# TITLE III: 2021-22 ENTITLEMENT \$11.6M

Carryover: \$14.2 M\*

Private School Share of Entitlement: \$167,962

Purpose: To support English Learners in attaining English Language proficiency and meeting State academic standards. The English Learner Journey begins with identification and ends with graduation of multilingual students.

### Support to Schools:

MMED and Regions provide support and technical state/federal EL guidance to school sites by offering professional development to teachers, EL Designees and administrators based on data such as the monthly English Learner Typology Monitoring Report and the MMED FOCUS Dashboard. Moreover, family training is provided both at the region and central level.

Available Title III resources have a 27-month use period, making it flexible to utilize all available funds the following academic year.
