

This chart shows the total general purpose revenue Sacramento Valley Charter School expects to receive in the coming year from all sources.

The total revenue projected for Sacramento Valley Charter School is \$3,303,669, of which \$2604771 is Local Control Funding Formula (LCFF), \$415347 is other state funds, \$37000 is local funds, and \$246551 is federal funds. Of the \$246551 in federal funds, \$175191 are federal CARES Act funds. Of the \$2604771 in LCFF Funds, \$458454 is generated based on the enrollment of high needs students (foster youth, English learner, and low-income students).

This chart provides a quick summary of how much Sacramento Valley Charter School plans to spend for planned actions and services in the Learning Continuity Plan for 2020-2021 and how much of the total is tied to increasing or improving services for high needs students.

Sacramento Valley Charter School plans to spend \$2970864 for the 2020-21 school year. Of that amount, \$375200 is tied to actions/services in the Learning Continuity Plan and \$2,595,664 is not included in the Learning Continuity Plan. The budgeted expenditures that are not included in the Learning Continuity Plan will be used for the following:

The Learning Continuity Plan (LCP) was developed to identify program enhancements and delivery changes for distance learning with the transition to hybrid model with eventually having all students be able to return to campus. We did not attempt to describe all General Fund Budget Expenditures in the LCP. Accordingly, administrative costs, facility rent and utilities, bus loan payments, and so many other expenses are not listed in the LCP but continue to be costs to the school.

Increased or Improved Services for High Needs Students in in the Learning Continuity Plan for the 2020-2021 School Year


In 2020-21, Sacramento Valley Charter School is projecting it will receive \$458454 based on the enrollment of foster youth, English learner, and low-income students. Sacramento Valley Charter School must describe how it intends to increase or improve services for high needs students in the Learning Continuity Plan. Sacramento Valley Charter School plans to spend \$343500 towards meeting this requirement, as described in the Learning Continuity Plan.

As described above, the LCP was developed to identify where the school has added program offerings (goods and services) to meet the needs of all students - with emphasis on High Needs Students (HNS) -

during the COVID-19 distance learning, hybrid model and transition back to on-campus instruction. It is not the same as the comprehensive expenses listed in the LCAP. SVCS has increased all supports for HNS (one-on-one aides, SSTs, parent conferences, differentiated instruction, on-campus tiny cohort with staff support, etc.) The actual expenditures on HNS will greatly exceed those identified in the LCP.


Introduction:

Sacramento Valley Charter School is committed to the safety and wellbeing of our scholars, staff and community, therefore, SVCS will be following the guidelines provided by the California Department of Public Health, Yolo County Health & Human Services Agency and the city of West Sacramento.

Orientation:

Due to the COVID-19 pandemic, SVCS will be holding orientation days online through a Zoom meeting. On August 10th, K-2nd grade will have their orientation. On August 11th, 3rd-8th grade will have their orientation. During these orientations you will meet your scholar's Teacher and Principal and receive a class schedule. You will also have the opportunity to ask any questions regarding the class to the teacher.

The 2020-2021 Academic Year Plan (3 Phases):



In phase 1, all SVCS scholars will attend school virtually. Attendance and participation should be taken as seriously as regular classes. The risk of transmission in this phase is very low.

In phase 2, each class will be divided into 2 groups. Group A will attend school on Mondays and Wednesdays and virtually on Tuesdays, Thursdays, and Fridays. Group B will attend school on Tuesdays and Thursdays and virtually on Mondays, Wednesdays, and Fridays. The risks of transmission in this phase is higher, therefore, more restrictions will apply such as, students will be kept at a 6ft distance, will have to wear face masks for the entirety of the class and transportation time, and will be regularly temperature checked. Parents and guardians will have the option to opt for virtual learning if they decide that the risks for their scholar is too high.



In phase 3, all scholars will attend in-class instruction. In order for SVCS to enter this phase it is necessary that the transmission rate is contained, and the virus is no longer a threat to our scholars, staff and community. In the case that a vaccine is available, SVCS will move

forward with the guidance of the CDC and the California Department of Public Health.



On Campus Modifications:

1. Visitors

Visitor access will now be limited to reduce the risk of transmission to SVCS staff and Community. All visitors must comply with state laws by properly wearing a face mask when visiting SVCS. It is recommended that you call the office first before your visit.

2. Social Distance

All SVCS staff, parents and scholars must remain at least 6ft away from others. This applies to the office, classrooms and all other SVCS rooms.

3. Desk Set-up

Under the blended mode, students will be seated in their 6ft apart desk that may be modified with a transparent barrier that will minimize the risk of transmission.

4. Lunch

Lunch will be served in the classrooms to minimize the contact with other students from other classes. It is the parent's responsibility to decide if their scholar will be bringing their own lunch or getting one from school.

5. Disinfecting

SVCS will be constantly disinfecting all campus rooms, floors and surfaces.

6. Hand Washing Stations

In addition to our regular hand washing sinks, SVCS will be placing portable hand washing stations around campus. This will allow students to wash their hands upon arrival to the school and during the day to maintain good hygiene.



This plan is subjected to change as the pandemic develops and new information becomes available. SVCS will keep parents and guardians updated of any change through email newsletters and our school's official website. Principal Report November 11, 2020

First Trimester Completion, November 6: The first trimester ended on November 6, and teachers created report cards for their scholars. Outstanding scholars were selected for Honor Rolls and Principal Honor Rolls. Teachers picked 'scholar of the month' and 'teacher choice awards' for recognizing extraordinary achievements. The Scholar Achievement Award ceremony is scheduled for November 18 virtually. Awards and medals will be sent home through our drivers.

Parent - Teacher Conferences, November 12-13: Teachers scheduled parent conferences to talk about the progress their scholars were making in the distance learning.

SST Meetings: To identify learning problems, several SST meetings were held with parents, teachers and the resource specialist. Mrs. Phillips and parents of a 3rd grade joined the meeting on October 15 and November 4. Ms. Lester and parents of a 1st grade attended the conference with the principal on October 27. Mrs. Phillips and parents of a 3rd on November 9.

IEP Meetings: Several IEP meetings were conducted to update IEP's and hold annual and triennial meetings. Six such meetings on different days involved school psychologist, the resource specialist, teachers, and the principal.

Halloween Celebrations: SVCS's tradition of celebrating American festival this year was totally different. Scholars participated in the event virtually. More than 100 entries were received. Clad in unique costumes, scholars demonstrated enthusiasm and creativity in their actions.

EL Dorado SELPA Buzz Session: A buzz session was held to get information about rules and regulations of special education services. The financial consultant, principal, school secretary, fiscal clerk and technology coordinator attended the meeting. The meeting was helpful in providing information to be compliant with the special education requirements.

SSD Anomalies Training, October 20: To keep student data updated, this training was necessary for office staff. Amrit and Lizvet attended this training.

Fiscal Committee Meeting on October 20: This meeting was necessary to understand the fiscal matters related with ED SELPA. Vicky and Dr. Singh attended the meeting.

CBEDS Deadline: CBEDS report was successfully completed and submitted before the deadline of October 31.

Mental Health Plan, November 2 was due to be submitted to ED Selpa.

Staff Update: Lizvet Aguilera, school secretary submitted her resignation letter November 4, 2020 with a 15-day notice. Her last working day is November 17th. She accepted a position based in Woodland. Ramil Custodio was hired for the teacher assistant position to support a 6th grade student and other middle school students.
