The Board of Education of the City of Los Angeles, acting as the Governing Board of the Los Angeles Unified School District, met in regular session on Tuesday, June 03, 2025, at the Los Angeles City Board of Education Administrative Offices, Board Room, 333 South Beaudry Avenue, Los Angeles, California.

Mr. Michael A. McLean, Executive Officer of the Board, called the meeting to order at 11:02 a.m.

The following Board Members were present: Ms. Sherlett Newbill, Dr. Rocío Rivas, Mr. Nick Melvoin, Ms. Karla Griego, Ms. Kelly Gonez, Ms. Tanya Ortiz Franklin, and Board President Scott Schmerelson.

Student Board Member Anely Cortez Lopez was present.

Superintendent Alberto M. Carvalho was present.

Mr. Schmerelson led the Pledge of Allegiance.

Mr. McLean asked for a moment of reflective and silent reading of the LAUSD Land Acknowledgement.

**BOARD PRESIDENT'S REPORTS**

**LABOR PARTNERS**

Helen Lopez, 1st Vice President of the Classified School Employees Association (CSEA) Los Angeles Chapter 500, expressed appreciation to the District for honoring Classified employees and recognizing their importance throughout the District, as well as the importance of celebrating them. She suggested that each Board Member host a local event next year to honor the efforts of Classified employees at the Local District offices, rather than one big event at the central office.

Maria Miranda, Elementary Vice President of the United Teachers of Los Angeles (UTLA), highlighted the District's ongoing failure to meet the State's Education Code requirement that 55% of education costs be allocated to classroom compensation, and that the District is projected to miss the target again this school year, showing minimal improvement. She urges the Board to vote *no* on the application for exemption from this rule, emphasizing that the District's reasoning is not valid, as other central urban districts have not faced the same issues. She also expressed concern regarding the District's non-staffing education expenses and the increase in reserves this period. Ms. Miranda calls for greater transparency and a stronger focus on investing in the workforce, particularly through negotiations with the union.

Maria Nichols, President, Associated Administrators of Los Angeles (AALA) Teamsters Local 210, emphasized the current critical stage of budget and Local Control Accountability Plan (LCAP) decisions

in LAUSD, where the District's proposed budget under AB 1200 is labeled "qualified," indicating solvency for two years, but uncertainty for the third year. She shared that the District holds substantial reserves, which, while positive, raise questions about priorities. She also explained that the focus is on collective bargaining efforts with LAUSD, where the Teamsters are engaged in data-driven negotiations, advocating for better working conditions, sustainable workloads, and more work-life balance. The survey results reveal that many staff members are working over 60-hour weeks, yet there is ambiguity around flex hours and extra duty pay. The team demands clear definitions for these terms to ensure fair compensation. Lastly, Ms. Nichols calls for an end to double standards in compensation, urging the Board to treat both teachers and administrators with dignity, respect, and fairness, recognizing that effective schools depend on collaboration between both groups.


