunities to add
 supports to schools midyear based on recent arrivals;
- Incorporating, in the District's annual legislative and advocacy priorities, legislation that helps support the diverse needs of MLL and newcomer students; and be it finally-

Resolved, That, with input from students, educators, staff, families, community organizations, and the LAUSD-UTLA Immigrant Support Committee, the Superintendent shall develop a revised Master Plan for English Learners for the 2025-2026 school year to fulfill the promise of our MLL students by addressing gaps in each of the areas listed above and report back to the Board on the implementation of the resolution and overall investments made on behalf of MLL students in 120 days and as part of the annual Strategic Plan.

Whereas, During the summer after high school graduation, youth lose the robust support system provided by schools, including food assistance, shelter, and teachers, school counselors, and other trusted adults who have helped them navigate the transition to adulthood, and this discontinuity can prevent their access to employment and higher education; and

Whereas, California State Senator Dave Cortese (San Jose) has introduced SB 333, which would establish a statewide guaranteed income pilot program called the California Success, Opportunity, and Academic Resilience (SOAR) Guaranteed Income Program, to provide over 15,000 high school seniors experiencing homelessness with direct cash assistance to support their transition out of high school and help them gain employment and postsecondary education; now, therefore, be it

Resolved, That the Governing Board of Los Angeles Unified School District hereby support the passage of SB 333, the California SOAR Guaranteed Income Program; and

Ms. Goldberg proposed the Board ask all their questions related to the presentations, and staff could provide the answers at a later time. In addition, she proposed that the Board continue the conversation at the next Committee of the Whole meeting, or at a special meeting to discuss school safety. Whereas, The Los Angeles Unified School District is committed to the health, well-being, and academic success of all students;

Whereas, The District has established a strong foundation for environmental stewardship through a series of impactful resolutions, including commitments to 100% clean energy (Res-018-19/20), extensive campus greening by 2035 (Res-002-22/23), and ensuring every student receives annual outdoor and climate literacy education (Res-016-21/22), demonstrating the District's unwavering dedication to fostering a healthy learning environment and a sustainable future for all;

Whereas, The District's 2022-26 Strategic Plan prioritizes student success in a sustainable future, the District recognizes the profound impact of a healthy environment on student learning and well-being, particularly through the development of safe and sustainable green spaces in schools as outlined in Pillar 2: Joy and Wellness – Welcoming Learning Environments;

Whereas, Students in low-income communities and communities of color are disproportionately impacted by environmental injustices, including higher levels of air and water pollution, limited access to green spaces, and the brunt of climate change effects;

Whereas, These environmental injustices negatively impact student health, leading to increased asthma rates, respiratory illnesses, and developmental problems;

Whereas, Access to clean air, water, and green spaces is crucial for students' cognitive function, stress reduction, and physical activity, all of which are essential for learning and development;

Whereas, ACA 16 (Bryan), also known as the Green Amendment, proposes to amend the California Constitution to establish a fundamental right to a clean and healthy environment for all Californians; and

Whereas, Enshrining this right in the state constitution would provide a stronger foundation for existing environmental legislation and guide future policy decisions that prioritize environmental justice and the health of all Californians; now, therefore, be it

Resolved, That the Governing Board of the Los Angeles Unified School District hereby strongly supports the passage of ACA 16;

Resolved further, That the Board urges the California Legislature to pass ACA 16 and Governor Newsom to sign it into law; and, be it finally

<u>Resolved</u>, That the Board hereby directs the Superintendent and the District's Office of Government Relations to transmit a copy of this Resolution to the Speaker of the Assembly, the President pro Tempore of the Senate, each member of the California State Legislature representing a district within the boundaries of the LAUSD, and Governor Newsom.

Tab 20. Dr. Rivas, Mr. Schmerelson – Equitable Access to Vision Care in Los Angeles Unified School District Schools (Res-029-23/24)

Whereas, The Los Angeles Unified School District demonstrates a multi-pronged approach to academic success and equity through the Community Schools initiative, Black Student Achievement Plan, and Priority Schools initiative, aimed at ensuring that all students are prepared and inspired for college, career, and life;

Whereas, The District's Strategic Plan 2022-2026 prioritizes Safe and Healthy Environments to Promote Joy and Wellness, expanding access to vision services aligns with the District's commitment to promoting whole-child well-being through integrated health, nutrition, and wellness services;

Whereas, Up to one-third of children experience vision problems that can significantly hinder their academic performance and overall well-being. These uncorrected issues impede learning as 80% of it is processed visually, leading to difficulties with reading, focusing, headaches, and participation in classroom activities;

Whereas, Limited access to vision care due to provider shortages, affordability concerns, and transportation limitations disproportionately impacts low-income District students, exacerbating existing educational and health disparities;

Whereas, Undiagnosed vision problems can have a negative impact on a student's social and emotional development, leading to difficulties participating in activities and feelings of isolation;

Whereas, A recent report with a study population of over 94% Black and Latinx students published in Journal of the American Medical Association (JAMA) Ophthalmology (2022) demonstrates that participation in a school-based vision program led to significant academic gains in both math and English. Students with Individualized Education Programs (IEPs) and those initially performing lower academically experienced the most improvement;

Whereas, The Los Angeles Unified School District Board previously passed Resolution Res-020-19/20 on March 10, 2020, aimed at increasing equitable access to student health care, and despite these prior efforts, ensuring all students receive the necessary follow-up care remains a critical challenge; and

Whereas, Integrating vision services directly into District schools maximizes resource utilization and removes barriers to care, promoting early intervention through effective school-based programs proven to identify vision problems, connect students with care, and improve academic outcomes; now, therefore, be it

Resolved, That the Governing Board of the Los Angeles Unified School District commits to furthering student success by expanding access to vision services through a school-based vision care program offered at no cost to students, families, or the District;

<u>Resolved</u> further, That the Superintendent shall develop a Strategic Vision Care Plan for a pilot program with non-profit organizations to provide school-based initial assessments, diagnosis, prescriptions, prescription glasses, and eye care as needed, that prioritizes service delivery on considerations including but not limited to, designations of Community Schools, BSAP Schools, and Priority Schools during the 2024-2025 school year. Services to be provided on an ongoing basis no less than every other year thereafter. The continued service will help address the changing needs of young children along with students who are new to a school. The vision care plan should prioritize the following:

- Accessibility: All services should be offered within school sites during school hours and after-school programming hours to maximize student participation.
- Quality: Vendors must be qualified eye care professionals with a demonstrated track record of providing high-quality vision care services to children, have at least five years' experience providing school-based vision services in California, and the ability to bill Medi-Cal for services rendered to covered students.
- Cultural Competency: Services should be delivered in a culturally competent manner that respects the diverse needs (i.e. linguistic) of District students and their families.
- Collaboration with relevant national, state, and local health care agencies: The Superintendent shall explore and develop partnerships with relevant agencies such as the National Center for Children's Vision and Eye Health, California Department of Health Care Services, Los Angeles County Department of Public Health, children's hospitals, optometry schools, and insurance providers to leverage their expertise and resources in developing a thorough, well-informed pilot program. This collaboration may involve identifying potential funding opportunities through relevant programs and exploring opportunities to integrate vision care services with existing programs that benefit students;

Resolved further, That the Superintendent shall foster ongoing collaboration with stakeholders by engaging educators, administrators, healthcare and vision care providers, school nurses, parents, the Community Schools Steering Committee, and the Black Student Achievement Plan Steering Committee to help inform the development of the vision care plan, address critical issues of equity and accessibility in service delivery, explore potential grant opportunities to ensure the program's long-term sustainability, and work with the Office of Government Relations, the Office of Student Health and Human Services, and any other relevant stakeholders to advocate for related legislation and necessary funding to ensure robust implementation; and, be it finally

Resolved, That the Superintendent shall finalize the vision plan by September 1, 2024, informed by stakeholder sessions as outlined above. This plan will ensure program rollout and service delivery begin within 30 days thereafter.

As you are aware, the Personnel Commissioners are appointed to three-year overlapping terms; with each term expiring on December 1st in successive years. In accordance with Section 45249 of the California Education Code, one vacancy is filled by SEIU, the Classified Bargaining Union with the largest number of classified employees. The next appointment is made by the Board of Education. This position is currently held by Joseph Paller. The two appointees elect the third and final Personnel Commissioner.

Mr. Paller, whose current term will expire on December 1, 2024, has expressed an interest in continuing his assignment as the Board's appointee to the Personnel Commission. Mr. Paller has served as a Commissioner since 2001. Joseph Paller has served as a member of the Personnel Commission of the Los Angeles Unified School District since 2001.

Adoption of Resolution Authorizing Application to the Zero Emission School Bus and Infrastructure (ZESBI) Incentive Project and Authorizing Performance of All Functions Needed to Participate in the Project

October 22, 2024

Action Proposed:

Adopt the attached Board of Education (Board) Resolution (Attachment A) which authorizes:

- participation in the Zero Emission School Bus and Infrastructure (ZESBI) Incentive Project
- submission of an application to the ZESBI Incentive Project
- if funding is approved:
 - O Authorize the Chief Procurement Officer or designee to execute all instruments necessary to accept ZESBI grant funds, including entering into a binding agreement(s) on behalf of the District, and to execute all instruments necessary, as legally permissible, to implement the Project, including the purchase of equipment and materials
 - o Authorize the Chief Eco-Sustainability Officer, the Director of Transportation, or designee(s) to act, as needed, to ensure the terms are satisfied

The final terms and conditions of the agreement(s) shall be subject to legal, finance and procurement approval. The final executed agreement(s) is further subject to ratification by the Board.

Background:

The Zero-Emission School Bus and Infrastructure (ZESBI) incentive project provides local education agencies (LEAs) incentives to replace heavy-duty internal combustion engine (ICE) school buses with new zero-emission school buses. Additional incentives are provided for the installation of charging or fueling infrastructure and related activities. ZESBI is co-administered by California Air Resources Board (CARB), which provides the incentives for the zero-emission school bus vehicles, and the California Energy Commission (CEC), which provides the incentives for charging infrastructure. A total of \$500 million is appropriated from Senate Bill (SB) 114 for ZESBI in Fiscal Year 2023-24, of which \$375 million is allocated to support purchases of qualifying zero-emission (ZE) school buses and \$125 million is allocated to support charging infrastructure and associated costs.

The ZESBI project has a three-step application process, Parts A, B, and C. Staff submitted an application under Part A to support the electrification of the San Julian Bus Garage fleet. The application includes the scrapping of 20 ICE school buses that will be replaced with 20 electric school buses to be housed at 604 East 15th Street, Los Angeles, CA 90015. The application also includes 20 chargers and associated infrastructure to be located at 1425 South San Pedro Street, Los Angeles, CA 90015.

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Recently, staff received notice that the Application Part A submission was preliminarily approved to advance to Application Part B, and funding has been reserved for the District's application. In Application Part B, which will open in Fall 2024, the District will be required to submit additional bus and infrastructure documentation and accept funding within 30 calendar days of notification. This includes a Board Resolution authorizing participation in the ZESBI project and designating representatives to execute and carry out the terms of the grant (Attachment A). If funding is not accepted within 30 calendar days, it may be reallocated to another applicant, and approval of late Application B submittals is at the discretion of CARB or its administrators. If Application Part B is approved, the District will advance to Application Part C, in which applicants will select their new zero-emission school bus(es) and sign a funding contract.

Expected Outcomes:

Upon adoption of the resolution, designated staff will perform all necessary application- and grant-related functions for the ZESBI Incentive Project, including the execution of all necessary instruments needed to administer, and comply with the requirements for grant awards totaling \$7.4 million.

Board Options and Consequences:

Approval of this action will allow staff to proceed with necessary application- and grant-related activities for the ZESBI Incentive Project. If the proposed action is not approved, the District will be unable to comply with the grantor's requirements and will forfeit the funding opportunity.

Policy Implications:

Staff's proposal aligns with the 2022-26 Strategic Plan Pillar 4 (Operational Effectiveness) by modernizing infrastructure and working towards ensuring that our school buses and infrastructure minimize harm to climate and the environment and reflect clean transportation standards. This proposal further supports the District's resolution "Transitioning Los Angeles Unified School District to 100% Clean, Renewable Energy Resulting in Healthier Students and More Sustainable, Equitable Communities" (Res-018-19/0).

Budget Impact:

This is a one-time grant opportunity to offset the cost of purchasing twenty (20) electric school buses and electric chargers. The total cost of the electric school buses and chargers is approximately \$8.8 million, of which the ZESBI funding will supplement \$7.4 million. The remaining \$1.4 million shall be paid for with General Funds. Due to the payment schedule required under the terms of the grant, it is possible that additional General Funds may be needed to front fund payments.

Student Impact:

Approval of this action allows the District to continue to participate in the ZESBI application process, and if awarded, to execute and provide all necessary documents needed for grant compliance. If awarded, this grant will directly benefit students by enabling the District's Transportation Services Branch to improve the timely delivery of students to schools. New buses have significantly fewer breakdowns, which reduces repair downtimes and transportation delays. The zero-emission buses will also improve student health by limiting their exposure to transportation-related air pollution.

Equity Impact:

San Julian Bus Garage is centrally located within LAUSD boundaries and its buses serve over 6,600 students. Of all LAUSD locations considered for this grant, the San Julian Bus Garage aligned most closely with grant deadlines given the availability of power.

Issues and Analysis:

Under the terms and conditions of this grant, LAUSD shall, at a minimum, be responsible for and/or agree to the following:

- Responding to requests for information and documentation from CARB or its Administrator within 10 business days.
- Coordinating with local electric utility provider(s) to prepare for the installation of infrastructure.
- Within 10 days of the execution of the grant agreement, signing and submitting a purchase order or other binding agreement for the new school buses.
- Dismantling and scrapping the 20 ICE buses within 24 months of the delivery of the new school buses.
- Submitting an initial request for payment within 45 calendar days of vehicle delivery to CARB or its Administrator.
- Coordinating with CHP to ensure that the new zero-emission school bus is inspected and receives a CHP 292 or equivalent within 30 calendar days of the delivery of the new school bus.
- Paying the HVIP approved dealer the amount due within 60 calendar days of the new, zero-emission school bus passing CHP certification.
- Ensuring the maintenance and operation of the Electric Vehicle Supply Equipment (EVSE), including the hardware and software, charging stations, cables, connectors, and related equipment used to charge EV batteries, for no less than six years.
- Telematics reporting requirements submitted on a quarterly basis.
