2026-27 Budget Narrative – for Adopted Budget
June 17, 2026

The following narrative is provided to highlight and explain significant changes since the 2nd Interim Report, identified elements of the CA May Revise and recent changes since the public hearing on the budget on May 21, 2026.

Revenue:

LCFF: Net increase \$216,910 since we are estimating 1) higher enrollment, 2) the proposed “super” COLA of 4.31 and 3) much lower return of unspent ELOP and other state adjustments to prior year revenue. Until classroom space is certain, we will wait to budget revenue for those classes. These three items more than offset the decrease in Concentration funding resulting from unduplicated reporting issues.

Federal Revenue: A one percent increase of \$3,900 is proposed.

Other State Revenue: A \$375,990 increase reflects the May Revise’s proposed significant increase to Special Education of \$341 per student included \$130,000 and discretionary block grant of \$945 per 2025-26 P-2 ADA or \$348,658 less SB740 deficated.

Local Revenue: Increase of \$10,000 as actual receipts in 2025-26 were consistently greater than budgeted and are expected to remain at this level.

Expenses:

Certificated: Net increase of \$57,168. The teacher step and column increases per the board-approved teacher salary schedule, estimated cost to fill open positions, reduced use of subs as open positions are filled and board-approved raises for two positions are included.

Classified: Net increase of \$169,159 as the Transportation Supervisor and IT Manager positions are for a full year, SVCS offers more days of ELOP -funded intercession/after-school program, Extended Learning, Student Data, Health Coordinator raise, food services raises approved. Includes wages and payroll taxes for an extra 30 minutes per student instructional day (and paid holidays) for IA and CSA positions as a result of the longer school day.

Benefits: Increase of \$71,744 as the medical benefits renewal is estimated at 10%, more staff are eligible for benefits and more staff are participating in the 401(k) employer matching.

Books and Supplies: Increase of \$8,000 for higher fuel costs expected for the year.

Services and Operating Expenses: Decrease of (\$286,645) for lower levels of ELOP placeholder since we are returning less unspent funding and the expenses are reflected in wages, benefits and supplies costs for ELOP programs.

Capital Outlay/Other Sources (Uses): Decrease of \$5,700 for one more vehicle being fully depreciated.

Other Outgo/Financing Uses: No change

Summary:

As communicated at the 2025-26 Second Interim report, SVCS' overall financial position has shifted as the depletion of one-time funding and the return unspent ELOP funding has resulted in continued planned deficit spending. SVCS should still focus on revenue increases through improved attendance rates and expense reductions through reducing contracted services and evaluating closing or reducing FTE of positions when there are resignations or terminations or delaying hiring of open positions for short-term cost savings.

SVCS will be able to meet its future obligations while maintaining its reserves above the 5% level contained in Operations MOU.

NOTE: Due to the change in collecting data from parents for NSLP, we are experiencing a drop in Concentration Funding as it is based on a 3-year rolling average that has been impacted by low returns of NSLP eligibility forms. SVCS staff are fully aware of this issue and will be working closely with parents to complete the forms needed to receive the level of funding due to SVCS for serving a high percentage of unduplicated students (mostly socio-economically disadvantaged or English learners).

Items to be determined:

- 1) Classroom space for another section of middle school (8th grade) and a second TK classroom - revenue from these classes and expenses including lease cost, if additional square feet are involved, and staffing the additional classes with teachers, IAs, materials and supplies.
- 2) Principal and Assistant Principal compensation
- 3) Classified raises (including transportation, School Secretary)
- 4) The "me-too" of \$1,200 each for Counselor and Instructional Coach
- 5) Determination of year-to-year stipends (Parent-Family Liaison, student council, etc.)
- 6) Additional depreciation expense for three vans to be purchased
- 7) State adopted budget impacts once the State budget is approved and trailer bills provide implementation details for things like the proposed as 14-weeks paid pregnancy disability leave

Board Policy – for adoption June 17, 2026 Pupil Safety, Professional Boundaries, and Misconduct Disclosure

Introduction:

California Senate Bill (SB 848) requires public and private K-12 educational entities to adopt policies addressing professional boundaries, mandated reporter expansions, and student safety. It restricts certain convicted individuals from employment and regulates hiring and misconduct disclosure.

1. Purpose and Scope

This policy establishes clear expectations for maintaining professional boundaries and promoting safe environments for pupils, in compliance with California SB 848. It aims to prevent child abuse, neglect, and sex offenses, clarify professional boundaries, and ensure all adults interacting with students understand their responsibilities.

2. Professional Boundaries and Communications

All employees, volunteers, and contractors must maintain professional, transparent boundaries with students at all times.

- **Digital Communication:** All electronic communication (including text messaging, email, and social media platforms) must be professional in nature and involve school-approved channels. Employees are prohibited from communicating with students privately via personal social media or unmonitored text platforms.
- **Supervision:** Employees must ensure that interactions with pupils occur in easily supervised, open, or transparent environments to promote safety.

3. Mandated Reporter Obligations

Pursuant to SB 848, the definition of a mandated reporter is expanded.

- **Applicability:** All certificated and classified employees, as well as designated school volunteers and contractors, including charter school board members, are legally required to report suspected child abuse or neglect to the appropriate authorities.
- **Training:** All staff and covered volunteers staff must complete required annual training on mandated reporting and child abuse prevention. SVCS uses the Vector on-line portal to assign Mandated Reporter training. The training must be completed upon being hired (within six weeks) and each volunteer must complete the training prior to serving as a volunteer.

4. Employment Screening and Misconduct Disclosures

The school is committed to rigorous hiring and employment verification protocols to prevent hiring individuals who have engaged in egregious misconduct.

- **Conviction Restrictions:** The school will not hire any certificated employee convicted of a serious or violent felony, or any sex offense.

- **Employment History Review:** Prior to hiring, the school will request employment records and conduct background investigations with former school employers to identify any substantiated egregious misconduct.
- **Database Compliance:** The school will participate in and check the statewide employment screening database as mandated by law, ensuring transparent reporting of egregious misconduct investigations.

5. Comprehensive School Safety Plan

The school will maintain and annually update a Comprehensive School Safety Plan. This plan will include specific procedures to protect students from child abuse, neglect, and sex offenses, and outline how the administration will assess and report violent crimes or sex offenses occurring on campus or during school-sponsored events.

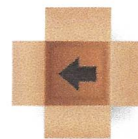

SUPERVISORS: Principal; Transportation Supervisor

- Communicate to maintenance and dispatch personnel regarding route or equipment problems; follow special instructions from dispatch personnel and Supervisors pertaining to students and their daily schedule.

- Inform and instruct all students regarding rules and regulations of riding the bus/van and evacuation procedures.
- Communicate professionally with all district staff, co-workers, and parents.
- Communicate to maintenance and dispatch personnel regarding route or equipment problems; follow special instructions from dispatch personnel and Supervisors pertaining to students and their daily schedule.
- Submit reports of vehicle condition, route time and mileage, student ridership, maintenance needs, time keeping, and abnormal occurrences as required.
- Maintain accurate route cards kept in dispatch at all times.
- Maintain cleanliness of the interior/exterior of the bus(es) on a daily basis.
- Ensure familiarity with assigned activities and/or field trips/CBI trips before transporting students utilizing the safest and most efficient route while meeting time schedules for departure and arrival.
- Maintain regular and prompt attendance in the workplace.

- Maintain a professional appearance; wearing district identification badges at all times while on/in school district property.
- Periodically participate in mandated meetings and in service programs during traditional and non-traditional workdays and work hours as required. Perform related duties as assigned.

QUALIFICATIONS:

Knowledge of:

- Applicable provisions of the California Vehicle Code, California Education Code, and Board Policy as they apply to transporting all students
- Defensive driving practices and procedures
- Local geography and roadways systems
- Basic first aid
- Laws and regulations governing student transportation

Ability to:

- Safely operate a school bus or van in all types of weather
- Resolve conflict and maintain discipline among students
- Establish and maintain effective working relationships with others
- Read and interpret maps, schedules and procedural instructions
- Rapidly learn routes and operation of equipment related to duties
- Possess the physical capabilities to sufficiently perform job duties
- Utilize interpersonal skills using tact, patience and courtesy
- Perform basic first aid

Background Experience and Education:

- Any combination of training, experience, and/or education equivalent to graduation from high school
- Six (6) months of experience involving the regular operation of a school bus for special needs students is desirable. Experience working with special needs students is preferred.

LICENSE OR CERTIFICATION:

- Possession of a valid California Class B Driver License with a Passenger and "S" endorsement
- Possession of an unrestricted California School Bus Driver Certificate (with the exception of "automatic" restriction)
- Valid Medical Certificate
- Valid First Aid Certification

Working Conditions:

- Regular exposure to noise, gases, fumes, dust and drafts, etc. when vehicle is in operation
- Regular exposure to elements such as rain, high or low temperatures

Physical Requirements: Employees in this position must possess/have the ability to:

- Sit for prolonged periods of time
- Stand and walk for short periods of time
- Occasional bending/stooping; squatting/crouching
- Occasional reaching overhead, above/below shoulders and horizontally
- Occasional pushing/pulling, lifting and maneuvering objects such as wheelchairs with students with a broad range of body weights
- Frequently bend/twist neck to adequately monitor students and traffic conditions
- Lift and/or support/drag up to 150 pounds for short periods of time
- Climb 5 feet of steps into/out of the bus
- Requires continuous use of hands, arms, feet, and legs to push/pull or activate essential controls (pedals, levers and knobs) in recurring operational motions
- Requires a range of simple grasping to firm grasping in order to seize, hold, grasp, turn or otherwise work with hands to turn the steering wheel, shift gears and/or manipulate mechanical levers and controls; as well as to position students in their car seats and/or infant seats; to fasten car/infant seat harnesses and/or belts; to secure students to their wheelchairs or car seats; and to secure the wheelchairs or car seats to the bus.
- Hear with or without assistive devices sufficient to hear students, receive communications on radio and hear outside noises sirens, horns, brakes, etc. that are necessary to operate bus safely
- Speak with or without assistive devices sufficiently, professionally and politely to give instructions/commands to students, speak professionally and politely to parents and other staff
- Visual acuity with or without assistive devices sufficient to pass driving test, read signs, road hazards and to be able to operate bus safely in reduced visibility conditions

HAZARDS:

- Traffic hazards
- Driving a vehicle during adverse weather conditions
- Working around or with equipment having moving parts
- Possible exposure to infectious agents, students' bodily secretions or fluids, blood, urine, fecal matter, blood, or offensive odors.
- May encounter non-compliant students
- Possible interactions with dissatisfied, hostile and irate individuals
- Exposure to students/parents who are, or who may become physically aggressive and/or non-compliant

Lead Bus Driver/Driver Instructor/Scheduler

Purpose Statement

The job of Lead Bus Driver/Driver Instructor/Scheduler provides support to the educational process with specific responsibilities for developing and providing classroom instruction and behind the wheel training of applicants and bus drivers; addressing school bus regulations and safety procedures; promoting safe driving habits for operators of school buses and transportation vehicles; identifying training requirements; and maintaining required documentation for audit in compliance with state certification and district/state/federal requirements. The employee in this classification will also perform the functions of a school bus driver, van driver and/or dispatcher/scheduler.

This job reports to the Principal and Director of Transportation.

Essential Functions

Coordinates and conducts classroom and behind-the-wheel bus driver training program for the purpose of presenting, reinforcing and/or developing bus driver skills as mandated by the state department of education and department of transportation.

Prepares schedules of bus routes, van routes, field trips, extracurricular events and contracted transportation services.

Assists in a variety of transportation activities and programs for the purpose of providing information and/or recognition while ensuring department needs are met.

Collects and reports the performance of bus drivers, van drivers, transportation vehicle drivers and driver applicants to the Principal for the purpose of ensuring that basic driving skills levels are met in compliance with state certification requirements.

Provides information to bus drivers, van drivers, transportation vehicle drivers, driver applicants and the school (regarding rules, regulations, laws, procedures, etc.) for the purpose of conveying information.

Inspects school buses for the purpose of determining that there are no mechanical faults in order to meet safety regulations.

Responds to transportation related accidents in consultation with the area California Highway Patrol (CHP) school pupil safety officer for the purpose of evaluating and improving driver safety through training.

Assists the Director of Transportation with mandatory inspections.

Coordinates vehicle maintenance and repairs with the Director of Transportation. When applicable, obtains multiple quotes for repairs and maintenance as evidence for reasonable costs.

Monitors student behaviors and other passengers during transit for the purpose of ensuring the safe transportation of all passengers and following regulations.

Oversees bus driver licensing, training requirements and certificate status of bus drivers for the purpose of ensuring compliance with regulatory requirements.

Participates in unit meetings, in-service training, workshops, etc. for the purpose of conveying and/or gathering information required to perform job functions.

Performs functions of a school bus driver, van driver and/or dispatcher as needed for the purpose of meeting the school's transportation service needs.

Maintains driver files including drug testing, training records and all other DOT and CDE-required

information. Coordinates with Human Resources for documents that belong in the employees' Human Resources files.

Assists the Principal with employee evaluations, improvement plans and/or supporting guidance for disciplinary action and/or termination.

Prepares and maintains a variety of manual and electronic documents and reports for the purpose of providing information and/or training information to bus driver, van driver, other school personnel and outside agencies as required by established policies and/or regulatory guidelines.

Responds to emergencies and inquiries from a variety of sources regarding bus and student transportation issues for the purpose of taking appropriate action to resolve immediate safety and/or security concerns.

Schedules post-accident training and testing of and/or by non-school personnel for the purpose of ensuring compliance with School policies and established regulatory requirements.

Understands and applies professional judgement and maintains confidentiality in student and staff matters. Applying confidentiality to student medical records, medical conditions, staff performance, and similar sensitive information is an essential

Other Functions

Performs other related duties as assigned for the purpose of supporting other personnel in the completion of their work activities.

Job Requirements: Minimum Qualifications

Skills, Knowledge and Abilities

SKILLS are required to perform single, technical tasks with a potential need to upgrade skills in order to meet changing job conditions. Specific skill-based competencies required to satisfactorily perform the functions of the job include: operating standard office equipment; using pertinent software applications; operating heavy and light duty vehicles; preparing and maintaining accurate records; operating a two-way radio and standard office machines including a computer terminal; and effective telephone techniques and etiquette.

KNOWLEDGE is required to perform basic math, including calculations using fractions, percents, and/or ratios; read a variety of manuals, write documents following prescribed formats, and/or present information to others; and solve practical problems. Specific knowledge-based competencies required to satisfactorily perform the functions of the job include: safe driving practices; provisions of the motor vehicle code and the education code applicable to the operation of vehicles transporting school students; state licensing requirements; curriculum requirements for behind-the-wheel; and required in-service/renewal classroom instruction.

ABILITY is required to schedule activities, meetings, and/or events; gather, collate, and/or classify data; and use job-related equipment. Flexibility is required to work with others in a wide variety of circumstances; work with data utilizing defined and similar processes; and operate equipment using standardized methods. Ability is also required to work with a wide diversity of individuals; work with similar types of data; and utilize a variety of types of job-related equipment. Problem solving is required to identify issues and create action plans. Problem solving with data requires independent interpretation of guidelines; and problem solving with equipment is moderate. Specific ability based competencies required to satisfactorily perform the functions of the job include: providing work directions; writing clear, complete, accurate and logical safety reports and specifications; adapting to changing work priorities; communicating with persons of diverse backgrounds; maintaining confidentiality; working as part of a team; observing legal and defensive driving practices; understanding and carrying out oral and written directions; and analyzing and interpreting specific transportation codes and technical data.

Responsibility

Responsibilities include: working under limited supervision using standardized practices and/or methods; leading, guiding, and/or coordinating others; operating within a defined budget. Utilization of resources from other work units may be required to perform the job's functions. There is a continual opportunity to impact the **organization's** services.

Work Environment

The usual and customary methods of performing the job's functions require the following physical demands: occasional lifting, carrying, pushing, and/or pulling, frequent climbing and balancing, frequent stooping, kneeling, crouching, and/or crawling and significant fine finger dexterity. Generally the job requires 60% sitting, 20% walking, and 20% standing. The job is performed under some temperature extremes and under conditions with some exposure to risk of injury and/or illness.

Experience: Job related experience with increasing levels of responsibility is required.

Education (Minimum): Targeted, job-related education with study in job-related area.

Equivalency: Any combination of training, experience, and/or education equivalent to: graduation from high school with the addition of any combination of formal and informal training, experience, and education in the areas of driver safety programs, transportation dispatch, training and development and five (5) years of experience in bus transportation.
