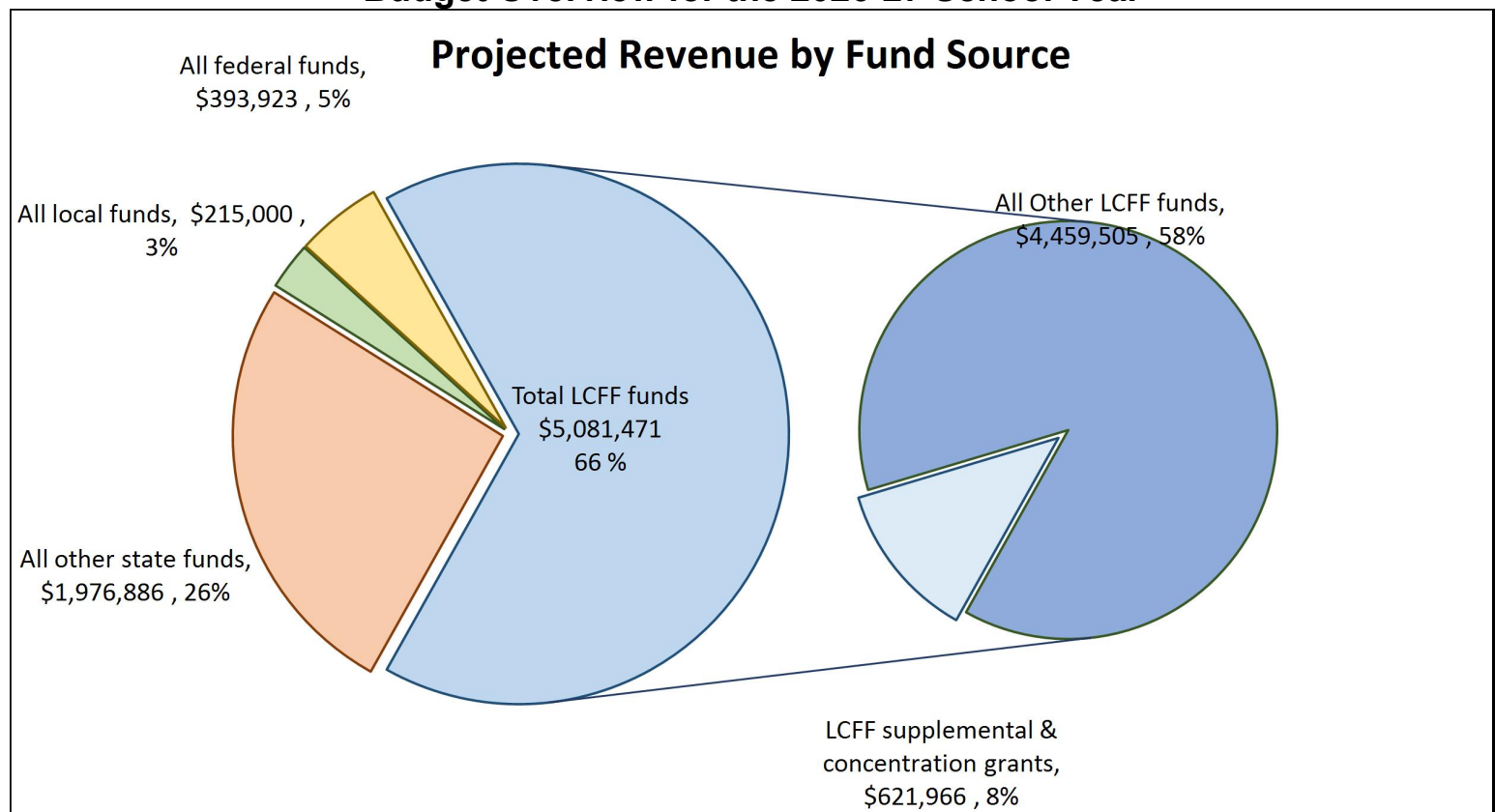

Budget Overview for the 2026-27 School Year

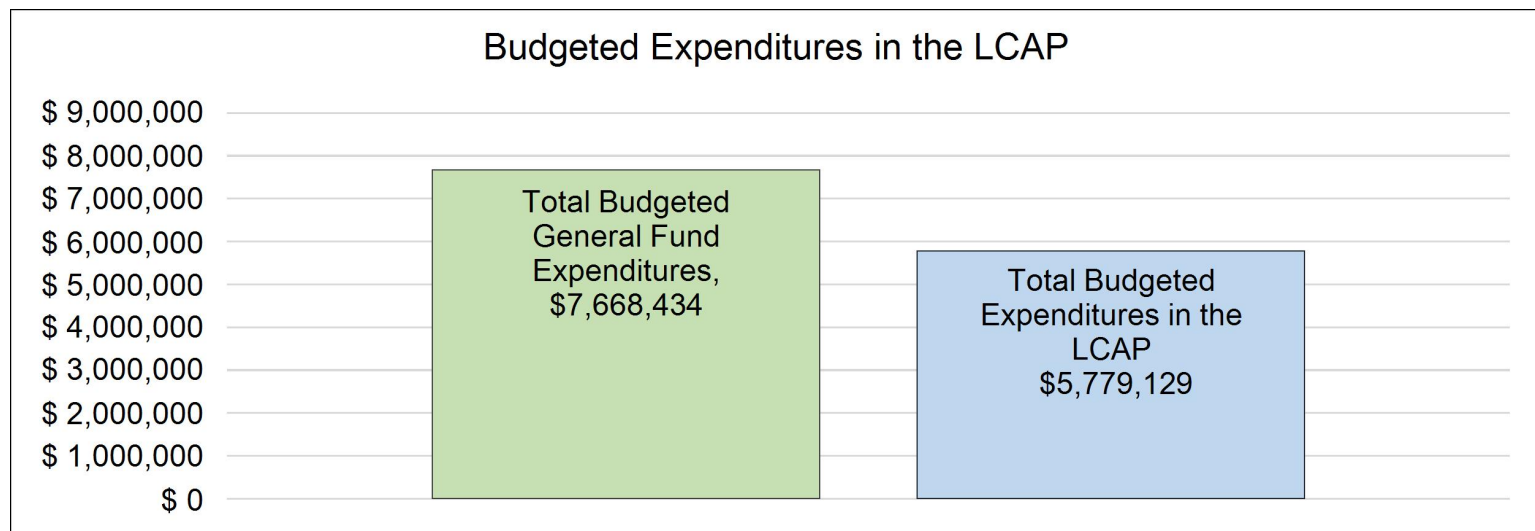


This chart shows the total general purpose revenue Sacramento Valley Charter School expects to receive in the coming year from all sources.

The text description for the above chart is as follows: The total revenue projected for Sacramento Valley Charter School is \$7,667,280, of which \$5,081,471 is Local Control Funding Formula (LCFF), \$1,976,886 is other state funds, \$215,000 is local funds, and \$393,923 is federal funds. Of the \$5,081,471 in LCFF Funds, \$621,966 is generated based on the enrollment of high needs students (Foster Youth, English learner, and low-income students).

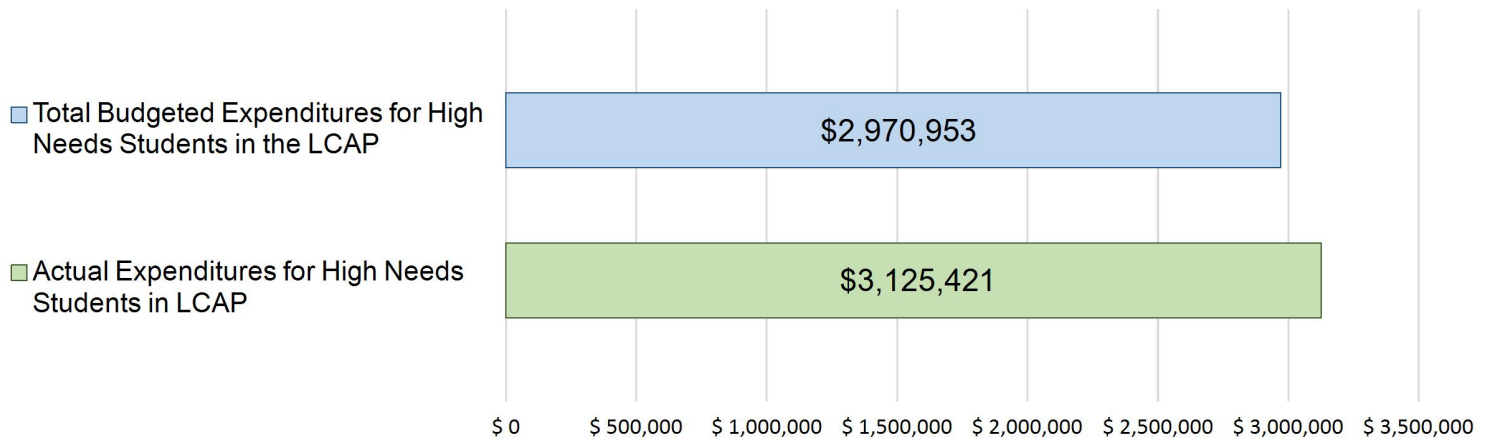
Increased or Improved Services for High Needs Students in the LCAP for the 2026-27 School Year

Plan Summary [2026-27]

General Information

Sacramento Valley Charter School (SVCS) is a TK-8th grade school located in West Sacramento authorized by Washington Unified School District (WUSD). The school opened in 2011 and serves students from West Sacramento and several other local communities. Students elect to attend the school in order to take advantage of the core curriculum in English Language Arts (ELA), Math, Social Studies, Visual and Performing Arts, Science, World Language Punjabi, and Physical Education. Many students enter as English Learners (ELs) and are reclassified to English Proficient within two years. SVCS provides a safe learning environment, small class sizes, credentialed teachers, a California Common Core-aligned curriculum and myriad opportunities to build English language proficiency. SVCS supports measurable student outcomes toward the overall academic performance in core curriculum. SVCS sets specific measurable goals and actions to reflect goals pursuant to the Education Code and priorities of the State of California for charter schools that include: conditions of learning, student outcomes and parent engagement. To further support student learning, the school offers Winter, Spring, and Summer Intersession, as well as a robust after-school program which includes homework help, small group instruction, robotics, chess club, sports, and other extracurricular activities.

Reflections: Annual Performance

From the 2024-2025 California School Dashboard: English learners: 75.7% made significant progress; Mathematics: Students scored 20.5 points Above Standard, demonstrating an increase by 3.3 points; English Language Arts: Students scored 28.2 points Above Standard, but demonstrated a decline by 4.4 points. 2025-2026: To improve student learning outcomes, several strategies were initiated. First, a

commitment was made to ensure that every classroom was staffed by a credentialed teacher; second an instructional coach was hired to provide classroom and professional support to all teachers; third, each grade has an instructional aide to assist with small group instructional support and teacher preparation; fourth, research-based ELA, Social Studies, and Science curricula were purchased, along with teacher professional development to train teachers in implementation; fifth, a Coordinator was hired to institute and manage mid-year intersessions, summer school, and an after-school academic support program; sixth, the Social Emotional Learning initiative was strengthened to include college students working with students who may struggle with mental and emotional challenges while at school; seventh, the effort continues to hire highly qualified teachers to fill open classroom positions; eighth, parent involvement has been prioritized through evening family-oriented events, ELAC parent membership and supporting the Parent Teacher Organization; ninth, in that chronic pupil absenteeism continues to be challenging for the school, the Extended Learning and Student Data Coordinator, has collaboratively developed an Attendance and Independent Study policies which have resulted in greater parental accountability for student truancy and tardiness; tenth, to reduce student suspensions, the school continuously seeks viable alternatives such as Saturday School, character trait essays, class community meetings, and restorative justice opportunities; and, finally, funding priorities have been examined to ensure that expenditures have had the result of improving student academic and behavioral outcomes. At Sacramento Valley Charter School, we understand that parents are one of our greatest resources. We therefore welcome parents' participation, partnership, and support in every aspect of their child's education. As a school we remain committed to ensuring that every child experiences his or her fullest potential in an environment that is physically and emotionally safe.

SVCS prioritizes maintaining close communications and relationships with all stakeholders. Parent Newsletters are sent during each trimester to inform parents of activities, events, school priorities, and student achievement data results. Priority messages are sent through our School Wise notification system to send urgent information and to request/receive instant feedback. SVCS intermittently gathers community feedback through Surveys sent to parents that centered around the eight state priorities. SVCS sent surveys home and a great number of parents/ families responded to the surveys. SVCS holds periodic English Learner Advisory Committee (ELAC) meetings to update these constituent groups about curriculum, staff, school and fiscal matters. The PTO meets periodically to assist with school activities as well as receive updates about curriculum, staff, school and fiscal matters. SVCS scholars are involved through reading contests, participation in talent shows and multicultural events. Teachers give their feedback through monthly staff meetings and surveys. SVCS updates our authorizer, Washington Unified School District (WUSD), about our programs and policies during an annual presentation to its Board. In addition, SVCS meets with the different WUSD departments and shares enrollment/attendance/financial reports and board meeting agendas at the requested intervals. Student Council is involved to conduct morning assembly flag salute, fundraising events, and Student Council-led events at the end of the year.

Once a month, PLC professional development continues, during which teachers share and analyze data in order to make informed instructional decisions. The work performed during these PLC sessions comes directly from information obtained at the aforementioned PLC conferences. In addition, the principal attended the CA Charter School Conference where information about charter renewal and other topics were covered.

An explanation of why the LEA has developed this goal.

This goal has been set in order to provide opportunities to SVCS scholars to harmoniously develop physically, emotionally, and personally. CDE requires PE throughout the school year; we adhere to the requirements for 200 minutes of physical education every 10 school days. We have been experiencing extreme shortage of PE teachers and the situation has not improved despite our best efforts, in view of this we continue to hire outside agencies to provide a well structured PE program that is fully aligned with common core standards. The SWEAT program has served physical education needs to meet our expectations and standards. We are actively trying to recruit an Art Instructor for an Art Program that all our students can participate in. The art program engages students in multiple ways, develops their artistic skills, exposes them to art history and different art mediums. The world language program is fully aligned with common core standards and NGSS standards that provides even more of an advantage to SVCS scholars, enriching their skills in ELA, Grammar, Math, Science, and World Cultures. Our World Language program is a centerpiece of the school and our stakeholders take pride in this program.

Physical Fitness: Students receive physical education from a credentialed PE teacher at a rate of 200 minutes per every 10-day period. Students receive instruction in music, visual and performing arts at least 2 times per week, and Punjabi instruction for one period per day, five days per week.

There are no substantial differences between Budgeted Expenditures and Estimated Actual Expenditures and/or Planned Percentages of Improved Services and Estimated Actual.

The VAPA program uses a standards-based curriculum; every student has a textbook; foreign language instruction also includes cultural and historical curricular offerings.

Students were given the opportunity to express their talents in vocal music during several school-wide events. 2025-2026: Students received autoharp instruction in Gr. 4-7, and TK-6 students received traditional folk dance instruction. After witnessing the students' success, for 26-27, fifty autoharps will need to be purchased for 5th grade students; their teachers will provide the instruction. For 26-27, a full-time VAPA teacher will need to be hired in order to build a more robust music program.

Education Code 51210 describes the subject areas TK-6 which SVCS adopted over and above the minimum required subjects. The subject World Language Punjabi is required for all students TK-8 and has been offered since the beginning of the school in 2011. It distinguishes the school and validates the research that the offering of at least one foreign language from kindergarten is beneficial in developing students intellectually, and emotionally, and in creating new neural pathways. STEAM provides opportunities to students to use their interdisciplinary knowledge in order to strengthen their skills in other subject areas.

With greater than 80% socio-economically disadvantaged, in 2023-24, SVCS is implementing the NSLP and SBP for reimbursement of meals served to students and the addition of daily breakfast. Although SVCS has provided lunch at no cost to students since the school opened, the school will seek the available funding for breakfast and lunch through federal and State programs.
