What are transition services?

Transition Services are a coordinated set of activities designed to facilitate the movement from school to postsecondary activities, including education, employment, and independent living

Service is based on the individual's needs and includes

- Instruction
- Related services
- Community experiences
- Development of employment
- Development of adult living objectives



Why do transition services matter?

Youth with an IEP are more likely than their peers to be socioeconomically disadvantaged and to face problems with health, communication, and completing typical tasks independently.


Youth with an IEP lag their peers in planning and taking steps to obtain postsecondary education and jobs.

Individual Transition Plan (ITP)


- Part of the Individualized Education Program
- Beginning at age 14, updated at least annually
- Three specific areas addressed
 - Education
 - Employment
 - Independent Living (as needed)
- Guides activities and lessons

The District Office of Transition Services Teachers provide...

- Field Trips / School Tours
- Lessons
- Parent Presentations
- Connections to agencies/organizations

- All 15 year old students are assessed to determine interests, goals, and activities
- Senior Advisory activities in support of students leaving with a plan



The District Office of Transition Services supports the provision of instruction in:

- Self Determination
- Self Advocacy
- Soft Skills and Pre-employment instruction
- Training in navigating relevant post secondary agencies

- Independent living skills
- Problem solving and resolving conflicts
- Community travel and mobility
- Time management
- Communication

- Lessons/Activities about applying, attending, and finding supports in postsecondary education

 - Financial Aid
